REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2006

The trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2006

STRUCTURE AND GOVERNANCE

Innovative Enterprise Action Limited (IEA) is managed by a Board of Trustees (The Board) made up of up to 9 members, who meet quarterly (On 28 September 2005, the Members of the Company passed a resolution revising Clause 26 of the Articles of Association to read as follows. Unless otherwise determined by a General Meeting, the number of members of the Board shall be not less than three nor more than nine.) The Board appoints a Chief Executive who, together with a team of professionals, manages the day-to-day operations of the charity

RELATED PARTIES

The charity has a very close relationship with its trading subsidiary - IEA Trading Ltd - which is a company limited by guarantee wholly controlled by the charity. The results of the IEA Trading Ltd have been consolidated into the Statement of Financial Activities on a line-by-line basis. A summary of the IEA Trading Ltd results has also been included in note 14 to the financial statements.

In September 2005, the Members of IEA (charity) at the Exceptional General Meeting of 28 September 2005 set up a new trading subsidiary, called IEA Social Enterprises, for the purpose of operating various social enterprises to be used for hands-on training in enterprise skills and to bring in new sources of revenue to IEA (charity)

RECRUITMENT AND APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

New trustees are recruited by existing trustees and the Chief Executive to represent various aspects of the organisation's work. The Board then votes on the appointment of new candidates for trustees

New trustees receive an induction pack, and ongoing training as appropriate, offered by various organisations providing training to charity sector trustees

RISK MANAGEMENT

The trustees have carried out an analysis of the major risks that the organisation faces. The charity has developed systems to monitor and control these risks and to mitigate any impact that they may have on the agency in the future

CHARITABLE OBJECTS

Innovative Enterprise Action (IEA) provides enterprise and related enterprise development support in order to achieve social and economic outcomes of inclusion and regeneration. In brief, its broad mission is regeneration through strategic enterprise development, with a more narrowly defined mission of enabling individuals and groups from various disadvantaged population groups to acquire the skills to develop and run enterprises

Summary of Objectives

IEA received confirmation from the Charity Commission on 14th June 2005 to expand its objects and its area of service, in response to a recommendation from the Charity Commission that it do so. In March 2005, the Board passed a resolution revising the Memorandum of Association to read as follows, subject to the written consent of the Charity Commissions for England and Wales

All or any of the following means establishes the Association for the promotion for the public benefit of urban or rural regeneration in areas of social and economic deprivation in the Greater London area

- the advancement of education, training or retraining, particularly by the provision of vocational training and courses in literacy and numeracy and particularly among unemployed people, and providing unemployed people with work experience,
- the relief of poverty and the provision of financial assistance, technical assistance or business advice or consultancy in order to provide training and employment opportunities for unemployed and other disadvantaged people in cases of financial or other charitable need through help (i) in setting up their own business, or (ii) in running existing businesses,
- 3 the creation of training and employment opportunities by the provision of workspace, buildings, and/or land for use on favourable terms,

- 4 improvement of the efficient application of resources for charitable purposes by the provision of advice to community groups and the development of social enterprises, and
- 5 such other means as may from time to time be determined subject to the prior written consent of the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales

Aims

In order to achieve its objectives, IEA aims to deliver funded projects that support enterprise development in strategically identified market sectors, reducing social and economic exclusion among disadvantaged populations, primarily women, black, Asian and minority ethnic groups including refugees (BAME) and regenerating deteriorated neighbourhoods of London through providing enterprise training, support & area development

IEA has targeted related to three primary industry sectors of focus, as well as focus on social enterprise development. The three target sectors are

- Retail, including restaurants & pubs
- 2 Creative industries
- 3 'Sustainability' industries (such as sustainable construction, alternative energy and various 'green' enterprises) and to improving access to
 - ☐ business advice
 - □ finance
 - □ assets

for start-up and trading SMEs developed by the disadvantaged population groups listed above

IEA is also increasingly involved in the development and management of social enterprises that deliver market-competitive services in strategically identified market sectors while training and employing members of disadvantaged populations and supporting the regeneration of deteriorated areas

Sample Charity Services (Current and Planned)

- -Enterprise skills training including hands-on social enterprise management
- -Access to training and enterprise development in media, construction & other enterprise sectors in which women and BMER groups are under-represented
- -Loan fund, borrower support
- -New models for providing business advice

The trading company controlled by the charity delivers funded and fee-for-service general business advice and training to pre-start, start-up and trading SMEs, social and community enterprises in Islington and provides serviced, managed business space to not-for-profit organisations

The activities of IEA have been grouped into two major categories

- 1 Community Development, which includes the work with voluntary sector organisations around the development of consortia to design and deliver collaborative projects like SIED, PRESTO and WHAM, as well as our internal internship programme, in which university students, graduates and postgraduates volunteer as interns in our community development projects
- Small Business Support, which includes projects offering general business advice and business training, and our industry sector focused business advice and training for the retail, creative industries and 'sustainability' sectors, support for social enterprises and STEP (a scheme placing university students in small businesses)

Main objectives for the year and strategies for achieving objectives

- To expand into the construction sector through effective delivery of the BuildUP programme
- To expand services for women, refugees and asylum seekers through the EASI, PRESTO and WHAM programmes
- To increase services to small businesses through the development of a loan fund
- To continue effective delivery and project management of various programmes

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

EASI (Empowering Asylum Seekers to Integrate)

The EASI partnership, led by Islington Training Network and funded by the European Social Fund (ESF) EQUAL programme involves collaboration with 12 other voluntary organisations and educational institutions in England, as well as with comparable partnerships from the France and Hungary EASI aims to improve the conditions of asylum seekers and provide them with a meaningful existence during the asylum seeking process EASI enables asylum seekers to improve their employment opportunities by delivering support and bespoke pre-vocational training to equip them with key and specialised skills if they get a positive decision on their asylum claim. This programme is also designed to build the capacity of refugee community organisations strengthening them to give more support to asylum seekers (through volunteering opportunities) and improve their access to mainstream services.

In the EASI project in 2005-6, IEA developed volunteering opportunities and related skills training for asylum seekers within its social enterprises

PRESTO (Professional Refugees into Employment Through Support, Training and On-Line Learning)

The PRESTO partnership, funded by the European Social Fund (ESF) EQUAL programme involves collaboration with 12 other organisations in the UK, as well as with comparable partnerships from the Czech Republic, Germany and Italy, in order to provide employment support and training to highly skilled refugees with professional qualifications primarily in the medical, engineering and education sectors. During 2005-6, IEA's role in the UK partnership was to research the services available to refugee entrepreneurs in various regions of the UK, to explore the development of social enterprises building on the skills of the professional sectors targeted by the partnership and to explore enterprise and related training for the programme participants. PRESTO funding is supporting the development of three social enterprises within IEA Hybridlab, a multi-media web channel showcasing creative enterprise (described further under WHAM) which will focus on refugee engineers, the mobile crèche described elsewhere) which will focus on refugee teachers, and a social enterprise that builds on the skills of refugee medical professionals

REP (Refugee Enterprise Partnership)

This partnership is led by the British Refugee Council with the goal of coordinating and improving the support for refugee entrepreneurs across the UK with funding from the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI)/Phoenix Fund IEA's role in this partnership was to conduct research in several regions of the UK about the existing business support services that target refugee entrepreneurs as well as the location of refugees in these regions, and their need for services

SIED (Supporting Integration through Enterprise Development)

SIED, led by the London Borough of Islington, involves collaboration with a variety of local authority, voluntary organisation, higher education and other partners as well as collaborative work with national partnerships in Denmark, Hungary, Poland and Spain SIED, funded through the ESF EQUAL programme, promote new means of opening up the business creation process through supporting community organisations to provide enterprise support. IEA's role is in providing training leading to SFEDI accreditation as well as mentoring support and resource tools for community-based business advisors.

WHAM (Women Helped to Advance in Media)

IEA is lead partner on the WHAM (Women Helped to Advance in Media) project, from the Central London Learning and Skills Council (LSC) ESF funds WHAM provides video skills and Management and Leadership training as well as work placement opportunities for unemployed women, many from BAME backgrounds, in a range of traditional and new media, primarily in high tech media where the percentage of women employed in this field in London ranges between 0 and 4% IEA's role is in managing the project, delivering the Management and Leadership training and the work placements

WHAM has facilitated the development of IEA's social enterprise, Hybridlab, a multi-media web channel showcasing and supporting creative enterprise. Hybridlab has begun by showcasing unsigned independent bands. It provides work placement opportunities for women in photography (still and video), journalism, web design and marketing.

The WHAM project has also helped support the development of IEA's social enterprise, Streetwise Productions Live, by providing work placement opportunities and an NVQ unit in management and leadership to participants in the enterprise

SMALL BUSINESS SUPPORT

Start-up Programme

This programme offers a package of support services to people interested in setting up in business, including business advice on a one-to-one basis, access to workshops and the option of joining one of the Business Management Training programmes leading to a recognised higher level qualification in management and leadership. The start-up programme incorporates several strands, including the business support project for Islington residents funded by the Islington Strategic Partnership (which targets unemployed individuals and members of disadvantaged communities in Islington to explore the opportunities for self-employment) and Business Link start-up support services in Islington under a partnership arrangement with Prevista who hold the BL4L contract for Islington. To stimulate interest in enterprise and to focus such interest to meet market demands, IEA provides regular seminars in 'Exploring Enterprise'

Social Enterprise Support

IEA's Chief Executive has continued writing a monthly column, The Social Capitalist, for Social Enterprise Magazine, providing ongoing visibility for IEA in the sector

The Community Enterprise (COMET) project has supported community groups engaged in self-help through the creation of community businesses, co-operatives, micro businesses, credit unions, and other such initiatives, primarily in Finsbury Park, Islington North. The community business advisor, supported by other staff from the IEA, works closely with local residents and community groups with the aim of developing local solutions, including the setting up joint initiatives at grass root level

Hybridlab, IEA's multi-media web channel showcasing creative enterprise, was launched this year, after development of the website platform. Hybridlab has begun by showcasing unsigned independent bands. It provides work placement opportunities for women in photography (still and video), journalism, web design and marketing.

The London Borough of Islington and the EC1 New Deal for Communities have funded IEA to develop and manage a pan-Islington 'mobile' crèche service, i.e., crèche services that can be offered in short-term locations throughout the borough developing a bank of local employed and under-employed childcare workers, and helping these individuals to develop networks to provide both commercial and community based crèche provision in different parts of the borough. The Mobile Creche began actual delivery of services by the end of the year

Streetwise Productions Live, IEA's street theatre social enterprise, continued operation this year, and provided training and hands-on experience on a Shakespeare-focused street theatre walking tour at various locations along the South Bank. IEA received performance licenses from Southwark for these venues. The enterprise also produced or collaborated in other productions at indoor venues, particularly during the winter

Industry Specific Programmes - Creative Industries

IEA continued delivery as lead partner on the Government Office for London/ESF funded Creative Skills Design project This project involved various types of support to creative enterprises

Hybridlab, IEA's multi-media web channel showcasing creative enterprise, was launched this year, after development of the website platform. Hybridlab has begun by showcasing unsigned independent bands, and it will be developing services and showcase opportunities for other creative sector enterprises.

Industry Specific Programmes - Sustainability Industries

IEA continued delivery as lead partner on the Pan-London LSC ESF funded project BuildON (formerly called New Perspectives for SMEs in Construction) This project has provide a range of support and training for SMEs and employees of SMEs in the construction industry. The project promotes sustainable site management among construction sector SMEs on large and smaller construction sites (with the development of training and delivery mechanisms specifically targeted to the two types of sites through collaboration by voluntary and private sector partners CITB-Construction Skills, FaberMaunsell, Kotuku and WilsonJames) and to develop

and support women and BME-owned SMEs and SME employees in this sector, particularly in the development of enterprise and heritage conservation skills (the latter involving the development and delivery of a new multi-skills conservation skills programme to be delivered by the highly acclaimed sector specialist colleges, Business Crafts College and Lambeth College) and through one-to-one support involving voluntary sector partner Agenda in collaboration with IEA

Industry Specific Programmes - Retail

There was no specific funding for this area, however IEA provided support to the Essex Road Traders Association through its general business support and community enterprise funding, and is looking to increase funding for this sector

General Support including Loan Funding for Existing Businesses

IEA has an active programme of support services targeted at existing small businesses, funded through Business Link programmes under our sub-contracts with Prevista. These services include the Up and Running Initiative, undertaking diagnostics with start-up businesses, trading under 24 months. The Start Up and New Businesses Initiative focuses upon developing mentoring agreements with pre-start businesses, with the aim of facilitating their progress to business start-up stage.

IEA was successful in receiving revenue and capital funding from the DTI Phoenix Fund to roll over a pan-London loan fund to IEA from an organisation that has gone into liquidation

The Shell Training & Enterprise Programme (STEP), an ongoing project in the portfolio of IEA services, offers companies an opportunity to recruit a university student to carry out a business project, normally related to marketing or computing. For students it is an opportunity to gain first hand experience of small businesses and sharpen their skills and knowledge. IEA acts as the STEP agent for the London Central area.

USE OF VOLUNTEERS

IEA has developed an internship programme of mentored work placements for recent graduates and international students. The volunteering of these interns also provides the 'match' funding for the EQUAL/ESF-funded programmes

REVIEW OF PERFORMANCE AGAINST OBJECTIVES

In 2005-6, IEA successfully achieved its objectives Programmes were effectively delivered, and received praise from funding bodies. The amount of grant money raised to achieve objectives increased by 33 4% over 2004-5

FUTURE PLANS

We look to 2006-7 as a year of consolidation and expansion of our existing programmes, in particular the development of our social enterprises under the PRESTO programme and the development of our presence in the built environment sector through the BUILD UP programme

In addition, through our transnational partnerships in the EQUAL-funded programmes, we are developing relationships with voluntary organisations in western and eastern/central Europe which will both inform our delivery in London and enable us to share our expertise with these colleagues

SPECIAL ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The Board wishes to record its appreciation of the support received from clients, partners and funding bodies whose contribution has been a vital ingredient of the work of the agency

TRUSTEES

Trustees are appointed according to the company's articles of association. The number of trustees should be between three and nine. New trustees may be appointed any member as a member of the trustee board provided the maximum number is not exceeded. Such appointed trustees will remain in office until the Annual General Meeting where they will be eligible for re-election.

Trustees have no beneficial interest in the company and are not remunerated

RESERVES POLICY

The principal aim of our Reserves Policy is to achieve a reasonable degree of financial stability so that we can provide reliable services to our beneficiaries over the longer term. We aim for free reserves to cover at least two months' basic overhead costs, plus staff costs. This amounts to £87,833 at current operating levels. Current reserves are £96,189

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and are in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice – "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in 2005, with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2005) and with the Companies Act 1985

Consolidated financial statements "group accounts" have been prepared in respect of the charitable company and its wholly controlled subsidiary, IEA Trading Ltd The results of IEA Trading Ltd have been consolidated into the Statement of Financial Activities on a line-by-line basis. In accordance with Section 230 of the Companies Act 1985 a separate Income and Expenditure Account for the charitable company has not been presented.

1.2 Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are trustees named on page 1. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

1.3 Funds accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes. Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with the specific restriction imposed by the donors.

1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Grants are credited to incoming resources in the year in which they are received or are receivable whichever is the earlier, unless they relate to a specified future period, in which case they are deferred

1.5 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and inclusive of VAT which cannot be recovered

Charitable expenditure comprises all expenditure directly relating to the objects of the charity

Support costs comprise costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity

Governance costs are those costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity which relate to the general running of the charity

Costs are allocated to the functional expenditure categories as far as possible. The remaining costs are then apportioned on the basis of staff time spent

The group makes payments to staff personal pension schemes on behalf of its employees. The contributions are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities as they fall due

1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £200 are capitalised. The incidental costs of installing and incidental costs of acquisition are not capitalised.

Purpose of Restricted Funds

LBI Community Enterprise (COMET) project supports community groups engaged in self-help through the creation of community businesses, co-operatives, micro businesses, credit unions and other such initiatives

Mobile crèche – funds were received from the London Borough of Islington and the EC1 New Deal for Communities to run a mobile crèche in the borough

London Borough of Islington (LBI) – Jobs and Training Project – the project is aimed at providing an integrated portfolio of business training and advice services for unemployed Islington residents aged 25 and under

GOL/ESF-funded Creative Skills Challenge project provides training and business support to promote creative enterprise

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2006

The SIED (Supporting Integration Through Enterprise Development) programme is a multi-member partnership funded through the European Social Fund Equal Programme that supports community organisations in delivering business advice services IEA's role is in providing training leading to SFEDI accreditation as well as mentoring support and resource tools for community-based business advisors

The EASI (Empowering Asylum Seekers to Integrate) partnership, led by Islington Training Network and funded by the European Social Fund (ESF) EQUAL programme involves collaboration with 12 other voluntary organisations and educational institutions in England, as well as with comparable partnerships from the France and Hungary IEA's role in 2005-6 was to develop volunteering opportunities and related skills training for asylum seekers within its social enterprises

PRESTO (Professional Refugees into Employment through Support, Training, and On-line Learning) is funded by the European Social Fund Equal Programme, which involves collaboration with other organisations in the UK and in Europe The programme aims to provide employment support and training to highly skilled refugees with professional qualifications primarily in the medical, engineering and education sectors, and IEA's role is to research available support and the potential for developing social enterprises

REP (Refugee Enterprise Partnership) was funded by DTI/Phoenix Fund and led by the British Refugee Council IEA's role was the conducting of a research project to look into the needs of, and services for, refugee entrepreneurs in three regions in the UK

The DTI/Phoenix Fund Loan Fund support was revenue funding to get the loan fund up and running within IEA. This funding was as a result of rolling over pan-London loan fund to IEA from an organisation that has gone into liquidation

BUILD UP is funded by LSC-Pan London and delivers training and support to built environment sector businesses and groups that do not normally participate in training, supports increased economic participation by Women's SMEs and black and ethnic minorities, raises awareness of environmental issues and action that can be taken by SMEs and SME employees, and aims to address skill shortages highlighted by local businesses through training and restoration skills
