GYPSIES & TRAVELLERS WALES REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st MARCH 2015

Structure, Governance and Management

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is therefore governed by Memorandum and Articles of Association. All members of the company are also trustees of the charity and there are no other trustees. The Executive Committee of trustees has the power to appoint additional trustees as it considers appropriate. The Executive Committee meet at least every two months to manage their affairs and receive regular reports from the staff.

Public Benefit

The Trustees have paid due regard to Charity Commission guidance in planning and managing the activities and work of the organisation for public benefit. Details of the main activities are described in the following two sections.

Objectives and Activities

The charity's objects and principal activities continue to be

- (i) the promotion of an understanding of Gypsies and Travellers way of life;
- (ii) the protection and relief of Gypsies and Travellers who are in conditions of need, hardship, sickness and distress, and
- (iii) the promotion of good relations by encouraging equal opportunities between Gypsies, Travellers and persons of different racial groups in a multicultural society.

In achieving these objects Gypsies & Travellers Wales (G&TW) aims to support and enable Gypsies and Travellers to achieve a high and sustainable quality of life, within their own culture, through improving access to suitable accommodation, public services and employment skills. Our work enables Gypsies and Travellers to access public services, to deal with problems and to express their views and wishes to public bodies, and equally supports public bodies in engaging with Gypsies and Travellers and their needs through advice, information and facilitation.

The staff structure during the year comprised senior liaison officer (4 days/week), liaison officer (3 days/week) and office manager (full time), which was a reduced staff complement owing to loss of Welsh Government funding in the previous year. Even this staffing level was partially supported from reserves during 2014/15 to cushion impact on service, and with the intention to seek additional funding. However, additional funding was not found and a further reduction of staffing was implemented at the start of 2015/16 along with a move to sharing a much smaller office within another organisation to reduce costs.

Achievements and Performance

Liaison Project

This project provides extensive information, advice and support to both Gypsies and Travellers, and to services and professionals in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan.

Throughout the year the project ran more than 80 advice sessions dealing with drop-in requests and appointment sessions. Caseworkers often work with a multiplicity of issues. The most frequent issues were to do with accommodation, and despite the desperate shortage of accommodation we were able to prevent homelessness for 75 families through a combination of advice, direct casework and partnership work with other agencies.

In addition to our work with Gypsy & Traveller families we received requests for advice and support from 64 public services and agencies. (partnership work). We continue to run the Cardiff multi-agency network meetings where information, contacts and good practice are shared on issues of community development, cohesion and safety. The project continues to provide both formal and informal awareness raising information and opportunities throughout its work.

<u>Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan first-contact service for unauthorised encampments</u>

We continue to provide the first contact where there are unauthorised encampments in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan. There has been an increase in the number of encampments in this year.

IT and Driver Training.

The computer based driving theory project was provided two evenings session a week attended by Gypsy and Traveller young people and women. One was based at the Shirenewton Site and the other at G&TW's office base. An average of 4 students per session achieved pass rate of 100% for Driving Theory tests as well as receiving training in and through ICT. The sessions provide students with opportunities to overcome poor literacy levels, become familiar with basic IT skills, and to develop existing skills.

Unfortunately, the funding for the project ceased at the end of 2014/15 and the project no longer operates.

Developing Plans and Strategies

In 2014/15 we continued to enable and encourage Gypsies and Travellers to participate in consultations and appropriate decision making processes and to support the inclusion and development of Gypsy & Traveller needs in relevant strategies and plans of service providers

G&TW continued to input into the consultations and evidence needed for the Welsh Government to ensure it met the needs of the Gypsy and Traveller community:

- G&TW contributed to the development of the Welsh Government Guidance documents on conducting Gypsy and Traveller Accommodation Needs Assessments as well as discussions on improvements on the twice yearly caravan count on which these needs assessment are often based.
- The Welsh Government requested our direct input to their draft strategy on health outcomes for Gypsies and Travellers. Their strategy document Travelling to a Better Health is the first health strategy implemented in Wales designed to

improve health outcomes and life chances for Gypsies and Travellers. Gypsies and Travellers Wales encouraged and facilitated consultation directly with Gypsy and Traveller communities in Cardiff both on sites and in bricks and mortar housing in order that they themselves had opportunity to input and shape the guidance.

- GTW has worked with Tai Pawb (a national voluntary organisation that promotes equality in housing in Wales) regarding the new duty that will commence in 2016 directing Local Authorities to provide Gypsy and Traveller Sites in Wales where unmet need is evidenced by way of Gypsy and Traveller Accommodation Needs Assessments.
- GTW also worked with Cardiff Council and Welsh Government regarding the relocation and management of Rover Way caravan site, ensuring that residents have an opportunity to input into this action plan as well as have the opportunity for regular engagement with the Local Authority. Part of the project looked at the practicalities of using a restorative approach with Rover Way Residents as part of the long term engagement to the Council's long term action plan for the relocation of Rover Way.
- GTW supported the Welsh Government's Cross party Gypsy and Traveller Strategy meetings enabling Gypsies and Travellers to actively contribute to these discussions. This year a member of staff was invited to sit on the cross party group speaker panel to speak on behalf of the Gypsy and Traveller Community in Cardiff and give a presentation on fuel poverty and how Gypsies and Travellers are directly affected and disadvantaged in terms of utility supplies on Council Sites.

Risk Review

The Trustees are aware that the organisation is subject to a range of potential risks in finance, operations, governance and compliance, and by external factors. A comprehensive Risk Register has been maintained.

Financial Review

The major funder in 2014/15 was Cardiff County Council which funded the core structure of the organisation and the advice and liaison work with Gypsies and Travellers. The Vale Council continued a small grant to provide an occasional outreach service and support for the Council's services to Gypsies and Travellers in the Vale. The Trustees wish to thank all funders for their generous support and commitment during the year.

Our income in 2014/15 was £83,468 with expenditure totalling £129,925 resulting in a deficit of £46,457 for the year. This compared with 2013/2014 year income of £152,873 with expenditure totalling £160,533 resulting in a deficit of £7,660. The income reduction is mainly due to the loss of the Welsh Government grant that ending 31st March 2014. Trustees had agreed to support revenue costs from reserves during the year to cushion the impact on services of staff reduction and in the hope of accessing additional funding. A portion of the deficit was due to the

costs of temporary agency staff employed to cope with sickness absence of a member of staff, and was therefore higher than originally budgeted. On the 31st March 2015 unrestricted reserves had reduced significantly from £60,520 at the start of the year to £15,265, this is now below the level of reserves that the Trustees need to maintain and Trustees will endeavour to build reserves again. The reserves policy is to attain free reserves to cover a minimum of three months expenditure, which is approximately £20,000.

Finances for 2014/15 have been extremely difficult but reductions in staffing and in office costs through co-location with another NGO, and use of reserves enabled a phased but substantial reduction in costs. With further reduction in staffing and costs for 2015/16 we are maintaining financial viability.

Plans for the future

GTW will continue to carry out objectives to protect and promote an understanding of the Gypsies and Travellers way of life.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES ON THE UNAUDITED ACCOUNTS OF GYPSIES AND TRAVELLERS WALES LIMITED

YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2015

I report on the accounts of the company for the year ended 31st March 2015 as set out on pages 4 to 9.

Respective Responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The charity's Trustees (who are also the Directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 (2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to an audit under Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006 and is eligible for independent examination, It is my responsibility to:

- 1) examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- 2) to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145 (5) (b) of the 2011 Act; and
- 3) to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's report

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2015

1 CHARITABLE STATUS

The Company is a Registered Charity under the Charities Act 2011 and is accordingly exempt from taxation on its charitable activities.

2 LIABILITIES OF MEMBERS

The Company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The Memorandum of Association provides that every member is liable to contribute a sum not exceeding £10 in the event of the company being wound up while they are a member or within one year of ceasing to be a member.

3 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- a) The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards and follow the recommendations in Statements of Recommended Practice:- Accounting by Charities (SORP), revised in 2005, and with the Financial Reporting Standard for smaller entities (effective April 2008).
- b) Restricted Funds are to be used for specified purposes as laid down by the Donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the Fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.
- c) Unrestricted Funds are those Funds received or generated for the objects of the Charity without further specified purpose and are available as General Funds, and for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

d) Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement Of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- → Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- → Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- → Investment income is included when receivable.
- → Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2015

3 ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

→ Grants receivable for the purpose of purchasing fixed assets are credited to a Capital Grant Reserve Fund and written off over the same period as the corresponding fixed assets.

e) Resources Expended

- → Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred.
- → Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services. It includes both directly allocated and indirect costs necessary to support them.
- → Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the Charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the Charity including a proportion of support costs in relation to achieving this.
- → All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis I.e. staff usage.
- f) Depreciation is provided on all Tangible Fixed Assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its estimated useful life, on a 25% reducing balance basis.

g) Pension

The organisation operates a defined contribution scheme for the majority of employees. The assets of the defined contribution scheme are held separately from those of the Organisation. The contributions to the defined contribution scheme are charged fully to the Profit and Loss Account.

One former employee had pension contributions dealt with under a defined benefit scheme. The scheme is the Cardiff and Vale of Glamorgan Pension Fund which is administered by Cardiff Council. It is part of the national Local Government Pension Scheme for England & Wales. Pension costs are assessed in accordance with the advice of the schemes actuary. The sole employee in the scheme was made redundant on 31st March 2015. We informed the pension scheme that G&TW will withdraw from the scheme and entered into negotiations about payment of the final deficit contribution with Cardiff City Council.

The actuarial valuation carried out in 2013 indicated that on the present value of estimated future pensions payable there would be a deficit on the scheme. Another actuarial assessment was carried out in December 2014 and the deficit at that date was £190,000, though this would have to be recalculated to the date of any eventual withdrawal from the scheme.

13 CONTINGENT LIABILITY

The Charity had one employee belonging to a defined pension benefit pension scheme with the Cardiff and Vale of Glamorgan Pension Fund.

The one employee remaining in the Scheme was made redundant at 31st March 2015.

We informed the Pension Scheme that G&TW would withdraw from the Scheme and entered into negotiations about payment of the final deficit contribution with Cardiff City Council which administers the Pension Scheme. G&TW made a proposal to pay off the deficit at £5000 p.a. over an extended period. This proposal has been accepted in writing but is subject to Cardiff City Council agreeing to act as 'sponsor' for the organisation in this arrangement.

We are awaiting the final actuarial recalculation to determine the final liability to the pension fund.

14 GOING CONCERN

The Charity receives funding on an annual basis as opposed to long term funding. As a consequence there can be uncertainty over the Chartity's future until confirmation of annual funding is received. The Trustees are aware of this issue and are currently addressing the matter.

The extent of any final deficit of the Pension Scheme will also have a detrimental effect on the Charity's future if a funding solution and payment scheme is not agreed.

The Trustees consider that in preparing the financial statements, they have taken into account all the information that could reasonably be expected to be available. On this basis, they consider that it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis. This assumes that the Trustees can secure sufficient core funding to enable the Charity to continue.

The financial statements do not include any adjustments that would result if the Trustees are not successful in their plans.
