BOARD OF MANAGEMENT REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

The Board of Management, who are also directors, present their annual report together with the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2014.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Catholic Independent Schools Conference (CISC) was incorporated in 1997 as a company limited by guarantee (company number 3407765) and is also a registered charity (charity number 1063645). The governing document of the charity is the Memorandum and articles of Association.

CISC is administered by the Board of Management, whose members are its directors and trustees for the purposes of Company and Charity Law respectively. The names of the members of the Board of Management are shown on page 1.

The Board of Management is elected by the membership. Candidates must be full members. Board members serve for a period of six years. The Board of Management elects the chairman of the board for a period of four years. Joseph Peake was elected Chairman on 1 March 2009 and the committee have invited him to serve until January 2014 when Christopher Cleugh took over as Chairman.

When new trustees are appointed, they are given copies of the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the latest accounts, together with details of the operation of the charity. Trustees are all serving Heads and are responsible to their school governing bodies. As such they keep themselves informed of current issues relevant to charities as well as through discussion at Board meetings.

Day to day operations are managed by the General Secretary's office.

Risk assessment

The trustees continue to monitor the risks faced by the charity and take any appropriate actions to mitigate those risks.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The objects of CISC are to promote education in Catholic independent schools – this is done by organising conferences, study days and retreats, for heads, governors and staff of these schools and meetings of groups of members, creating the opportunity to meet to discuss, analyse and consider common concerns and to disseminate the outcome of such meetings. Support is also given from the office, and visits to schools by the Secretariat and by a mentoring scheme for new heads. Increasingly we are getting involved with creative collaborations with the Catholic maintained sector and other Christian denominations.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

This has been a year of significant development – the conference was inspirational, the programme of other activities including study days continues apace. Collaboration with the Catholic maintained sector is an important feature of our work – we played a full role in the organising of another National Retreat for Catholic Heads in June 2013 which is becoming established as an annual event and are very involved with the organising of the third national retreat in June 2014.

The new website presents our schools attractively and offers the media a source of stories on the outstanding work going on in our Catholic independent schools. A CISC flyer "Why Catholic Schools?"

has been produced. This has been very warmly received by Heads and the 15,000 copies were taken at the conference. This condenses the essence of a Catholic school into a limited number of words and images, which schools are using with prospective and current parents, new and existing staff and some on their website. Letters are sent to newspapers as appropriate.

We continue to work collaboratively with the Catholic Education Service and have had meetings with the new leadership. We greatly appreciate the alertness with which they respond to Government consultations which impact on Catholic education.

A greater level of support for individual schools in a variety of ways has been given either by secretariat themselves or co-ordinated using expertise of member schools, especially in supporting governors with headship appointments.

More schools have joined CISC taking membership to within five schools of the potential number in the UK (97%) and we have started to have Catholic independent schools in the Republic of Ireland in membership.

The conference "Let us begin this journey...of fraternity, of trust between us", caught the spirit of Pope Francis and explored, and indeed at times demonstrated, what Catholic schools are being called to do. We are aiming to develop the study day programme so that key groups like Heads of RS and Chaplains come together regularly; the Directors of Music model this - they had another very successful day at St Edmund's College in September 2013. There was a very thought-provoking day for Heads and Governors at St George's Weybridge which attracted around 100 delegates. As in all of these days, it is the bringing together and sharing ideas of those performing similar roles in our schools that is so helpful. The CISC Christmas Card Competition attracted its strongest entry to date highlighting outstanding artistic talent in CISC schools.

There were good meetings of a group of non-maintained and independent Catholic Special Schools Heads - with the background of cuts to funding in Local Authorities, this is a challenging time for them. CES are being proactive is espousing their cause – the schools do fantastic work for the most vulnerable and challenging young people in our country – all they want is a level playing field.

CISC supports the recruitment of young teachers into our schools at Graduate Recruitment Fairs at St Mary's University College, Twickenham, and Liverpool Hope University.

We welcomed Antony Hudson (St George's College Junior School) and Michael Kennedy (St Mary's College, Crosby) to the committee. They have come in to replace Stephanie Bell and Joe Peake both of whom have given valuable service to CISC, especially Joe whom has led CISC with great distinction over the last five years.

In addition to a regular stream of news articles on the website, termly editions of CISC News were produced for all full and associate members and sent to individuals and organisations connected to CISC - the aim is to celebrate and inspire readers and to highlight notable activities and achievements within CISC and its schools. Most articles were also published in Networking, giving CISC and its schools a wider profile.

THE FUTURE

It has become clear that there is a need to be proactive in developing middle and senior leaders in our schools so that more are encouraged and better prepared for leadership of a Catholic school; we judge that this should be a major area of work for CISC in the future. Initially a day for Aspiring Leaders of Catholic Schools will be put on in 2015 but it is intended to develop a programme which will support and encourage potential leaders.

We seek to extend the range of study days. It is important that RE teaching is our schools is dynamic and challenging. - a day for RE teachers has been planned, "Academic Rigour in Religious Education" led by Peter Vardy at Marymount International School, Kingston-upon-Thames. Art is a key aspect of the education of our young people - a Study Day for those with responsibility for Art and History of Art at St Leonards-Mayfield, will hopefully inspire attendees with new ideas to take back to their

schools. Our collaboration with the Jesuit Institute offers a greater range of opportunities around the country bringing valuable training closer to more schools.

With the many pressures on Heads and the spiritual leadership they are expected to provide in their schools, which play a more important role than ever in the formation of young people, supporting Heads spiritually is an important need. This is a fruitful area of collaboration with the maintained sector and the National Retreat for Catholic Heads led by Fr Christopher Jamison OSB was a great success. Those who have experienced these retreats recognise a deep need they fulfil; the next national retreat, to be led by Fr Timothy Radcliffe OP, will be on 12-13 June 2014 near Stratford-upon-Avon - CISC is very involved with the organisation.

In order to help Heads sustain the benefits of the retreat, regular meetings with a spiritual guide within easy reach of school/home have been set up for those who expressed a desire;; CISC plays a key role in this. In order to meet the demand for spiritual guides, it is necessary to train more - a joint project with the Jesuit Institute, funded by EducareM, called the Emmaus Project, has been initiated. It will start in May 2014 with two pilot courses in London and Manchester last 9 months. We are very grateful for the support and professionalism of the Jesuit Institute who will run these courses and supervise the practice in subsequent years.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

With a highly successful conference, increased sponsorship and donation to CISC, we have moved from breakeven last year to a surplus of over £24k. This is timely given the increased costs associated with our 25th anniversary in 2015. There will be on-going increased costs as we seek to extend our activities further. Given the healthy reserves, we are in a strong position to do this.

Reserves policy

The trustees continually monitor the free reserves of the charity. At 31 March 2014 free reserves totalled £174,693, which are defined as unrestricted funds less fixed assets (2013: £149,907). The trustees consider that reserves of between six and twelve months expenditure are required to ensure that the charity is able to meet its long term charitable objectives. As the total expenditure for the year under review was £151k, the trustees are therefore satisfied that the level of free reserves at 31 March 2014 is sufficient.

Public Benefit

We have referred to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the Board of Management have considered how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.
