Directors' report

The directors present their annual report and the audited financial statements of the Company for the period ended 31 March 2004.

Principal activity

The principal activity of the Company is that of a retailer of wedding dresses and associated bridal services.

Results and business review

The loss for the period retained in the Company was £586,622(2003:£2,744,091). The directors are unable to recommend the payment of a dividend (2003: £nil).

Due to lower than expected performance by the London store, a decision was made in January 2003 to cease operations from this location. A plan was formulated for the disposal of this store, and the store ceased operations on 1st May 2003.

After reviewing the result for the period, the directors are confident that the remaining store, based in Manchester, will show an increase in sales in 2004/05, and are considering brand expansion at other locations.

None of the directors who held office at the end of the period had any disclosable interests in the shares of the Company.

The members of the Company have passed elective resolutions in accordance with Sections 366A, 252 and 386 of the Companies Act 1985 dispensing with the previous statutory requirement of holding annual general meetings, laying accounts before the Company in general meetings and re-appointing auditors annually. This last resolution will lead to the continuing appointment of KPMG LLP as auditors of the Company until further notice.

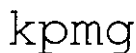

Respective responsibilities of directors and auditors

The directors are responsible for preparing the directors' report and, as described on page 2, the financial statements in accordance with applicable United Kingdom law and accounting standards. Our responsibilities, as independent auditors, are established in the United Kingdom by statute, the Auditing Practices Board and by our profession's ethical guidance.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the directors' report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding directors' remuneration and transactions with the company is not disclosed.

Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the directors in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Company's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

1 Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and under the historical cost accounting rules.

Under Financial Reporting Standard 1 the company is exempt from the requirement to prepare a cash flow statement on the grounds that a parent undertaking includes the company in its own published consolidated financial statements.

As the company is a wholly owned subsidiary of Barfair Limited, the company has taken advantage of the exemption contained in FRS8 and has therefore not disclosed transactions or balances with entities which form part of the group.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis in view of the fact that the ultimate parent undertaking Virgin Group Investments Limited has formally indicated that it will provide sufficient funding to the company, to enable it to meet its liabilities as they fall due, for at least the next twelve months.

The directors have no reason to believe that the parent company will not be in a position to provide the support referred to above and, accordingly, they have prepared the financial statements on the going concern basis.

Turnover

Turnover represents the amounts (excluding value added tax) derived from the provision of goods and services to customers.

Leases

Operating lease rentals are charged to the profit and loss account on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction.

Fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost less the estimated residual value of tangible fixed assets by equal instalments over their estimated useful economic life as follows:

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Taxation

The charge for taxation is based on the profit for the period and takes into account taxation deferred because of timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes. Deferred tax is recognised, without discounting, in respect of all timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes which have arisen but not reversed by the balance sheet date, except as otherwise required by FRS 19.

Post retirement benefits

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the company in an independently administered fund. The amount charged against profits represents the contributions payable to those schemes in respect of the accounting period.

17 Related party disclosures

At 31 March 2004, the Company's ultimate parent Company was Virgin Group Investments Limited whose principal shareholders are certain trusts, none of which individually has a controlling interest in Virgin Group Investments Limited. The principal beneficiaries of those trusts are Sir Richard Branson and/or his immediate family. The shareholders of Virgin Group Investments Limited have interests directly or indirectly in certain other companies which are considered to give rise to related party disclosures under Financial Reporting Standard 8.

18 Ultimate parent company

At 31 January 2003 the ultimate parent undertaking was Virgin Group Investments Limited, a company incorporated in the British Virgin Islands.

The results of the company are consolidated in the accounts of a parent company, Barfair Limited, a company incorporated in the UK. The accounts of Barfair Limited can be obtained from Companies House.
