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TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2018.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's [governing document], the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016)

BAND merged with Family Action, a registered charity number 264713, on 1 April 2018. The trustees in office at the time resigned on that date and were replaced by trustees appointed by Family Action. As explained on page 7, the outgoing trustees formed a local management committee on retirement.

Objectives and activities

BAND is a charitable organisation which exists to support individuals living within the Borough of Bolton who experience mental health problems. The objects as stated in our Memorandum and Articles are:

"To support the people within the Borough of Bolton who live with mental health problems to reach their full potential as defined by themselves, through:

- · The promotion of choice and independence.
- · The provision of support for the individual.
- · The facilitation of education, recreational, social and enterprise opportunities.
- · Contributing to the development of services across the mental health economy."

Following the merger, these aims and objectives will remain at the core of all future work that BAND develops with Family Action, as stated in the Merger and Post Merger agreements.

During the 2017/18 financial year we continued to meet our objectives through the delivery of the following services:

- · A range of shared interest, social and activity groups
- · One to one befriending project
- · One to one mentoring project
- One to one information and support project
- · Community partnership working
- · Service user engagement and representation project
- · In reach at the hospital
- · One to one support on discharge from hospital
- · Volunteering opportunities

Benefits

BAND delivers its services free of charge to adults who experience mental health problems and who live in the Borough of Bolton. We believe in Equality of Opportunity and work to ensure equality of opportunity to all people, including using buildings that are accessible to people with restricted mobility, providing services at different times of day and the week and in varied geographical locations, and the use of interpreters where necessary and practicable.

We work to ensure that people who experience mental health problems will experience improved rates of recovery through the provision of wider social, educational and recreational activities, development of a personal asset base and the development of recovery focussed services across the mental health agencies. The wider population of Bolton will benefit from mental health promotion, awareness and knowledge.

Achievements and performance

Core and development work

Information and support sessions and life skills learning have been made available across a number of locations including Horwich, Westhoughton, Deane, Halliwell and Farnworth. Shared interest/activity sessions were also available in some of these locations.

Shared interest groups operated on a weekly basis. Groups that ran during the year 2017/18 are:

- Future Horizons, which runs on a Wednesday evening and Sunday daytime and offers opportunities for socialising and activities such as board games, arts and crafts, music appreciation, Cook and Eat sessions and invited speakers.
- FC Bolton football team, run in partnership with Active Choices and Early Intervention. Members attend training and play in league matches.
- Creative writing, which supports members to express themselves through word art. The group has
 had trips out to local venues to source inspiration for their writing. The group facilitator works in a fully
 inclusive way to ensure that traditional norms around writing (spelling and grammar) do not form
 barriers to individuals.
- The art group, for people who are not necessarily fledgling Van Gogh's but who enjoy being creative with paint, pencils and pastels.
- Out 'n' Abouters, volunteer supported trips out to local recreational and leisure facilities. Trips have included visits to museums and art galleries, neighbouring towns and attractions such as The Sea Life Centre.
- Greenhouse Project, a horticultural project run in partnership with the Mutual Aid Centre and offering opportunities to learn about planting, growing and cooking.

Our one to one service offers:

- An information and support service, offering help guidance and support with a range of issues including, but not limited to, benefits, housing, access to services, care planning, family and relationships, immigration, work/employment and combating social isolation/ engaging with meaningful activities.
- Befriending support, aimed at supporting those who are at the beginning of their recovery journey to build their self confidence and esteem and to begin to think about how they would like their lives to be
- Mentoring support, aimed at supporting people to identify things that they would like to achieve and enabling them to work towards their goals by offering encouragement, action planning and problem solving and mentoring.
- Buddying support, a project funded by Lloyds Foundation and begun in August 2016. This project aims to support a successful transition from hospital to community and will work with individuals who have little or no support at home, as they are discharged from the psychiatric wards at the hospital.
- Partnering with Urban Outreach in their Big Lottery Bid to work with individuals with complex presentations, we will work with 20 to 30 individuals per year where mental health is the primary presentation.

The benefits to our members from the above activities are: improved resilience in managing everyday living, enhanced self esteem, increased chance of recovery, and social inclusion.

Our Equalities Worker delivers outreach work to a wide range of diverse community groups. During the financial year 2017/18 she maintained contact with over 25 groups and organisations offering mental health support and delivering Ways to Wellbeing sessions. A successful Wellbeing Event was held in October 2017 at Bolton University with 14 stage presentations and workshops about wellbeing delivered by a diverse range of groups. Over 18 groups had stalls at the event and more than 400 people attended on the day.

The Service User Representation project continues with the aim of ensuring an effective service user voice in the evaluation, monitoring and development of current and new mental health services, policy and practice. To this end, BAND continues to recruit people with experience of using mental health services to represent the views of service users on a range of committees facilitated by the CCG and GMW Mental Health Foundation Trust. Service user reps have also been invited to participate in preparation for the recent CQC inspection of GMW Mental Health Foundation Trust, to present at conferences and to participate in the recruitment of paid staff.

We continue to support the Bolton LGBT+ group

We work in partnership with the YMCA, to raise awareness of issues around wellbeing and mental health to young people. The project formed the foundation for a joint bid to participate in the Thrive Partnership, the aim of which is to develop a range of services to provide low level mental health and emotional wellbeing support for young people aged between 13 and 25. We are happy to report that the bid was successful and that the project is currently running.

BAND is delivering a 6 module Wellbeing Course for Refugees and Asylum Seekers as part of a Lottery Funded Project working in partnership with the Red Cross, Refugee Action, Rainbow Haven and Revive. The course is delivered across Greater Manchester, thus extending BAND's reach and reputation.

Work continued on the psychiatric wards at the Royal Bolton Hospital to offer support to patients. The Patient Lounge offers a welcome opportunity for some respite from the ward environment and for chat, support and a brew with volunteers. Volunteers visit the psychiatric wards 3 afternoons a week, providing a point of contact and a friendly face to those who may not often have visitors. The internet café opens two afternoons a week. Patients are able to access their social media accounts, e-mails, do internet banking or just plug in headphones and chill out to music.

The benefits of these projects and activities to our members and to the wider mental health community are:

- improved involvement by people (including those from BAME communities) with mental health services;
- BAND is better able to take an holistic approach to the delivery of services including attention to appropriate social, educational and recreational activities;
- · increased resilience in managing everyday living and
- · improved and enhanced self esteem

Volunteering and student placements

BAND offers student placements to those studying to become adult teachers, psychologists and mental health support workers. In the last year, BAND has offered placements to a number of students all of whom have contributed to the overall success of the BAND services, often working on specific activities and projects with the members, thus enhancing the range of opportunities available.

Processes have been designed and implemented to support new volunteer recruitment, induction, training and support programmes. During the year 2017/18, 84 volunteers were active within the organisation and were able to benefit from the delivery of our training modules including:

- · Advocacy training
- · Anti-discriminatory practice
- Boundaries
- Communication
- Confidentiality
- · Cultural Competency
- Managing Aggression
- Mental Health Act
- · Mental Health Awareness
- · Motivational Interviewing
- Node Link Mapping
- · Recovery Parts 1, 2 and 3
- · Rights and Responsibilities
- Safeguarding
- · Suicide prevention

All volunteers are supported through individual and peer supervision and are invited to and encouraged to attend training that is relevant to their role.

The benefits of our work with volunteers and student placements are:

- · Increased skills, self confidence and self esteem for people who volunteer
- Increased awareness of mental health and recovery based services for people who are training to work within mental health and associated settings

Networking and partnership working

BAND works in partnership with many agencies across Bolton, some of which are mental health specific and some of which are not.

Importantly, BAND provides representation on Bolton Mental Health Strategy and Planning Group. BAND represents the voluntary sector at the Local Authority's Market Shaping Group. Membership of these committees enables us to ensure that the voice of the voluntary sector is heard in the development and commissioning of services within the mental health communities and associated services. Representatives from BAND also attend at the CCG commissioned Equality Target Action Groups, Volunteer Forum, Voluntary and Community Sector Forum and Health and Care Together Forum.

BAND is a partner in Move Forward Bolton, Bolton Mental Health Forum and the Preventative Provider Group, all of which are collaborative bodies of provider organisations.

We are part of the Greater Manchester Mental Health Forum, and have been invited to join a mental health advisory group which meets quarterly with the Greater Manchester Director for Health and Social Care.

BAND facilitates Service User representation when requested to do so, on a number of committees and working groups.

Financial review

The charity's core funding has met the level of expenditure needed to meet its objectives through sound financial planning and management and the support of staff and volunteers.

In order to build capacity to enable delivery of both the AssistU (Local Sustainability Fund) and Partnerships (Lloyds Enhance) projects and still deliver on core activities the Trustees took the decision to fund additional hours to and/or backfill time for the Chief Officer, Operations Manager and Team Leader from previous underspend on core restricted funds. Core funding for 2017/18 was insufficient to cover full time hours for these essential posts.

The Statement of Financial Activities shows a net deficit of £44,381 for the year and our funds stand at £251,691 in total. The charity's assets are held for the objects of the charity.

Reserves policy

The charity needs reserves to protect its current activities, in order to allow the trustees to meet their day-to-day responsibilities and to ensure that it continues to operate on a going concern basis. The trustees have examined the risks, needs and challenges faced by the charity in both the short and medium term along with relevant financial forecasts and have formulated a policy to mitigate those risks and meet those needs, which are satisfied by the level of unrestricted reserves (£115,751) at the balance sheet date.

Following the merger, all assets were transferred to Family Action. Reserves transferred will be held as a restricted fund, held by Family Action, and will be applied only in accordance with the original objects of BAND as stated in the merger and post merger agreements.

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources for the charity are currently by way of grant and contract income from Bolton Council Adult and Community Services and Bolton CCG.

Investment policy

Most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term and a prudent amount has been kept available to maintain a healthy cash flow. A small amount of funds surplus to working capital needs is currently invested in a high interest account. The trustees review the policy following the AGM each year.

Risk management

The charity has conducted a review of the major risks to which it is exposed and this is updated at least annually. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces.

Major identified risks to the charity are:

Sustainability – Increasing pressures on statutory services, coupled with the on-going austerity drive continue to impact on funding available for the sector. Shaping of the commissioning landscape will also be shaped by Greater Manchester Devolution and the introduction of pooled budgets through the Local Care Organisation. Competition for funding is likely to increase and there are calls for the VCS to operate differently in order to meet the challenges ahead.

Capacity – Cuts to funding have affected staffing within BAND. The organisation has worked hard to maintain high quality, front line services that meet the needs of our beneficiaries. This has, however, been at the expense of management structures leaving limited capacity for development and growth.

Skill mix – BAND's senior finance officer retired in June 2017. BAND took the decision not to recruit to this post pending the outcome of two streams of work:

- AssistU Project (supported through funding from the Local Sustainability Fund) exploring
 opportunities for earning an income through the introduction of a paid for service. A new paid for
 service stream is being developed as a result of this project.
- Partnerships Project (supported by Lloyds Foundation's Enhance Programme) analysing
 opportunities for partnerships, collaborations and mergers. We are currently exploring the possibility
 of merging with another organization in order to minimize the risks outlined above, to protect the work
 of BAND and to further our strategic development plans.

The decision to merge with Family Action was approved by the membership by special resolution at the Annual General Meeting on 15 December 2017. An amendment to the resolution, confirming the date for the merger states 'will take effect from 31 March 2018 or such other date as notified to member by the Board' was approved at a General Meeting held on 23 March 2018.

Internal control risks were minimised by the implementation of procedures laid down in a financial controls policy. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety regulations within all premises occupied by the charity. Procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

Plans for the future

Following the merger with Family Action on 1 April 2018, BAND's charitable activities are through that charity with effect from that date. BAND will work to ensure a smooth transition of operations, as it is vital that the service offered continues to meet the needs of our users.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 27 November 1996 and registered as a charity on 19 February 1997. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established its objects and the powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up, members are required to contribute an amount of £5.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Executive Committee.

All the trustees in office at 31 March 2018 stepped down with effect from 1 April 2018 and were replaced by new trustees representing Family Action. The outgoing trustees then formed a local management committee.

 to people with lived experience of mental health conditions. This is a developing forum and Terms of
 Reference are currently being developed.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Building a New Direction Ltd is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 24 Angel Gate, City Road, London, EC1V 2PT.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

As explained in note 14, the operations of BAND were merged with another charity, Family Action, with effect from 1 April 2018. Although it will continue to exist as a registered company and charity for the foreseeable future, its operations will be within Family Action, rather than within Building a New Direction Ltd. However, it is not felt that this has had any material impact on the assets, liabilities and funds stated in these accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

Transfers between funds arise when expenditure is incurred in one fund which can be funded or part funded by income of another fund. In addition, transfers may be made from unrestricted funds to clear excess expenditure over income arising in restricted funds.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the items have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be reliably measured. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

Costs of raising funds, which are activities undertaken to generate income.

Expenditure on charitable activities, which are the costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services to its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. estimated usage.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses. Fixed assets costing more than £350 are capitalised.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Office furniture and equipment

15% per annum reducing balance

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks.

1.9 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is a contract which results in a financial asset arising in one entity and a financial liability arising in another. The charity generally only has basic financial instruments, such as short term trade debtors and trade creditors, and cash and bank balances. It has elected to apply the provisions of FRS 102 Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' to these.

1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

1.12 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are valued at the amount of expenditure prepaid.

1.13 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised when the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party, and the amount due for settlement can be measured or estimated reliably. They are normally recognised at their settlement amount.

12 Restricted funds (Continued)

Bolton MBC Prevention funds the provision of Recovery Services, including access support and information, to meet the needs of people with lived experience of a mental health condition.

CCG Core Funding supports core costs, including staff costs, and also the provision of Recovery Focussed Services.

The Welcome to My World project will be used to support patients on psychiatric wards to participate in community arts based activity.

Food and You funds are set aside to offer support for people who experience eating disorders and their families.

Creative Pastimes is a project that was funded by Bolton PCT, its aim being to support in-patients who are nearing discharge to re-engage with community facilities and activities.

CERT (Community Engagement and Service user Representation) was funded by the Bolton CCG to support community development and engagement across equality strands and service user involvement, consultation and representation. Funding for Community Development and Engagement ceased from 1 October 2015.

Highway to Health is a grant from the Department of Health that covers 4 financial years. The aim of the money is to work within marginalised communities to develop volunteer health champions who will work to deliver health improvement messages and to support a greater awareness of mental health and wellbeing.

CDW IAPT project was funded by Bolton PCT and delivered in partnership with UCLAN; this research project worked with the Gypsy, Romany, Traveller Communities to examine barriers to accessing psychological therapies. We are planning to use remaining money to review and refresh the findings of the original report with a view to promoting to commissioners the needs of this community.

Local Sustainability Fund (LSF) is time-limited funding aimed at supporting organisations to build capacity and develop approaches/practices that will support a more sustainable future.

Lloyds Foundation funding is to support people at the point of discharge from the psychiatric wards and to facilitate a successful transition to living in the community.

Support First is a project funded through the Help through Crisis Fund, which is administered by BIG Lottery. The project is being delivered in partnership with Urban Outreach, who are the lead Organisation aimed at providing wrap around support to, and improving the lives of, people with a history of repeat attendance at A&E or to the emergency services, and who have complex and layered issues impacting on their lives.

Project Blue is is a one off fund to develop an approach to a web-based emotional wellbeing guidance and signposting information about local information that can help if a young person needs support.

14 Events after the reporting date

BAND merged with Family Action, a charity registered in England and Wales, with effect from 1 April 2018. BAND's future activities will be undertaken within Family Action, though the BAND name will continue to be used locally as an operating style.
