REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The Trustees submit their consolidated report together with the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2000.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The Trust's principal activity is the advancement of education for the public benefit through the organisation and display of collections, exhibitions and heritage, and the management of its premises. The Trust provides its property for the recreation of the public, and seeks to promote and encourage a wide public appreciation and usage of all its facilities and services.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR

A report highlighting the year is attached.

RESULTS

The income and expenditure account shows the deficit for the period.

TRUSTEES

The liability of the Trustees in the event of the trust being wound up is limited to a sum not exceeding £1.

The Trustees met as a Council of Management on seven occasions during the period, and their names are shown on page 7 together with any variations in the numbers of Trustees during the period.

THE ENTERPRISE COMPANY

The Bodelwyddan Castle Enterprises Ltd was incorporated on the 7th October 1994 with capital of 20 £1 ordinary shares. The Directors gifted their shares by depositing their share certificates with the Trust. The review of the year extends from 1st April 1999 to 31st March 2000.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Trust for that period. In preparing the financial statements the Trustees are required to:

- i. Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- ii. Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- iii. Prepare financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Trust will continue to operate.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Trust, and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Trust and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

BODELWYDDAN CASTLE TRUST CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

I am pleased to introduce this Annual Report and Accounts with a statement on the developments that have taken place within the organisation over the past year. This is not an easy task since there have been a number of very complex adjustments within the operation and strategy of the organisation in this period.

The past few years have seen considerable change for Bodelwyddan Castle Trust. It is true to say that it has been a particularly fraught period in the Trust's history especially considering the financial constraints that have had to be applied. Trustees have been required to make some difficult decisions in this process. However, we are now beginning to see the very positive results of these decisions.

The Joint Area Museums Education Service (JAMES) has become established at the Castle to serve museum education needs throughout the area. Enforcing this thrust towards educational provision, a series of artist-in-residence workshops were held at the Castle, funded through the Arts Council of Wales Arts Lottery programme. The Trust also benefited from support for volunteer training from the Carnegie United Kingdom Trust under the JAMES activities. Other work in progress includes a new temporary exhibition programme in partnership with Techniquest in Cardiff, and the prospect of a new National Portrait Gallery first floor exhibition.

There is a spirit of optimism within the Trust as we begin an exciting new period of development. However, Trustees have not forgotten that much has fallen to the staff to ensure that these policy changes can be implemented, thereby enhancing the service to our visitors. The dedication of the staff has been a major part of the success of Bodelwyddan Castle over the year and I am pleased to minute our thanks to them for all their hard work.

BODELWYDDAN CASTLE TRUST REVIEW OF THE YEAR

The constitutional framework and financial structure of the Trust remain as described in previous annual reports. As an independent charitable company, the Trust has responsibility for the custodianship of public finances. These finances include a significant contribution from Denbighshire County Council for which the Trust is very grateful.

Partnerships with the National Portrait Gallery, Warner Holidays Ltd., and local support groups such as the Friends of Bodelwyddan Castle Trust enable the Trust to develop a strong public educational focus. They also ensure that the work of the Trust has a significant impact on local tourism and economic strategies. The day-to-day operation of the Trust during the year has reflected these primary aims with a mix of activities catering for a variable clientele.

Within this general ethos, the Trust's operation has changed significantly over the past year following a review of staffing and procedures. Perhaps the most significant factor has been a reduction in staffing levels though this has only been achieved following a thorough review of the services offered to the public. It was also necessary to review the way in which the Trust organised its summer events programme with a move towards an enabler rather than provider function. Further changes have taken place in the way in which the facilities for trading activities are arranged.

The establishment of the Joint Area Museums Education Service and the success of the artist-in-residence schemes highlight a move towards greater educational provision. Other activities are planned. Despite this, the new services being offered to the public will take time and investment to achieve results. Indeed, during the past year visitor numbers have continued to fall, partly due to a previous lack of investment and partly following a trend within similar facilities in the region. In recognition of this and to reflect the inevitable delay in building up income figures, initial staffing levels were set at a very low level following the review. So much so that the effect of the changes has been an immediate and significant reduction in expenditure levels that reverses a trend over the previous two periods.

The year has been one of consolidation and preparation, of prudence and optimism for the future. Following a difficult year operationally, the Trust is now preparing to move forward, ensuring that new facilities and services can be offered to the public and that we have the staff equipped to provide such quality services. Our proposals include partnerships with Techniquest in Cardiff and the prospect of a brand new National Portrait Gallery presence within the Williams Hall. We look forward to the new challenges ahead.

BODELWYDDAN CASTLE ENTERPRISES LTD REVIEW OF THE YEAR 1999 - 2000

Bodelwyddan Castle Enterprises Ltd. was incorporated on the 7 October 1994 to manage the Bodelwyddan Castle Trust's trading outlets and promote the charitable objects of the Trust. The Company employs no staff but pays to the Trust the apportionment of costs for the trading operation. The majority of the trading activities within the 1998/99 financial year have followed closely the pattern set in previous years. The main trading activities undertaken by the Company involve providing a service to Trust customers within the Castle Gift Shop. In addition the Company has continued to act on behalf of the Trust in the refurbishment of St Asaph Lodge.

The results for the year indicate a reasonable amount of covenant to the Trust given the difficult circumstances surrounding the review of operations. One major change has been the closure of the Lowther College Tea Room in favour of a catering provided by Warner Holidays Ltd. This has had a significant effect on turnover for the year. In addition, there still remains a general decline in visitor numbers experienced by the Trust as reflected in Enterprises income. However, a marked upturn is anticipated once the effects of the Trust's revised strategy are realised. The Enterprises Company will have a new and important role to play in ensuring the maximum amount of income is diverted to the Trust for its educational purpose within the new mode of operation.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2000

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act 1985 and Statement of Recommended Practice 2, Accounting by Charities.

Consolidation

The group financial statements consolidate the financial statements of the Trust and its subsidiary made up to 31st March 2000.

Cash flow

The Company qualifies as a small company under the Companies Act 1985. The trustees have elected to take advantage of the exemption under FRS1 not to prepare a cash flow statement.

Income

Donations and legacies are accounted for when received by the Trust.

Other income is accounted for on an accruals basis as far as it is prudent to do so, exclusive of VAT.

Depreciation of tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its useful life:

Furniture & fittings

20% straight line

No depreciation is charged on freehold and long leasehold land and buildings.

Where zero depreciation of freehold buildings is appropriate

Freehold buildings are depreciated to write down the cost less estimated residual value over their remaining useful life by equal annual instalments. Where buildings are maintained to such a standard that their residual value is not less than their cost or valuation, no depreciation is charged as it is not material.

Grants

Revenue grants are credited to the income and expenditure account in the period when the related expenditure is incurred.

Capital Grants made from the Designated Arts Fund, in respect of capital expenditure, are credited to the income and expenditure account over the estimated useful life of the relevant fixed asset.

Taxation

As a registered charity, the Trust benefits from Rates relief and is generally exempt from Income Tax and Capital Gains Tax.

2. NET INCOME/(EXPENDITURE) OF TRADING SUBSIDIARY

Bodelwyddan Castle Trust has a wholly owned trading subsidiary incorporated in the UK. The entire share capital of Bodelwyddan Castle Enterprises Limited was gifted to the Trust on 31st October 1994.

Bodelwyddan Castle Enterprises Limited operates a gift shop and tea rooms at Bodelwyddan Castle and covenants it's taxable profits to the Trust.
