### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### **Governing Document**

The Vale of Aylesbury Vineyard Christian Fellowship was established in September 1997 and is controlled by its governance document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association It constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006 and does not have a share capital. It is a registered charity, number 1064215

### **Organisation Structure**

A board of trustees of up to 6 members, who meet quarterly, administers the charity. These trustees are stewards of the church's resources, facilitate the achievement of the mission, give advice and counsel in matters pertaining to employment, property, finance, insurance and risk management. Day to day management decisions are made by the Senior Pastor in consultation with the trustees

The Vale of Aylesbury Vineyard Christian Fellowship is part of the Association of Vineyard Churches UK. The Association is there primarily to support the charity but has minimal bureaucracy and states that the local church should be free to express and govern itself, within the context of the values and theology of the Vineyard. This means the church enjoys local autonomy, is a registered charitable organisation in its own right and able to establish its own policies and priorities

### **Related Parties**

The charity does not have any relationships with other charities or organisations who co-operate in the pursuit of charitable objectives

### Risk Management

The trustees have examined the major strategic, business and operation risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen the risks

### Risk Management (Continued)

We have a dedicated child officer and an assistant in place who overseas this area of risk and maintains up to date registration

Our fire alarm system, having been upgraded, is inspected regularly by our service contractors.

We also continue to PAT test electrical items that are donated to us before giving them away through our storehouse project

We continue to monitor numbers in the building and any associated risks with the ministry of storehouse, including lifting furniture and personal safety

### Recruitment and Appointment of New Trustees

The power of appointment and removal of trustees rests with the existing trustees. On being appointed new trustees spend time with the existing trustees to ensure they understand their responsibilities and the legal and financial framework in which the ministry operates. For reference all trustees are issued with the Charity Commissions publication "The Essential Trustee. What you need to know" June 2005

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The principal objectives of the Vale of Aylesbury Vineyard Christian Fellowship as stated in its Memorandum and Articles of Association is the advancement of the Christian Faith missionary activities in the United Kingdom and overseas and also including, but not limited to, the planting of new churches and organisations of congregations

It is also established for the relief of the poor and needy, sick and elderly, the furtherance of religious or secular public education and other such charitable objectives and for the benefit of such other charitable bodies and institutions as the committee shall, in the absolute discretion, see fit

### ACHIEVMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable Activities and Future Plans

This financial year, we have again been blessed as a church. We have seen more new people coming to our Sunday services although again, we have had some people move on. Attendance at our midweek groups has increased slightly during the year.

Our youth event "Warehouse" continues to go from strength to strength, with more young people attending, getting saved and healed and filled with the Holy Spirit, and enjoying the experience

Throughout the year we have been regularly going out on the streets of Aylesbury to pray for healing for anyone who wants it, and have been encouraged by the number of people we have seen God touch and heal, and a good number of people have given their lives to Christ

Our regular activities have continued and within our Storehouse project, which provides food, furniture and children's clothing for the poor in our community, this year we have helped over 3360 children and families (Figure includes some multiple visits) We have also given away some 500 bags of free food and over 3496 items of furniture

# TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2010

### Charitable Activities and Future Plans (continued)

Various courses, such as Alpha, and leaders meetings and training events have been held at the Vineyard Centre, and we continue to bless the New Frontiers Church by letting them use main meeting room once a month for the leaders' meetings too

We have also helped further develop our Storehouse Project volunteers by having on-going in-house training, such as developing listening skills

The annual Vineyard Leaders Conference at Bognor was very interesting with a number from our church attending. The time was spent worshipping, praying, listening to God's word, as well as hanging out together over food and drinks, and seeing old friends from around the country, made this a very special time.

For the first time we invited our leaders to attend a live link Willow global leadership summit held at St Albans Vineyard. It was a great time with inspiring speakers (including Tony Blair) teaching on good leadership principles. Over the course of the year we were in negotiations to purchase the old ATG building at a price of £450,000. We were busy with the bank, the planners and various other agencies, and happily we managed to complete before the year end

We are very excited about all the possibilities this will give us to bless our community, develop more ministries and give us a home for our Sunday services

In February, to keep us up to speed, we had a trustees training day with Peter Sturrock, who helped us in the whole area of legal implications of trusteeship, and the ever changing rules and guidelines affecting charities

Over the summer many of the families from the church attended the annual New Wine conference, and our youngsters went to Soul Survivor A good time was had by all, with some giving their lives to Jesus for the first time

From March to June, senior pastors, Mick and Lynn, took a well earned sabbatical, leaving Mark, Viv and Ellie to run the church (which they did extremely well) It was for Mick and Lynn a time of rest, refreshing and re-envisioning for the next ten years! They visited Israel, Mick travelled to Northern Ireland with Nigel Carman to serve Mark Marx, and Lynn travelled with Sue Jane to India to visit Andi Wright serving in a training school in Dakar

A good number of people from the church continue to support Tim, Maz and Aaron in South Africa, both financially and practically, visiting from time to time

We have also been involved working with other churches in the town blessing our community with acts of kindness, as well as worshipping and praying together

As a leadership we are overseeing 2 Vineyard churches, and are thrilled that the church we are monitoring for adoption has now become a Vineyard in its own right

We have also begun to investigate a new ministry called Sozo to replace current Steps Ministry, and are excited at the prospect of this very effective tool. In September we had Mark Stibbe come and do a conference for the Aylesbury churches on the Fathers' heart, which was very healing for those who attended, and we hope to have him again next year. We ended the year combining our birthday party with a fund raising barn dance for Thembalitsa. It was great fun and raised over £1,000 for the charity

### Public Benefit

The Trustees have had regard for the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and the activities carried out above are consistent with these reimbursements. In particular, the Storehouse Project has assisted the poor community and the church activities have sought to meet the religious needs of the local community.

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

### Giving and Reserves Policy

The Vale of Aylesbury Vineyard Christian Fellowship has an ongoing priority when income is received from any source to set aside no less than 10% in accordance with the Word of God. This tithe creates a fund which has been used to extend the Kingdom of God in the following ways

- \* Church Planting and Renewal
  This money has been given to Vineyard Churches UK to support evangelism, church planting and ministry to the
  poor
- \* Other Ministries
  Over the course of the year we have supported the Vineyard Church in Oxford, Aylesbury Vale Youth for Christ,
  Aylesbury Church Network, Hannah Wilkes, Sally Sargeant, Mark Marx, Soul Survivor, Cuddington Methodist
  Church, Andi Wright in India and Themballisha in South Africa

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the charity. Normally each year 5% of the charity's income is placed into a separate growth fund, but because of our reduced general income this year it hasn't happened. However our reserves are still healthy. This fund provides sufficient funds to cover management and administration and support costs and also provides.

- \* Funds to restructure the charity in the event of the income sharply dropping
- \* 6 months foundation for security of ministry and to meet contractual obligation

A minimum unrestricted fund reserve of £90,000 is required to meet the above objectives and the total unrestricted funds at 30 September 2010 were £156,281 (2009 £164,680) giving a margin available should income drop again during the coming year

At 30 September 2009 the accumulated funds were £461,958 and these have increased to £561,493, by 30 September 2010, of which £405,212 (2009 £297,278) were restricted funds. The trustees have ensured that there are adequate funds in reserve to carry out the purposes of the charity

The financial statements have been prepared on the accounting policies set out in the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association and comply with applicable laws, and the requirement of the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2006

### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The main strategies for the ministry for the next year are to continue and build on the present ministries and to look for additional growth in committed memberships

#### RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

The trustees (who are also the directors of the Vale of Aylesbury Vineyard Christian Fellowship for the purpose of the law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the Financial Statements in accordance with applicable law and the United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2010

### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### 1.1 Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)

#### 1.2 Grants

Grants are included on the statement of financial activities when they are received

### 1.3 Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor when funds are raised for particular purposes Expenditure meeting the criteria for restricted funds is charged to the fund

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements

### 1.4 Resources Expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis, and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. All costs have been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributable to particular heading they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

### 1.5 Fixed Assets

Individual assets over £100 are capitalised in the financial statements

### 1.6 Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows

### 1.7 Stocks

#### 1.8 Operating Lease Agreements

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

#### 1.9 Pension Costs

The charitable company operates a defined contributions pension scheme Contributions payable for the year are charged in the Statement of Financial Activity

### 1.10 Value Added Tax

The charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT

### 1.11 Gifts in Kind

Fixed assets donated to the charity are included as donation income at market value at the time of receipt Donated facilities are included as donation at the value to the charity where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by a volunteer

### 1.12 Taxation

The charity is exempt for corporation tax on its charitable activities

### 1.13 Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included on the statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. All income is accounted for gross
