Chairman's report

For the year ended 31 March 1999

Introduction

1998/99 consolidated Tommy's Campaign's position as a major source of funding in the UK for research into fetal health. Grants for both medical research and education and information projects totalled £1.2 million.

The charity raised just over £2.5 million, an outstanding achievement, particularly when taking into account that the charity receives neither government funding nor legacies.

Research

Professor Lucilla Poston, Tommy's Campaign's Professor of Fetal Health, contributed significantly to our mission to solve problem pregnancies by forging ahead with her internationally renowned research programme. Following the success in centres in South East England, the research team is extending the PREMET trial to centres in Leeds and Bradford. PREMET aims to establish whether an antibiotic can be effective in treating infection which is thought to be a cause of premature birth.

The results of the VIP – Vitamins in Pregnancy – Trial which establishes whether supplements of vitamins C & E reduce the incidence of pre-eclampsia are due to be published in the autumn and are eagerly anticipated by the international research community.

Dr Andrew Shennan, a key member of the Fetal Health Research Group has been funded to undertake a major piece of research into Obstetric Cholestasis, thought to account for 5% of all stillbirths. The team will examine the relationship between liver function tests, bile acid tests and the itching that characterises the condition.

Under the experienced guidance of the Medical Advisory Group the charity funded a total of 10 projects including:-

- A study to examine the placenta to analyse what triggers the birth process, with the aim of developing tools to
 predict and prevent preterm delivery;
- An analysis of whether too much oxygen in early pregnancy is the cause of miscarriage; and
- A project to establish if sialidase activity is a predictor of preterm birth.

Tommy's Campaign, together with the University of Bristol has filed patent rights relating to an assay for sialidase to gauge the risk of preterm labour in connection with this project.

Fulfilling the charity's remit to educate and inform, an information leaflet with guidance for pregnant women on helping themselves to a healthy pregnancy was distributed during National Pregnancy Week to antenatal clinics, health centres and GP surgeries. Research with midwives indicated the leaflet achieved an extremely high standard in terms of both the advice offered and the broad distribution achieved.

National Pregnancy Week itself was extremely successful in generating widespread media coverage with much of the press coverage focusing on information and guidance on healthy pregnancies.

Research (continued)

A grant from the National Lottery Charities Board of £20,326 will fund the writing and production of two leaflets on the subject of premature birth – one for health professionals and one for pregnant women. They will provide guidelines to help identify and provide support for women at risk of premature labour. The grant includes provision for a midwife's salary to research and write the leaflets.

Tommy's Campaign's mission to make the everyday lives of parents easier via lobbying for parent-friendly facilities made further inroads with the most successful and highest-profile campaign ever, with the emphasis on retailers providing parents with the opportunity to shop from home and have goods delivered to their door.

A new initiative to make pregnant women's lives easier in the work place was launched with the introduction of Tommy's Campaign's Pregnancy Accreditation scheme. Participating corporations and employers will be asked to meet a set of pre-ordained pregnancy-friendly criteria such as providing a smoke-free rest-place for pregnant employees and encouraging employees towards a healthy pregnancy by distributing leaflets produced by Tommy's Campaign. An eminent panel of experts on stress in pregnancy have contributed considerably to the extremely high level of interest in the scheme from major corporations.

Fundraising

A highly successful partnership with Asda involving colleague fundraising, in-store activity and the use of the Tommy's Campaign's logo on the own-brand baby toiletries range meant that the high-profile supermarket chain raised a magnificent £1 million. Boots the Chemist, Huggies Nappies and Brewers Fayre also made valuable contributions to the fund-raising effort via corporate partnerships.

Events aimed at generating both profile and funds included Calypso in the Park which raised £73,000 and the Chelsea Flower Show from which Tommy's Campaign was truly fortunate to benefit to the tune of £277,000.

Two brand new initiatives are about to be launched aimed at increasing the level of funding from individual donors. The launch of Pioneers Club targets donors at the £250 level. Members of the Pioneers Club will receive privileged access to research, opportunities to meet researchers to find out more about their work, and have members' names inscribed in a special roll of honour.

Smalltalk – aimed at mums of young babies – offers subscriptions to a tri-annual magazine with hints, tips, and guidance on bringing up baby in return for a £25 donation. The generous donation of databases from Nutricia and Bounty means that a total of around 300,000 names have been targeted for membership of the scheme.

Fundraising (continued)

Volunteer and branch fundraising has been extremely successful with a total increase of 50%. We continue to be hugely grateful to our volunteer fundraisers for the energy and commitment they put into fundraising for us.

Committee support

We are extremely pleased that Ron Dennis has agreed to join the Board of Trustees. As Group Managing Director of the TAG McLaren Group, he brings with him a broad range of expertise and determination to succeed which should contribute considerably to the growth of the charity.

Sarah, Duchess of York, our Patron made a valuable contribution to the success of the Asda partnership by launching the initiative at the Roehampton store, and will, fittingly, celebrate reaching the target of £1 million at Asda's headquarters in Leeds this June.

Chief Executive

I am delighted that Vivienne Creevey joined us in October 1988 as the new Chief Executive. With a background in marketing and strategic consulting she brings a business energy to the charity which we believe will be of immense use in our continued effort to grow.

Financial overview

Income for the year increased to £2.5 million with resources expended on charitable objectives coming in at £1.28 million.

Grants for medical research amounted to £977,909. This includes £329,105 awarded to Professor Lucilla Poston's fetal health research unit and £51,519 towards a part funding of Dr Andrew Shennan's post of Senior Lecturer.

Reserves

Total funds stand at just over £1 million, with £125,062 restricted for purposes specified by donors. Due to a rescheduling of the Medical Advisory Group (MAG) meetings, a single grant making meeting fell within the financial year 1998-99. This was an exceptional situation and in 1999-2000 there will be two meetings annually, one in May and one in November. The £964,867 unrestricted funds therefore include amounts that will be allocated in May to the MAG. The remaining amounts will be available to maintain and increase our level of support for the funding of research, and to guard against any shortfall in fundraising income in the future.

It is the Trustees' policy to hold specific resources in the form of long-term investments that will be used to fund grant obligations.

Year 2000

The charity has been planning for the Year 2000 since September 1997. A detailed programme has been in place since then which is systematically upgrading all equipment and software, and providing key staff with the relevant training. This has helped to spread the costs over a two and a half year period and will make sure that Tommy's Campaign will be able to function effectively in the Year 2000 and beyond.

Trustees' responsibilities

It is the responsibility of the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the group and of the charity and of the results of the group for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees have:

- selected suitable accounting policies and then applied them consistently;
- made judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- stated whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepared the financial statements on the going concern basis.

The trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the trust and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Auditors

A resolution proposing that Binder Hamlyn be re-appointed as auditors of the Charity will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

Auditors' report

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As described on page 5, the trustees, who are also the directors of Tommy's Campaign Limited for the purposes of company law are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements. Basis of opinion

Notes to the financial statements

For the year ending 31 March 1999

1 Accounting policies

a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of investments which are included on a market value basis. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice SORP - 'Accounting by Charities'.

b) Basis of consolidation

The group financial statements include the results for the year ended 31 March 1999 of Tommy's Campaign and its subsidiary company The Baby Fund Trading Limited. The results of the subsidiary are included on a line by line basis and its own profit and loss account and balance sheet are shown in note 16.

c) Funds accounting

General funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the fund.

Designated funds comprise general funds which are set aside at the discretion of the trustees for specific purposes.

Restricted funds are funds subject to restrictions imposed by donors or the nature of the appeal. The purpose and use of the restricted funds is set out in note 15.

d) Incoming resources

All incoming resources becoming available to the group during the year are included when there is certainty of receipt. The incoming resources are shown gross except for small events organised by volunteers, where expenses are netted off against income.

e) Medical research grants

Medical research grants payable within three years are accounted for as expenditure when awarded by the Medical Advisory Group not withstanding that the amounts may not be paid in the year. The amounts payable after three years are met from future income and have not been recognised as a liability. Disclosure of these commitments are made in the note 18 to the financial statements. Where expenditure is charged to unrestricted funds in anticipation of receiving restricted funding in a subsequent year an adjustment is made to reflect this.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

f) Allocation of expenditure

Expenditure is classified under the principal headings of direct charitable and other expenditure rather than the type of expense in order to provide more useful information to the users of these accounts. Where costs cannot be directly attributed they have been allocated to activities on a utilisation basis.

Support costs comprise all services supplied centrally and identified as wholly or mainly in support of grants and education and information projects and include an appropriate proportion of general overheads. Details of allocation of expenditure are shown in note 7.

g) Depreciation of tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided on a straight line basis to write off the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives ranging between three and ten years.

h) Investments

Investments are stated at market value. It is the charity's policy to keep valuations up to date such that when investments are sold there is no gain and loss arising. As a result the statement of financial activities only includes those unrealised gains or losses arising from the revaluation of the investment portfolio throughout the year. A disclosure is made within note 11 to the financial statements of the differences between the historic cost and the sales proceeds of the investments sold during the year.

i) Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

i) Taxation

To the extent that it does not exceed the accounting profit for the period, any taxable profit of the subsidiary, The Baby Fund Trading Limited, is eliminated by deed of covenant in favour of the charity. The activities of the charity fall within the exemptions granted under section 505 of the Income and Corporation Taxes Act 1988.

k) Cash flow statement

The charity has taken advantage of the exemption from preparing a cash flow statement available under Financial Reporting Standard No. 1 (Revised) on account of its size.

Restricted Funds

These are donations for specific projects as requested by the donors. The restrictions are as detailed above.

The charity awards grants each year and shows this expenditure in full as unrestricted expenditure. Of £1,099,078 awarded in the previous year, donors contributed £67,500 during the year ended 31 March 1999. An adjustment has been made this year to the statement of financial activities to reflect the fact that these payments, previously charged to unrestricted funds, have been paid out of restricted funds, received in the current year to fund this specific expenditure.
