The directors, each of whom is a trustee and, ex-officio, a governor, present their report together with the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 July 2004.

### STATUS AND ADMINISTRATION

The governing document is the Memorandum and Articles of Association. St George's College Weybridge was set up under a Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 11 February 1993, registration number 2789023.

The company is a charity registered with the Charity Commission Number 1017853.

### **OBJECTS**

The company's objects are to conduct and develop independent Roman Catholic Schools.

### **AIMS AND ETHOS**

St George's College and its Junior School aim to promote Christian values within a Roman Catholic context, encouraging a strong sense of family within the Josephite tradition. All pupils are equally valued and encouraged to fulfill their aspirations and potential in an environment of broadly based education within which they strive for the highest standards of academic excellence and sporting and extra-curricular achievement.

### **ORGANISATION**

The Governing Body decides matters of major School policy and meets usually four times a year. It operates through a Finance and General Purposes Committee and an Academic Committee which customarily meet 5 and 4 times a year respectively. Implementation of Governing Body decisions is the responsibility of the respective Headmasters as appropriate on the academic side, and of the Bursar on the business side of the schools.

### MANAGEMENT BOARD

The Headmaster, the Deputy Headmaster, the Director of Studies, the Curriculum Co-ordinator and the Bursar form the Management Board of the College. The Headmaster of the Junior School, the Deputy Headteacher, the Head of Curriculum and the Head of Lower Years of the Junior School and the Bursar form the Management Board of the Junior School. The Management Boards undertake the general and administrative management of each school. The two Headmasters and the Bursar attend all Governors' meetings.

### METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OF GOVERNORS

The Governing Body, upon the advice of the Nominations Committee, appoints governors.

### **REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES**

The company continues to operate two Roman Catholic Schools. One, St George's College, is a coeducational day school for pupils ages 11 – 18. The other is St George's College Junior School, a coeducational day school for pupils ages 3 - 11.

Phase 1 of the Development Plan was concluded.

### **FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

The final stage of Phase1 of the Development Plan was concluded in the financial year 2003/2004. Phase 2 is planned to commence in the financial year 2005/2006.

### **FIXED ASSETS**

A summary of all movements of fixed assets during the year is given in note 10 to the accounts.

## **CONNECTED CHARITIES**

Details of connected charities are disclosed in note 20 of the financial statements.

### **ASSET COVER FOR FUNDS**

Note 15 to the financial statements sets out an analysis of the School's assets attributable to the various funds. These assets are sufficient to meet the schools obligations on a fund by fund basis.

### RESERVES POLICY

In common with other charities, the School is asked to state its policy with regard to the build up of free reserves. Due to the high level of capital expenditure in past years, the School has long operated with a net borrowing position and a deficit of free reserves. At 31 July 2004, there were unrestricted general reserves of £6.4 million which after deducting investments in operational fixed assets of £10.3 million, gives a deficit of free reserves of £3.9 million.

If the expected reduction in borrowing were to continue, after 2005/06 there could eventually be positive free reserves. However, it is not the Governors' intention to allow free reserves to build up to too high a level. It is considered that a margin of working capital of one term's fee (currently about £3.7 million) would be adequate to enable the School to operate comfortably and to cope with any unexpected items of expenditure that could not be met from current income.

This policy will be regularly reviewed by the Governors, particularly if it appears that substantial free reserves are likely to become available.

### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

Over the course of the year there has been a progressive review of risk areas culminating in the production of a comprehensive identification of risk areas. Arising from this process, the major risks to which the charity is exposed as identified by the trustees have been reviewed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

### STATEMENT OF GOVERNORS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Company law and laws applicable to charities in England & Wales require the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of the Charity's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing those financial statements, the governors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the Charity and which enable them to ascertain the financial position of the Charity and ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

## **AUDITORS**

Following the transfer of substantially all of the business of Horwath Clark Whitehill to a limited liability partnership on 1 April 2004, Horwath Clark Whitehill will be resigning as auditors to the company at the conclusion of the Annual General Meeting.

The board has decided to recommend Horwath Clark Whitehill LLP for appointment as auditors of the company and, Horwath Clark Whitehill LLP having expressed their willingness to accept this appointment, a resolution appointing them will be submitted to the forthcoming Annual General Meeting.

## INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE GOVERNORS' OF ST GEORGE'S COLLEGE WEYBRIDGE

We have audited the financial statements of St George's College Weybridge for the year ended 31 July 2004 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and the related notes set out on pages 11 to 25. These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets and the accounting policies set out on pages 11 to 13.

The report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. ## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## a) Accounting Convention

The accounts of the Charitable Company are prepared in accordance with the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2000 and the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in October 2000 and with applicable accounting standards.

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets.

## b) Fees and Similar Income

Fees receivable and charges for services are accounted for in the period in which the service is provided. Fees receivable are stated after deducting allowances, scholarships and other remissions granted by the School.

## c) Donations

Donations received for the general purposes of the School are credited to unrestricted funds. Donations subject to specific wishes of the donors are credited to restricted funds.

## d) Resources Expended

Expenditure is classified under the two principal categories of charitable expenditure and costs of generating funds, rather than the type of expense, in order to provide more useful information to user of the financial statements.

Resources Expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. Charitable Expenditure is allocated to expense headings either on a direct cost basis, or apportioned according to time spent. The irrecoverable element of VAT is included with the item of expense to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise costs directly attributable to raising funds to finance the activities of the college.

Liabilities are realizable where there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the College to the expenditure.

## e) Leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

#### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)** 1.

#### f) **Fixed Assets and Depreciation**

Depreciation is not provided on freehold land. In accordance with FRS15 transitional arrangements, the school buildings are stated at valuation at 31 July 2001 and this deemed cost will be frozen subject to any adjustments necessary resulting from an impairment review. On other assets in use depreciation is provided on cost amounts in equal annual installments over the estimated lives of the assets.

All items of a capital nature over £1,000 are capitalised Capital assets donated to the School are realizable in fixed assets and credited to the statement of financial activities.

#### Stock g)

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

#### g) **Pension Schemes**

The Charity contributes to the Teachers' Pension Defined Benefits Scheme at rates set by the Scheme Actuary and advised to the Board by the Scheme Administrator. The scheme is a multi employer pension scheme and it is not possible to identify the assets and liabilities of the scheme which are attributable to the school. In accordance with FRS 17 therefore, the scheme is accounted for as a defined contribution scheme.

All non teaching staff are entitled to join a group personal pension scheme, which complies with the requirements for a Stakeholder Pension Scheme.

#### Joint Venture and Subsidiary Undertaking h)

The results of the Joint Venture Company and subsidiary undertaking are not consolidated. In the opinion of the Directors the results up to 31 July 2004 are immaterial in relation to the company's, and therefore should not be included.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## i) Unrestricted Funds

### **General Fund**

The surplus from normal School activities, and unrestricted donations are transferred to the General Fund.

## **Designated Funds**

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the governors for particular purposes.

## **Restricted Funds**

The Restricted Funds held are applied to the provision of scholarships to handicapped children and sixth form pupils, and for the provision of fixed assets.

## j) Advance Fees Scheme

The school offers parents the opportunity to pay for up to seven years tuition fees in advance in accordance with a written contract. The amount received is invested and interest is accrued to contracts. This is treated as deferred income until the pupil joins the school whereupon the fees for each school term is charged against the remaining balance and taken to income. Any shortfall is treated as a deduction from school fee income and any excess accrued is treated as additional school income.

## k) Unlisted Investments

Unlisted Investments are shares in the subsidiary and shares and loans to the joint venture company. These are held at the lower of book value or director's valuation.

The college contributed £34,163 as pension contributions to the above employees during the year.

No Governors received remuneration or were reimbursed expenses during the current or previous year.

## **Teachers' Pension Defined Benefits Scheme**

The School participates in a multi employer defined benefits pension scheme, the Teachers' Pension Scheme (England and Wales) ("the Scheme"), for its teaching staff. As a result it is not possible or appropriate to identify the assets and liabilities of the Scheme which are attributable to the school. The last Report by the Government Actuary (GA) covered the period 1 April 1996 to 31 March 2001. The valuation statement as at 31 March 2001 made in March 2003 revealed that the total liabilities of the Scheme (the estimated cost of past and future service benefits of existing members) amounted to £142,880 million. In accordance with the Teachers' Pension (Amendment) Regulations 2002, the actuarial review assumed that the value of the scheme assets equalled the value of the scheme liabilities at 31 March 2001. The scheme assets at 31 March 2001 consisted of future contributions in respect of existing members valued at £40.870 million and a balance of £102.010 million in the Teachers' Pension Account being a notional investment. The actuarial review assumed that the real rate of return on the notional investment is 3.5% in excess of price increases and 2% in excess of general earnings increases, therefore assuming a rate of real earnings growth of 1.5%. The assumed long-term gross rate of return is 7%. Following this report the standard contribution rate has been raised from 14.35% to 19.5% from 1 April 2003. 6% is to be paid by the teachers and the remaining 13.5% borne by the school. The superannuation charge represents contributions payable to the Scheme for the year ended 31 July 2004 of £524,446 (2003: £383,885).

The school also runs a scheme for its non-teaching staff, which is a defined contributions scheme. The cost for the year represents the school's contributions to the scheme of £129,183 (2003: £114,208).

## **Joint Venture**

The company has a 50% shareholding acquired on 25 March 1994 in a Joint Venture company, St George's College and Surrey County Tennis Centre Limited, incorporated in the United Kingdom, which manages the indoor tennis centre. The joint venture company is managed jointly by the company and Surrey County Lawn Tennis Association which owns the other 50% shareholding.

On 25 March 1994 the company agreed to provide land, with the approval of the Josephite Community, the freeholders, the company as the head lease holder, agreed to offer a sublease to Surrey County Lawn Tennis Association ("the Surrey Trustees") on similar lease terms. The Surrey Trustees agreed to build and fund the indoor tennis centre.

The joint venture company is responsible for making arrangements for use of the indoor tennis centre which under the present agreement is given equally to St George's College Weybridge, Surrey Trustees and the joint venture company which will let the courts for commercial profit. St George's College will assist by making available its own staff to carry out the joint venture company's operations. St George's College is also responsible for day to day maintenance of the tennis centre buildings. If a deficit is made by the joint venture company, it will be shared equally by St George's College and the Surrey Lawn Tennis Association.

## Josephite Community Loan

The company on 31 July 1993 took over the loan due to the Josephite Community amounting to £850,000 after waiver of £475,000. The governors agreed that should sufficient funds be available, the company would endeavour to repay that part of the loan waived by the Josephites.

The original loan advance of £850,000 is repayable in equal quarterly amounts over twenty years commencing on 1 September 2000 and interest of 5 % per annum is payable from 1 September 2000.

A further loan advance of £400,000 was made on 17 July 1995, the repayment terms are the same as the original loan advance and interest of 5% per annum is payable from the date of the advance.

## Sisters of the Infant Jesus Loan

The loan was advanced to the school on the acquisition of St Maur's School on 1 September 1999.

The total consideration on the sale was £2,000,000. £125,000 was repaid on completion, the remaining balance of £1,875,000 is repayable as follows:-

- First five months interest free and no capital repayments.
- Next four years and eight months interest payable in three instalments each year at 5% per annum and no capital repayments.
- The subsequent twelve years and eight months £199,998 payable per annum to cover interest and capital.
- Final payment of £17,927 payable on 1 June 2017.

## **Designated Funds**

The governors approved the formation of a Technology Appeal Fund which was to be used for the refurbishment of the old music block to provide a technology centre capable of delivering technology in the curriculum to key stage 4.
