Day to day decisions are delegated to the Centre Director who is assisted by staff. The Centre Director regularly reports back to the committee.

OBJECTS

The trust's objects are:

- to provide facilities for recreation with the objects of improving the conditions of life and social welfare of the inhabitants of the London Borough of Islington, Haringey and Hackney ("the area of benefit")
- to provide a community centre for the benefit of those living in the area of benefit;
- to advance education for those living in the area of benefit;
- to relieve poverty by providing advice and assistance to those in need; and
- to undertake any other charitable activity

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES 2008-09

The trustees, in planning the activities for the year, have had due regard to Charity Commission guidance on public benefit.

It was a very busy year for everyone at Elizabeth House – employees, volunteers, as well as, all users of the Centre. We would like to express our thanks for everybody's contribution and help in running the Centre, and delivering good quality projects for the benefit of many local people. It was also a year of some changes in the structure of the Centre. Following serious discussions we have completed a restructuring process, and a Children's Activities Co-ordinator has been appointed. Their duty is the overall responsibility of all activities for children run within the centre. A few long-serving members of staff have left, in the last year. We would like to thank all of them for their hard work over many years and their contribution to the local children and young people.

We can say that it was another successful year with more people participating in various activities, and using Elizabeth House. The Trust, with the small team of staff and volunteers, have continued to provide a variety of services for the communities of Highbury, Finsbury Park, Arsenal and Stoke Newington areas. We have been working in partnership with City & Islington College, Highbury Children's Art Group, London Youth, London Lishi Arts, The Saturday School of High Achievement, Safer Neighbourhood Police, Fin-Future and several other community groups, with the support of Islington Council, local MPs and Councillors. City & Islington College ran a wide range of classes for young people and adults, including those with learning difficulties, in basic skills, IT, catering, retail, drama, dancing and various sports activities. The Saturday School of High Achievement ran Saturday support classes for Caribbean boys aged 6-15, and the Highbury Children's Art Club worked with children 5-12 years of age, who want to develop their artistic skills.

We have made good progress in raising money for the refurbishment of the sports hall, which will improve the facilities and enable us to increase the number of activities for local children and young people. We have chosen a contractor and are planning to start the work in June 2009.

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES 2008-09 (continued)

For Children (5-12 year olds)

After School Club has been run for children aged 5-12, from Monday to Friday during school term time. Partnership agreement with Gillespie and St John's of Highbury Primary Schools attracted more children, and helped to develop new activities within the club. Children who attend the club can participate in different activities: arts, craft, cooking, drumming, gardening, as well as, using computers and search on the Internet or receive help with homework. Up to 230 children participate, weekly, in the various activities run within the centre.

Holiday Playschemes is run during the half-terms and holidays, throughout the day, from Monday to Friday. Daily, up to 40 children can take part in and benefit from a wide variety of different indoor and outdoor activities. By involving them in different activities, we want to make positive changes in their lives, build confidence and self-esteem: make new friendships and be active in their society. The 'Summer in the City' programme ran for 6 weeks and was very successful: we will continue to run this in the future.

Around the World Project – supplementary classes in English, Maths, Geography, Arts and Biology. The project is built on the idea of travelling via different continents: learning about various countries, cities, languages, dancing, cooking traditional food, making traditional costumes, and at the end we are planning a trip to the ZOO to identify animals living in different locations.

Non-contact boxing - For young people aged 8-16 and has been running once a week and up to 16 people participate in this fitness training, weekly.

Football training - This most popular sport activity has been running twice a week and attracted up to 24 people each time.

Break-dancing – the 'taster sessions' were very well attended and the participants have shown their interest and talent in performing, hence, we are working on securing funding so the project can be run for a longer period of time.

The Highbury Children's Art Club, with the support of the trust, runs The Art Club and up to 45 children participate in the programme on a weekly basis. The exhibition of children's artwork in July 2008, during the Open Day, was very successful and attracted a large crowd of visitors.

Youth Club (12-17 years of age)

Opened two years ago, the Youth Club has grown very rapidly and over 80 people have joined. Young people could participate in: Motorbike project (repairing and riding), Non-Contact Boxing, DJ Sessions, Football training, Cooking. The summer project "Multimedia – Building website" was very successful. It was a great opportunity for the local young people to participate in this unique project. As a result of the training, two of the boys built the website for the Centre (www.elizabeth-house.org). Generic Friday Night Session includes activities such as: pool, table tennis, street dancing, playstation, searching on the internet, as well as discussions and outings.

During each week approximately 60 young people participated in various activities. The residential weekends for young people were very successful. During these weekends they took part in a series of educational workshops and activities, based around the skills for life e.g. confidence building, team working, achieving personal goals, empowerment and inspiration. They were also involved in an awareness workshop raising awareness on sexual health, drugs, and street crime, children and young people. We are working on securing funding for this project and new activities which we hope to commence in the near future.

We wish to express thanks to all volunteers and staff who contributed to the trust's work throughout this period. We would also like to take this opportunity to thank all the organisations who have supported the trust financially in the last year: without these contributions, we would not be able to celebrate our achievements.

RESERVES POLICY

The charity has a reserves policy. At 31 March 2009 the charity has free reserves of £65,905. Free reserves are those unrestricted funds not invested in fixed assets. The trustees consider that the level of free reserves is inadequate and are seeking further funding to remedy the situation.

Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the latest Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) for charities, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective Jan 2007) and the Companies Act 1985.

Donations

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when received. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Grants and other income

Grants are recognised in full in the SOFA when receivable. Hire of premises and other incoming resources are included in the SOFA when receivable.

Fund accounting

Restricted funds are grants, donations and other incoming resources which are to be used for specific purposes as laid by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.

Unrestricted funds are grants, donations and other incoming resources receivable for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and is exclusive of VAT.

Governance costs

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include costs linked to the strategic management of the charity. Governance costs which cannot be allocated directly are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

Depreciation

Details of restricted funds

The Buildings fund represents the cost and improvement of Elizabeth House less loan and accumulated depreciation.

The Children's Fund is to provide education and activities for children during term time after school and during school holidays.

The Youth Club Fund is to provide education and activities for young people.

The Repairs and Maintenance Fund is to provide repairs and maintenance for Elizabeth House.

12. Financial commitments

At 31 March 2009 the charity has a commitment during the next year of £2,000 under a non-cancellable lease of a photocopier, which expires within one to five years.
