The Articles provide for the Board to consist of up to nine elected Governors, two co-opted Governors and one Governor nominated by the Health Advisory Council. One third of the elected Governors resign at each Annual General Meeting and can stand for re-election for one further term.

1 Introduction

This report aims to provide a clear account of our work and what it has achieved for people with coeliac disease and dermatitis herpetiformis (DH) for the year ending 31 December 2009. We explain how we have gone about that work and how we have funded it. In writing this report we have adhered to the Charity Commission's guidance published as SORP 2005.

2 Objectives and activities

The Charity's objects are set out in its Memorandum of Association

- (i) to help and to promote the benefit and welfare of persons with Gluten Enteropathy, Dermatitis Herpetiformis or any medical condition akin thereto ("the Coeliac Condition"), and
- (ii) to advance public education in and understanding of the nature of the Coeliac Condition and its treatments particularly (without prejudice to that generality) among sufferers from the Coeliac Condition and the families, finends and carers of such persons,
- (iii) to promote research into the nature, causes, alleviation, treatment and cure of the Coeliac Condition and to make publicly available the useful results thereof

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commissions general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future objectives

In 2006 the Charity agreed the 2007-09 Strategic Plan which set out six key objectives

- improving our support for people with the condition
- improving the recognition of the condition by healthcare professionals and ensuring subsequent management is
 of high quality
- access to a wider range of better quality gluten-free products on prescription and in shops
- eating out, for pleasure or through need, is freed from restrictions
- providing long term solutions by helping to support research into understanding the nature of the disease, glutenfree cereals and a possible cure
- and delivering value for money for the Membership by demonstrably improving our efficiency and effectiveness

We set out specific activities for 2009 in our annual plan and our achievements against this plan are set out in the next section

3 Achievements and performance

The 2009 plan was developed at a time of great financial turbulence in global markets. The most important impact on the Charity's finances at the time was being felt in unrealised losses on our investments. Avoiding liquidating these assets underpinned much of the thinking behind the 2009 budget in order to minimise the impact of the economic downturn. We were successful in doing so with careful management of the cashflow. At the end of 2008 investments had declined to 73% of their value at 31 December 2007. However, at the end of 2009 a small recovery in investments had restored their value to 78% of the 2007 figure.

The other single most important issue the Charity faced during 2009 was the implementation of the new European law on labelling of gluten-free foods (EC 41/2009). The new law will profoundly affect the everyday lives of people with coeliac disease since the only treatment is to avoid food containing gluten. As the debate on how the law will be applied in practice has unfolded in the UK, the Charity was involved in intensive discussions with the UK authorities to ensure the law works to the benefit of people with the condition and not against them

Despite the financially tough climate, the Charity was able to commit a further £300k to medical research on understanding the genetic base of the condition and improving diagnostic approaches

3 1 Our Objective Improving our support for people with the condition

The Charity continued to recruit new Members and extend its service provision throughout 2009 By the end of 2009, just over 54,000 people were Members of the Charity under the Membership fee scheme introduced in 2008 Nearly 13,000 new Members joined in 2009 compared to just over 9,000 in 2008 – up 41%

- Changes to the law on gluten-free labelling, which will become mandatory in 2010, are set to make a difference to
 the everyday lives of people with coeliac disease. To help support Members in dealing with the expected
 changes, the Charity devised an active learning module rolled out to Local Voluntary Support Groups to cascade
 on to Members locally. Extensive use was made of the Charity's regular communication outlets to keep Members
 up-to-date with the changes.
- As a result of the new law, changes were made in the format of the Charity's key service to Members, the Food and Drink Directory The resulting Directory sent out at the beginning of 2010 has received praise for its user friendly format
- The Charity's Helpline is a first point of call for many on diet and health issues. In 2009, advisers on the Helpline handled over 11,000 calls, emails and letters.
- A comprehensive review of the current travel information for Members was undertaken with over 40 countries
 now covered around the world. Additional information was researched on retail outlets, brands, local foods,
 labelling and local society contacts. The new information is available for download from the Charity's website or
 hard copy on request from the Charity's Helpline.
- At the beginning of 2009 an inspirational DVD 'Living with coeliac disease' was launched for new Members featuring four real life case studies. It provides a dynamic dimension to our support for the newly diagnosed
- Working with the organisers of Gastro 2009, the world's largest event for healthcare professionals in gastroenterology, a public education day was organised in London attended by 300 people

3 2 Our Objective Improving the recognition of the condition by healthcare professionals and ensuring subsequent management is of high quality

- The first NICE guideline on coeliac disease was published in May 2009 and widely promoted by the Charity to the
 medical and mainstream media. In the run up to the publication the Charity co-authored high profile articles in
 the British Medical Journal and the British Journal of General Practice on lack of recognition for the condition.
- Despite repeated approaches to the SiGN group in Scotland to develop similar guidelines on diagnosis, the group decided against proceeding further but did agree that in the absence of Scottish specific guidance it would signpost others onto the NiCE guideline
- Following the Charity's successful lobbying for a NICE guideline on diagnosis, an application for management guidelines was submitted by the Chair of our Health Advisory Council The application scored highly on its first round assessment and is currently awaiting assessment at second stage
- As part of our campaign to improve the public and political awareness of health issues associated with the
 disease a petition to Number 10 Downing Street was launched On its submission at the beginning of 2010 the
 petition had over 8,000 signatures
- In 2008 Coeliac UK developed a partnership with the British Dietetic Association (BDA) to promote an accredited
 post-registration course for Registered Dietitians to be rolled out across the UK. In 2009 three courses were
 given by local dietitians in Manchester, Derby and Surrey. In 2010 we hope to extend the range of accredited
 courses for dietitians reaching more localities. Further presentations were undertaken at a range of healthcare
 professional conferences.

3 3 Our Objective

Access to a wider range of better quality gluten-free products on prescription and in shops

A new EU-wide law on gluten-free labelling was put into effect at the beginning of 2009 based on the new international standard agreed in 2008

- As the implications of the new law unfolded throughout 2009 the Charity worked hard to negotiate a policy on the
 issue that worked for people with the condition. We also played an important role in keeping the commercial
 sector informed about the changes including organising a stakeholder event with speakers from the Food
 Standards Agency and the British Retail Consortium.
- During the year a pan European agreement was finally reached, after many years of negotiation, on a European Licensing scheme. Once the scheme is rolled out it is expected that many more products sold in European shops will bear the universally recognised symbol for safe gluten-free food. In the UK 17 new licensees of the Crossed. Grain. Symbol. were signed up in 2009 bringing the total number of licensees to 83.
- The planned food conference in Scotland was cancelled at a time of economic turmoil which resulted in many similar events being cancelled

34 Our Objective

Eating out, for pleasure or through need, is freed from restrictions

The ability to eat out safely and easily is consistently rated as a key Member concern. We made significant advances in 2009 despite new challenges posed by the introduction of the law on gluten-free labelling

- The Charity's Awareness Week for 2009 focused on improving eating out with its theme of Free for Tea? The
 Week achieved 37 articles in the national press and 74 in regional media. Results from a survey of Members
 which highlighted how the catering sector is missing out on £100 million worth of business, also attracted
 extensive coverage in the specialist catering media reaching an estimated audience of 63k key contacts.
- In an effort to raise the profile of gluten-free catering further, the Chanty rolled out a new professional and in training chef competition. Working with the Institute of Hospitality to promote the competition to the sector, other key stakeholders such as Sodexo and 3663 were engaged and 238 catering colleges contacted. Extensive coverage was achieved in the sector press such as Essentially Catering, Eat Out and Food and Drink News.
- An updated online catering training module was developed for the Charity's website providing a platform for the development of an interactive tool for completion in 2010

3 5 Our Objective

Providing long term solutions by helping to support research into understanding the nature of the disease, gluten-free cereals and a possible cure

The Charity committed a further £300k on medical research to be spent in the period 2009 – 2010. Total spend for 2009 on existing research and the first year spend of the new research programme, amounted to £182k. Spending in this area exceeded by 1% the Charity's objective to spend a minimum of 5% of its income on research.

- Three new research projects have received support from the Charity A research team led by Professor David van Heel of Queen Mary College, London has been awarded £143k to work on identifying the genetic basis of coeliac disease. A research team working in Cardiff University led by Professor Daniel Aeschlimann, is working with Drs David Sanders and Marios Hadjivassiliou in Sheffield, to research identifying coeliac disease in patients with neurological symptoms. The grant is worth £143k over three years. Finally, Dr David Sanders has received a further grant worth £14k to improve speed of diagnosis by screening patients referred for endoscopy with non specific symptoms using a point of care blood test.
- Two research projects were completed in the year. Dr Nina Lewis finished her Fellowship with the Charity after support for four years and Professor Sonia Quaratino completed her project looking at the innate immune response in coeliac disease in a project which began in 2006. Final reports from the projects will be published in 2010.

3 6 Our Objective

Delivering value for money for the Membership by demonstrably improving our efficiency and effectiveness

Securing the Charity's funding base was identified as an essential underpinning of its 2007-09 strategy. After the successful introduction of the Membership fee scheme, the Charity has continued to expand its funding streams.

- The Charity successfully applied for a Radio 4 charity appeal which was broadcast in February 2010
- A stage one application to the Department of Health, Third Sector Investment Programme 2010-11, on 'Developing culturally specific dietary approaches for people with coeliac disease from a South Asian background' was successful. This project is in partnership with a High Wycombe gastroenterologist but will impact upon both national and community services. A completed proposal for the three year project has been submitted to the Stage 2 process.
- A new website was launched in 2009 which will provide a platform for more personalised information delivered to
 the Membership. The Charity had committed to extending its online venue guide in the year to include other local
 services but reviewed its approach with the creation of the new website and will be prioritising other services such
 as creating a discussion board for Members going forward.
- Early in the year, the Charity completed an office move to new premises with minimal disruption to the Charity's services. The Members' Helpline was closed at lunchtime on a Friday and reopened at lunchtime on the following Monday. There was no other disruption to service. The move was prompted by the proposed redevelopment of the Charity's former premises and a coincident break clause in the office's lease.
- At the end of the year the Charity had applied for the Investors in People standard which was subsequently awarded in January 2010

The breakdown of expenditure on our charitable activities can be seen in more detail in Note 3 of our financial statement

How we are managed – Structure, governance and management

4.1 The Charity

Coeliac UK is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 14 June 1995 and registered as a charity on 20 July 1995 with the Charity Commission. It was also registered with the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator in 2007.

4 2 The Board of Governors

The Board of Governors lead the Charity in setting its strategic direction and agreeing objectives and plans to deliver the Charity's aims. The Board monitors and evaluates the progress of the Charity to ensure it achieves those objectives and plans.

The expertise within the Board is substantial and wide-ranging. Governors include a finance director of a major multinational corporation, a Charity Commission lawyer, a senior director with banking experience, senior multinational executives, university lecturers and experienced senior healthcare professionals. All Governors are volunteers committing many days, evenings and weekends of the year to working for the Charity.

During the year Rosemary Hoyle and Mike Wickens retired from the Board of Governors after many years of dedicated and valuable service. In Henderson and Ian Tottman were elected for the first time at the 2009 AGM to serve as Governors having been co-opted to the Board in 2008. Two new Governors, Tim Wade and Gillian White, were co-opted to the Board in 2009 and will bring valuable new expertise from both the banking and investment sector, and the food sector.

4 3 The Board's Committees

The Board delegates some of its responsibilities to committees to provide a particular focus on some issues. The Audit Committee ensures the robustness of the Board's overall financial and risk monitoring, while the Human Resources (HR) Committee oversees the Charity's HR policies ensuring they are legally compliant and fit for purpose

The Executive Action Committee was created to allow the Board to retain control in crisis situations when the full Board may not be able to be convened. The Committee would only be called upon in emergencies and was not invoked in 2009.

Health Advisory Council and Health Associates

The Health Advisory Council provides the Charity with expert insight into health issues related to coeliac disease, associated research and advice on related policies and activities. The new Council draws upon a wide range of expertise to reflect all aspects of healthcare. Two new members joined the Council, Professor David van Heel and Dr David Sanders, both of who bring substantial research expertise to the Charity. Dr Geoff Holmes retired from the Council having devoted many years to the work of the Charity.

The Health Associates Network added several new members to its membership including GPs and a clinical psychologist

Food Sector Advisory Panel

This panel provides the Charity with expert insight into the food sector and advice on gaining maximum benefit from the Charity's activities in the sector

The members of the Panel include three members from the Coeliac UK Board, Sarah Mitson (Chair of the Panel), Ian Tottman and Gillian White. In addition, the Panel includes representatives from the retail, catering and food manufacturing sectors as well as their regulators.

Meeting arrangements

The Board and its committees continue to use a combination of face-to-face meetings and teleconferences during the year to ensure the cost effectiveness and efficiency of their operations

4.4 Recruiting and supporting Governors

Recruitment of new Governors for 2009 was undertaken in the year through advertisement in the Charity's magazine, website and on a number of open access websites. Two new Governors were recruited in 2009 and have been provided with induction training and a Governor 'buddy' who is able to provide informal support and advice.

4 5 Company Secretary

Peter Howlett resigned from the position of Company Secretary in 17 August 2009 The new Company Secretary will be joining the Chanty in 2010

4 6 Management and Staff

The Board of Governors delegates the day-to-day management of the Charty to the Chief Executive who leads a team of 24 6 full-time equivalent staff. Their work is supplemented at times of peak workload by a limited number of temporary staff. The staff work within the Delegation of Authority agreed in a statement by the Board.

The staff agree a work plan with the Board at the beginning of the year and report back progress at Board meetings throughout the year through quarterly reporting

47 Our volunteer community

We had 94 active Local Groups at the end of the year and we hope to restart a further four who had suspended activities in 2009. Nearly 1,281 volunteers provided local support, campaigned and fundraised for the Charity within Groups. We have expanded our volunteer activities further by creating new opportunities to engage within the Charity. One hundred Members volunteered to regularly collect local data on food prices whilst 50 undertook specific activities during our Awareness. Week. A further 28 people volunteered for a variety of different roles in campaigning, research and administrative work. All of our volunteers add a great deal to the Charity's overall effectiveness.

In fact, every day across the UK our Groups and volunteers provide local support and a sympathetic ear to those with coeliac disease and Dermatitis Herpetiformis (DH), particularly the newly diagnosed

48 Managing Risk

A risk register is used by the Board and staff to monitor the major risks to which the Charity is exposed. Actions are identified on the register to mitigate risks and the register is routinely monitored at each Audit Committee and Board meeting as part of the quarterly business report to the Board.

All major project work undertaken by staff have risks and mitigation measures identified at the beginning and these are monitored throughout the project lifetime

At the beginning of 2009, a review of the risk register was carried out to assess the risks of the Annual Plan against the changing environment faced by the Charity. The risk register is reviewed annually in the light of the Business Plan.

5 Financial Review

5 1 Overview

The Charity's performance in 2009 was much better than anticipated. Overall income grew by nearly 25%. The Charity received legacy income of 348k income in other categories increased by nearly 12%. However, investment income was down by 31%,

Expenditure rose 6% with additional resources spent on campaigning and research. More detail may be found in the Statement of Financial Activities and subsequent notes.

5 2 Investment results

The Charity had an unrealised gain of £58k compared to unrealised loss of £293k in 2008. At the end of the reporting period the Charity's investments had recovered to 78% of their 2007 value. With effective cash management the management were able to continue operations without having to liquidate its investments.

53 Investing in research

Research expenditure during the year was £182k with a further £192k committed for 2010 and 2011 (which is provided for from restricted or designated funds) as part of our ongoing programme of supporting research

5.4 Investment and Reserves policy

The Charity reviewed its investment policy in 2006, concluding that we should place our investments with a fund manager to provide a reasonable and growing income over the long term, commensurate with a moderate but not excessive degree of risk. The Charity will not invest in high risk instruments, such as derivatives, hedge funds, covered warrants or spread betting. The Charity has also taken the view that it would be unethical to invest in tobacco industry as an organisation committed to good health as this would impact on the Charity's reputation amongst its stakeholders.

All of the Charity's investments are managed by M&G, a leading investment manager, within its Charifund and Chanbond portfolios

The Board recognises the need to hold chantable funds as free reserves in order to safeguard the continuity of provision of basic services, to fund periods of expenditure in excess of revenue and to fund unexpected expenditure. In 2007 the Board concluded that the equivalent of between five and 10 months of operating costs (excluding restricted and designated expenditure) should be held as free reserves. These levels were set given the uncertainty of income levels following the introduction of the Membership fee.

The reserves policy was reviewed early 2009 in the light of the economic downturn and will continue to be reviewed annually by the Board. The Board will monitor the level of free reserves regularly throughout 2010. Excess reserves may be spent to further the objectives of the Charity. If free reserves fall below the agreed level the Board will take steps to establish or maintain free reserves at the agreed level by taking measures to reduce expenditure and by managing levels of designated reserves.

The good financial performance by the Charity provided the conditions for improving our reserves position at the end of the year. The proportion of free reserves at 31 December 2009 was 7.27 months of annual general expenditure, bringing our position back into line with our reserves policy, compared to 4.21 at the end of 2008. Total reserves rose by £254k in 2009 contrasting with the drop of £490k in 2008.

6 Plans for Future Periods

The 2010-11 Business Plan represents the first two years of a new strategic planning period for the Charity whose long term aims remain

- · improving services for Members
- · campaigning for clearer labelling and more choice in the packaged food market
- campaigning for clearer signposting and more availability of gluten-free options in the catering sector
- continuing to fund high quality research with a view to improving clinical outcomes and developing long term solutions to living with the condition
- and continuing to develop the efficiency and effectiveness of the Charity's performance

The Business Plan for 2010-11 will deliver

- a deepening and broadening of relationships in the catering sector
- working with institutional caterers and major catering suppliers to improve gluten-free catering provision using the promotion of accredited online training modules
- the development of a new gluten-free assurance tool to widen and deepen our relationships with food manufacturers and retailers
- an extension of policymaking relationships with a view to achieving QOF recognition for coeliac disease
- developing Member resources about labelling changes thus adding value to our Member offering
- improving services with better venue guide and recipe database
- · and developing new research collaborations in Europe and the UK

7 Responsibilities of the Board of Governors

1 Accounting policies

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the inclusion of fixed asset investments at market value and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, Applicable United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) have been followed in preparing these accounts

b) Local groups and accounting policy

The local groups record their income and expenditure on a receipt basis. At the end of the financial year, each group submits a return of its income and expenditure which is included in the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet.

c) Income

Income from membership, web advertising, sponsorship and licensing is deferred on a proportionate basis over an appropriate period. All other income is recognised on a receivable basis.

d) Cost allocation

e) Grants

Grants payable are payments made to third parties in furtherance of the charitable objectives

Grants which are free from specific conditions are recognised in full as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity

Multi year grants are conditional on an annual review of progress which will determine if future funding is provided. Due to this condition only one year's funding commitment is recognised.

f) Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as specified by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.

g) Depreciation of fixed assets

Provision is made for depreciation on all tangible assets at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows

h) Investments

Investments held as fixed assets are revalued at mid market value at the balance sheet date

ı) Taxatıon

The Charity's activities are exempt from taxation under Section 505 of the Income and Corporation Taxes Act 1988

1 Accounting policies (continued)

j) Leasing

Rental payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight line basis over the lease term

k) Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. They are analysed between charitable expenditure, cost of generating funds and governance of the Charity

Any direct costs are allocated between restricted and unrestricted funds as incurred

l) Designated funds

Designated funds are funds earmarked by the Board of Governors for particular purposes

m) Pension

The Charity operates a group personal money purchase pension scheme. The pension cost charged in the financial statements represents contributions payable by the Charity during the financial year.

n) Basis of consolidation

The group accounts consolidate the accounts of Coeliac UK and its subsidiary undertaking on a line by line basis. The accounts are made up to 31 December 2009.

The amount of the result for the financial period dealt within the financial statement of the subsidiary is disclosed in note 13 to these accounts

o) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are classified and accounted for, according to the substance of the contractual arrangement, as either financial assets, financial liabilities or equity instruments. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities.
