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#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) and comply with the charity's governing document and the Charities Act 2011.

The report is prepared in accordance with the small company regime (section 419(2) of the Companies Act 2006).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The directors have referred to the guidance from the Charities Commission about public benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular the directors consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that they have set.

The objects of the charity are set out in paragraphs 4(1) (a) and (b) of the Articles of Association, being;

Raising the public's aesthetic appreciation in applied art and design; and the provision of educational lectures, workshops and exhibitions at The Bluecoat Display Centre, Liverpool

The directors aim to achieve these objectives by actively promoting applied art and design to the public and supporting educational programmes and exhibitions.

Bluecoat Display Centre Activities timeline 1<sup>st</sup> April 2017 – 31<sup>st</sup> March 2018



Future Forwards Exhibition 25<sup>th</sup> March – 22<sup>nd</sup> April 2017

This exhibition examined the role, which different making techniques such as digital technology, 3D printing, Computer Aided Design and laser cutting play in craft today. Exhibiting artists included Beatwoven, Joanna Bury, Vanessa Cutler, Rebecca Gouldson, Jack & Joan Hardie, Kathryn Hinton, Jonathan Keep, Katy Luxton, Rachel McKnight & Moira Walton.

Get Creative Weekend workshop 8<sup>th</sup> April 2017

As part of BBC's Get Creative Weekend, BDC ran a drop-in workshop led by artist Rachel Howard to get people involved in having a go at drawing and craft. Children were invited to try their hand at making greetings cards, with a focus on spring flowers.


Manchester Study Trip 20<sup>th</sup> April 2017



Protégés Exhibition

Norman Eames gave a talk about his jewellery along with ceramicists Alan Whittaker and Attila Olah who were taking part in the main exhibition, Protégés. The evening also saw BDC staff give an update on the progress of its innovative outreach work and thank Members for their ongoing support.

Printmaking workshop at PSS Leeson Centre-Gill Curry 9<sup>th</sup>, 16th, 23<sup>rd</sup>, 30<sup>th</sup> May 2017

Members of the group learned how to make a series of different prints using simple cutting tools and lino. The group experimented with different coloured inks, made base prints and then made books into which they could keep the prints. The group were so delighted by working with Gill that at the end of the last session they presented her with a plant and card signed by all group members. Gill engaged with 14 people.

Quote from a participant included "Steadied my racing brain and fidgets. Absolutely calmed me. Loved the printing session."



LightNight Liverpool 19<sup>th</sup> May 2017

To celebrate LightNight, BDC hosted a Meet the Maker event with San Francisco-based wire artist Thomas Hill. Toms 3D wire sculptures were based on drawn studies of birds and animals in motion. The talk complemented a solo *In The Window* focus during May 2017



Artist Residency at Broadgreen Hospital - Sian Hughes

31st May - 20th July 2017

Ceramicist Sian Hughes was artist in residence at Broadgreen Hospital, working with patients in the stroke rehabilitation & trauma units, teaching patients to make various objects from porcelain paper clay. For the final commission a series of botanical 'slides' made from porcelain paper clay were hung in front of a light box to be permanently back-lit. Sian engaged with 109 patients.

Quotes from patients included "My family won't believe it when I get home that I've made all this- I'm not artistic at all" - Barbara



Craftivism Exhibition

10th June 2017 - 15th July 2017

This exhibition showcased the work of artists who had found their voice through craft or who had helped and inspired others to find theirs through socially engaged practice. Inspired by the outreach work of BDC in local hospitals, the show included the work of local artists who had played an integral part in this outreach work. It was curated by Jessica Fenna who selected artists Jennifer Collier, Caroline Gregson, Sian Hughes, Katrin Spranger, Phil Young & Emma Ware.

Cut & construct a leather trimmed Tote workshop

Sunday 11th June 2017

Led by talented textile artist and leather worker Sally-Anne Thompson, this unique workshop showed participants how to create a denim bag from a choice of textiles, leather and rivets. They used simple hand & machine sewing on cloth to perfect their designs, 6 attendees.

Garden Party Fundraiser 16<sup>th</sup> July 2017

Following the success of the first garden party, BDC held this event to raise funds for the ongoing outreach programme and raised close to £2,000. The Bluecoat garden came alive with craft stalls, artist demos, a raffle, food and drink and live music. An online auction was also introduced to allow people who couldn't make it on the day to bid for their favourite artworks generously donated by designer-makers Ruth Ball, Rebecca Gouldson, Hugh Miller and Miranda Sharpe.



Dish of the Day Exhibition 22nd July 2017 - 26th August 2017

This exhibition highlighted the contemporary ranges of beautiful handmade functional tableware currently being produced by potters across the UK. Makers included Clod & Pebble, Emily Doran, Dove Street Pottery, Helen Faulkner, Teresa Green, Miriam Jones, Lindean Mill Glass, Hugh Miller, Marged Owain, Pottery West, Jane Sarre, Charlotte Storrs, Kaori Tatebayashi, Michael Taylor, Christine Toh & Sarah Went.

Artist Residency at The Walton Centre – Verity Pulford 31<sup>st</sup> July –4<sup>th</sup> October 2017

Glass artist Verity Pulford ran workshop sessions at the CRU and outpatient clinic in the Sid Watkins building at The Walton Centre. Activities for the workshops included working with brusho powder colours, creating dimensional drawings, mono-printing with carbon paper, resist and watercolour painting, ink drawings and painting on glass tiles. For the final commission Verity made a series of handmade glass discs decorated with neuroscientific and botanical themes informed by her time spent with patients. Verity engaged with 107 patients and family members.

Staff at The Walton Centre commented "It's great to have this art group. Art is so important in a patient's rehabilitation."

Meet the Makers 2<sup>nd</sup> August 2017

Hugh Miller and Charlotte Storrs (both exhibiting in Dish of the Day) spoke about their work and making practices and chatted informally to an audience. Hugh demonstrated how his beautiful wooden pieces could be used in the home and invited people to handle the works, 15 attendees.

Backhouse Bequest Exhibition - In memory of Arthur & Lilian

2nd September 2017 - 7th October 2017

This prize exhibition showed six recent graduates from the North West working in the medium of ceramics. Their works were selected for originality and strength of voice. Confirmed exhibitors included Julie Fewster (Glyndwr University), Gaenor Hall, Rob Parr and Michael McGowan (UCLAN), Rudi Morris (Manchester Metropolitan University) and Attila Olah (Liverpool Hope University).

The exhibition was supported by David Backhouse, (a trustee of BDC, who works in the fields of architecture and ceramics himself), and his brother Roy who have both sponsored the show and a winning prize award of £1,000 in memory of their parents; Arthur & Lilian. The winner of the Backhouse Bequest prize award was Michael McGowan.

Guided visit: Edo Pop, Japanese Prints at the Lady Lever Art Gallery 20th September 2017

The energy and spirit of 19th century Edo (now Tokyo) was brought to life in this exhibition of 50 woodblock prints, on loan from local collector Frank

Milner who gave a talk about the works. The group explored the gallery and grounds of this beautiful location, 11 attendees.

Artist Talk at The Athenaeum with Jessica Briggs 26<sup>th</sup> September 2017

Jessica spoke about her stunning range of wearable jewellery working primarily in silver, while also using gold leaf to bring colour, contrast and life to her collection. Questions were invited from the audience as well as informal discussion with Jessica at afternoon tea following the event, 20 attendees.



Artist Residency at Alder Hey Children's Hospital – Caroline Gregson 27<sup>th</sup> September – 5<sup>th</sup> November 2017

Willow sculptor Caroline Gregson was artist in residence at a general surgical ward at Alder Hey Children's Hospital. Children were encouraged to try weaving with willow rods by hand to create their own willow sculptures that they could take home to keep. Caroline worked with children in the communal play area and also at bedside. For the final commission Caroline sculpted a bee-keeper in willow that was installed in the Radiology courtyard at Alder Hey. Caroline engaged with 176 patients.

Hospital staff commented "We've never had anything like this before it's completely different. They have something to take home at the end, it's fabulous."

Past, Present, Future 14th October 2017 - 11th November 2017

This show was curated by leading North West sculptor Emma Rodgers. It was programmed to complement 'In the Peaceful Dome' which formed part of the Bluecoat's 300 year anniversary celebrations. Exhibitors included Peter Hayes (sculptural ceramics), Gina Kirby (textiles), Ian Rylatt (ceramics), Jacob Chan (jewellery and ceramics) and Emma Rodgers herself.

Guided visit: British Ceramics Biennial

26th October 2017

This day trip to Stoke on Trent showcased contemporary ceramics from across the world. The visit included a talk and tour of Spode China Hall and a visit to the Potteries Museum and Art Gallery with plenty of exhibitions and ceramic works to view, 12 attendees.





Annual Gardner-Medwin Lecture given by Peter Hayes 2nd November 2017

Peter Hayes spoke about how travelling in Africa has influenced his works. His talk focussed upon textures of ceramics, erosion of surfaces and different kinds of mark making. His works were on show in the BDC exhibition Past, Present Future, 42 attendees.

Colour Mapping Exhibition

18th November 2017 - 13th January 2018

This exhibition featured the work of printmaker Colin Moore. His bold, dynamic works displayed the beauty of the British countryside and coastline. Eleven jewellers also exhibited pieces, which complemented the strong lines and colours of Colin's work. They included: Rachel Brown, Jane Dzisiewski, Trevor Forrester, Linda Jeanne Jones, Hila Karni, Emily Kidson, Nicola Rawlings, Dot Sim, Su Trindle, Charlotte Whitmore and Anthony Wong.







Creative Block printing workshop 19th November 2017



Meet the Makers event


27<sup>th</sup> February 2018

Meet the Makers of the Future 19<sup>th</sup> March 2018



Participants recycled unwanted paperback books to make tree trunk sculptures covered in different types of fungi constructed from the leftover book pages through a series of cutting and paper manipulation techniques, 10 attendees.

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

#### **Future Plans 2018-19**

Curated programme of exhibitions planned by BDC staff including emerging curator Meghan Hartley-Roberts and guest curator metalworker Rebecca Gouldson. 2019 will mark the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the BDC which will be celebrated throughout the year.

In the Window installation series, supported by The Granada Foundation & Cass Art, continues with accompanying artist workshops (at a subsidised rate for wider audience accessibility) based at Cass Art.

In the Window exhibition awards for MMU and Hope University selected graduates, continued participation in Liverpool's Irish Festival and LightNight Liverpool events. In the Window exhibition for 2018 Carter Preston People's Vote winner during 2019.

Study trip programme to include South Liverpool and Manchester trips planned so far with another planned to view the 7 newly commissioned hospital residency artist's works at Royal Liverpool University, Broadgreen, Alder Hey and The Walton Centre.

We aim to maintain the current level of outreach activity and partners to better manage alongside our gallery programmes and related talks and workshops.

We were awarded a Cultural Education Research Initiative grant by Liverpool Hope University and Curious Minds to investigate a project in partnership with a local secondary school (currently under special measures or requiring improvement) with the aim of placing a local professional craft maker to work in residence with pupils on a curriculum related project. The research project will be completed and presented by June 2019.

The rolling programme of fundraising now extends into applying for funds to enable future year's outreach work i.e. the charity is currently fundraising for the 2019/20 outreach programme. This results in funding for subsequent years being received before the end of ongoing financial years. This funding is included in incoming resources in accordance with the accounting policies outlined on page 19. In some instances the outreach activity often does not happen until months after the funding is in the charity's bank accounts. Since this financial year we are identifying each outreach project and funder on our accounts system to enable staff and our accountants to keep track of projects that extend across financial years and inform our funders' reports and evaluations.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Reserves policy

In accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting by Charities, the directors are required to evidence in their report that the charity has in place certain policies. These policies, agreed and formally adopted by the directors are as follows:

It is the policy of the charity to hold free reserves at a level which will provide assistance for future years' operations. At 31 March 2018 free reserves were £74,709 (2017: £104,202). The trustees do not consider there to be any material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

The charity's wholly owned subsidiary company Bluecoat Display Centre (Trading) Limited made a profit on ordinary activities before tax and gift aid of £33,493 (2017:£39,937). Gift aid receivable from the subsidiary company of £33,346 has been included in these accounts. At 31 March 2018, the subsidiary company held reserves of £100.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

#### Related party relationships

The charity owns 100% of the share capital of Bluecoat Display Centre (Trading) Limited. To protect the charitable status of the parent company, this trading subsidiary was established on 22nd December 2010 to carry on its trading activities.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new directors/(trustees)

A regular review of directors is carried out to ensure that proper skills and an interest in the areas of applied art and design are fully represented. New directors undergo an induction process to brief them about their obligations and they are encouraged to attend appropriate and regular directors' meetings to help understand their role.

#### Organisational structure

The trustees have overall responsibility for the affairs of Bluecoat Display Centre Limited. Day to day management of the Charity is delegated by the trustees to the Centre manager. M A Bampton was the centre manager until December 2017, Sam Rhodes took over the role thereafter.

#### Risk management

The directors have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure that appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

#### **Investment policy**

Having considered the options available, the trustees have decided that bank deposits meet their requirements for short and medium protection of the charity's resources.

#### Pay policy for Senior Staff

The directors consider the board of directors, who are the charity's trustees and Maureen Bampton/Sam Rhodes, the Centre managers to comprise the key management personnel of the charity, in charge of directing, controlling, running and operating the charity on a day to day basis. All directors give their time freely and no director received remuneration for their role as director in the year. The pay of staff is reviewed annually and normally increased in accordance with average earnings and depending on the results of the Charity and its subsidiary for the year.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### BASIS OF PREPARING THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

The company has been operating since incorporation on 20 March 1996, as a company limited by guarantee. On 7 June 2010, the company's Memorandum and Articles of Association were amended by resolution and the company was registered as a charity with the Charity Commission.

#### Preparation of consolidated financial statements

The financial statements contain information about Bluecoat Display Centre Limited as an individual charity and do not contain consolidated financial information as the parent of a group. The charity is exempt under Section 399(2A) of the Companies Act 2006 from the requirements to prepare consolidated financial statements.

The charity has also claimed exemption from preparing a cash flow statement as it qualifies as a small company.

#### **INCOME**

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which there is entitlement provided there is sufficient certainty that receipt of the income is considered probable and the amount can be measured reliably and any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met or are fully within the control of the charity.

Donations and legacy income includes gifts, donations and grants of a general nature.

Legacies are recognised on the earlier of:

- when a distribution is received from the estate; or
- when it is probable a distribution will be received.

Receipt of a legacy is normally considered probable when:

- there has been a grant of probate;
- the executors have finalised the estate and notified the charity a distribution will be made; and
- any conditions attached to the legacy have been met or are within the charity's control.

#### **INVESTMENT INCOME**

Investment income from bank deposits is recognised on a receivable basis.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **EXPENDITURE**

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and includes costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them including governance costs.

#### TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:

Building project

Fully depreciated (previously 20% on cost)

Building alterations

10% on reducing balance

Fixtures and fittings

20% on reducing balance

Computer equipment

20% on cost

Fixed assets are recognised at cost with assets over £500 capitalised.

#### **TAXATION**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### **FUND ACCOUNTING**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

#### HIRE PURCHASE AND LEASING COMMITMENTS

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

#### PENSION COSTS AND OTHER POST-RETIREMENT BENEFITS

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **FIXED ASSET INVESTMENTS**

Fixed asset investments relate to shares held in the subsidiary trading company and are stated at cost less any provision for impairment.

#### **FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS**

The charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments.

#### CASH AT BANK

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments.

#### **CREDITORS**

Creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Bluecoat Display Centre (Trading) Limited paid £24,724 (2017: £21,558) to the parent charitable company in respect of rental payments for use of the premises leased by the charitable company and charged £7,160 (2017: £7,189) to the parent charitable company in respect of running costs.

M. A Bampton became a trustee of the charity in November 2017.

She was employed as the manager of Bluecoat Display Centre (Trading) Limited until 31 December 2017 and was a director of that company until 23 March 2018. She received £14,933 salary in respect of her role as manager and £1,493 employer pension contributions were made on her behalf. This is authorised under clause 6(3b) of the charity's governing document.

P. W G Urquhart is a trustee of the charity and also a director of Bluecoat Display Centre (Trading) Limited. He resigned as a director on 23 March 2018.

A Whittaker is a trustee of the charity. He was appointed a director of Bluecoat Display Centre (Trading) Limited on 23 March 2018.
