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CHAIR'S REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

The period 2013-2014 was another challenging year with budget cuts across all organisations in Wales and UK. Third Sector organisations were further hit by the cuts as they were already delivering services under tight budgets.

Despite the financial cuts, we worked with different partners to deliver a range of services and in 2013-14 we successfully supported 4,613 people. This number is a 36% increase from 2012-13, when we supported 3,370.

The reason for last year's increase in demand for our services is due to closures of other Third Sector organisations. In addition, further demand for Bawso's services resulted from our efforts to raise awareness of the Violence Against Women agenda related to Female Genital Mutilation and human trafficking. We have encountered numerous examples of changes to the welfare system compounding our service users experiences. For example some of the service users were affected by the 'bedroom tax' although they were temporarily accommodated in a Safe house, the result being that Bawso is responding to their call for help whereas in the past, the welfare system would adequately support them.

In the face of the challenging financial environment there were successes to celebrate:

- The FGM project was expanded to include Newport
- We set up the Sanctuary project in North Wales
- We continued to deliver the Mental Health project across Wales Amalgamated with The Women's Workshop (TWW).
- Enhanced service users participation former service users were involved in staff recruitment and selection processes, participating as members of interview panels. Those still receiving support from Bawso also actively participated in designing how our support is delivered.

The merger with TWW ensured that expertise developed in the delivery of grassroots training and development would have a solid legacy as well as potential for growth given a more stable financial position. TWW was set up in 1984 in response to the need identified by domestic abuse organisations for mainstream opportunities to equip women with skills to become economically independent. As a result, service users now have a women's only space dedicated to their personal development.

All these achievements were possible because of the commitment of Bawso staff, volunteers and interpreters as well as our partners. We all work tirelessly to deliver positive outcomes for all of our service users. Our staff remain highly committed and continue to deliver life changing support during these challenging times of cutbacks and changes to the welfare system. Service users remain at the centre of our support. As an organisation we recognise the challenges faced by staff and put measures in place to cater for their wellbeing.

As we go forward, we know next year will continue to be challenging due to further budget cuts. Bawso remains determined to weather the storm and consolidate the services as well as prioritise quality support for our service users.



Governance

Bawso, is a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. Charity number: 1084854. Company number: 03152590

Bawso carries out an Annual Skills Audit to identify any gaps in the Board of Directors. This year we took on board two of the Board members from the Women's Workshop to continue to reflect the expertise of the Women's Workshop projects. We reserve a third of our places on the Board for ex-service users.

This year a total of 12 Board Members served Bawso. They have acquired a wide range of skills, experience and knowledge. They also come from varied professional backgrounds.

Strategic Management

Bawso is currently developing the new Business Plan 2013 2016. The management Team are playing a crucial role in contributing towards the Business Plan.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Bawso delivers on government and local priorities in an innovative and value-driven way to the most marginalised communities, often seen as 'hard to reach' by many service providers. Our specialist services meet local needs, empower users, create bridging social capital, and contribute to social cohesion.

In the last year we supported 4,613 people from diverse black and minority ethnic (BME) backgrounds. These service users were from 10 ethnic backgrounds, spoke 39 languages and belonged to at least seven religions. This was consistent with the general observation that domestic abuse is not partial to any specific cultural or socio-economic groups of the community. However, at the same time, it is also widely recognised that there are a range of barriers to the identification and reporting for some sections of the community as well as potential challenges to effective intervention. The report describes our work in the last financial year, highlighting the main challenges faced by BME service users and commonly recognised barriers to accessing support. It also reports on individual projects as well as other initiatives Bawso was involved in 2013-14.

Context of BME service users

BME women are disproportionately affected by different forms of abuse including; forced marriage, "honour-based" violence, female genital mutilation and sexual exploitation (in the form of commercial sex work and trafficking). The multiple vulnerabilities arising from overlapping contexts of abuse BME women face on a daily basis shaped the pattern of support which we provided during the last year. We aimed to provide support which was accessible, equitable and valued diversity. In some instances this entailed engaging specialist BME workers who are aware of the particular needs of BME people. Support staff belonged to 10 ethnic backgrounds. It is worth noting that the ethnicity of people could be broken down further into smaller ethnic groups.

Women from BME backgrounds suffer in silence because they reluctant to report. Often women do not report abuse for various reasons such as language and literacy barriers - which impact on their level of knowledge, understanding and awareness about support that is available to them and even that domestic violence is a crime.

Language barriers can often lead to a power imbalance within the family and women are left to rely on their children who pick up the language more quickly (through school, friends and so forth). In the last year we worked with interpreters in 1,926 support sessions using 39 different languages, an average of 160 per month.

Additionally there is a financial dependency and stigma attached to speaking out about the abuse within some communities. For instance, women were not employed and had no separate disposable income. As a consequence they were ill equipped to escape abuse and are at high risk of homelessness. Cultural beliefs and stigma in some BME communities can also inhibit women's ability to access appropriate services, and can contribute to homelessness being 'hidden'. For most BME women the family structure to which they belong is invariably strong and their role within it is highly prescribed – which can restrict their personal freedoms. Whereas domestic abuse may not be condoned by all family members, it is infrequently questioned or challenged. By design or default many families collude to maintain traditional power relationships and behaviours that keep woman almost completely isolated and unable to confront abuse within marriage. For example, 62% out of the 372 women we supported on the Floating Support project had experienced domestic abuse.

In some instances the abuse reflects a degree of social exclusion that characterises their everyday lives as individuals and citizens. BME women may not try to access services because they feel there is a lack of understanding of their community, fear of authority, and that they will face discrimination. Most of the women we support find it difficult to access and engage meaningfully with non-specialist services because of repeat victimisation in the form of racism and discriminatory cultural stereotypes that minimise their experience of violence.

The challenges are further compounded for women who are particularly vulnerable with complex needs but are not eligible for welfare support or assistance or have very limited access to what may be available because they have no recourse to public funds (NRPF). This is despite projects such as the Destitution Domestic Violence (DDV) rule which provides support to men or women who are on a spousal visa fleeing domestic violence. Women in this situation include those recently arriving or temporary immigrants, those who belong to the families of skilled migrants, sponsored relatives, international students and immigrants who have been living in the UK for a relatively short period. Women in these situations are often forced to remain in abusive situations and risk losing their life. Last year we received 164 referrals from women with NRPF out of which we were only able to support 76. Out of the number supported, only 24 were eligible for support under the DDV rule and 12 were funded by Social Services. 40 women were supported using Bawso reserves. In such instances when women access refuge, Bawso does not only provide weekly subsistence allowance, but also loses housing benefit income.

The impact of flight for a BME mother and her children is enormous. The emotional and practical stress of trying to establish a new existence is heightened by the prejudice and racism that exists. 'Moving out' of the family home removes almost everything that determines the identity and 'sense of belonging' for a mother and her children. It damages much of their self-esteem and self-worth, and contact with all those who formally affirmed their position and value.

At Bawso we aim to ensure our support and services are provided on the basis of need rather than constrained by financial concerns. The cost of Bawso providing timely and appropriate support to the thousands of BME women and their families dwarfs the costs of doing nothing, which would result in significant increases to Wales' health and social care budgets.

Outreach

Last year 219 people were supported on Outreach projects. Our outreach support service caters for people affected by domestic abuse who are unable to access refuge accommodation as well as exiting the service. Women and children affected by domestic abuse need a range of services to meet their needs. What works for one woman may not be appropriate for the next. Not all women, for example, want or need to go to a refuge.

Through outreach the women are helped to understand their options and make decisions about their lives.

One hundred and seventy (170) service users supported through outreach last year were in North Wales where the biggest project is run. We helped women regain their self-worth and empower them to make their own life choices, and break patterns of behaviour to stop them getting involved in other abusive relationships.

We also provided outreach support in Carmarthen, Llanelli.

Refuge

Our safe accommodation provides spaces which are culturally sensitive where women can be sure they are safe, and where they can access emotional and practical support from staff who understand what they have been through. This is particularly important for BME women fleeing abuse who in most instances come from highly patriarchal communities which use honour as a means of control.

Bawso supported 112 women in refuge and safe houses with 114 children accompanying their mothers. It is a known fact that children are the silent victims of domestic violence – their voices are not heard and pain often goes unnoticed. They can either witness the violence or themselves be objects of violence. They also see what happens after the abuse – their mother's tears, bruises, and torn clothes, and are often used as pawns by the abuser through child custody disputes. Children living in violent homes often have limited resources and no access to information and support. Their hardships at school, difficulties in relating to others, aggressive behaviour and depression are seldom attributed to violence between adults at home. Without intervention, these children may continue to suffer into adulthood.

All children were assessed and an individual support plan was designed to meet the needs. We also worked closely with the School staff and Health visitors to ensure their wellbeing and educational developments.

IDVA

Bawso provides IDVA support in Cardiff, Swansea and Wrexham. Last year 737 individuals were supported through IDVA. Most of the referrals were from Police, MARAC, Bawso's internal projects and other partner agencies. In order to maximise victims' safety and to reduce the risks to individuals, IDVAs took multi agency approach and worked closely with police, Domestic Abuse Unit, health professional, housing, education and other relevant agencies. A risk and needs assessment was carried out, safety management plans were put in place, ongoing support plans were agreed by individuals. Over 80% of those referred to the project fully engaged, and received appropriate support to meet identified needs.

Diogel Project - Support for people who have been trafficked

The Diogel project continued to provide support, advocacy and accommodation to trafficked people who were exploited. During the last 12 months we have supported 67 people who were trafficked of which 37 were supported in secure accommodation and 30 through outreach. The project mostly supported 65 women and 5 men. The women supported in secure accommodation were accompanied by 11 children. The individuals had experienced different forms of exploitation which caused severe trauma. However it remained challenging to access specialist counselling due to long waiting lists. As a result some of the people requiring counselling had to access generic services.

Support workers worked with the service user to create individual support plans for the service users, which included financial help, support accessing health services, specialist counselling, criminal and immigration-related legal advice, education and employment.

Floating Support

The floating support schemes in Cardiff, Caerphilly, Newport, Merthyr Tydfil and Swansea supported 372 service users. Service users were equal partners in the development and delivery of support so as to ensure it met their needs.

The support we offered was varied and included dealing with eviction notices, benefit issues, antisocial behaviour, repairs & maintenance, overcrowding, resettlement, rent arrears, children's issues, completing forms, advocacy, Health & Safety and immigration. In some instances the support was to access ESOL and other training courses so that support users are able to subsist independently in the community.

Our floating support project in Merthyr Tydfil is generic for women who are victim of domestic abuse and have housing issues. Majority of the service users have complex needs which sometimes include substance misuse. We supported 48 service users during April 2013 to March 2014 out of which 92% were White British, 6% European and 2% from Far East.

Among service users we supported, 70% reported feeling safe whilst the remaining 30% showed progress towards the achieving it. Support staff worked with service users to ensure that they resettled in the community and contribute to their and their families' safety while they integrated into their new communities.

Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)

The FGM Health and Safeguarding was established in May 2010 to support people in Cardiff who are affected by or who are at risk of undergoing Female Genital Mutilation. Last year in June the second phase of the project started which extended it to Newport. The project continued to engage with communities affected by FGM to raise awareness of the social and health implications with the aim of empowering them to challenge the practice. Last year 249 people from different communities affected by FGM participated and benefited in project activities.

In Newport the focus was to introduce the project by gathering baseline data about community knowledge of FGM as well as establish partnerships to work collaboratively, to strengthen people's voices in the fight against FGM. There was a baseline survey (50 participants) which found that there majority awareness of FGM, however the levels of detailed knowledge (about the law, reasons for the practice among practitioners who may come across girls and women affected or at risk) was low. Very few people thought FGM was a religious practice. There was a noticeable apathy or lack of opposition to FGM in conversations in the wider community, even though many of the respondents clearly felt disaffected by FGM. The common oral submissions on knowledge of FGM reflected the views of those who support FGM. One respondent (aged over 60 years) expressed support for FGM when answering this question, saying 'Sunna is good, if I had girls I will do it on them... the advantage is that it reduces sexual pleasure and promotes purity and virginity'. Another person said 'It's ok for me, but they say it's not allowed here'. This suggests that there is a lack of strong voices at community level speaking out against FGM. In Cardiff we continued to work with women, young people and men through different approaches.

Older People's Project

The project continued to working closely with BME older people in Cardiff in order to improve their health and wellbeing as well as promote independent living. Last year the project 332 participated and benefited from community activities. A further 169 BME older people received one to one support.

We organised intergenerational activities which involved food preparation and sharing as well as storytelling in schools. In total 115 older people and 124 children and young people attended the intergenerational traditional story telling events held in the community. There were also 14 older people who delivered story telling sessions in School. We compiled 10 stories in a booklet and are looking for suitable images to with the stories. Both the young and older people thoroughly enjoyed the initiative. It gave them they opportunity to bridge the gap between young and older people.

The project held 11 health awareness sessions which were attend by 228 of older people. We also encouraged 26 older people to undertake IT and 70 English language classes. The majority of the older people who undertook English had previously attempted to study ESOL but found it challenging because it was set at a higher level. The classes delivered by the project were pitched at a level which they could cope with. Some of the classes were conversational and delivered by volunteers.

In the last year, 15 older people were recruits as volunteers. Volunteering had significant benefits for BME older people including the opportunity to meet people, to undertake a challenge and to keep the brain and body active. BME older people brought benefits to the wider community through their volunteering, both in terms of the delivery of essential services and the combating of social exclusion and the building of skills. For example, some of the English and knitting classes were delivered by older people.

One Stop Shop

The One Stop Shop was set up in 2008 to provide convenient and efficient service and also to create the opportunity for our clients to access a multiple services under one roof. It saves the client a lot of time and effort in comparison to visiting a separate agency for each area of need. The One Stop Shop also makes it easier for statutory and voluntary agencies to access the so called 'hard to reach' groups.

During the last year 16 organisations provided services at the One Stop Shop which included: Welsh Refugee Council; Immigration solicitors; Willows group; Gateway Program; Wrexham Welsh Refugee Council; Community Safety Partnership; The Wallich; Women's Aid; African Community Centre; The Team Around the Child; North Wales Police; Shelter; @67- @67 Communications; Cobweb; Key Connections and Parenting group. A total of 9521 people attended the on stop shop to access support from the agencies.

The Women's Workshop

TWW continued to deliver different training activities to up-skill women. During 2013/2014 the activities included: open house, WAVE, the Club, the Women's Space, and Mothers then and Now.

Open House

The 3 year project ended in August 2013 and provided learning opportunities for 418 women and girls over its life time. During this time 19 external community groups made use of facilities and 6 community events were held with the help of a range of groups and volunteers.

Out of 121 evaluations returned for activities delivered for girls aged 13-17 in year 3, 91% of participants stated they had tried out new things and/or learnt a new skill and 89% said they had had fun, while 95% of evaluations for the informal evening classes and Saturday workshops for adults in Year 3 rated the classes as excellent.

Women Adding Value to the Economy (WAVE)

WAVE is an EU funded partnership programme and we are joint sponsors with Cardiff University and The University of Wales. The aim of the WAVE programme is to contribute to tackling the causes of gender pay gaps in Wales, working with employers and employed women. The programme aims to empower and upskill women to progress in the non-traditional sectors of technical ICT and construction. We are delivering high level training, mentoring and networking to support this, and working with employers to improve their approach to gender equality and diversity. In this year, the programme had supported 108 women from within the convergence area.

The Club

This was a pilot intergenerational project with a group of 6 young mother volunteers designing and organising a Club for local women over 60. In total 10 Clubs were organised within this period and activities ranged from information sessions including Age Concern and South Wales Police to fun craft activities. In partnership with Butetown Enterprise Centre, the young mothers were able to gain a Work Skills qualification. This project is now being continued with the support of the Communities First team for Butetown.

The Women's Space

The project provided the means to deliver a range of community activities at Clarence House. The activities ranged from one off fun events; the provision of ESOL and essential skills training; informal evening classes such as Arabic for girls and Pilates classes, access to our women's only gym and the hosting of a number of small volunteer led women's groups. Between January and September 2013 there were 744 sessions recorded in the women's only gym.

Mothers Then & Now

The project works with 10 girls aged 11-18 focusing on the social history of women over the period 1900-present day, using personal testimony from female members of their families and archive material. The girls have received training on both the Glamorgan Archive and the archive contained in the Butetown History & Arts Centre. Other training has included interviewing techniques, communication skills, fashion design, digital imaging and website creation. The girls are currently working on gaining an Edexcel Creative Media Award

Raising Awareness

There are several events/activities which cater to Bawso's public and professional awareness in the form of church ecumenical services, conferences, training courses, advocacy and campaigning, information and advice bureau. Wherever possible Bawso seeks to build partnerships and engage with collaborators in these activities rather than operating solo.

Light a Candle Event – We delivered yet another successful ecumenical service at Llandaff Cathedral which brought together more than 250 people.

Tackling FGM Together in Wales – We jointly delivered a conference on FGM which was attended by more than 100 people on 6th February 2014 which was funded by Welsh Government. The conference brought together different practitioners to map a strategy of how to tackle FGM in Wales.

International Women's Day conference —We organised a community based conference which brought together 120 participants. Former service users shared their experience of domestic violence which gave insights of how support from agencies like Bawso was a defining moment in their survival.

Training

Bawso provides a range of multi-disciplinary training courses, which promote an integrated approach for all those working in the statutory, third and independent sectors. In the last year we delivered 21 raising awareness training sessions which were attended by 484 participants. The training was delivered to the Police, Medical centres, schools, and third sector. Our training drew on the resources of specialist staff team and a national network. We delivered 13 sessions on your own whilst 8 were delivered in partnership with other agencies. The raising awareness sessions covered specialist areas such as FGM, human trafficking, forced marriage and honour based violence, no recourse to public funds and domestic abuse from a BME perspective.

Campaigning for change

Bawso recognizes the importance of working together with other organisations to share experience and push for change in order to achieve positive outcomes for women affected by violence against women.

Last year we continued to actively participate in the Wales Violence Against Women Action Group which has been leading the campaign for development of strong legislation in Wales.

We continue to campaign for better protection and services for people who have been trafficked in the UK through membership to the Anti Trafficking Monitoring Group. We gave written and verbal responses to draft Modern Day Slavery and Human Bill.

Information and Advice

Bawso received several calls to seek information and advice since we are the biggest BME service provider in Wales. The information requests come from professionals requiring advice on issues affecting BME people such as honour and shame and no recourse to public funds. We provided information and advice 1,293 people last year.

The number of information requests increased last year due to welfare reforms as most families found themselves with little or no money which had an impact in their ability to pay rent and purchase food. Many people accessing the advice service were referred onwards to the food bank.

Research & Information

Bawso initiates research in different areas in order to build the body of knowledge in the various areas of violence against women and girls as well as to keep abreast with emerging trends and patterns in the sector. The research findings not only provide evidence of gaps and needs in the services but also inform and influence service provision and policy direction.

In the last year we were involved in two primary research studies. One study looked at the needs of BME men experiencing DV entitled "Perceptions and Challenges in Supporting BME Men Who Are Affected by Domestic Abuse". We continued to collaborate as Associate Partners in a study entitled "Cultural Encounters in Interventions Against Violence" which involves universities in four countries – England/Wales, Germany, Portugal and Slovenia. As Associate Partners we participated in two study days to discuss and agree the scope of the research as well develop the methodology for gathering data. We also organised two research workshops for practitioners on human trafficking and domestic violence.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Bawso Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the income and expenditure of the charitable company for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditor is unaware; and
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005).

Consolidation

In the opinion of the trustees, the company and its subsidiary undertakings comprise a small group. The company has therefore taken advantage of the exemption provided by Section 398 of the Charities Act 2011 not to prepare group accounts.

The directors do not consider the cost of preparing consolidated accounts justifiable and note 12 provides adequate details relating to the nature of the trading subsidiary.

Female Genital Mutilation Project (FGM)

The joint initiative of the City Parochial Foundation (CPF), Esmée Fairbairn Foundation (EF) and Rosa (the UK's Women's Fund), funded Bawso for a second round of 3 year period for community-based Preventative work on FGM. The funding is for a full time support worker and cost of community engagement.

AVOW Grant

This small grant was used to deliver Activities to increase Confidence, improve listening and communication skills, increase self-awareness and create alternative thinking for BME Youths in Wrexham.

WCVA Gwirvol

This one year grant was to work with young volunteers from disadvantaged background. They have gained invaluable experience from being part of our projects. The highlight of the project has been their participation in the Forced Marriage Play, Intergenerational Play, and the FGM Play.

Independent Domestic Violence Advocates Project (IDVA)

The Home Office, Welsh Government and the Community Safety Partnerships fund the IDVA projects. The IDVA grant is used to fund the employment of an Independent Domestic Violence Adviser to support service users through the Specialist Violence Court (SDVC) Service in Cardiff, Swansea and Wrexham.

Older People's Project

The Welsh Government under Section 64 has funded this 3 year project to work with BME elders in Cardiff to reduce isolation, improve health and wellbeing and increase participation in public life. The funding is for a support worker, sessional community workers and the related activity costs.

Women's Equality Network - International Women's Day Funding

The Welsh Governments Women's Equality Network funded the International Women's Day Event. The funding was for hosting an event in partnership with Butetown Riverside Grangetown (BRG) Communities First to raise awareness and empower women in times of austerity; not to wait for hand out but put hands up.

Oxfam - Sanctuary in Wales Project

Oxfam has funded this project to address the particular issues faced by refugee and asylum seeking women in Wrexham. The Sanctuary in Wales project will provide a range of integrated services that have been specifically designed to meet the unique needs of women seeking sanctuary. These services include:

- Employment & training
- Social inclusion & community involvement
- Getting better services

Women Adding Value to the Economy (WAVE)

WAVE is an EU funded partnership programme and we are joint sponsors with Cardiff University and The University of Wales. The aim of the WAVE programme is to contribute to tackling the causes of gender pay gaps in Wales, working with employers and employed women. The programme aims to empower and upskill women to progress in the non-traditional sectors of technical ICT and construction. We are delivering high level training, mentoring and networking to support this, and working with employers to improve their approach to gender equality and diversity. In this year, the programme had supported 108 women from within the convergence area.

Ethnic Minority Mental Health Awareness Project (EMHAP)

Different ethnic groups have different rates and experiences of mental health problems, reflecting their different cultural and socio-economic contexts and access to appropriate treatments.

The EMHAP project was set up to work with BME women to raise awareness of mental health issues and overcome barriers, access mainstream services and empower them to build confidence, gain skills and cope well with mental health issues across Wales. Bawso took responsibility for the EMHAP project in October 2013 after the closure of MEWN. By 31st March 2014, 202 BME women participated and benefited from the project. This number includes ongoing support and the Mental Health awareness, coping and empowering sessions. The participants were from different ethnic background including African, Asian and European.

The project also provided one to one support to some service users which included initial assessments followed by fortnightly visits.

The project has been highly rated by those who accessed the different activities.

20. CONTINGENT LIABILITY

Bawso has appealed to the local valuation tribunal against the decision to change the valuation banding from non domestic rates on the Council Tax list for the refuge accommodation in Swansea and Cardiff. The liability to Bawso if the appeal is unsuccessful will be £27,559 for the period 2010 to 2014 inclusive.

21. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The company was under the control of the trustees throughout the current and previous year.

During the year the trustees Mrs A Emezie and Mrs C Sinha were also directors of Bawso Training and Interpreting Services Limited. As at 31st March 2014 £23,694 (2013: £49,892) was owed from Bawso Training and Interpreting Services Limited. As at 31st March 2014 Bawso Training and Interpreting Services Limited made a donation of £11,225 (2013: £nil) to Bawso Limited by guarantee.
