Structure, Governance and Management

The charity is constituted as a charitable company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital. Governing document: memorandum and articles of association incorporated on 7th September 1994 (as amended by special resolution on 19th June 1995).

The members of the Pastoral Council (= Members of the charitable company) are appointed by the Archbishop of Westminster.

The members of the Pastoral Council give the general guidelines for the company activities, appoint the directors and other company officials and staff, adopt the accounts and represent the Redemptoris Mater House of Formation before the Archbishop of Westminster.

The company is run by an Administrative Council, whose members are the directors of the company. The Administrative Council is chaired by the rector.

The rector of the House of Formation is the chief executive of the company. He is appointed by the Archbishop of Westminster and is *ex officio* member and chairman of both Administrative and Pastoral Council.

All members of the Administrative Council (= the directors of the company) are appointed by the Pastoral Council, i.e. by the members of the company. No person other than a resigning member of the Administrative Council is eligible for election unless his nomination is made by a member of the Pastoral Council. Any member of the Pastoral Council is entitled to submit nominations. (Cf. Articles of Association, §24)

Directors are chosen for their expertise in administration, legal matters and/or for their direct experience of working in the charity field. An induction process is carried out by other directors on a one-to-one basis, with the support of material provided by the Charity Commission.

Day to day administration is delegated to the rector, who takes relevant advice from Council members and other professionals before making important decisions.

Objectives and Activities

The main object of the charity is to promote religion in accordance with the Roman Catholic faith, in particular by forming young men as priests for the new evangelisation of Europe and the whole world. (*Cf. Memorandum of Association*, §3²)

For that purpose the company is renting a property known as Edward's Convent, located at 11 Harewood Avenue, London NW1 6LD. The building houses the registered office of the charity and a House of Formation where the students and some members of staff are in residence. The House is run under the direct supervision and responsibility of the rector.

Voluntary helpers contribute significantly to the activities of the House of Formation. Cleaning, cooking and most maintenance works are carried out by volunteers. In the year 2004-2005 there have been 3 volunteers residing full time in the House. Another 7 have offered their services part-time.

In the year 2004-2005, 14 seminarians from a number of countries of Europe and America have been residing full board in St Edward's Convent, while attending courses of General English, Philosophy and Theology in preparation for the priesthood. The House of Formation has provided the beneficiaries with food and lodging, met their expenses (studies, clothing, health care, travelling in London and abroad, etc.) and offered them a training programme including studies, pastoral and spiritual meetings and field-work training in the UK and abroad.

Achievements and performance

Two students have been ordained during 2005. One has been ordained priest for the Archdiocese of Westminster; a second one has been ordained deacon for the same Diocese and is expected be ordained priest next year.

Students have been working in adult catechesis in India, Israel, Zambia and Italy. In London students and staff have carried out various pastoral ministries in parishes, hospitals and schools.

Financial Review

The charity has adopted a policy on reserves, thereby designating a fund to be used in the event of winding up, to meet legal and administrative expenses and settle payments to staff (if any: no paid staff are presently employed). It has been decided to allocate a sum of £5,000 for this purpose.

Direct charitable expenditure refers to funds used exclusively for:

- (a) covering the maintenance costs for the House (rent, electricity, gas, water, telephone, repairs, etc.);
- (b) paying for food, travel, studies and any other expenses necessary to provide the required training and ensure adequate living conditions for the beneficiaries;
- (c) paying travel expenses for the students involved in missionary work abroad;
- (d) providing food for the voluntary helpers (the Rector and two/three others) who have been living full time in the House for the sole purpose of running it in accordance with the charitable object of the Company;

None of the directors or members was remunerated. Money spent for the charity management amounted to £199, which includes meeting expenses, travelling, stationery, administration fees and telephone calls.

The funds made available to the charity during the year 2004-2005 have all come from unrestricted voluntary donations. In comparison with previous years there has been a loss of income which led to a deficit of £ 3,048. It is the directors' opinion that one of the main causes was the on-going climate of uncertainty concerning the physical location of the House of Formation, should St Edward's convent be no longer available to the charity. A series of meetings with regular and potential donors has given good results in the first quarter of the new financial year. Negotiations for a more stable accommodation arrangement are continuing. Initiatives aimed at providing new income channels in the UK and overseas are also underway.

Plans for the future

The plan for the immediate future is to continue running the House for the academic year 2005-2006, providing the 14 students attached to it with all that is required for their studies, pastoral activities and field-work training in UK and abroad.

Investigations, including relocation, are to continue, in order to secure a stable location for the House of Formation.

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 August 2005 set out on pages 6 to 9.

In my opinion:

- a) the accounts are in agreement with the accounting records kept by the Company under section 221 of the Companies Act 1985;
- b) having regard only to, and on the basis of, the information contained in those accounting records:
- i) the accounts have been drawn up in a manner consistent with the accounting requirements specified in section 249C(6) of the Act; and
- ii) the Company satisfied the conditions for exemption from an audit of the accounts for the year specified in section 249A(4) of the Act as modified by section 249A(5) and did not, at any time within that year, fall within any of the categories of companies not entitled to the exemption specified in section 249B(1).

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended on 31 August 2005

1. Accounting Policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2002 ("SORP") and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002) under the historical cost convention, modified by the revaluation of investments.

a) Donations

Donations received for the general purposes of the Charity are included as unrestricted funds. Donations for activities restricted by the wishes of the donor are taken as restricted funds.

b) Resources expended

These are accounted for on an accrual basis.

c) Depreciation

Depreciation of Motor Vehicles is provided at a rate of 25% per annum on a reducing balance basis calculated to write off the cost of the asset after its estimated useful economic life.
