TRUSTEES' REPORT For the year ended 30 June 2005

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and the financial statements of Emmaus Greenwich (the charity) for the ended 30 June 2005. The trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2000.

Constitution policies and objectives

The charity is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 20 August 1997.

The principal object of the charity is to provide homeless and unemployed people with a home, meaningful work, companionship and a chance to regain self-respect. Each Emmaus Community combines residential accommodation with a business based on the collection and sale of donated goods, as well as refurbishment and recycling. Members, known as Companions, have the opportunity, regardless of ability or skills, to help themselves through work, and thereby rediscover their self-worth and take steps towards their own personal development and re-integration into society at large.

There have been no changes in the objectives since the last report.

History and purpose of the Emmaus movement

The Emmaus movement began in France just after the Second World War. Abbé Pierre, a remarkable priest and former member of the French Parliament, opened his house to homeless and unemployed people, where they shared their daily life together, and earned their living by recycling and selling things that others had thrown away. There are now over 400 self-supporting, self-governing communities in 44 countries.

Emmaus Communities are open to anyone who is homeless and destitute. There are a few conditions: every Companion signs off income support or job seeker's allowance, and agrees to work to the best of their ability. Drink/drugs and violence are not allowed. Each Companion receives food, clothing, shelter and spending money, at present £32 per week plus a further £6 is saved for when they leave.

Emmaus Greenwich

The Community in Greenwich opened in April 1994 with a small group of Companions. The building, a former children's home, was renovated and adapted to provide a capacity of 15 rooms. HRH The Prince of Wales and Abbé Pierre officially opened the Community in November of the same year. Initially Emmaus Greenwich was part of Emmaus UK but became a charity in its own right from 1st November 1997.

Method of appointment or election of trustees

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

The current trustees are shown on page 1. The changes in trustees during the year and since are as follows:

Organisational structure, decision making and risk management

The Management Committee, consisting of one or two trustees plus the Community Leader, usually meets once a week. It is an opportunity to go over routine and non-routine business, discuss community events and problems, and work on advance planning. In this way any potentially damaging problem is quickly dealt with before it escalates. The Board of Trustees now meets every two months, with meetings of sub-committees (Finance, Development, Supporting People / Staff and Companion Development) held as required. The trustees continue to monitor the risks facing the charity and mitigate against the main risks where possible.

Review of activities and future developments

This year has brought us a number of challenges and changes, and Community Leader Mongi Khanyile's dedication and patience have provided the Community with the stability it needs to ensure a secure environment for Companions. Our Deputy Community Leader, Ita Lohan, who made a very valuable contribution to the life of the Community, left on Maternity Leave in December 2004 and gave birth to Danny in February 2005. She has decided not to return to work for the time being. Ruth O'Meara (who has since left to join Emmaus Dover) and Magdalena Basson provided support as Deputies, and everyone in the Community enjoyed celebrating Magdalena's marriage. Ruth also got engaged.

During the year the Community has been consistently at full capacity with 15 Companions. The Community benefited 66 homeless people during the year. On average 9% of the Companions stay in the Community for under a month, 29% range from one to 3 months, 48% from 3 to 12 months, 5% between 9 and 12 months and another 5% for over two years. In keeping with our objectives and Supporting People we helped 31 Companions into resettlement. Some moved on to jobs and independent accommodation, others went back to live with family and friends, and some moved to other Emmaus Communities. As part of our support plans, all Companions have one-to-one meetings with a staff member at regular intervals. We have been holding a Community Forum three times a year, which is attended by Companions, staff and trustees.

The new Supporting People policies, including the Welcome/Access Policy adopted in the previous year are now in place and have become routine, but do involve a lot of extra administrative paperwork. There has been some uncertainty over whether this funding would continue, following an unfavourable report from the SP officer who carried out his assessment in July 2004, which was vigorously and successfully challenged. At the time of writing it appears likely that, subject to our fulfilling certain conditions, we will be given a full 3-year contract, albeit with reduced funding, from 2006.

The shop has continued to perform well over the course of the year, with sales rising to around £5,000 per month by June 2005. We have been advertising for some time for a Workshop Manager, and in June 2005 Antonio Buonvino was appointed for a one-year contract. We are very grateful to South East London Foundation for partly funding this position, and it has been very satisfying to see the workshop put to good use again, and Companions learning new skills. Restored and repaired furniture has contributed to the rise in shop sales. Companions continue to do door-to-door leafleting, we advertise in some local magazines, and there has been some good press coverage in the local newspapers including an Emmaus UK fundraising campaign in the Daily Telegraph. We held a special sale for the benefit of Tsunami victims, which was publicised on local radio, and raised £600 which was donated in solidarity. We continue to take part in local events and fairs including the Plumstead Make Merry, Glyndon Annual Fair and the Danson Festival. The Community has committed to paint and redecorate a local church hall that is used for holding the Friday Feast for local homeless people.

One Companion was selected this year for two weeks' work experience with the solicitors, Freshfields. Every Companion in the Community undergoes training courses in Emergency First Aid as well as a Foundation Certificate in Food Hygiene. Twelve Companions have to date done the PAT Testing course with 60% passing. Three Companions have taken driving lessons with the help of a grant from the charity StreetSmart, whose grants partly contributed towards the driver's salary and also helped us to carry out repairs to the roof. In accordance with the conditions of our insurance, an independent asbestos survey was carried out and we did not receive any alarming results.

We have been planning for some time to make improvements to the shop and workshop areas, carry out repairs and refurbishment around the building, improve training for Companions and staff, open a second shop, and possibly expand the number of rooms, to accommodate a further ten Companions. During the course of 2005, we decided to concentrate on consolidation, refurbishment, training, and increasing our retail business, leaving expansion of the Community for a later date. The Oak Foundation, who had previously offered us a grant of £200,000 (conditional on producing equivalent match funding) as part of a development and expansion programme, invited us to re-submit our application to reflect our change of focus. This re-application was turned down in November 2005. We have in the meantime decided to re-organise the management structure of the community, and employ a General Manager, who would take responsibility for business and management matters, thus reducing the trustees' workload, and that of the Community Leader, enabling him to concentrate more on Companion support and training. Plans to employ a fundraiser for one year have been put on hold until our new management structure is in place.

There continues to be a need for more move-on accommodation, and many people have requested that we investigate the idea of a 'halfway-house' as a stepping stone towards totally independent living. We would like to improve training and work experience opportunities for Companions, and also provide more training for staff, for example in areas such as mental health and drug and alcohol addiction.

We would like to record our thanks to all Companions and staff and volunteers for their contribution to the stability of the Community and a very successful year's trading. Thanks are also due to:

During the year we welcomed representatives from the ODPM, Grand Charity, Carpenters Company, St. Mungo's, Persula Foundation, All China Youth Federation, Shaks Gosh of CRISIS and the Duke of Westminster, and many others.

We were also invited to No. 10 Downing Street to receive a turkey for Christmas from Cherie Booth. The Community enjoyed this immensely and sent their appreciation.

Emmaus UK and Emmaus International

As a member of the national organisation we have benefited from advice and assistance on a number of matters including Supporting People, Housing Benefit, recruitment and training, and we are grateful to the Emmaus UK staff for their readily available assistance. Being the only Emmaus Community in London, we play a crucial role in the development and growth of Emmaus by welcoming visitors and potential funders for other Emmaus Communities and Groups.

We work in partnership with Emmaus South Lambeth which is due to open in 2007, and have been taking part in the preliminary meetings of the London Regional Partnership, organised by Emmaus UK. We are in the process of applying to join Emmaus International.

Reserves policy

The majority of the charity's funds are invested in the Community's premises, vehicles and equipment for continuing use in the charity.

The charity's policy is to strive to break-even on a year by year basis, after providing for the maintenance of the charity's property to a good standard.

The trustees have set up a Development Fund of £40,000 for expansion and improvement of the charity's accommodation and business premises.

The trustees also strive to hold contingency reserves representing approximately three months' operating expenditure and the annual insurance premium (approximately £50,000). They believe that this level of free reserves is sufficient.

As at the end of the financial year the extent of free reserves held as cash and working capital was £48,780. There is no residual reserve at the year end in excess of the contingency.

Risk management

Risks are constantly under review. Policies are complied with on a daily basis, trustees regularly examine the policies, and one trustee has responsibility for Risk Assessment.

Financial controls in are place which are monitored according to Charity Commission guidelines, and we carry out regular reviews of our Health and Safety policy.

Trustees' responsibilities

Company and charity law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit of the charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements the trustees have:

- selected suitable accounting policies and applied them consistently;
- made judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- stated whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures
 disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis (unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation).

The trustees have overall responsibility for ensuring that the charity has an appropriate system of controls, financial and otherwise. They are also responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the detection and prevention of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 30 June 2005

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in October 2000, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985.

1.2 Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the charity are the trustees named on page 1. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Gifts in kind donated for distribution are included at valuation and recognised as income when they are distributed to the projects. Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold. Donated facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 30 June 2005

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.5 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Fund-raising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management carried out at Headquarters. Management and administration costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.6 Cash flow

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the charity, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002).

1.7 Turnover

Turnover comprises the invoiced value of goods and services supplied by the charity, exclusive of Value Added Tax and trade discounts.

1.8 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Leasehold property - 2% straight line
Motor vehicles - 25% straight line
Fixtures and fittings - 20-30% straight line

The Repair Fund represents a donation from StreetSmart to fund building repairs. This donation has now been used for its intended purpose.

The Salary Fund represents grants from Office of the Deputy Prime Minister (ODPM) of £15,490, South East London Community Foundation (SELF) of £1,406 and StreetSmart of £8,000. The grant from ODPM is to partially fund the salary of the Community Leader for one year, and has been expended in full. The grant from SELF is to partially fund the salary of a Workshop Supervisor, and has been expended during the year. The balance of the original grant from SELF of £7,594 has been carried forward in deferred income at 30 June 2005, and will be released to income against future salary costs in due course. The grant from StreetSmart is to fund the salary of a van driver and driver training for Companions, and has been expended in full.

In addition to the above, the charity received a grant from Emmaus UK during the year of £30,000 to fund the salary and associated costs of a Project Worker. The Project Worker is due to commence employment in February 2006, and as such the income has been carried forward in deferred income as at 30 June 2005.
