REFERENCE AND ADMINISTRATIVE INFORMATION

The Charity was founded in 1993, and is registered with the Charity Commission under charity number 1017853. The Governors, executive officers and principal addresses of the Charity are as listed on page 1. Particulars of the Charity's professional advisers are given on page 2.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

St George's Weybridge is a charity and a company limited by guarantee (company number 2789023) The Company was known as St George's College Weybridge until 24 December 2012 when Companies House registered the change of name to St George's Weybridge The charity runs two schools, each autonomous, St George's College and St George's Junior School, the latter's name changing from St George's College Junior School on 8 October 2012 Each school has its own separate Department for Education number The schools are managed by the same Governing Body (Board of Directors)

The Company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association (2010) Governors are also guided by Terms of Reference for the Charity's seven committees

The Development Committee reports to the Board and was formed on 17 June 2013 The Building Sub-Committee reports to the Finance and General Purposes Committee and was formed on 14 October 2013

Governing Body

The Governors are required to be members of the Company and are also Trustees and Directors The Nominations Committee recommends individuals to the Governors for appointment to the Board New Governors are appointed by serving Governors at a full Governors' meeting to fill any casual vacancy and subsequently elected to a full first term at the Company's Annual General meeting Governors are appointed for terms of three years and may serve up to three terms. Governors may not be reappointed until one year has elapsed since their last day of prior service.

Governors' (Trustee) Training

All Governors are required to undergo induction training. The training has been provided internally by experienced members of the Board, the Clerk to the Governing Body and the Heads, and externally, either through AGBIS (the Association of Governing Bodies of Independent Schools) and/or by seminars hosted by professional advisers.

Organisational Structure

As a routine, the Board meets twice in the Christmas term and once in each other term. Additional meetings are held if required. Board meetings are preceded in the cycle by meetings of the Finance and General Purposes Committee and the Academic and Pastoral Committee so that Committee minutes can be produced in a timely way to enable their consideration at the ensuing Board meeting. The Strategic Planning Committee meets termly and reports to the next Board Meeting. The Remuneration Sub-Committee meets as required. The Nominations Committee meets as needed when vacancies on the Board arise. The Development Committee directs fundraising operations and meets as required. The Building Sub-Committee oversees major building development projects and meets as required.

The Board delegates executive responsibilities to the Heads of the respective schools and to the Bursar who is Clerk to the Governors and Company Secretary to the Company and to the related companies. In turn, the Heads and Bursar delegate responsibility to their Senior Management Teams.

Employee Involvement and Employment of People with a Disability

We consult with our employees about future College activities and issues of direct concern (such as terms and conditions) through a range of mechanisms

All employees have the opportunity to elect colleagues to represent them on various committees and groups that meet from time to time

We also engage with employees primarily through questionnaires and staff meetings, and where possible include employee representatives in the development of new HR policies so that employee views are reflected within our final proposals

We have a range of detailed HR policies to support our charitable and business objectives and to ensure compliance with employment legislation

The College will treat all employees, members of the College community and any person visiting the College in accordance with the Equalities Act and the College expects all employees and all other members of the College community to comply with this policy

Risk Management

The management of risk is a standing item considered by the Finance and General Purposes Committee. Risk is evaluated on a weighted basis and is the subject of a full and formal evaluation by the Board annually at its Summer Term meeting. Procedures are designed to identify the major risks to the Charity, and any risks so identified have been reviewed and systems or procedures have been established to manage them. The major risks to the Charity are

- Loss of fee income
- Loss of reputation
- A crisis affecting the operation of either school

OBJECTS, PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES FOR THE YEAR

Objects

The advancement of education by the provision and conduct of a school or schools for boys and girls to enable the fulfilment of their academic potential and personal development within an ethos of Christian ideals which derive from the traditions and teaching of the Roman Catholic Church and by ancillary or incidental education or religious activities for the benefit of the community

Principal Activities

The principal activity in fulfilment of the aims is the provision of day school education to boys and girls aged 3-11 in the Junior School and 11-18 in the College

Grant Making Policy

The School relieves fees by means of assisted places, bursaries, scholarships and staff fee remission Assisted places and bursaries are means-tested awards to new and current parents respectively. The Assisted Places scheme offers up to 100% fee assistance to pupils applying to either the College or Junior School from age 7 to 18, totalling £438k (2012 £407k) to 36 students in the year (2012 34) £324k (2012 £287k) was awarded in bursarial support to 49 (2012 42) current students. Scholarships are awarded on merit only and staff are able to access fee remission for any children they send to the School. In total, fees were relieved by £1,614k in the year – 8% of total fee income (2012 £1,478k)

Public Benefit

The Governors recognise the duty imposed upon them by the Charities Act 2011, Section 17 and also the requirement to have due regard to the general guidance provided by the Charity Commission in connection with Public Benefit

The Governors are fully committed to the principle of making the education at both schools open to all children of the necessary academic ability, regardless of family means. To this end, Governors continue to place a great emphasis on the Assisted Places Scheme which aims to make 53 places available across both schools, free of charge to low-income families. So as to ensure widespread publicity about the scheme, the College has undertaken local press advertising, displayed detail on the schools' website and distributed information in local parishes. Additionally, the schools will continue to support other families in hardship through their means-tested Bursary programme. The Governors set out below a schedule of the various activities in which the schools engage.

Activity

Description

St George's Weybridge and Surrey County Tennis Centre

The College hosts a facility on site for the promotion of physical education (tennis) to 80-90 boys and girls aged 4 to 16. The College pays all staffing and running costs of the Centre. These amounted to £50,518 in the year. The Centre is open to all children of the required potential/ability, regardless of parental means.

The School makes its facilities available either free of charge or at minimal cost to a number of local schools and organisations for physical education and other purposes

To Walton Leigh Special Needs School, the free use of athletics track, sports hall and tennis centre on an as required basis

To Philip Southcote School for children with learning difficulties, the free use of the tennis centre as required and the artificial sports pitch

To Heathside School and Salesian School (local maintained sector primary schools), the use of the athletics track for their summer programme

To Runnymede Borough Council, the use of all sports facilities when available for their programme to deliver physical education in the community

The School runs an annual 'Science, Maths and Technology Day' for several local state schools at no charge

The School runs a 'Superstars' sports event for several local state schools at no charge The Junior School invites three year groups from St Charles Borromeo RC Primary School to a day of Christian educational theatre provided by an external theatre company

Objectives for the Next Year

The annual objectives are derived from the St George's Weybridge Strategic Plan which has a 5-10 year horizon and groups strategic objectives into the following themes Academic, Public Benefit, Ethos/Culture, Governance/Structure, Facilities, Extra-Curricular and Financial Key annual objectives for next year are

- To promote the Assisted Places Scheme to continue to broaden the opportunities for a Georgian education
- Embark upon the build phase of the Junior School Lower Years Project by July 2014
- Introduce a new Virtual Learning Environment into both schools to enhance student experience
- Contain or reduce costs in targeted areas of school administration and support

REVIEW OF ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE IN THE YEAR

Academic

St George's College students celebrated a 100% pass rate at A Level with 97% achieving A^* - C grades and 83% achieving A^* - B grades. Five students gained places at Oxford University with one being awarded an organ scholarship to Exeter College and another gaining an Army Scholarship to study at Lady Margaret Hall. 86% of U6th students gained places at their first choice of university, 67 of which are at Russell Group institutions.

At GCSE, the College has maintained its 100% 5 A* - C grades 40 students gained all A* - A grades, including eight who achieved straight A*s 71% of students achieved A* - A grades, up 4% on the previous year and against a backdrop of decline in these grades nationally. Overall, 40% of grades were at A*, up from 34% last year. All the Fourth Year students took Religious Studies GCSE a year early, with 75% gaining A* - A grades, up from 60% last year. The whole cohort also took IGCSE English Language a year early with 65% gaining A* - A grades 31 of the Fourth Year took French a year early with everyone achieving A* - A grades and 65% gaining A*s. Four Fourth Years took Spanish GCSE gaining A*s. These GCSE results place us 27th in co-educational independent schools in the country.

At the Junior School, a full complement of 88 pupils started in Year 6 at the beginning of the 2012-13 academic year 85 pupils passed the entrance examination to St George's College and seven Junior School pupils were awarded academic scholarships, two were awarded sports scholarships and two music scholarships. At the end of the academic year, Year 6 pupils performed very well in the Independent Schools Examination Board examinations in English, Mathematics and Science In particular, excellent results in Mathematics were achieved with 18 pupils scoring over 90% and almost half the year group also completing the Level 1 13+ paper, again producing creditable results

In the Christmas Term, children participated in the Primary Maths Challenge, with one pupil qualifying for the National Final. In the Easter Term, two Year 6 mathematicians finished first overall out of forty teams in the Eagle House Challenge and seven Year 6 pupils performed superbly in the Junior Maths Challenge when competing against much older pupils, with two children receiving prestigious gold certificates. Year 6 pupils proved themselves to be highly competent and natural public speakers and performers. Two pupils were selected to represent the school at the Catenian Public Speaking Competition at St Dunstan's in Woking with one pupil being placed second overall.

Music

The College Choir sang for the first time at Mass at Westminster Cathedral, followed later in the term for Evensong for the first time at St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle. The Department staged its triennial 24 hour music marathon to raise awareness of how music can assist children with special needs, as well as its inaugural Jazz Supper showcasing our jazz and big band ensembles, soloists and staff performances, which as followed by another first, an evening dedicated to just chamber music from the senior musicians.

The Chamber Choir participated in the Armistice celebrations in Melle, Belgium In the same term, the combined music departments of the College and Junior School launched the first instrumental CD – Amore et Labore, raising funds for our Josephite schools in the Congo The singers also made their own CD, In corde meo, celebrating the high quality choral music across the school They also staged a mammoth 2013 choral project to sing Bach's St John Passion, in German, and accompanied by the professional Baroque instrumental ensemble, the Brandenburg Sinfonia

Later in the term we welcomed over 100 children to St George's from our feeder schools to join our own Lower School instrumentalists and enjoy making orchestral music together. A live BBC Radio broadcast of Sunday Mass was held in the Chapel at St George's College. The Chamber Choir gave a concert at the Queen's Chapel of the Savoy as part of the 2013 London Brandenburg festival.

Over 6,000 music lessons took place and over 100 students took exams. Students achieved the following the Organ Scholarship at Exeter College, Oxford for 2013 and Organ Scholar at St Mark's Hamilton Terrace, NW8, a choral scholarship to St Mark's, becoming the Leader of the Royal College of Music Junior Department's Chamber Orchestra, winning a place in the National Youth Training Choir, becoming Head Chorister at The Chapel Royal, Hampton Court, gaining a place in the Stoneleigh Youth Orchestra. The year was rounded off with the 2013 tour to New York, during which the Choir sang in two of New York's finest cathedrals, St John the Divine and the amazing St Patrick's Cathedral.

At the Junior School, pupils in Years 3-6, from both the Junior and Senior Choirs, participated in a joint concert at SGC to launch the CD 'Amore et Labore', made in the previous summer term. Over 200 pupils helped to raise money for the Lourdes trip by contributing in karaoke sessions, as part of the '24 Music Marathon' across both schools. All the members of the orchestra had the opportunity to attend a rehearsal at 'G Live' given by the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. The annual Summer Concert this year had the most pupils ever taking part. 148 pupils in both choirs, string groups, recorder group and orchestra performed. Every child at the JS has performed during the year from Nursery to Year 6 in nativities, Carol Services and Year Group Productions.

Sport & Competitions

The College and Junior School continue to achieve success on the sporting arena. Both schools strive for the highest standard whilst embracing a sport for all, regardless of ability. Championship successes were achieved in the following sports or competitions. All of the eight A Level students going onto Art College achieved places at their top choice university or college destinations two gained places at Central St Martins' in London, one to London College of Communication, two to Loughborough University and three achieved places at Farnham

A highlight last year was the third year gifted and talented Art exhibition at the Celebration of Achievement. This is the first time the Department have arranged an exhibition for the Lower School. As always, the GCSE and A Level exhibitions in the summer term were a great success. Displays of artwork are updated each year so the GCSE and A Level work is shown.

At the Junior School, the inaugural open evening art exhibition was a great success with all pupils in Years 5 and 6 submitting work on the theme of water. There was a delicate painting of a snow leopard drinking from an icicle, a multi-coloured oil pastel waterfall and even Poseidon with his trident — quite a selection for such young pupils. 13 girls from Year 6 completed 10 water cooler panels for a company to be used as part of their advertising campaign. Such was the quality of the work that all were considered to be outstanding and have been used on the company website.

Drama

The Drama Department added a new Year 1 production with each tutor group staging an adaptation of a Shakespeare play for parents in the Amanda Smith Theatre. The Senior School gave an engrossing performance of Sophocle's great tragedy Oedipus Rex followed by an adaptation of John Wyndam's The Crysallids and Moira Bufinni's A Vampire Story from the Lower and Middle School The year was rounded off by two outdoor performances of As You Like it and A Midsummer Night's Dream with Second year Drama Club and the Dance Group also contributing

Two OGs gained post graduate acting qualifications from Arts Educational and The Actor's Studio

At the Junior School, in the Autumn Term the Lower Years performed their Year Group Nativities during the lead up to Christmas. In the Spring Term Year 4 staged a production of 'The Plotters of Cabbage Patch Corner,' and Year 3 performed a new adaptation of 'George's Marvellous Medicine' – with a new score written by Mr Hodgson from the Junior School Music Department. Later in the Spring Term over 50 Year 6 pupils took their Grade 2 LAMDA Acting examinations and performed a showcase of their work. All our LAMDA pupils were awarded Distinctions and Merits. Year 4 also had considerable success with their English Speaking Board exams this year. Once again every child in the year group took the exam and achieved Distinctions, Merit Plus' and Merits. In the Summer Term Year 5 gave a demonstration of the work they had developed in their Drama Classes, including a selection of rehearsed scenes from 'Charlotte's Web' and 'Toad of Toad Hall' 28 Year 5 pupils also took their Level 3 English Speaking Board exams and were all awarded Distinctions. The year ended with the Year 6 Leavers' Revue, entitled 'A Night at the Movies,' which was a great success and much acclaimed by audiences. Outside of the classroom, pupils enjoyed a range of Drama Clubs and workshops. Many engaged in extracurricular performing arts activities outside of school, with some undertaking professional work. One of our Year 6 leavers was offered a scholarship to Elmhurst School of Dance in Birmingham.

Fundraising Performance

Voluntary Funds

The Development office has continued its fund-raising efforts in support of the Assisted Places Scheme and other projects. In the year £55k was raised (2012, £50k). A further sum of £147k (2012, £122k) was donated through Parents' Associations.

Trading Company

The charity received £76k (2012 £62k) by way of income representing the surplus of St George's Weybridge Enterprises Limited which was gift-aided to the School

Investment Performance

The company does not have an investment portfolio. Surplus funds are managed on a daily basis with the assistance of the company's bankers to maximise yield on money markets commensurate with the forecast cash demand. Gifts of shares are liquidated upon receipt

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total incoming resources for the year were £1,735k higher than the prior year Net movement in funds achieved during the year was £2,644k (2012 £1,951k)

Reserves Policy

Due to the high level of capital expenditure in past years, the Charity has long operated with a net borrowing position and a deficit of free reserves. At 31 July 2013, there were unrestricted general reserves of £23 6m (2012 £21 0m) which after deducting investments in operational fixed assets of £26 8m (2012 £26 9m), gives a deficit of free reserves of £3 2m (2012 £5 9m) funded by long term bank borrowing. In the light of the Governors' expected capital expenditure plans over the ensuing two years it is unlikely that free reserves will be generated. However, Governors ensure that sufficient funds are available to provide contingencies against unforeseen expenditure.

Designated Funds

There are no Designated Funds as at 31 July 2013

Restricted Funds

Restricted Funds for the provision of an Assisted Places Scheme at 31 July 2013 are £309k (2012 £266k) Assisted places will, for the foreseeable future, be largely funded through trading income to allow this fund to grow

Financial Viability

The Governors are currently satisfied on the basis of information available to them that the Charity is financially viable for the foreseeable future

Principal Funding Sources

Fee income represents the principal funding source

1 STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

11 Basis of accounts preparation

These accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the adoption of current cost for investment assets and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice on Accounting and Reporting by Charities the Charities SORP 2005. The results of the Joint Venture and subsidiary undertaking are not consolidated. In the opinion of the Trustees the results up to 31 July 2013 are immaterial in relation to the charitable company's results, and therefore should not be included.

1 2 Fees and similar income

Fees receivable and charges for services and use of premises are accounted for in the period in which the service is provided. Fees receivable are stated after deducting allowances, bursaries, scholarships and other remissions granted by the School, but include contributions received from Restricted Funds for scholarships, bursaries and other grants. Fees received in advance of education to be provided in future years under an Advance Fee Payments Scheme contract are held as interest-bearing liabilities until either taken to income in the term when used or else refunded. Investment income earned on them in the meantime, if exceeding the provision for any debt-financing costs arising under the contract, is taken to a designated fund to cover any ultimate shortfall that may arise on the Scheme.

1.3 Donations

Donations receivable for the general purposes of the Charity are credited to Unrestricted Funds Donations for purposes restricted by the wishes of the donor are taken to Restricted Funds where these wishes are legally binding, except that any amounts required to be retained as capital in accordance with the donor's wishes are accounted for instead as Endowments - permanent or expendable according to the nature of the restriction

1.4 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. Overheads and other costs not directly attributable to particular functional activity categories are apportioned over the relevant categories on the basis of management estimates of the amount attributable to that activity in the year, either by reference to staff time or space occupied, as appropriate. The irrecoverable element of VAT is included with the item of expense to which it relates

Governance costs comprise the costs of running the Charity, including strategic planning for its future development, also internal and external audit, any legal advice, and all the costs of complying with constitutional and statutory requirements, such as the costs of Board and Committee meetings and of preparing statutory accounts and satisfying public accountability

1.5 Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged in the SOFA on a straight line basis over the lease term

1.6 Pension schemes

The Charity contributes to the Teachers' Pension Defined Benefits Scheme at rates set by the Scheme Actuary and advised to the Board by the Scheme Administrator. The scheme is a multi-employer pension scheme and it is not possible to identify the assets and liabilities of the scheme which are attributable to the School. In accordance with FRS17 therefore, the scheme is accounted for as a defined contribution scheme. The Charity also contributes to a group personal pension scheme for non-teaching staff at 10% of annual basic pay. Contributions to both schemes are charged in the SOFA as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the schemes.

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

1.7 College land and buildings and equipment

Capitalisation and replacement

Tangible fixed assets costing in excess of £500 are considered for capitalisation. In accordance with the transitional provisions of Financial Reporting Standard 15, the School buildings are stated at valuation at 31 July 2001 and this deemed cost has been frozen subject to any adjustments necessary resulting from an impairment review. This valuation has not been updated

Depreciation

The freehold college land is not depreciated. Depreciation of other assets is provided at rates calculated to write off the excess of cost over estimated residual amount over the estimated useful economic lives of each class of asset, subject to annual review.

8.2 Joint Venture

The company has a 50% shareholding acquired on 25 March 1994 in a Joint Venture company, St George's Weybridge and Surrey County Tennis Centre Limited, incorporated in the United Kingdom, which manages the indoor tennis centre. The Joint Venture Company is managed jointly by the company and Surrey County Lawn Tennis Association which owns the other 50% shareholding.

On 25 March 1994 the company agreed to provide land, with the approval of the Josephite Community, the freeholders. The company as the head lease holder, agreed to offer a sublease to Surrey County Lawn Tennis Association ("the Surrey Trustees") on similar lease terms. The Surrey Trustees agreed to build and fund the indoor tennis centre.

The Joint Venture Company is responsible for making arrangements for use of the indoor tennis centre which, under the present agreement, is given equally to St George's Weybridge, Surrey Lawn Tennis Association and the Joint Venture Company which lets the courts to third parties. St George's Weybridge assists by making available its own staff to carry out the Joint Venture company's operations. St George's Weybridge is also responsible for day to day maintenance of the tennis centre buildings. Any deficit will be shared equally by St George's Weybridge and the Surrey Lawn Tennis Association.

15. PENSION SCHEMES

The School participates in the Teachers' Pension Scheme (England and Wales) ("the TPS"), for its teaching staff. This is a multi-employer defined benefits pension scheme and it is not possible or appropriate to consistently identify the liabilities of the TPS which are attributable to the School. As required by FRS17 "Retirement Benefits", the School accounts for this scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme.

The pension charge for the year includes contributions payable to the TPS of £817,307 (2012 £786,208) At the year-end £112,625 (2012 £102,757) was accrued in respect of contributions to this scheme

On 4 July 2012, the Chief Secretary to the Treasury confirmed that the Government would be taking forward legislation based on the reformed scheme design for the TPS to be introduced in 2015 as set out in the Teachers' Pension Scheme - Proposed Final Agreement ("the TPS Agreement") The TPS Agreement sets out the main parameters for both the provision of future pension benefits and the structuring of the future contributions to the TPS including the basis for increasing average employee contribution rates up to 2015

On 31 January 2013, the Department for Education published the outcome of the consultation on further contributions increases that will apply to members of the TPS in financial year 2013-14 as well as the removal of provisions governing scheme valuations and cap and share arrangements A revised eight tier salary and employee contribution rate structure has been introduced from 1 April 2013 with employee rates varying between 6 4% and 11 2% Employer contributions will continue for this period at the current rate 14 1%

On 25 April 2013, the Public Service Pensions Act 2013 was enacted and provides the arrangements for managing the future TPS costs, including a requirement for scheme regulations which must set an employer cost cap which will be required to be in accordance with Treasury directions

In light of the new arrangements for setting contribution rates the Government has concluded that there is now no need to carry out the currently suspended TPS actuarial review or the cap and share processes

The Charity also runs a scheme for its non-teaching staff, which is a defined contributions scheme. The cost for the year represents the Charity's contributions to that scheme of £197,297 (2012 £175,998)
