# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### **Governing document**

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 2 September 1993 and registered as a charity on 6 December 1993. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which defined the objects and powers of the charitable company. It is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

### Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law. The trustees have developed a policy for the recruitment of trustees that ensures their collective experience and skills are best able to meet the needs of the charity. Trustees are elected by the members of the charity at Annual General Meetings.

### Organisational structure

The trust is managed by a committee made up of the trustees, normally meeting bi-monthly at Elizabeth House.

Day to day decisions are delegated to the Centre Director who is assisted by staff. The Centre Director regularly reports back to the committee.

### **OBJECTS**

The trust's objects are:

- to provide facilities for recreation with the objects of improving the conditions of life and social welfare of the inhabitants of the London Borough of Islington, Haringey and Hackney ("the area of benefit")
- · to provide a community centre for the benefit of those living in the area of benefit;
- · to advance education for those living in the area of benefit;
- to relieve poverty by providing advice and assistance to those in need; and
- · to undertake any other charitable activity

### **REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES 2013 - 2014**

The Trustees consider that the performance of Highbury Vale Blackstock Trust (HVBT) this year has been satisfactory. The trustees have considered and discussed the issue of Public Benefit which is a requirement under the Charities Act 2011 and have concluded that the activities carried out by the Trust fulfil this requirement

### Who we are and what we do

Highbury Vale Blackstock Trust (Elizabeth House) was established in its present form in 1993 but has served the local community by providing:

- · Educational services meeting the needs of children, young people and the wider community;
- Recreational opportunities to the local community contributing to well being and healthy lifestyle choices and
- · Affordable rental facilities to individuals, groups and organisations for functions, meetings and activities.

The team of staff and volunteers has continued to provide a variety of services for the communities of Highbury, Finsbury Park, Arsenal and Stoke Newington areas. During the year the Trust worked in partnership with City & Islington College, Highbury Children's Art Group, London Youth, Safer Neighbourhood Police, Highbury Taekwondo Club and several other community groups supported by Islington Council, local MPs and Councillors. City & Islington College based classes delivered in partnership with Job Centre Plus, including ESOL, employability, IT and office skills at Elizabeth House.

The Trust, operating from its own freehold property, Elizabeth House at 2 Hurlock Street, London N5 1ED, in the London Borough of Islington, has been able to refurbish and undertake repairs within the building with Section 106 funding from the London Borough of Islington. This year this has enabled us to repaint the main hall. Further works will be possible to improve and maintain Elizabeth House to a good standard in the coming year in the programme of works to be completed by 2016. In addition section 106 funding from the London Borough of Islington has enabled Elizabeth House to refurbish the IT Suite and paid for installation of audio visual equipment in all meeting rooms/classrooms Elizabeth House remains an Islington Community Hub, one of 11 in the London Borough of Islington providing a focus for local community activity which brings residents together to improve the quality of life in their areas. Further Elizabeth House holds the Visible Communities Standard (Charity Commission endorsed accreditation) administered by Community Matters in recognition of the good quality of its work.

### After School Club and Holiday Play Schemes (5-12 year olds)

It has been another successful and enjoyable year at Elizabeth House with after schools and playscheme services offered, as always in a very caring environment where children are encouraged to look out for one another and work together.

Elizabeth House has maintained good working relationships with three local schools, St John's Highbury Vale, Gillespie Primary School and Parkwood School with up to 35 children attending each day.

A wide range of regular activities are developed based on children's ideas and interests designed to develop communication and language, physical development and personal, social and emotional development. They include a wide range of sports and physical activities, creative arts and crafts, cooking, drama and storytelling.

Holiday Play Schemes catered for up to 45 children during half term breaks and 70 during the six week summer break.

### After School Club and Playscheme highlights

- Roller Disco has proved very popular and drawn new children who are not normally EH regulars into the Centre. The disco is run by former EH service user George who has been introduced to volunteering by this activity.
- Lemonade entrepreneurs from the After School Club sell lemonade to parents and carers picking up from the Centre. Profits are used for an end of term party and the project helps to develop money skills and financial literacy.
- The After School Club put on an excellent Christmas Show for parents and Trustees. The show involved children in event planning, scripting, make-up and costumes. Participation was excellent with 30 young people taking part.
- We have been engaged in an environmental project with Octopus Wild Places which has involved building bug houses, preserving bird nests and seed planting. EH will develop this relationship further over the coming year.
- Trips to places of local interest as well as the annual seaside visits to Brighton and Broadstairs.

### Youth Club (12-17 years of age)

The Youth offer at HVBT has been developed with the financial support of the Leathersellers Company to include activities requested by young people but also new opportunities designed to extend their experiences developing team work, self esteem and personal/social skills.

The Youth Club has benefited from the Jack Petchey scheme with three awards made to young people who have made a difference in the Youth Club or made an exceptional contribution in the youth club or local community. They have used the award money to buy equipment and develop activities.

### Youth Club (12-17 years of age) (continued)

Weekly football coaching sessions have continued through the year proving to be very popular with an attendance of up to 24 young people aged ten to sixteen years.

### Youth Club highlights

- HRH Prince Philip's visit in October 2013 was organised through London Youth, of which EH is an
  affiliate member holding a silver quality mark. The Prince was accompanied by City Bridge and other
  funders of youth work in London.
- Volunteer It Yourself ten young people gained City & Guilds accreditation in painting and decorating.
  They refurbished the canteen and converted an office into a quiet room for young people. This
  programme was undertaken in partnership with London Youth and Wickes, and also funded by the Big
  Lottery.
- A Computer Building pilot for the After School Club had young people doing basic computer coding and the Youth Club built computers that participants could take home. These highly successful projects will be developed further in the coming year.
- Successful healthy living and life skills project combining physical activities and cooking. This was enhanced by having a qualified chef volunteering with us.

### **Educational Support**

Elizabeth House continues to run support classes in English and Math with the project designed to help children and young people with their homework by providing support in groups of no more than ten young people.

### Centre

- Lettings increased to include Dynamics a social group for young people with autism and we have seen an astronomy group joining us
- This year EH hosted an International Women's Day celebration which attracted over 200 women and girls. We were delighted to work in partnership with One True Voice, a Somalian women's group with whom we have created an ongoing relationship and are already planning an event for 2015.
- We are working more closely with Blackstock Tenant Management Organisation on joint community events, for example Halloween, and environmental activities such as planting. The Halloween event involved a firework display, along with making and sharing food.

### Taekwon-Do

Taekwondo now in its fourth year at Elizabeth House has continued to be very popular attracting many local young people (5 to 12 years) and adults to classes.

### **Pilates**

Pilate's classes are held at Elizabeth House every Monday morning is well attended by local women from diverse backgrounds.

### **Sports School**

Elizabeth House hosts a sports club for children which meets on a Saturday morning providing multi sports to children 5-8 years. The club is well attended and has proved extremely successful at introducing children to a variety of sports under the supervision of qualified and experienced sports coaches.

### Computer Building

The computer building was introduced at Elizabeth House this year offering children 6-12 years the opportunity to learn about computer hardware and build computers from spare parts.

### The Highbury Children's Art Club

The Art Club has continued to meet at Elizabeth House supported by the Trust offering structured sessions for up to 55 children aged 5 to 11 years every week. One child from the 7-8 years group was chosen by the Saatchi group to exhibit work at their gallery through a national competition. The art club works with a range of different mediums

In addition Elizabeth House facilities are used by various community groups: Capoeira; Covenant Church; Fepaco Church; St. John's Ambulance and Amour for family (a French and English support group for local children).

### Challenges

- 1. The Stakeholders Forum was launched at the AGM last year so is a work in progress. The aim is to encourage Elizabeth House user participation from young people, parents and the wider community.
- 2. Core funding will continue to be a challenge to Elizabeth House particularly in respect of reducing local authority budgets.
- 3. To deliver the activities and programmes needed and requested by our local community we must source new project funding which covers all costs associated with the project including core costs to ensure Elizabeth House is sustainable for years to come.

### **FUTURE PLANS**

Much has been achieved this year. We have built closer working relationships with the Octopus Hubs network, Blackstock TMO, the local community and local community groups through the Ward Partnership. And our ongoing work as a play, community and children centre is continually successful.

Our AGM was successful with a large turnout of parents and user groups who joined us in making this a celebratory event to showcase achievement and work through the year. The Stakeholders Forum has proved more difficult and remains a work in progress.

There is more work to do in developing organisational partnerships particularly in respect of joint work/projects and in securing funding for those projects which will continue to be a challenge.

### **GOVERNANCE**

Trustees met 8 times during this financial year. Meetings were well attended and trustees have continued to take an active role in supporting the staff team and in the management of the organisation.

Following a Trustees skills audit we have embarked on a programme of recruitment for new Trustees to bring specific skills to the board.

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

Income received in the year increased by 4.5% from £243,224 to £254,107. The majority of this increase was as a result of increased income from the main activities of the centre such as the After School Club and Playschemes Income. Expenditure decreased slightly from £270,581 to £266,336 due to lower repair costs than in 2013. The net movement in funds for 2014 was an outflow of £12,229 (2013: £27,357). Although this represents an improvement on the previous year's figures, the Trustees are making income generation a priority in 2015 and 2016 to ensure a small surplus in future years.

The total funds carried forward in 2014 are £603,271 (2013: £615,500). The cash reserves of the Trust are £258,063 (2013: £278,981). This represents approximately 12 months of expenditure (no change from 2013).

### Reserves

The Trustees are aware of the need to maintain unrestricted general reserves, currently £84,110 (2013: £23,047). Furthermore the Trustees are mindful of the uncertainty of Local Authority funding on which the Trust is currently dependent to deliver services so are being maintained at a relatively high level to ensure continuity of services to the local community.

### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

During the year the trustees have discussed and dealt with matters where there has been risk to Elizabeth House and its activities. In the coming year we plan to develop our risk management system further and link this to the development of our business plan.

I report on the accounts of the company for the year ended 31 March 2014 set out on pages 7 to 13.

### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

### 1. Accounting Policies

### **Basis of accounting**

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP): Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005 and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

#### **Donations**

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when received. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

### Grants and other income

Grants are recognised in full in the SOFA when receivable. Hire of premises and other incoming resources are included in the SOFA when receivable.

### **Fund accounting**

Restricted funds are grants, donations and other incoming resources which are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.

Unrestricted funds are grants, donations and other incoming resources receivable for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

### Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and is exclusive of VAT.

### **Governance costs**

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include costs linked to the strategic management of the charity. Governance costs which cannot be allocated directly are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

### **Depreciation**

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Buildings

2% on cost 33.33% on cost

Equipment and fittings

Items of equipment and fittings are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £300.

### **Operating leases**

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred over the term of the lease.
