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TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective 1 January 2015).

Objectives and activities

The objectives for which the charity has been established are:

- To unite those who, regarding Jesus Christ as their God and Saviour according to the Holy Scriptures, desire to be His disciples in their faith and in their life, and to associate their efforts for the extension of His Kingdom
- To lead young people to the Lord Jesus Christ and to fullness of life in Him.
- To provide, or assist in the provision of, leisure and recreation facilities for men and women with the objectives of improving their conditions of life and enhancing their social welfare.
- To provide, improve and manage houses and hostels as accommodation for men and women of all ages upon terms appropriate to their means.
- To provide directly, or in association with others, a counselling and advice service for men and women of all ages.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Charity should undertake.

Activities

The charity fulfils its objectives by providing supported accommodation and client-centred information, advice and guidance programmes for those least able to afford it themselves. Inspired by, and faithful to, its stated Christian values, it creates supportive, inclusive and energising communities, where young people can truly belong, contribute and thrive.

Client support programmes, using the Outcomes Star Model, are delivered across all key accommodation sites:

- In the 27 bed unit at its Bishop's Stortford premises in Northgate End
- In the communal unit at Northgate End accommodating two young people who require more intensive one to one work.
- In two properties situated in the local communities of Sawbridgeworth and Ware, each accommodating one young person one of higher risk and one of lower risk.
- In the two supported housing units for eight asylum seekers in Stevenage.

EHYMCA holds the InSync national quality assessment accreditation and, in the most recent Hertfordshire County Council compliance inspection of the Northgate End programme (November 2015), scored 99.4%.

Ensuring strong and transparent governance has continued to be a key objective during this financial year and we have been able to maintain our full complement of nine directors. YMCA East Herts adheres to the National Housing Forum's Code of Governance.

The Board has attracted men and women from diverse backgrounds, covering all the required key skills. The Chair and Chief Executive are responsible for on-going recruitment and the co-opting of an additional director to the Board in 2016-2017 will ensure a smooth transition should an existing director decide to step down. In addition, during this financial year we have continued to benefit from the knowledge of an experienced volunteer advisor in the area of change management.

Achievements and performance

Housing: 4 Northgate End, Bishop's Stortford

Supported Housing for twenty-seven 18-30 year olds at the 4 Northgate End site in Bishop's Stortford continues to be EHYMCA's core business focus. Alongside this, and in partnership with Herts County Council (HCC), additional housing support provision continues to develop. More intensive housing support is offered to two young people in our communal facility and EHYMCA has direct access to five units of moveon accommodation for those young people who have shown that they are ready to leave us and move into independent living. In 2016-17, 81.25% of our residents at Northgate End achieved planned, positive 'moveons'. We made available 10,585 bed spaces during the year, provided housing support to 56 vulnerable young people, incurred 4.43% voids and 1.35% bad debts.

Our staff, directors and volunteers work together to make our mission a reality. We are an inclusive Christian movement helping to transform local communities so that young people can truly belong, contribute and thrive. We all have a responsibility for enabling our YMCA to make a difference in young people's lives.

<u>Move-On Accommodation</u>: At the centre of all our work are the young people themselves and this year, following a review of our support work, we have increased our expectation levels of residents. This cultural change will take time to achieve but has already seen a growing confidence in residents going out into the community through successful planned 'move-ons'. The charity's vision of enabling young people to reach their potential is greatly assisted by our direct access to move-on accommodation. This provides a strong motivating factor for them to prepare well for independent living by paying their rent on time and by abiding by the YMCA's house rules and regulations.

Partnerships with a variety of agencies continue to be key and the YMCA works closely with: Herts Young Homeless; Citizens Advice; the new county-wide Homeless Hub; the Police; NHS and Oxford House; the Probation Service; Housing Providers and other YMCAs, as well as the Councillors and Officers of the Town, District and County Councils.

Housing: Properties in the Local Community

Linked to our mission of helping to transform communities, the Directors have focused on flexibility, partnership and response to need. Part of this had been a 'spot purchase' agreement with the Department of Children's Services, at Hertfordshire County Council (HCC), to support higher risk 'Children-Looked After' in the local community. However, under the agreement EHYMCA was required to offer accommodation on a needs basis with the inherent risk that projects could start and end with little notice. This agreement, for the reasons listed below, came to an end completely in February 2017.

During the previous financial year (2015- 2016) considerable experience of working with higher risk individuals had been gained utilising three rented properties in the local community. Two of the three properties were occupied with high risk young people and one with lower risk. This reduced to two in early 2016 with the young person 'moving-on' to new accommodation and the rented property in Bishop's Stortford being sold by the landlord.

At the beginning of the 2016 - 2017 financial year, following overnight reductions of support funding by HCC, housing a high risk vulnerable person in one of the two remaining properties became untenable. This property in Ware was therefore returned to the Landlord in April 2016. The third property based in Sawbridgeworth saw considerable voids during the year because of its location. After HCC selected the area to meet a specific young person's need it was found to be unpopular with subsequent residents. In February 2017, following agreement between HCC and EHYMCA, this property and the project also came to an end.

While we were sad to see our work with high risk individuals in the community come to an end, a great deal was learned and the relationships with all three local landlords ended with professionalism and without incurring financial liabilities. Vital experience has been gained to enhance our support work at Northgate End and the Asylum Seeker project especially regarding issues related to self-harm and aggressive behaviour. The Directors also believe that there is scope to work in this field in the future.

Housing: Asylum Seeker Programme, Archer Road, Stevenage

In 2016-17 the Asylum Seeker project in Stevenage continued to develop. Working with HCC we provide two properties for Asylum Seekers - four beds available to 16-17 year olds applying for asylum and four beds to 18-21 year olds. All residents are either applying for asylum or have had their applications turned down but are undertaking the sometimes very lengthy appeals process. While the establishment of this project in 2013 initially consumed significant amounts of staff time, it has achieved stability and initially was able to make a sound contribution to our housing provision and core costs, as well as raising our profile with the Council. With minimal increases in Council funding since the project's inception combined with increasing maintenance and health and safety costs the margin has considerably reduced. The need to either increase the weekly payments per resident or close the programme was discussed by the Directors and the Council and this resulted in the Council's agreement to increase the funding from 1 April 2016. With the appointment of a new Programme Development Manager in May 2016 all the procedures at the project have been reviewed and updated.

A significant achievement of this project has been the acceptance of the asylum seeker residents, as part of the local community. Playing sport such as badminton, cricket and table tennis have enabled residents (and especially those studying at the local colleges) to both see and feel a sense of inclusion.

Emergency Crash Pad Facility

As part of EHYMCA's service to the community an emergency crash pad facility at Northgate End in Bishop's Stortford is also provided. All agency referrals, as well as any self referrals, go via East Herts Council and the facility is designed for any young people who might be 'street homeless.' The Crash Pad is used as a 'stop gap' for a maximum of two nights while other accommodation is found.

Making a Difference:

On behalf of the Directors, I would like to pay tribute again to the hard work undertaken by our staff and volunteers. The staff work long hours and regularly deliver beyond their job specifications. We have also been very fortunate in the number and quality of our volunteers without whose dedication and enthusiasm even more work would have fallen to our permanent staff.

Financial review

A budget deficit of £46,776 had been planned and approved by the Directors for 2016 -2017. The net actuals for the year amounted to a deficit of £20,350 - a positive actual to budget variance of £26,426.

However, it is important to note that budget for 2016 - 2017 did not include the staff restructure costs that occurred between April and June 2017, depreciation, significant decorating costs as well as fundraiser consultant fees. When taking these into account the actual performance was £77,411 better than anticipated.

EHYMCA, as with all organisations in the charity field, has continued to face a financial environment where traditional sources of funding have been severely reduced. The Government's austerity measures are directly affecting our housing support programmes and as Council budgets decrease so does their ability to fund programmes to support vulnerable young people. Increases in contract prices are minimal if at all and many YMCAs have had their housing related support contract drastically reduced if not completely cut. In spite of this EHYMCA continues to retain good communication links with the Commissioners and the contract budget increase agreed for the Asylum Seeker programmes have been able to provide an important contribution to reducing this year's financial deficit.

To the delight of the Directors £19,355 of unrestricted funding was raised during the year. This represents a 19.4% increase on the previous year and was achieved as a result of a diverse range of events but specifically our second annual 'Sleep Easy' event that took place in March 2017. 'Sleeping rough for one night so that others don't have to' attracted 49 volunteers who slept in cardboard boxes and who supported by Community groups our local MP and Councillors. This one night event raised £6,000 and will become our main fundraiser each year. It has great potential for future unrestricted fundraising.

Raising our profile has led to successful applications for restricted funding with the result that all 29 self-contained flats at the Northgate End premises were equipped with new hard wearing tub chairs and wardrobes.

The final pension scheme liability to the YMCA England pension fund incurred a deficit contribution payment of £6,627 during the year as well as a £1,077 contribution towards the plan's expenditure. As part of a joint and several scheme to which many other YMCAs also belong this represents a liability over which we have no control. Fortunately, the EHYMCA contribution is low in comparison to others.

Looking forward it is clear that the financial environment will remain challenging for some years to come. While the financial performance in 2016 – 2017 was far better than expected we still incurred a deficit. As a result the Board of Trustees has been carefully considering options for the future, which also takes into account YMCA England's transition from housing activities and their requirement that our 4 Northgate End building is purchased by 31.03.18 with contracts being exchanged by 31.10.17 at the latest. It had been hoped that our restructuring process during the financial year would help us, however events have overtaken us.

Changing Environment and Existing Pressures

The Board's formal position regarding independence/merger has always been that we should remain independent if, by doing so, we can provide a better standard of service to the young people we serve. However, circumstances have changed and as a result on 30.03.17 the Trustees unanimously voted to initiate amalgamation negotiations with One YMCA.

Whilst we have achieved:

- the transformation of the lives of a large number of vulnerable young people
- · a substantial increase in our income over the years
- a successful restructuring of our senior management team in the last year or so with a view to the expansion of our programmes
- · a strong governance structure

We are now suffering the consequence of a tightening of our margins, and an inability to release sufficient management capacity to speedily develop our operation.

We are not in a position to compensate for reductions in rent, static contract agreements regarding price and the cost increases forced upon us by current Government policies – and still ensure that we can provide the best possible service to our client groups both now and in the long term. In 2016, we invested boldly in our future but we are still too small and have a number of deadlines to meet.

The key issues regarding timing have been:

- YMCA England's requirement that we exchange contracts on the 4 Northgate End property by 31.10.17 and purchase it by 31.03.18.
- Prior to the exchange of contracts, the need to apply to and be registered by the Homes and Communities Agency in order to access the property's social housing grant. Clear indications, received from those who have been through the process, stated that we would be likely to fail the financial stress testing.
- Herts County Council turning down our proposal to change our housing-related support contract at 4
 Northgate End which would have had a significant beneficial impact on our budget for 2017 2018.
- We are becoming increasingly conscious of warnings from YMCA England that more serious government budget cuts will be on their way affecting social care programmes in the next year or so. Clearly any special relationship will not protect us anymore.
- The departure of Richard Morris (vice Chair) in 2017 and Stuart Veitch (Chair) / Max Beddard (Treasurer) in 2018 – each having completed their maximum nine years on the Board.

With this combination of events occurring, and taking into account the national picture of YMCAs coming together, the Directors believe decisive action needs to be taken now and EHYMCA acts from a position of strength with reserves still intact. Our relationship with One YMCA has been built up over many years and we believe it is strong and mutually beneficial – a partnership where we have been able to help and trust each other. It also makes strong strategic and economic sense to have a single YMCA in Hertfordshire liaising on a county-wide basis with Hertfordshire County Council and key stakeholders.

Reserves

East Herts YMCA is heavily reliant on local government contracts which are often relatively short term. It therefore aims to maintain sufficient financial reserves to provide protection against the loss of a contract and has determined that 20% of turnover would achieve this.

The reserves held will additionally protect against unforeseen expenditure whether repairs or operational costs, reduced grant and fundraising income or fluctuating cash flow.

Risk management

The directors have examined the major risks that the company faces each financial year and have developed systems to monitor and control these risks to mitigate any impact that they may have in the future.

Structure, governance and management

As well as being a registered charity and a non-profit making organisation, the company is limited by guarantee. It was incorporated on 1 March 1994 and its governing document is the Memorandum and Articles of Association. Its board of directors (who are also the trustees of the charitable company) are listed on page 6, and its management consists of a Chief Executive, a Programme Development Manager and an Operations Manager. It is affiliated to YMCA England (the national body for YMCA's) on whose behalf it manages the Northgate End property in Bishop's Stortford.

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

East Herts YMCA is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 4 Northgate End, Bishop's Stortford, Hertfordshire, CM23 2EX.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \pounds .

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

These accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017 are the first accounts of East Herts YMCA prepared in accordance with FRS 102, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland. The date of transition to FRS 102 was 1 April 2015. An explanation of how transition to FRS 102 has affected the reported financial position and financial performance is given in note 22.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future given the planned amalgamation with One YMCA (see Trustees report for details). Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes laid down by the donor. Expenditure for these purposes is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of overheads and support costs.

Unrestricted funds arise from grants, donations and other incoming resources received or generated for expenditure on the general objectives of the charity.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the Charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the Charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes.

1.5 Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs relating to the category. Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Support costs are allocated in full against resources expended on charitable activities.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements. These costs are allocated in full against resources expended on charitable activities.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Capital items costing in excess of £1,000 are capitalised. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Plant & Equipment

33% straight line

Fixtures & Fittings

20% straight line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the Charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and bank deposit accounts.

1.9 Financial instruments

The Charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the Charity's balance sheet when the Charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors are initially recognised at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

1.10 Employee benefits

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the Charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

East Herts YMCA participated in a multi-employer defined benefit pension plan for employees of YMCAs in England, Scotland and Wales, which was closed to new members and accruals on 30 April 2007. The plan's actuary has advised that it is not possible to separately identify the assets and liabilities relating to East Herts YMCA, therefore the scheme is accounted for as a defined contribution scheme.

As described in note 16 East Herts YMCA has a contractual obligation to make pension deficit payments of £6,434 per annum, increasing by 3% each year from April 2016 to April 2027, accordingly this is shown as a discounted liability in the accounts. In addition East Herts YMCA is required to make annual contributions to the operating expenses of the Pension Plan. These costs vary year by year and are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they are made.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the Charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

16 Retirement benefit schemes

The Charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for all qualifying employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the Charity in an independently administered fund.

Defined benefit schemes

East Herts YMCA participated in a contributory pension plan providing defined benefits based on final pensionable pay for employees of YMCAs in England, Scotland and Wales. The assets of the YMCA Pension Plan are held separately from those of East Herts YMCA and at the year end these were invested in the Mercer Dynamic De-risking Solution, 40% matching portfolio and 60% in the growth portfolio and Schroder (property units only).

The most recent completed three year valuation was at 1 May 2014. The assumptions used which have the most significant effect on the results of the valuation are those relating to the assured rates of return on assets held before and after retirement of 5.35% and 3.85% respectively, the increase in pensions in payment of 3.3%, and the average life expectancy from normal retirement age. The result of the valuation showed that the actuarial value of the assets was £90.8m. This represented 70% of the benefits that had accrued to members.

The plan's actuary has advised that it is not possible to separately identify the assets and liabilities relating to East Herts YMCA and accordingly the pension deficit is not shown on the balance sheet.

The Pension Plan was closed to new members and future service accruals with effect from 30 April 2007. With removal of the salary linkage for benefits all employed deferred members became deferred members as from 1 May 2011.

The valuation prepared as at 1 May 2014 showed that the YMCA Pension Plan had a deficit of £38.7m. East Herts YMCA has been advised that it will need to make monthly contributions of £552 from 1 May 2015. This amount is based on the current actuarial assumptions (as outlined above) and may vary in the future as a result of actual performance of the pension plan. The current recovery period is 12 years commencing 1 May 2015. Using the discount rate based on AA corporate bonds for the same period a liability with a net present value of £57,845 (2016: £60,688) is recognised within provisions for this contractual obligation.

Recognition of defined benefit pension deficit liability

As detailed in note 16 upon transition to FRS 102 East Herts YMCA has recognised the discounted liability regarding the recovery plan for the YMCA England multi employer pension scheme. There was no effect as of the 1 April 2015, however during the year ending 31 March 2016 the discounted liability was recognised in full as at 1 May 2015. The pension deficit contribution was then removed from the SOFA and set off against the liability, whilst an unwinding charge was made and included in finance costs.
