REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2019

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The trustees, who are also the directors for the purposes of Company Law, present their annual report and audited consolidated financial statements of The Stowe House Preservation Trust, a charitable company, and its subsidiary undertaking for the year ended 31 March 2019, which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2016, Charities Act 2011, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Principal Activities and Objectives

This annual report details the achievements of the Charity against the objects stated in the Memorandum and Articles of Association as amplified by the Trust's strategic plan 2017-2023. The objects of the Charity are "to protect and preserve for the benefit of the public and the nation Stowe House in the county of Buckingham". The strategic plan sets out the phases in which restoration work are planned while an annual operating plan details specific projects and sets annual targets for income generation and visitor numbers.

Stowe House is one of the finest 18th century houses in the world and constitutes the grandest temple in the world famous landscape gardens. A visitor attraction since the 18th century, Stowe House is one of the greatest and most imitated estates in Europe. It is an architectural masterpiece on an immense and palatial scale which has inspired countless artists, architects and poets. The House includes the work of a number of leading 18th century designers, notably Sir John Vanbrugh, Robert Adam, James Gibbs, William Kent and Sir John Soane.

Restoration Plans

The Stowe House Preservation Plan envisaged a phased restoration of the building within the Grade I curtilage as defined in the lease. In order to fundraise for and manage restoration projects, the Charity holds the Grade I listed Ducal Palace on a long lease from Stowe School, to whom the property is leased back for daily use. Successive restoration projects have enabled more visitors to experience the exceptional architecture while also showcasing the work of conservation professionals. Restoration work often reveals previously unknown details of the House and its history, which are then fully researched and documented for future reference. The Charity is committed to ensuring that the House is a beacon of accessibility, both intellectually and physically, to enable wider and more diverse audiences to appreciate the importance of this and other country houses to the Nation's history and identity. As outlined in the strategic plan, the restoration was originally envisaged in six phases:

- Phase 1 The North Front and Colonnades
- Phase 2 The Central Pavilion and South Portico
- Phase 3 The South Front
- Phase 4 Nugent House and Power House Yard
- Phase 5 Stables Courtyard
- Phase 6 The State Rooms

Progress to Date: Work began in 2000 and, to date, the Charity has spent some £24m. Over time, the above phases have become blurred as work has been undertaken in response to preferences of individual donors. The Marble Saloon was subsumed into phase 2 and the Library into Phase 3 to meet, respectively, a donor request and a programming necessity. The South Front balustrade, removed from Phase 3 through a lack of immediate funding, was completed in 2013 as part of a project to return the Medici Lions to the South Front and re-instate the vases that once adorned the piers of the balustrade. Of the State Room restoration, the Music Room, Egyptian Hall and Blue Room have all been completed, leaving the western suite of State Rooms as the last major project which requires further funding. The two courtyards remain as unfunded and unplanned work as these are areas where public access is limited, although Stowe School is carrying out improvement works to the Stable Courtyard as part of a project to change the use of that area. In addition, the Charity has raised funds for and delivered a much improved area for visitor reception and orientation in a former cellar and an education room.

<u>Highlights of the Year</u>: This year has seen another significant milestone in the restoration of the North Hall which, despite the conservation of William Kent's spectacular painted ceiling in 2014, remained a rather functional space. The project involved the replacement of inappropriate terrazzo flooring and redecoration of the walls and woodwork in a historically accurate shade of stone colour. As the Charity often cannot furnish the House with period artefacts, statuary offers an opportunity to recreate some of the atmosphere of the House in its heyday. Earlier in the year, copies of six more classical statues were installed in the south portico overlooking the landscape garden.

<u>Future Plans</u>: Statuary is a key element of plans for the coming year. The crowning glory of the North Hall project will be the installation of an exact copy in bronze of Carbonneau's statue of the Trojan priest Laocoön that left Stowe following the sale of 1848. The Charity hopes to obtain copies of two further stone statues to complete the south portico project and a bronze Mercury plus replica stone busts for North Hall. The greater part of the year will be spent in continuing to plan and starting work on the last remaining unrestored state rooms, the western suite, comprising the former State Drawing Room, the State Dining Room and the small dining room. The discovery of a lost painted decorative scheme on the east stairs has added a further project that will extend the scope and content of the overall restoration programme and, subject to funding, it is hoped to pursue investigative work and academic research in this area during the coming year. Repair and maintenance demands will also be met.

Application of Resources: The highest priority for the previous year was to generate sufficient funding to sustain the condition of the fabric of the Mansion (maintenance) and to enable its continued presentation to future generations (restoration projects). Funds allocated to future maintenance increased to £500,000 at the end of March 2019, in line with the target set in the strategic plan, whilst ensuring all necessary maintenance in the year has been completed. Restoration projects in the year have been funded by donations and grants. The target for the period to 2023 is to raise £4m, which will enable further restoration work while also securing funds for future maintenance.

<u>Visitor Experience</u>: Raising the profile and awareness of Stowe House as a visitor attraction continues to be of high importance. New visitor facilities were opened in the Mansion in August 2015 following completion of a project largely funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and will require an update to improve coherence with the State Rooms and to ensure that the technology is still reliable. This work will be scheduled for completion during the western suite project. Interpretation continues to develop and coherence between house and gardens is fundamental to the visitor experience and understanding of the estate as a whole.

<u>Community Outreach</u>: Community outreach is at the heart of the Charity's plans for presentation of Stowe House and seeks to offer large-scale, cross-curricular projects to primary schools and to provide opportunities for families and diverse audiences to discover the significance of heritage through engaging activities. Volunteers within the Stowe Ambassador programme deliver talks to local groups to promote wider understanding of the significance of Stowe House locally and nationally.

<u>Archive and Research</u>: Improved access to archive material and wider opportunities has been developed in support of research, both to meet the Charity's own requirements and in response to external interest.

<u>Public Benefit</u>: The Trust provides a benefit to the public by allowing visitors from all over the world to enjoy access to Stowe House, a building of immense grandeur and beauty, whose international importance is well established. The number of visitors viewing the House during the year through the purchase of tickets was 11,430 (2018: 10,622). In addition 9,379 (2018: 6,536) visitors contributed income through commercial events.

Events: The turnover of the trading subsidiary increased to £207,159 (2018: £165,128) and the donated sum to the net income of the charity to £87,953 (2018: £55,288). Donations raised by the Trust were £367,010 (2018: £152,377).

<u>Volunteer Staff:</u> Volunteers continue to give valuable support to the visitor experience and, without them, it would not be possible to operate the house as a heritage attraction. The level of customer service and quality of visitor experience has risen again this year and the morale of the volunteers has been sustained by social events and professional enrichment visits as well as more formal training. 59 volunteers offered their services during 2019 (2018: 66).

<u>Partnership:</u> The Stowe House Preservation Trust continues to work closely with its partners on the Stowe site, Stowe School Limited and The National Trust, on the restoration of the House and improving the visitor experience in the House and Landscape Gardens. Stowe School Limited continues to subsidise a number of The Stowe House Preservation Trust's administrative and support functions.

<u>Fundraising</u>: The Development Executive consultant continues to work closely with the Chief Executive Officer. They have reported monthly to the Chairman of Trustees to ensure regulatory compliance with the Charities Act 2011 and the Charities (Protection and Social Investment) Act 2016, the Data Protection Act 1998 and the General Data Protection Regulations 2018 (GDPR) in order to protect the public. The Development Executive consultant agrees to comply with the code of ethics published by the Institute of Fundraising.

Fundraising activities and compliance has been included in reports to trustees' meetings. A privacy policy has been completed for GDPR. Compliance of fundraising activities continues to be overseen by the Chief Executive Officer. We have received no complaints during the year.

FUTURE PLANS

The main objectives for the forthcoming year are to:

- Successfully and safely install the replica of the Laocoön group in North Hall.
- Complete the lighting installation in the Egyptian Hall.
- Gain Listed Building Consent for complete uncovering of the painted decorative scheme on the Eastern Grand Staircase while continuing to support further research into the scheme.
- Develop further the outreach activities and deliver the first steps in a strategic plan for outreach and education.
- Continue research into the whereabouts of artefacts sold in the two great sales at Stowe and progress loans where possible.
- Submit Listed Building Consent to install a copy of the Marine Venus in the Music Room.
- Secure Listed Building Consent for the Western Suite restoration, initiate tender action and appoint contractors for a start date of May 2020.
- Continue to populate the collections management system.
- Continue to work with the National Trust to widen access to all archival records held on site.
- Grow the maintenance earmark by a further 10%.

FINANCIAL REVIEW AND RESULTS FOR THE YEAR

Financial Results

The net income for the year was £310,422 (2018:net expenditure £224,147).

Principal funding sources for the year were from the Mellon Estate, Country Houses Foundation and individual private donations.

Further restoration work was carried out and £514,050 was capitalised during the year (2018: £108,196).

The accounts are prepared on an accruals basis and, as required, the restoration work is capitalised and will therefore be reflected in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) over the period of its useful economic life by way of depreciation charges.

Reserves Policy

At 31 March 2019 the total unrestricted funds were £2,206,528 (2018: £2,113,545) and the restricted fund was £19,640,158 (2018: £19,422,719).

Part of the unrestricted funds is set aside as a designated fund to reflect the extent to which unrestricted donations have been committed to complement restricted grants and restricted donations, for expenditure on specific restoration work. The designated fund was £1,454,447 (2018: £1,457,291) and the general unrestricted fund was £752,081 (2018: £656,254).

£500,000 of the general unrestricted fund has been earmarked to cover future maintenance and repair of completed restoration work. The remaining balance of the general unrestricted fund is there to be utilised for the continued operation of the charity including the support of restoration projects and the purchase of artefacts.

Trustees consider £1.1 million to be a sufficient level of general unrestricted funds for the continued operation of the charity including maintenance once the House has been fully restored; this target is set for 2023 in the strategic plan. The current shortfall is expected to be addressed by commercial activity through the Charity's subsidiary, unrestricted donations and rental income.

Investment Policy and Objectives

Until the Trust establishes sufficient funds for investment in financial instruments, the day to day management of cash surpluses is the responsibility of the Chief Executive Officer.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association upon incorporation on 30 June 1997 as amended by special resolution on 22 September 1999. The charity was registered on 26 November 1997.

Governance

The Charity's activities are controlled and governed by the trustees who meet regularly throughout the year. All members are trustees. Trustees' appointments are confirmed in Annual General Meetings. New trustees are recruited based on skills and experience needed to cover the full range of the Charity's responsibility and appointed by the trustees. The number of trustees connected with Stowe School is not to exceed one third of the total number of trustees.

The trustees are responsible for the overall management and control of the Trust and meet formally four times a year to receive reports from the Chief Executive who is responsible for implementing their policies and coordinating the work of the Project Management Teams and professional advisers and, through them, the appointed contractors.

The Trust has a wholly owned trading subsidiary, Stowe House Enterprises Limited, which donates all its profits to the Trust.

Key Management Personnel Remuneration

All trustees give their time freely and no trustee remuneration was paid in the year. Details of trustee expenses and related party transactions are disclosed in the accounts.

Trustees are required to disclose all relevant interests in accordance with our policy and withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises.

Key management personnel is considered to be the charity's Chief Executive. Their pay is reviewed annually and is subject to performance and market forces, using a performance and pay matrix.

Training of Trustees

New trustees are encouraged to take part in an induction into the workings of the Charity through a visit programme, discussion, and an introductory pack. Trustees also have access to ongoing training and a portal gives access to a discrete area of the website housing significant documents and records for their information.

Lease Arrangements

Stowe House is leased to The Stowe House Preservation Trust with a coterminous leaseback to Stowe School Ltd for 99 years effective from 1 January 2000. The arrangements were confirmed under Charity Order 0149530D dated 10 November 1999. The cost of the acquisition of the lease was nil. An open market valuation could not be determined and there is an extensive repairing obligation. The trustees therefore included the acquisition at cost.

Risk Management

Trustees have examined the principal areas of the Trust's operations and considered the major risks that may arise in the categories of: projects, catastrophe, finance, compliance, visitor experience, operational, archive and reputational. Each category is sub divided into specific risks which consider its effect, probability, impact, mitigation and is allocated an owner. These risks are recorded in a register which is updated by the chief executive officer and reviewed by the trustees annually.

The key risks identified by the trustees are:

- Catastrophe e.g. fire.
 - o Mitigation Regular review of fire risk management which includes a salvage plan.
- Restoration project funding.
 - o Mitigation Phasing and scale down of works in line with funding.
- Asbestos.
 - Mitigation Managed in accordance with procedures and recorded on an asbestos register.
- Sourcing of restoration materials.
 - Mitigation Ensure ethical sourcing and allow lead time for timely procurement.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees (who are also directors of The Stowe House Preservation Trust for the purpose of company law) are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report (incorporating the directors' report) and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Opinion

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2019

Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

The Stowe House Preservation Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

There are no material uncertainties about the Trust's ability to continue as a going concern.

The presentation currency is £ sterling.

Group Financial Statements

These financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly-owned subsidiary Stowe House Enterprises Limited (SHEL) on a line by line basis. The summarised income statement and statement of financial position of SHEL are given in note 3.

Fund accounting

The charity's general fund consists of funds which the charity may use for its purpose at its discretion. Trustees recognise that part of the unrestricted funds comprise voluntary sector income that has been utilised as partnership funding in the restoration work fixed assets. They have therefore created a designated fund to recognise this. The charity's restricted funds are those where the donor has imposed restrictions on the use of the funds.

Income recognition

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations and voluntary income are recorded as incoming resources on a receivable basis. Income tax recoverable on covenanted giving and Gift Aid donations is accounted for in the year of receipt of the associated income on an accruals basis.

Grants receivable are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) in the year for which they are receivable, to the extent that the costs to which the grant relates are incurred. Where grants are received for future periods these are carried forward as deferred income. The grants are for the restoration costs of Stowe House which are capitalised. The grants are held in a restricted fund which will be amortised in line with the depreciation of the restoration costs.

Income from bank deposits and from the leasing of property are included in the SOFA in the year in which they are receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank. All investment income arises from investments in the United Kingdom.

In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time is not recognised. Please refer to the Trustee Report for more information about their contribution.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2019

Accounting policies continued

Expenditure recognition

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measure reliably.

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis, and includes non-recoverable VAT where applicable. Costs have been directly attributed to one of the functional categories of resources expended in the SOFA as follows:

Cost of generating funds includes the Subsidiary's trading costs.

Expenditure on Charitable activities includes the costs of depreciating the restoration work capitalised, their associated support costs and governance costs.

Heritage assets

The restoration costs of Stowe House are capitalised as appropriate and written off over a period of expected useful life of 75 years from completion of the project. The "Medici" Lions are amortised over 50 years, display costs for the Welcome Centre and Interpretation Centre are depreciated over 15 years and furniture and equipment costs for the Welcome Centre and Interpretation Centre are depreciated over 5 years.

No depreciation is provided until the particular section of a phase of the restoration phase is complete.

Impairment Reviews

Impairment reviews are undertaken on an annual basis and expenditure on repairs is accounted for when incurred.

Financial Instruments

The Charity only has financial assests and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to sell. Provision is made for obsolete, slow moving or defective items where appropriate. When stocks are sold, the carrying amount of stock is recognised as an expense in the period in which the related revenue is recognised.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit account or similar account.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Operating Leases

Assets held under operating leases are not capitalised. The costs associated with hire rental are charged directly to income as they arise.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2019

Accounting policies continued

Significant judgements and estimates

In the application of the Charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reveiwed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

1) Legal status of the Trust

The Trust is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the charity. Its Registered Office and principal place of business is Stowe House, Stowe, Buckingham.

Stowe House is leased to The Stowe House Preservation Trust with a coterminous leaseback to Stowe School Ltd for 99 years effective from 1 January 2000. The arrangements were confirmed under Charity Order 0149530D dated 10 November 1999. The cost of the acquisition of the lease was nil. An open market valuation could not be determined and there is an extensive repairing obligation. The trustees therefore included the acquisition at cost. A valuation of the lease cannot be obtained at a cost which is commensurate with the benefits to users of the financial statements.

Income relating to operating leases: Property

The house has been leased from Stowe School Ltd, with a coterminous leaseback to Stowe School Ltd for 99 years, effective from 1 January 2000 (no break clauses). The arrangements were confirmed under Charity Order 0149530D dated 10 November 1999.

The lease charge represents the rent income from Stowe School Ltd for the School's occupation of Stowe House. The lease charge is reviewed every five years (next review 2023); the income for the year is £155,162 (2018: £142,085).

The total minimum lease payments remaining on this lease are £8 million, over the remaining 80 years.

15) Contingent Liability

Trustees are not aware of any contingent liabilities.

16) Other Commitments

Trustees agreed in July 2011 to offer support to The Hall Bequest Fund, in the form of advancing a loan, up to a maximum of £25,000, to be repaid within three months. Any loan would have to be for a specific purpose i.e. to purchase artefacts relevant to the history of the House. This offer is still in place but has not been used in year.

17) Custodian Trusteeship

19) Related party transactions

Stowe School Ltd (SSL), a charity with three trustees in common, holds the underlease on Stowe House and granted the leasehold interest to The Stowe House Preservation Trust (SHPT) out of its freehold interest. The lease has arrangements for the payment of market rent by SSL. SSL recharged costs to SHPT totalling £97,722 (2018: £108,131), and SHPT has received rent of £155,162 (2018: £142,085), with a balance due to SSL at 31st March 2019 of £9,132 (2018: £8,048).

Stowe Enterprises Ltd (SEL) is a trading subsidiary of SSL and assists in the arrangements of commercial activities with Stowe House Enterprises Ltd (SHEL), the charity's subsidiary. Profits from these ventures are shared. SHEL has trading transactions with SEL amounting to sales of £102,886 (2018: £71,259) and purchases of £0 (2018: £303), with a net balance owed by SEL to SHEL at 31st March 2019 of £180 (2018: £610).

Stowe House Enterprises Ltd (SHEL) is the trading arm of The Stowe House Preservation Trust. At the balance sheet date SHPT was owed £7,679 by SHEL (2018: £9,590).

Certain trustees are trustees in both charities. The composition and control of the boards of trustees however remain independent of each other. All transactions between the related charities were on an arms length basis. There were donations from 2 trustees in the year totalling £210,842 (2018: £47,258).
