Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 March 2012

Chairman's Statement

Croydon Youth Development Trust has experienced one of the most significantly challenging years since its formation in 1996

The current economic climate has affected Local Authority budgets, and in year the organisation was affected by a number of programmes being decommissioned, projects closing and the loss of valuable, knowledgeable and experienced employees. In addition charitable trusts and other funding bodies have experienced considerable increases in applications for support, which far outstrips supply and resources

However Croydon also experienced scenes of violence and disorder in August last year, and once again young people were in the spotlight being highlighted as the instigators, and many have attributed the lack of provision and services, budget cuts and the uncertain economic climate as an underlying cause

In light of the economic downturn the CYDT board of trustees and senior management team have undertaken a review of the organisational vision, aims and objectives, to ensure that CYDT is able to respond to the needs of young people in Croydon, and that there is a strategic alignment with the statutory key themes in providing young people's services. It has also undertaken a radical overhaul of its branding and marketing, and has launched a new logo and website

The vision of CYDT remains, to provide engaging projects which Support, Challenge, Develop and enable young people to Achieve. It is without question that the staff team remain the strongest and most valuable asset of the organisation and I would like to take this opportunity to thank the whole Staff Team at CYDT for their commitment and resilience in such challenging times. They remain focused and determined to provide experiences and support to the young people of Croydon.

The upcoming financial year 2012/3 will be extremely challenging, and the organisation will undoubtedly face further funding cuts, however the board and the staff team are committed to seeking resolutions to enable CYDT to continue to be a leader of youth services within Croydon for many years to come

The trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ending 31 March 2012. These financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, and requirements of the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association. This report is a directors' report as required by \$417 of the Companies Act 2006 and all trustees are directors.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

Croydon Youth Development Trust is a company limited by guarantee, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 24th July 1996 It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission

Appointment of trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association, the chair(s) of the trustees is / are nominated and elected by the Board. Local statutory agencies such as the Police and Local Authority are invited to nominate representatives as trustees

Trustees' Induction and Training

Trustees are encouraged and expected to visit and acquaint themselves with the Trust's various projects, workers and clients Training is planned and available as and when necessary

Risk Management

The Board has conducted its own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed and systems have been established to monitor and mitigate those risks

Organisation

The board of trustees administers the charity and meets bi-monthly. A Chief Executive is appointed by the trustees to manage the day to day operations of the charity. To facilitate effective operations the Chief Executive has delegated authority for operational matters including finance, human resources, staff development, and the implementation of Health and Safety procedures, and strict Safeguarding Children, and confidentiality policies. In their absence the delegated authority is passed on to the Operations Manager.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity are -

- To experiment with new approaches in addressing the needs of young people
- To work in partnership with local young people and other agencies
- To specialise in work with young people who are disadvantaged, including those excluded from school and those at risk of or involved in crime
- To recognise the special needs of minorities, particularly those of ethnic communities and unaccompanied young refugees and asylum seekers
- To create positive opportunities for young people which encourage personal development for the local management of projects by local people
- To evaluate the effectiveness of the projects and disseminate the results so that other agencies can benefit from the experience

The trust aims to complement and enhance the work of the statutory services in Croydon and surrounding areas in addition to engaging with new Government – led initiatives that aim to resolve some of the issues that can confront disadvantaged and disaffected young people. This is achieved through projects that are both innovative and imaginative

The above supports the Charity's objects as set out in its Memorandum of Association which are

- To provide or assist in the provision of facilities to educate young people in the London Borough of Croydon and elsewhere especially but not exclusively through their leisure-time activities, so as to develop their physical mental and spiritual capacities and skills in order to enable them to achieve their full potential and to grow to full maturity as individuals and members of society and thereby to enable them to make a positive contribution within the community as a whole
- To advance the education of young people (particularly those who are unemployed) by the provision of vocational training and limited periods of work experience

CABS (Croydon Auto & Bike Scheme)

CABS is an established borough wide crime diversion scheme. The scheme is based on a structured programme of Personal, Social, Health Education, through group work and discussions focusing upon topics such as Drugs Misuse, Anti Social Behaviour, Anger Management, and Sexual Health Education, with some practical sessions on motorbike mechanics and maintenance, and riding skills. The CABS programme includes a prison visit to HMP Coldingley and an annual week long residential to Wales.

CABS runs four x 10 week courses throughout the year working with approximately 70 young people accessing these programmes, and receives referrals from the Youth Offending Team, Youth Early Support Panels, Social Services, CAHMS, and an increasing number of self referrals. In addition to our New Direction Courses we offer tailor made programmes to schools and community groups, increasing the number of young people worked with approximately 200 young people in 2011/12

CABS is currently seeking to accredit all work completed by young people on its courses. We enjoy a high level of attendance and success with young people attending courses, and we have welcomed many of these young people to the Post Course which is offered to those who complete the New Directions programme as a once a week drop in. In addition, young people are encouraged to take up volunteering experiences. We currently have 1 previous service user, who returned as a volunteer and is now a part time employee.

<u>Include +</u>

Include is a programme which aims to support young people aged 10 -15 to combat and change the negative influence of delinquent peer groups and prevent young people from initially

becoming involved in gun, knife and gang related crime

The programme supports young people for a period of 26 weeks and is delivered twice a week. The programme incorporates one group work session covering subjects such as Bullying, Gangs Awareness, and Relationships whilst the second weekly session is activity based, and includes access to the CYDT music studio, drama, arts and crafts and healthy living sessions and in addition a community based project is undertaken. Over the lifetime of the project CYDT has worked with over 90 young people, and supported many to access other provisions, and support mechanisms. The Home Office Community Fund closed in March 2011, however CYDT continued to deliver this programme for a further 3 months to effectively signpost service users to alternative programmes.

ISS Education Provision

CYDT provide an alternative education provision for the South London ISS, an alternative programme to a custodial sentence CYDT receives referrals for those young people who are subject to a court order or bail conditions, and who are not currently engaged in statutory education CYDT provide a varied programme of alternative education, whilst a more appropriate placement is secured. In 2011/12, CYDT worked with over 40 young people and worked in partnership with ISS, to support and prepare over 90% of beneficiaries into college or an alternative placement.

Summer Arts College

CYDT were commissioned by South London ISS and Croydon YOT to deliver the Croydon Summer Arts College to 10 young people on ISS/YRO orders (an alternative to a custodial sentence)

The programme is delivered over the 3 week summer holiday and over 25 hours each week, and attendance is compulsory. The young people participate in various art activities and study a minimum of 3 different art forms, to compile a portfolio of work to achieve a Bronze Level Art Award. The art forms that the young people chose to study consisted of Free Running, Graffitti Art, Music, and Photography.

7 young people achieved the Bronze Arts Award, and produced an amazing portfolio of art work which can be seen across the CYDT site, and a DVD which accompanied the music created in the studio, and a collage of different photographs

CYDT would like to thank Croydon Youth Offending Team and South London ISS for the opportunity and support offered during this programme, and look forward to next year's summer project

TMS

TMS is a fully equipped music studio and media suite, consisting of 6 apple mac computers with access to software programmes such as Reason and LOGIC, a mixing desk, vocal booth and recording facilities

TMS facilitates a range of programmes including bespoke programmes for agencies, schools and pupil referral units. All programmes will be catered to support the needs of the beneficiaries and may consist of structured 2 hour sessions for 8-10 weeks, and provide young people with an opportunity to write lyrics, DJ, and record vocals, to culminate in the production of a CD.

TMS also supports other CYDT programmes such as Summer Arts College and ISS

TMS is also funded by Youth Music to develop a programme called Streets to Beats, which will provide young people with access to a free music making project

A range of sessions are offered, including some specific school sessions during the day, and a range of open sessions after shoool and at weekends and all young people can be accredited for work through the Arts Award

In 2011/12 over 100 young people participated in activities and sessions within the Music Studio

Integr8

CYDT are developing an integenerational project called Integr8, which will be accessible to all community members living within the Selhurst area.

The project will provide a programme of activities which will consist of groupwork/discussions and a group project. The inteventions will provide the opportunity to break communication barriers enabling participants to develop and establish relationships with other generations.

The project started in January 2012 with a month networking and planning phase Delivery of the project will commence in Septmember 2012

CCB

CCB (Croydon Community Bus) is a converted London Transport double decker bus, which provides mobile play and youth work activities in areas of isolation and deprivation CCB aims to engage with young people aged 8-19, and provides age appropriate activities for all beneficiaries

CCB is fully equipped with a dedicated arts and crafts area located on the upper deck of the bus, alongside a desginated games console room. Downstairs consists of discussion pods, which can be utilised for groupwork activities, 1-2-1 sessions, and chill out areas. On board are a number of plasma TV's, a mini kitchenette, and varied sports equipment and accessories which can be utilised in outdoor areas or green spaces.

Each CCB session is 2 hours in length, and the experienced and qualified staff team develop a delivery plan, which includes a 20 minute structured activity. The activities may consist of discussions, worksheets, quizzes, on a range of issues that affect young people. The activity will increase the beneficiaries understanding, knowledge and decision making skills. Following completion of the structured activity, beneficiaries can participate in activities of their choice.

CCB staff can provide information, advice and guidance on a wide range of issues, and signpost to other services as appropriate

CCB is a condom distribution and chlamydia testing site, and provides young people with literature to take away on a range of subjects

In 2011/12 the CCB project worked with over 350 young people across all sessions

The Bridge

The Bridge is a weekly youth group for LGBT young people aged 13-21. The Bridge offers young people a safe, non judgemental environment to express themselves, and to meet and socialise with other like minded young people.

The project also provides all young people with an opportunity to access 1-2-1 support, and will effectively signpost and support young people to access additional support and information, advice and guidance services

In 2011/12, The Bridge had a collective membership of 65 young people, which is a 50% increase on the previous year, and it is continuing to increase!

The Family Project

The Family Project provided a variety of sessions, activities and programmes to enable parents and carers to spend quality time with their children

The aim of The Family Project was to promote the social capital of the family, improve relationships, communication, and understanding of one anothers needs

The Family Project worked with 82 families, providing access to 10 week engagement programmes, family mentoring sessions, drop in sessions, and family days and events

The Family Project was funded by the Tranistion Fund and closed in March 2012

Ignite

Ignite is a weekly youth club for young people aged 10 - 15. The youth club provides structured activities for young people to participate within such as Art, Drama, Sports, Music and Cooking It also provides a safe place for young people to meet their friends, play on the latest games consoles, football tables and pool. Ignite is funded by Awards for All.

Public Benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our objectives and activities and in the planning of future activities. It is the judgement of the Trustees that activities in pursuit of the above objectives fully meet the public benefit test, which they have kept in mind in planning programmes for CYDT. In delivering services and in the appointment of staff, volunteers and trustees CYDT operates a strict policy of no discrimination on any grounds.

Reserves Policy

The Board of Trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible assets (the free reserves) held by the charity should be between 3 and 6 months of the resources expended. Free reserves currently stand at £79,540. Designated funds are set out in note 13 to the accounts.

Investment Policy

The Board of Trustees have considered the most appropriate policy for investing funds not immediately required for operations and in consequence operates a high interest bank account linked to predicted monthly expenditure. This is the only viable option at this moment in time taking into consideration that the majority of incoming funds are soon required to sustain the day to day running of the Trust and its associated projects.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees (who are also directors of Croydon Youth Development Trust for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to a) select suitable accounting policies, and then apply them consistently,

- b) observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP,
- c) make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- d) state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- e) prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company, and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 March 2012

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charity and the charity's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As explained more fully in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities, the trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's (APB's) Ethical Standards for Auditors

Scope of the audit of the financial statements

Operations are being tightly managed and finances closely monitored to ensure current budgets are adhered to, and that sufficient reserves remain in place to enable an orderly wind-down should this be necessary. Although access to funding in the new climate is a priority, the current conditions indicate the existence of a material uncertainty which may cast significant doubt about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The financial statements do not include the adjustments that would result if the charity was unable to continue as a going concern.

In our opinion the information given in the Trustees' Annual Report for the financial year for which the financial statements are prepared is consistent with the financial statements

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2012

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the preceding year.

(1) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005

In common with many other voluntary organisations in the current economic climate, funding levels are uncertain for 2012/13 and beyond. Operations are being tightly managed and finances closely monitored to ensure current budgets are adhered to, and that sufficient reserves remain in place to enable an orderly wind-down should this be necessary. Access to funding in the new climate is a prority, and the trustees are hopeful that CYDT will obtain sufficient funding to continue in operation one way or another. For this reason, the trustees consider the going concern basis to be appropriate

(11) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discrection of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes Restricted funds are subject to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal

(III) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full when receivable
- Income from charitable activities relates to the provision of services that are recognised as income
 when the service is delivered
- Secondment recharges are recognised as income from charitable activities in line with the underlying expenditure
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified.
 The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- Investment income is accounted for on an accruals basis

Where income is received, some or all of which is specifically in relation to future periods, the relevant amount is deferred and credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which it relates

(iv) Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates

- Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its
 activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to
 such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and stautory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to
 reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others
 are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

1 Accounting policies (cont'd)

(v) Fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. The cost of minor additions or those costing below £400 are not capitalised. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life. The rates used are as follows.
