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#### DIRECTORS' REPORT

Year ended 31st March 2001

The directors submit their report, together with the audited accounts of the company, for the year ended 31st March 2001.

## Principal activities and review of business developments

The company is the parent company of certain overseas operations of the Johnson Matthey Group which are engaged in the manufacture and supply of decorative products and associated raw materials for ceramics and glass. During the year the company sustained an operating loss of £0.9 million following the closure of an associated company.

#### Distribution and retention

The company made an operating profit before taxation of £11.7 million mainly due to interest received of £12.6 million on a loan to Johnson Matthey Plc, its ultimate parent undertaking. Costs arising from the closure of an associated company were £0.9 million. The profit on ordinary activities after taxation was £11.7 million. The directors do not recommend payment of dividend and the retained profit of £11.7 million has been taken to reserves.

#### Subsequent events and future developments

There has been no change in the nature of the company's operations since 31st March 2001.

## Research and Development

During the year the company spent £ nil (period ended 31st March 2000 £ nil) on research and development.

#### Donations

During the period the company made no donations to UK charities (period ended 31st March 2000 £ nil). There were no donations for political purposes.

## Policy on payment of commercial debts

The company's policy in relation to the payment of suppliers (set out in the Johnson Matthey Group Control Manual, which is distributed to all operations) is that payment should be made within the credit terms agreed with the supplier. As at the balance sheet date the company's payment period was 30 days (period ended 31st March 2000 30 days).

## Accounting policies

#### **Accounting convention**

## Foreign currency translation

# 6. Ultimate parent undertaking and group accounts

Johnson Matthey Ceramics Plc is a wholly owned subsidiary undertaking of Johnson Matthey Public Limited Company, a company registered in England. Johnson Matthey Public Limited Company, whose accounts are available from 2-4 Cockspur Street, Trafalgar Square, London SW1Y 5BQ, is considered to to be the ultimate parent undertaking.

Johnson Matthey Ceramics Plc is exempt (under Section 228 of the Companies Act 1985) from the obligation to prepare and deliver group accounts. The accounts present information about the undertaking as an individual undertaking and not about its group.
