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Directors' report

The directors present their annual report and the audited consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2000.

Principal activities

The principal activities of the group are the manufacture and supply of anionic, nonionic and cationic polyacrylamides for use in the mining, paper, water treatment and oilfield industries, and the manufacture and distribution of composites and adhesives for use, primarily, in the aerospace and leisure industries.

Business review

Details of the group's results for the year are set out in the profit and loss account on page 5.

Research and development

The directors consider that research and development plays a vital role in the group's success. A significant part of the work of the group's technical services and laboratory staff is concentrated in this area.

The group's spending on research and development during the year was £260,000 (1999:£255,000).

Market value of land and buildings

In the opinion of the directors the market value of the land and buildings of the company on an existing use basis is not materially different from the book value of these assets.

Proposed dividend and transfer to reserves

The profit for the year after taxation was £7,111,000 (1999: £5,951,000). The directors do not recommend the payment of an ordinary dividend (1999: £2,440,000). Therefore, the profit for the year retained in the group was £7,111,000 (1999: 3,511,000).

Notes

(forming part of the financial statements)

1 Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and under the historical cost accounting rules.

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated accounts include accounts of the company and both of its subsidiaries up to 31 December 2000. No profit and loss account is presented for the company as provided by section 230 of the Companies Act 1985.

Fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided by the group to write off the cost less the estimated residual value of tangible fixed assets by equal instalments over their estimated useful economic lives as follows:

Freehold buildings - 2.5% per annum

Plant and machinery - 10% per annum

Fixtures and fittings - 10-33% per annum

Motor vehicles - 20% per annum

Computer equipment - 20% per annum

No depreciation is provided on freehold land and assets in the course of construction.

Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated using the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date and the gains or losses on translation are included in the profit and loss account.

Government grants

Capital based government grants are included within accruals and deferred income in the balance sheet and credited to trading profit over the estimated useful economic lives of the assets to which they relate.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Leases

Where the company enters into a lease which entails taking substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset, the lease is treated as a 'finance lease'. The asset is recorded in the balance sheet as a tangible fixed asset and is depreciated over its estimated useful life or the term of the lease, whichever is shorter. Future instalments under such leases, net of finance charges, are included with creditors. Rentals payable are apportioned between the finance element, which is charged to the profit and loss account, and the capital element which reduces the outstanding obligation for future instalments.

All other leases are accounted for as 'operating leases' and the rental charges are charged to the profit and loss account on a straight line basis over the life of the lease.

Pensions and other post-retirement benefits

The group operates defined benefit pension schemes for the majority of its employees, providing benefits based on final pensionable pay. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the group. Contributions to the schemes are charged to the profit and loss account so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the group.

Research and development expenditure

Expenditure on research and development is written off against profits in the period in which it is incurred.

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. In determining the cost of raw materials, consumables and goods purchased for resale, the weighted average purchase price is used. For work in progress and finished goods manufactured by the group, cost is taken as production cost, which includes an appropriate proportion of attributable overheads.

Taxation

The charge for taxation is based on the profit for the period and takes into account taxation deferred because of timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes. Provision is made for deferred tax only to the extent that it is probable that an actual liability will crystallise in the foreseeable future.

Turnover

Turnover represents the amounts (excluding value added tax) derived from the provision of goods and services to customers during the year.

21 Contingent liabilities

A subsidiary of the group, Cytec Engineered Materials Limited, has guaranteed duty charges to HM Customs and Excise; the maximum liability at the year end was £100,000.

The group paid a royalty charge to an associated company, Cytec Technologies Corporation Inc, a US resident corporation, at the rate of 2% on qualifying sales for a number of years to the year ended 31 December 1999. The level of royalty income recognised by the US company is currently under review by the US tax authorities, which could result in additional royalty costs in the UK in respect of qualifying sales for the periods ended 30 November 1994 to 31 December 1999. It has been estimated that the maximum liability of the group is of the order of £3,819,000. Net of tax this will be in the order of £2,574,000.

22 Pension schemes

The group operates two pension schemes in the United Kingdom, providing benefits based on final pensionable pay, contributions being charged to the profit and loss account so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the group.

For Cytec Engineered Materials Limited, the contributions are determined by a qualified actuary on the basis of triennial valuations using the projected unit funding method. The most recent valuation was at 29 June 2001. The assumptions which have the most significant effect on the results of the valuation are those relating to the rate of return on investments and the rates of increase in salaries and pensions.

Investment return - 5.75%-6.75% per annum
Earnings increases - 4.25% per annum
Pension increases - 2.5% per annum

The most recent actuarial valuation showed that the market value of the scheme's assets was £4,748,000 and that the actuarial value of those assets represented 102% of the benefits that had accrued to members, after allowing for expected future increases in earnings. The contributions of the company and employees will remain at 12% and 5% of earnings respectively.

There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

For Cytec Industries UK Limited the most recent formal actuarial valuation of the Scheme was undertaken as at 31 December 1999. The valuation was carried out using the projected unit method with the Scheme's assets being valued by discounting the expected future income generated by them.

An appropriate review of the funding position was carried out as at 1 January 1999 for the purpose of determining the pension charge. The main assumptions are as follows:-

Price inflation - 2.9 % per annum
Salary increases - 4.8% per annum
Pension increases - pre 97 - 0.0% per annum
Pension increases - post 97 - 2.9% per annum
Investment return - pre retirement - 6.9% per annum
Investment return - post retirement - 4.9% per annum

As at 31 December 1999 the market value of the assets of the Scheme was £9,353,000 and the actuarial value of the assets was sufficient to cover 105% of the benefits that had accrued to members, after allowing for expected future increases in salaries.

The total pension charge for the year was £426,000 (1999: £372,000).

The contributions of the Company are 10% of Scheme salaries for the period. Employees also contribute 5% of Scheme salaries.

At 31 December 2000 an accrual of £800,000 (1999: £658,000) is included in creditors, this being the excess of the accumulated pension cost over the accumulated contributions paid.
