#### Structure, Governance and Management

## **Governing Document**

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 11 June 1996 and registered as a charity on 1 April 1996. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

## Recruitment and Appointment of Management Committee

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Management Committee Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association at each AGM one third of the trustees are subject to retirement by rotation or, if their number is not three or a multiple of three, the number nearest to one third shall retire from office, but, if there is only one trustee who is subject to retirement by rotation, he shall retire. Subject to the provisions of the Act, the trustees to retire by rotation shall be those who have been longest in office since their last appointment or re-appointment.

At the next AGM the following trustees will be pooled for retirement Charles Woodd, Kerrie Gaelan and Jean Petrie will be able to offer themselves for re-election

The trustees regularly conduct a skills and experience audit and in the event of particular skills being lost due to retirements, individuals are approached to offer themselves for election to the Management Committee

#### Trustee Induction and Training

Most trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity, having been service users or members. Additionally, new trustees are invited and encouraged to attend a short training session (of no more than an hour) to familiarise themselves with the charity and the context within which it operates. These are led by the Chief Executive of the charity and cover

- The obligations of Management Committee members
- The main documents which set out the operational framework for the charity including the Memorandum and Articles
- Resourcing and the current financial position as set out in the latest published accounts
- Future plans and objectives

A trustee induction pack has also been prepared drawing information from the various Charity Commission plus Governance Hub publications. This is distributed to all new trustees along with the Memorandum and Articles and the latest financial statements. Feedback from new trustees about their induction has been very positive.

# Risk Management

The Management Committee has conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Funding continues to be a risk, but a number of new funding streams and grants have been obtained during the year, and steps have been taken to ensure new funders accept responsibility for the overhead costs of the work they are funding. The trustees consider that adequate insurance is held with AON. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers and visitors to the Volunteer Centre's premises.

#### Organisational Structure

Volunteer Centre Southwark has a Management Committee who meet quarterly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the Committee has nine members from a variety of personal and professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. The charity's Chief Executive, who is also the Company Secretary, attends Committee meetings to advise the Trustees, but has no voting rights. Other staff are invited to attend as and when required

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the provision of the services rest with the Chief Executive along with the Senior Management Team. The Chief Executive is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators and quality standards are met.

#### **Objectives and Activities**

Volunteer Centre Southwark is the local volunteer development agency for the London Borough of Southwark. The charity's objects are to advance education, protect health, relieve poverty, sickness and distress and to promote any other charitable purpose for the benefit of persons in the London Borough of Southwark and its environs, by the promotion of voluntary work and a volunteer service.

The charity's mission is to "promote more and better volunteering in Southwark". To achieve this Volunteer Centre Southwark aims to

- Increase individual volunteering and community involvement through providing a volunteer referral service
- Improve volunteer management and enhance volunteer involvement through providing a range of information services on volunteering to voluntary and community organisations
- Influence volunteering policy at local and regional level to achieve increased volunteering and better management of volunteers
- Manage the organisation effectively within a given set of values

## Developments, activities, achievements and performance

The main areas of charitable activity are the provision of a volunteer referral service, support for specialist areas of volunteer recruitment and support, a business volunteers programme, the promotion of good practice in volunteer management, and the provision of an Active Citizens Hub for the Borough

This year the numbers of people registering with the centre's referral service to get involved has stabilised, with a total of 4180 people making contact with us. We have worked with approximately 650 different groups ranging in size from international charities to residents groups and new and emerging groups, and on average have about 500 different opportunities registered with us at any one time

In addition, the Business Volunteers project has continued to grow with 1708 volunteers engaged over the year from 17 businesses, including 9 regular members and 8 businesses engaged in one-off team challenges. The project has begun to engage more small to medium size enterprises (SME) and also pilot longer term volunteering and skills sharing through a partnership with Better Bankside.

This year has seen a huge growth in our ability to develop and deliver training and advice for groups, businesses and active citizens and through the year we have delivered 52 training sessions attended by 338 people. This growth has in part been developed with support from the different projects, but also through the development of a specific 'Training and events manager' post, created to respond to training and consultancy needs and support training within the centre.

Our supported volunteering projects have gone from strength to strength with our Active Futures project supporting 30 homeless people to volunteer. The Capital Volunteering project, which supports people who have severe mental health problems to volunteer, has enabled 60 service users to volunteer as part of their recovery process, with 95% of the referrals coming from mental health service providers. We have continued to coordinate the project for the borough and have supported the delivery of a small grants scheme where 11 different groups received grants to run different projects.

The Active Citizens Hub has started to make a real impact in the borough. We have produced 10 down-to-earth 'How to' guides, and developed a comprehensive training programme for active citizens, with many courses tailor-made for specific groups. We have supported the trustee network, attended and put on events to promote and develop active citizenship and had workers based one day a week at both the Peckham Programme and South Bermondsey Partnership

The organisation benefited throughout the year from the enthusiastic and generous support of the Worshipful the Mayor of Southwark, Councillor Paul Kyriakou, who made the Volunteer Centre his charity of the year His support enabled us to develop a new volunteering award for Southwark, 'Southwark Stars' This is an award for anyone who has volunteered for more than 104 hours in the year, and it was launched at a big event at Glaziers Hall where 80 people were given awards. We gave out special awards to recognise outstanding contributions, and named Patrick Horan our 'Volunteer of the Year'

We have continued to play a leading role in wider developments in the Borough, and beyond. The Chief Executive both sits as a member of the Southwark Alliance Management Group and as a member of the Board. He is also a trustee of Greater London Volunteering. We continue to organize the Volunteer Management Forum for Southwark, and have had a presence at most Community Council Meetings.

Volunteer Centre Southwark's income in 2006/07 reached £769,643. We are as always tremendously grateful to our various funders and supporters, including Southwark Council, Southwark Alliance, the Bridge House Estates Trust Fund, Capital Volunteering, CSV, Wakefield Trust, OSW (Off the Street and into Work), as well as all our Business Partners Our planned income for 2007/08 is £645,000.

During the year several people who have been key to the organisation's development moved on Two long-standing trustees Eileen Conn and John Holmes resigned from the Committee, and John Barkus, our Director, stepped down after over 7 years with the organisation in January 2007 John spearheaded the Volunteer Centre's growth over that time, and we have much to be grateful to him for Sean Risdale and Daniel Adele-Leigh also resigned from the Committee after a number of years' service

In John Barkus's place we were pleased to appoint Clive Pankhurst, formerly our Volunteer Services Manager, as the new Chief Executive While the staff team has experienced an inevitable turnover as people have moved on to new challenges and opportunities, overall staff numbers have stayed at the same level of around 18 over the year During the year we welcomed Michael Bukola onto the Committee

#### Financial Review

#### Reserves Policy

The Management Committee has examined the charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organisation. It has established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the charity should be between 3 and 6 months of the current expenditure.

Budgeted expenditure for 2007/8 is £670,000 and therefore the target is £167,500 to £335,000 in unrestricted funds. The reserves are needed to meet the working capital requirements of the charity, and to meet its legal obligations in the event of a significant drop in funding. Income funds stand at £769,643. The present level of unrestricted reserves available to the charity of £176,978 represents approximately three months running costs.

#### Designated Funds Policy

Within unrestricted reserves, the trustees have designated certain funds which were received during the year. As part of the annual budget process, the management committee will decide which monies, receivable from the various organisations, will be set aside for specific projects in furtherance of the charities objectives.

#### Grant Making Project

As part of the Capital Volunteering project we have been distributing small grants to groups involved in supporting people with severe mental health problems to volunteer. Decisions on who received grants were made by the Capital Volunteering Southwark Steering group

#### **Plans for Future Periods**

The charity plans to continue the activities outlined above in the forthcoming years, subject to regular review with its stakeholders and to satisfactory funding arrangements. The charity will also continue to work within the Volunteering England Quality Standard (QSIS), Investors in People and Investors in Volunteers quality marks.

Plans are also being developed for a number of income generating activities, including a diversification of our business involvement project and further development of our training and consultancy

With the support of Children in Need and the housing associations Family Mosaic, Genesis and Hyde Housing we are also developing a new youth volunteering project to engage 14-19 year olds. With funding from Southwark Council Economic Development Unity we will further develop our homelessness and work experience project to engage young homeless people as a way of increasing their employability.

#### **Auditors**

In accordance with section 385 of the Companies Act 1985, a resolution proposing that FW Stephens be reappointed as auditors of the charitable company will be put to the Annual General Meeting

#### Responsibilities of the trustees

The Management Committee are responsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

Company law requires the Management Committee to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year. In preparing those financial statements, the management committee should follow best practice and

- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent, and

# Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> March 2007

#### 1 Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the preceding year.

## a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985

#### b) Fund accounting

- Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the management committee
- Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes. The trustees decide which incoming funds to designate in order to match the budgeted annual expenditure expected on the particular projects.
- Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal

#### c) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- Investment income is included when receivable
- · Incoming resources from charitable trading activity are accounted for when earned
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance. If this performance has not been satisfied by the year end, the related income is deferred.

#### d) Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred

- Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes, including training
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery
  of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be
  allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary
  to support them.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and includes the audit fee and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

# 1 Accounting Policies (continued)

#### e) Fixed Assets

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life, which in all cases is estimated at 4 years. Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £500

### f) Operating Leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred over the term of the lease

# g) Pension scheme

The charity contribute to a stakeholder pension scheme in respect of three of its employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity in an independently administered fund. Contributions payable are charged in the period to which they relate.

#### Restricted funds.

<u>Volunteer Services</u> – This fund consists of a number of grants received by the charity to fund specific projects within the Volunteer Service division. These grants include

- Bridge House Estates Trust Funded the Volunteer Services Manager post within Volunteer Services supporting the strategic development of volunteering management and policy within Southwark
- Capital Volunteering (CSV) Funded a supported volunteer project co-ordinator and assistant
- Off the Streets and into Work (OSW) Part funded the post of Work Experience Assistant to support people who are homeless to find volunteering opportunities as well as develop stronger links between the charity and homelessness groups
- Training and Event

<u>Hub</u> – The objects of this restricted fund are to bring volunteer awareness to the local citizens of Southwark through the establishment of an "Active Citizens Hub". The trustees received funds from a number of different sources and are required to spend them as follow

 Southwark Alliance – Initially funded a research project into active citizenship and then subsequently funded the development of the Active Citizens Hub

<u>Business Volunteers</u> – This restricted fund represents a grant received from the Wakefield Trust which the charity used specifically to further the development of business volunteering in the Tower Bridge and North Southwark area

#### 17 Transfer between funds

Three transfers was made as follows

- One transfer of £13,163 was made between three restricted funds from HUB plus Capital Volunteering to Volunteer Services to correct a misallocation of training costs in previous periods
