STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting by Charities", using the following accounting policies:

INCOMING RESOURCES:

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Grant, Contract and Service Agreement income represents amounts receivable from local government and national funding bodies, less amounts received relating to future periods.

Interest on bank and building society deposits represents amounts receivable.

Other income represents recharged costs, membership subscriptions and other fees receivable.

Donations and sponsorship represents amounts received.

RESOURCES EXPENDED:

Expenditure of the Charity is accounted for as it is incurred.

Expenditure is allocated to the headings 'Direct Charitable Expenditure Support Costs', 'Fund-raising and Publicity' and 'Management and Administration of the Charity' on the basis, which in the opinion of the Trustees, gives the fairest allocation of costs, in accordance with the Statement Of Recommended Practice.

The charity allocates costs as 'Direct Charitable Expenditure', where such costs directly relate to the objects of the charity and, where appropriate, of the restricted fund. The allocation of certain expenditure is on the basis (e.g. staff costs on time spent, premises costs on area occupied, etc.,) appropriate to the nature of the expenditure and subject to, where appropriate, the provisions laid down by the income providers within the contracts and service agreements.

Support costs include services supplied centrally, identified as wholly or mainly in support of the project work and objects of the charity.

'Fund-raising and Publicity' expenditure represents amounts incurred on the promotion of the charity and its objects in order to gain further income.

Other expenditure incurred is included within 'Management and Administration of the Charity' expenses.

FIXED ASSETS:

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

- over 4 years.

Depreciation of leasehold property improvements is provided so as to write off the assets over the remaining period of the lease.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

FUND ACCOUNTING:

- (i) The Charity's Unrestricted Reserves consist of general reserves which the Charity may use for its purposes, at its discretion and these may include reserves which have been designated by the directors to meet future commitments.
- (ii) Restricted Reserves are those where the donor has imposed restrictions on the use of the funds which are legally binding.

15. RESTRICTED FUNDS (continued)

RURAL INITIATIVES FUND

This fund was established in the late 1980s for the purpose of distributing small grants to rural organisations.

FARMING AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT

During the early 1990s a group was set up to give support to farmers and, latterly, the rural community generally, in terms of coping with stress. The fund was established principally to finance the production of an information card.

TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT ADVISOR (VOLUNTARY SECTOR)

This post was established in 1995 to encourage training and voluntary sector development. It is funded by Bedfordshire and Luton Chamber of Commerce, Training and Enterprise.

COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION PROJECT

The Community Participation Project was established in 1996 to encourage the participation of users, carers and voluntary groups in the planning of health and social services. The Rural Communities Charity carried out this function which is funded through joint finance.

COUNTRY WORK

A national initiative, Country Work is sponsored by British Telecom and the Post Office, supplemented by local funding from Mid Beds District Council. Its purpose is to fund rural enterprise initiatives.

VILLAGE SHOPS DEVELOPMENT SCHEME

Bedfordshire Rural Communities Charity administers this scheme on behalf of the Rural Development Commission and the three District Councils in Bedfordshire. Its purpose is to help village shopkeepers to improve their shops, in villages of less than 3,000 population and in communities where there is a sole shop.

YOUTH VOLUNTEERING (M.A.D)

This fund was established in 1997, with 2 year funding from the Home Office. Working in north Bedfordshire, the main aims of the Project are to encourage young people to take advantage of volunteering opportunities and to encourage organisations to provide opportunities. Following the success of the initial project, funding has been secured from the Nationwide Foundation to continue the work and extend it to include the mid-Bedfordshire area.

DRUGS OUTREACH PROGRAMME

This fund was established in 1998 to deliver outreach work to young people in rural communities who are in danger of drugs misuse. The initiative is financed from the Department of Health's "Opportunities for Volunteering" Fund.

EUROPEAN SOCIAL FUND

A successful bid was made to the European Social Fund (ESF) in order to finance a dual-purpose project. The funds were awarded to set up a web-site for the Rural Communities Charity and to provide grants to registered childminders to enable them to undertake formal NVQ qualifications.

RURAL TRANSPORT PARTNERSHIP

The Partnership was established to improve sustainable rural transport in Bedfordshire. The fund was established to enable the Rural Communities Charity to employ a Partnership Officer and to facilitate an Action Plan.

15. RESTRICTED FUNDS (continued)

VILLAGE CARE SCHEMES

The purpose of this funding from Bedfordshire County Council is to establish care schemes and day care facilities in rural communities in the county.

MILLENNIUM VOLUNTEERS

Millennium Volunteers is a government initiative aimed at encouraging young people between the ages of sixteen and twenty four into volunteering. The fund enables the Rural Communities Charity to employ three people.

HOUSING AND SUPPORT NEEDS

The Housing Associations Charitable Trust (HACT) has provided funding for research into the housing needs of the elderly in rural Bedfordshire.

EUROPEAN SOCIAL FUND - PROJECT No 2

This is the second successful bid the Rural Communities Charity has made to this Fund. It will extend the work of the previous project, enabling registered childminders and pre-school learning groups in rural areas of Bedfordshire to achieve a recognised accreditation. The Project is also supported by the National Childminding Association and the Pre-School Learning Alliance.

COMMUNITY SAFETY PROJECT

The Rural Communities Charity successfully bid for funding from the National Lottery Charities Board to work at grass-roots level in the southern half of the county to improve the safety of people living in rural communities.

RURAL TRANSPORT PARTNERSHIP DELEGATED FUND

This fund was established to fund small-scale transport projects in rural Bedfordshire.
