The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 September 2013

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 3 July 1996 and registered as a charity on 17 December 1996. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Recruitment and Appointment of Management Committee

The directors of the company are also Charity Trustees for the purposes of Charity Law. The Management Committee consists of the Trustees, the National Co-ordinator and the National Treasurer Under the Memorandum of Association the number of Trustees shall not be less than three At each Annual General Meeting one third of the Trustees retire by rotation and are eligible for re-election. If the number of Trustees is not three or a multiple of three, the number nearest to one third shall retire from office.

Trustee Induction and Training

All the current Trustees have several years experience of the work of the Charity before their appointment. In the event that a Trustee was to be appointed who did not already have such experience of the work of the Charity, training would be provided.

Organisational Structure

Chernobyl Children's Project (UK) has a Management Committee consisting of the Trustees, the National Coordinator and National Treasurer

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the running of the Charity rests with the National Co-ordinator

Risk Management

A review of the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, as identified by the Trustees, has been carried out and systems have been established to mitigate those risks. We ensure that all host families are CRB checked and we also have a Child Protection Policy in place which all groups are expected to fully adhere to Our policies and guidelines are updated annually to improve the operation of the Charity and the safety and security of all concerned. Our Aid Co-ordinator takes all possible measures to ensure the safety of those involved in the collection and delivery of aid.

Objectives and activities

The Charities objectives and activities as set out in the Memorandum of Association are

To promote such charitable purpose or purposes for persons living in Belarus, Ukraine or Western Russia who are suffering as a result of the Chernobyl disaster and in particular but without limiting the foregoing

To provide holidays and other recreational activities, in the interests of social welfare for children whose health has been affected by the disaster, with the object of improving their conditions of life

To relieve sickness and preserve and protect the health of such persons

To educate the public about the health and environmental effects of the Chernobyl disaster and its implications for the future of nuclear power

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake

Achievements and performance

In furtherance of the objects of the charity a total of 127 children, 15 mothers and 21 doctors and interpreters have been provided with recuperative holidays in Great Britain and a further 100 children and young adults from Zhuravichi Children's' Home, Rechitsa Boarding School and two adult institutions have been provided with holidays in a sanatorium in an uncontaminated area of Belarus during the year ended 30 September 2013 During the same period we have delivered 6 vehicle loads of aid to Belarus which included medical equipment and disability aids as well as clothing, nappies, bedding, furniture, toiletries, educational materials and other aid. These have been sent to 4 organisations in the Gomel and Minsk regions.

The total weight was 40,265 tonnes and the value of donated aid delivered was £117,500.

Much of the work of the charity is carried out by three groups of volunteers 1) The 130 families who raise funds, organise activities for the children's visit and then host and care for the children for two weeks during their visit 2) The Humanitarian Aid Team, who collect and load aid and deliver it to Belarus, and 3) the volunteers (24 this year) who travel to Belarus to work hard with disabled children to ensure that they have a great holiday at a Belarusian Sanatorium. It is impossible to put a valuation on the work all these people do for us

The respite care centre we established in Gomel, the Mayflower Centre, has continued to provide short breaks for groups of six profoundly disabled children and in this way it supports fifty families in Gomel region. Whilst the main costs of running the centre were taken on several years ago by the Social Protection Department in Gomel, we continued to organise all the transport until summer 2013. We then gave a minibus to the Centre so that they can collect the children and young people themselves. We continue give other support to the centre through aid and training and a small amount of additional funding.

We support a class for wheelchair children at Special School No 5 in Gomel, funding the cost of travel and employing the driver

We have continued to fund "Rodni Kut" our family home for five disabled children in Rogachev, "Family Home 2000" for young adults with physical disabilities at Klimovka, and the Childrens' Hospice in Gomel

We have also continued to support Zhuravichi Children's' Home, Children in Trouble and the Diabetic Association Medicines have been purchased for the Children's Cancer Hospital and the Belarusian Children's Hospice, and we fund the purchase of test strips for children belonging to the Diabetic Association

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2013

In January an educational visit to the UK was organised for senior staff at the Institute which provides further education to social workers in Minsk. In March the Deputy Minister for Social Protection came to Britain with one of his colleagues and two representatives of non-governmental organisations. They met many social work professionals and visited supported living accommodation, further education colleges and other facilities for adults with learning disabilities.

In June three cleft palate surgeons were brought to the UK to upgrade their skills. A week long programme of theatres and clinics was provided for them by Royal Manchester Children's Hospital

Social services professionals from the UK delivered a training course in Temporary Fostering for Babies and Young children and two courses in Restorative Justice. The first two parts of a four module training programme in Social Work were delivered at an Institute in Minsk. Visits to Belarus to offer advice and expertise were made by a number of different specialists in learning disabilities and a clinical psychologist.

The Medical Director of the Belarusian Children's Hospice completed her studies and received a Post Graduate Diploma in Palliative Care at Cardiff University, which we funded through a grant from the Raisa Gorbachev Foundation. Our Palliative Care Consultant John Costello made two visits to Belarus to give training and take part in a conference.

In the summer volunteers worked at Zhuravichi and Vikov, a home for disabled adults, as well as at the Holiday Camp, providing care, physiotherapy and fun for those who are not able to take part in the holidays. Two psychologists continued to work in support of new mothers whose children were born with a disability. They work in all four maternity hospitals in Gomel.

With a grant from the British Embassy in Minsk we employed two psychologists to work with struggling families whose children are in danger of being admitted to custodial schools. Our lead Trainer Geoff Wright supervises this programme

A review of the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, as identified by the Trustees, has been carried out and systems have been established to mitigate those risks. We ensure that all host families are DBS checked and we also have a Child Protection Policy in place which all groups are expected to fully adhere to. Our policies and guidelines are updated annually to improve the operation of the charity and the safety and security of all concerned. Our Aid Co-ordinator takes all possible measures to ensure the safety of those involved in the collection and delivery of aid.

At 30 September 2013 Chernobyl Children's Project (UK) had a total of 16 groups located in various parts of England

Financial review

Principal Funding Sources

The largest proportion of our income is received through support groups located in various parts of Great Britain. The remainder of our cash income comes from both individual and corporate donors. The balance of the income is in the form of gifts in kind, the bulk of which is delivered to various locations in Belarus.

It is not the current policy of the Charity to set funds aside as reserves

It is not the Charity's policy to invest funds for the long term. The Charity's expenditure is seasonal as the recuperative holidays in the United Kingdom and Belarus are mainly during the months of July and August. As funds are received in advance of this period they are placed on short term deposit with Standard Life Bank.

Plans for the future

We intend to continue and develop our objectives and activities with the resources made available to the charity

1 Accounting policies

1 1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006

1 2 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the Charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accurancy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the Charity, are recognised when the Charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the Charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.

Gifts in kind and assets given to the Charity for distribution are recognised as incoming resources only when distributed

Investment income is included when receivable

1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting vouluntary income and the costs of trading for fund raising purposes

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for it beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the Charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the Charity

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the statement of financial activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, other are apportioned on an apportioned on a appropriate basis.

1 4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows
