Structure, Governance and Management

The charity is constituted as a charitable company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital Governing document memorandum and articles of association incorporated on 7th September 1994 (as amended by special resolution on 19th June 1995)

The members of the Pastoral Council (= Members of the charitable company) are appointed by the Archbishop of Westminster

The members of the Pastoral Council give the general guidelines for the company activities, appoint the directors and other company officials and staff, adopt the accounts and represent the Redemptoris Mater House of Formation before the Archbishop of Westminster

The company is run by an Administrative Council, whose members are the directors of the company. The Administrative Council is chaired by the rector

The rector of the House of Formation is the chief executive of the company. He is appointed by the Archbishop of Westminster and is ex officio member and chairman of both Administrative and Pastoral Council

All members of the Administrative Council (= the directors of the company) are appointed by the Pastoral Council, 1 e by the members of the company No person other than a resigning member of the Administrative Council is eligible for election unless his nomination is made by a member of the Pastoral Council Any member of the Pastoral Council is entitled to submit nominations (Cf Articles of Association, §24)

Directors are chosen for their expertise in administration, legal matters and/or for their direct experience of working in the charity field. An induction process is carried out by other directors on a one-to-one basis, with the support of material provided by the Charity Commission.

Day to day administration is delegated to the rector, who takes relevant advice from Council members and other professionals before making important decisions

Objectives and Activities

The main object of the charity is to promote religion in accordance with the Roman Catholic faith, in particular by forming young men as priests for the new evangelisation of Europe and the whole world (Cf Memorandum of Association, §3²)

For that purpose the company is renting a property known as St. Edward's Convent, located at 11 Harewood Avenue, London NW1 6LD The building houses the registered office of the charity and a House of Formation where the students and some members of staff are in residence. The House is run under the direct supervision and responsibility of the rector.

Voluntary helpers contribute significantly to the activities of the House of Formation Cleaning, cooking and most maintenance works are carried out by volunteers. In the year 2005-2006 there have been 6 volunteers residing full time in the House. Another 7 have offered their services part-time.

In the year 2005-2006, 14 seminarians from a number of countries of Europe and America have been residing full board in St Edward's Convent, while attending courses of General English, Philosophy and Theology in preparation for the priesthood. The House of Formation has provided the beneficiaries with food and lodging, met their expenses (studies, clothing, health care, travelling in London and abroad, etc.) and offered them a training programme including studies, pastoral and spiritual meetings and field-work training in the UK and abroad

Achievements and performance

One of the students was ordained a priest by Cardinal Murphy-O'Connor for the Archdiocese of Westminster in June 2006 and now is on active pastoral duties in the diocese

Students have been working in adult catechesis in India, Israel, Zambia and Italy In London students and staff have carried out various pastoral ministries in parishes, hospitals and schools

Financial Review

The charity has adopted a policy on reserves, thereby designating a £5,000 fund to be used in the event of winding up, to meet legal and administrative expenses and settle payments to staff (if any no paid staff are presently employed)

Direct charitable expenditure refers to funds used exclusively for

- (a) covering the maintenance costs for the House (rent, electricity, gas, water, telephone, repairs, etc.),
- (b) paying for food, travel, studies and any other expenses necessary to provide the required training and ensure adequate living conditions for the beneficiaries,
- (c) paying travel expenses for the students involved in missionary work abroad,
- (d) providing food for the voluntary helpers (the Rector and five others) who have been living full time in the House for the sole purpose of running it in accordance with the charitable object of the Company,

None of the directors or members was remunerated Money spent for the charity management and fund raising amounted to £414

The funds made available to the charity during the year 2005-2006 have all come from unrestricted voluntary donations. The uncertainty experienced in recent years as to whether the charity could remain located at the site of St Edward's convent has ended. This more stable situation, together with personal contacts with regular and potential donors in the UK have improved the Charity's revenue in comparison with the previous year. Small scale fund raising activities are continuing.

Plans for the future

The plan for the immediate future is to continue running the House for the academic year 2006-2007, and to make full provision for the studies, pastoral activities and field-work training in UK and abroad for the 13 students attached to the House

Following the Sisters of Mercy's decision to postpone indefinitely the sale of St Edward's Convent and to allow Redemptoris Mater to rent part of the property, a medium or long term contract will be negotiated with the Sisters, in order to secure a more stable and long term basis for the House of Formation future and activities

Plans to share the building with the Sisters of Mercy on a longer term basis will include building works and general refurbishment of the property to make it more suitable for both occupiers

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended on 31 August 2006

1 Accounting Policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2002 ("SORP") and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002) under the historical cost convention, modified by the revaluation of investments

a) Donations

Donations received for the general purposes of the Charity are included as unrestricted funds. Donations for activities restricted by the wishes of the donor are taken as restricted funds.

b) Resources expended

These are accounted for on an accrual basis

c) Depreciation

Following a review of the Motor Vehicles assets it has been ascertained that they have no market value and it has been decided to increase the depreciation to the full residual value

A new asset category has been created "Household appliances" Depreciation is calculated straight line over three years

2 Accruals

a) Pre-payments

£ 175 for No 1 Motor car road license

b) Liabilities

£1.193 liabilities for Utilities, Travel, Services & Repairs

3 Assets

A new category has been created "Household appliances" to include domestic appliances with initial value greater than £250

4 Reserves

In accordance with the Directors report, a reserve has been designated to cover the costs in the event of the dissolution of the Charity
