BOARD OF MANAGEMENT REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2010

The Board of Management, who are also directors, present their annual report together with the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2010

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Catholic Independent Schools Conference (CISC) was incorporated in 1997 as a company limited by guarantee (company number 3407765) and is also a registered charity (charity number 1063645) The governing document of the charity is the Memorandum and articles of Association

CISC is administered by the Board of Management, whose members are its directors and trustees for the purposes of Company and Charity Law respectively. The names of the members of the Board of Management are shown on page 1

The Board of Management is elected by the membership. Candidates must be full members Board members serve for a period of six years. The Board of Management elects the chairman of the board for a period of four years. Joseph Peake was elected Chairman on 1 March 2009.

When new trustees are appointed, they are given copies of the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the latest accounts, together with details of the operation of the charity. Trustees are all serving Heads and are responsible to their school governing bodies. As such they keep themselves informed of current issues relevant to charities as well as through discussion at Board meetings.

Day to day operations are managed by the General Secretary

Risk assessment

The trustees continue to monitor the risks faced by the charity and take any appropriate actions to mitigate those risks

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The objects of CISC are to promote education in Catholic independent schools – this is done by organising conferences, study days for the heads, governors and staff of these schools and regular meetings of groups of members, creating the opportunity to meet to discuss, analyse and consider common concerns and to disseminate the outcome of such meetings. Support is also given by phone, email and visits to schools by the General Secretary and by a newly set up mentoning scheme for new heads.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

This has been a successful year for CISC with a significant increase in the number of events being organised. There was a very successful annual conference in Harrogate in January 2010 and an increased number of Study Days are being organised. Governance is a key area and bringing together and supporting Governors as well as giving them practical help for appointing a new Head is a key function of CISC — an inspiring study day for Heads and Governors at St Mary's Ascot was organised. There is a need to nurture the next cohort of CISC Heads and a very successful day for Aspiring Heads was held at St Benedict's, Ealing. We are organising study days for colleagues in our schools who have a particular responsibility for the Catholic ethos — Chaplains, Directors of Music, Heads of Religious Studies/RS Co-ordinators. All teachers in our schools have a responsibility for Catholic ethos.

and Form Teachers have a very key role – a day is being organised to support all staff, whether or not they are Catholic – the success of our schools in fulfilling their aims depends on a shared understanding of Catholic ethos, it is important for CISC to facilitate this

There has been effective collaboration between the General Secretary of CISC and the Catholic Education Service especially when interfacing with the Department for Children Schools and Families with which there was an on-going series of meetings regarding Spiritual Moral Social and Cultural Education

The General Secretary has forged links with similar Christian educational organisations and those of other faiths. The vast majority of CISC schools are members of one of the five professional associations affiliated to ISC, CISC benefits greatly from having within its membership an increasing number of non-maintained Catholic Special Schools.

CISC supports the recruitment of young teachers into our schools and is represented at the Graduate Recruitment Fairs held at St Mary's College Twickenham and Liverpool Hope University

Katherine Jeffery (New Hall School), Gerard Hobern (Prior Park Preparatory School) and Lynne Renwick (Our Lady's Abingdon) joined the Committee on 1 March 2010 taking over from Adrian Aylward (Leweston School), Charles Foulds (Grace Dieu Manor Preparatory School) and Bridget Williams (Notre Dame Cobham Senior School) who have give much service to CISC

Four editions of CISC News were produced for all Members and Associates and sent to individuals and associations connected to CISC - the aim is to give a mixture of professionally useful content and news of members and schools

THE FUTURE

As well as expanding the provision of study days, a new website is being created which will both promote CISC schools to the general public and provide a means of communication and sharing between members increasing collaboration. CISC is also building resources to support Governors in our schools in the process of appointing a new head.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Conscious of financial pressures on schools, subscriptions and conference fees have been held fixed for four years. This has put pressure on CISC finances especially in a year when computer equipment needed replacing and there were the costs associated with a change of General Secretary. There was an operating deficit of £3,193 compared with a surplus of £21,199 in 2009, details of which are shown in the accounts. The main contributor to this change was a loss made on the conference owing to lower delegate numbers compared to a surplus in excess of £15k in 2009 owing to a high number of delegates. Given the healthy reserves, this is not an immediate concern but there is a need to bring income and expenditure into balance for ongoing financial health.

Reserves policy

The trustees continually monitor the free reserves of the charity. At 31 March 2010 free reserves totalled £134,205, which are defined as unrestricted funds less fixed assets (2009 £138,331). The trustees consider that reserves of between six and twelve months expenditure are required to ensure that the charity is able to meet its long term charitable objectives. As the total expenditure for the year under review was £133,910 the trustees are therefore satisfied that the level of free reserves at 31 March 2010 is sufficient.

Company law required the Board of Management to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Board of Management are required to

- · select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- · observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP,
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any
 material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The Board of Management are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1 Accounting Policies

The following policies have been used consistently in the preparation of the charity's financial statements

Basis of Preparation of the Financial Statements

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and on the going concern basis which assumes the company will continue in operational existence for the foreseeable. These accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Companies Act 2006 and in compliance with Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2005). Amendments have been made to the financial statements where necessary

Incoming Resources

Incoming Resources represent the total income receivable during the year comprising subscriptions, sponsorship and conference income. Subscriptions are accounted for in the year to which they relate

Resources Expended

Expenditure is charged to the income and expenditure account on the accruals basis. Management and administration consist of direct costs together with an allocation of indirect costs incurred in the management of the charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirement.

Depreciation of Tangible Assets

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off each asset over its estimated remaining life on a straight line basis at the following annual rates
