STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Vale of Aylesbury Vineyard Christian Fellowship was established in September 1997 and is controlled by its governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association It constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006 and does not have a share capital. It is a registered charity number 1064215

Report of the Trustees For the Year Ended 30th September 2009

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The power of appointment and removal of trustees rests with the existing trustees. On being appointed new trustees spend time with the existing trustees to ensure they understand their responsibilities and the legal and financial framework in which the ministry operates. For reference all trustees are issued with the Charity Commissions publication 'The Essential Trustee. What you need to know' June 2005

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

A board of trustees of up to 6 members, who meet quarterly, administers the charity. These trustees are stewards of the church's resources, facilitate the achievement of the mission, give advice and counsel in matters pertaining to employment, property, finance, insurance and risk management. Day to day management decisions are made by the Senior Pastor in consultation where necessary with the Trustees.

The Vale of Aylesbury Vineyard Christian Fellowship is part of the Association of Vineyard Churches UK. The Association is there primarily to support the charity but has minimal bureaucracy and states that the local church should be free to express and govern itself, within the context of the values and theology of the Vineyard. This means the church enjoys local autonomy, is a registered charitable organisation in its own right and able to establish its own policies and priorities.

Related parties

The charity does not have any relationships with other charities or organisations who co-operate in the pursuit of our charitable objectives

Risk management

The trustees have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks

We have a dedicated child protection officer and an assistant in place who oversees this area of risk and maintains up to date registrations

Our fire alarm system having been upgraded is inspected regularly by our service contractors

We also continue to PAT test electrical items that are donated to us before giving them away through our storehouse project

We continue to monitor numbers in the building, and any associated risks with the ministry of Storehouse, including lifting furniture, and personal safety

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The principal objectives of the Vale of Aylesbury Vineyard Christian Fellowship as stated in its memorandum of association is the advancement of the Christian Faith including missionary activities in the United Kingdom and overseas and also including but not limited to the planting of new churches and organisations of congregations

It is also established for the relief of the poor and needy, sick and elderly, the furtherance of religious or secular public education and such other charitable objectives and for the benefit of such other charitable bodies and institutions as the Committee shall in their absolute discretion see fit

Report of the Trustees For the Year Ended 30th September 2009

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities and Future plans

This financial year, we have again been blessed as a church. We have seen more new people coming to our Sunday services although again, we have had some people move on. Attendance at our midweek groups has remained fairly static during the year.

Our Youth event "Warehouse" continues to go from strength to strength, with more young people attending, getting saved and healed and filled with the Holy Spirit, and enjoying the experience. We now have two youth groups meeting in homes, coming together monthly for celebration and ministry

Throughout the year we have been regularly going out on the streets of Aylesbury to pray for healing for anyone who wants it, and have been encouraged by the number of people we have seen God touch and heal, and a few people have given their lives to Christ. We are continuing to pray for more favour with the council to go out more often

Our regular activities have continued and within our Storehouse project, which provides food, furniture and children's clothing for the poor in our community, this year we have helped over 1700 children and families, (figure includes some multiple visits) We have also given away 600 bags of free food and delivered over 2500 items of furniture

Various courses and leaders meetings have been held at the Vineyard Centre, and we continue to bless the New Frontiers Church by letting them use our main meeting room once a month for their leaders meetings too

We have also helped further develop our Storehouse Project volunteers by having ongoing in-house training, such as developing listening skills

This year's leader's away day was great fun, again with Jamie Pennington, a motivational leadership speaker. We looked at how we can best handle change, and how different types of people react differently. It was very revealing about ourselves!

The annual Vineyard Leaders Conference at Hayling Island was a great success with a good number from our church attending. The time spent worshipping, praying, listening to Gods word, as well as hanging out together over food and drinks, and seeing many old friends from all over the country, made this a very special time.

Over the course of the year we were blessed by a number of visiting speakers, as well as taking ministry trips to other churches. Again we have been seeing an increase in Gods activity and more and more people are being healed. So "Thank you Jesus"

In November 2008, we identified a possible building which would be suitable for church premises as well as our storehouse and offices, and then in January we had a gift day and raised an incredible £145,000 in gifts and pledges. We also successfully applied for some grants towards the building and storehouse facility totalling £45,000.

We are currently applying for a mixed-use planning permission to enable us to carry on the ministries of the church, including our Sunday services. We are looking at acquiring a mortgage to finance the purchase, as well as having another gift day. So watch this space

Following on from Tim and Maz and Aaron moving out to South Africa, a good number of people from the church have paid them a visit, helping out with further building and decorating, as well as getting involved at the baby unit and in the townships working with the aids orphans and families. It has been a very helpful time, and very moving for the team, seeing firsthand the townships living conditions.

We also said goodbye to Andy as she moved to India to help with the training school at Dakar Vineyard. She will be greatly missed, but knows she is where God wants her to be at this time and she will be a huge blessing to the church there.

Two of our young people have gone to spend time serving the Lord in different locations. Hannah Wilkes is currently taking a gap year doing street work in inner London. And Sally Sargeant is at Boise Vineyard in Idaho USA studying and training there, and going back for a second year in December.

We have also been involved working with other churches in the town blessing our community with acts of kindness, as well as worshipping and praying together

As a leadership we are overseeing 3 Vineyard churches, and are thrilled that the church we were monitoring for adoption has now become a Vineyard in its own right

We ended the year with a party at the school, with live music, dancing, and the launch of our fabulous new website, of which I am extremely proud, and grateful for the immense amount of work willingly given by those gifted in IT

Public Benefit

The Trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and the activities carried out above are consistent with these requirements. In particular the storehouse project has assisted the poor in the community and the Church activities have sought to meet the religious needs of the local community.

Investment Powers

Under the memorandum and articles of association, the charity has the power to make any investment which the trustees see fit

Plans for the Next Year

The main strategies for the ministry for the next year are to continue and build on the present ministries and to look for additional growth in committed memberships

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Giving and Reserves policy

The Vale of Aylesbury Vineyard Christian Fellowship has an ongoing priority when income is received from any source to set aside not less than 10% in accordance with the Word of God. This tithe creates a fund which has been used to extend the Kingdom of God in the following ways.

- Church Planting and Renewal
 This money has been given to Vineyard Churches UK to support evangelism, church planting and ministry to the poor
- Other Ministries
 Over the course of the year we have supported the Vineyard Church in Oxford, Aylesbury Vale Youth for
 Christ, Aylesbury Church Network, Hannah Wilkes, Sally Sargeant, Mark Marx, Soul Survivor, Cuddington
 Methodist Church, Andi Wright in India, and Thembalitsha in South Africa

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the charity. Normally each year 5% of the charities income is placed into a separate growth fund, but because of our reduced general income this year it hasn't happened. However our reserves are still healthy

This fund provides sufficient funds to cover management and administration and support costs and also provides

- Funds to restructure the charity in the event of the income sharply dropping,
- 6 months foundation for security of ministry and to meet contractual obligations,

A minimum unrestricted fund reserve of £95,880 is required to meet the above objectives and the total unrestricted funds at 30th September 2009 were £161,990 giving a margin available should income drop during the coming year

FINANCIAL REVIEW

At 30th September 2008 the accumulated funds were £266,900 and these have increased to £461,958 by 30th September 2009, of which £297,278 were restricted funds

The trustees have ensured that there are adequate funds in reserve to carry out the purposes of the charity

The financial statements have been prepared on the accounting policies set out in its memorandum of association and comply with applicable law, and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees are responsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law) The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the surplus or deficit of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006 They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 30th September 2009

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statements of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities of March 2005 together with applicable accounting standards

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. All income is accounted for gross

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis, and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. All costs have been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual assets over £100 are capitalised in the accounts

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its useful economic life

Leasehold Property - over the period of the lease
Leasehold Improvements - over the period of the lease
Worship and Sound Equipment - 20% Reducing Balance
Furniture, Fixtures, Fittings and Equipment - 20% Reducing Balance
Computer Equipment - 40% Reducing Balance
Motor Vehicles - 25% Reducing Balance

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes Expenditure meeting the criteria of restricted funds is charged to the fund

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements

Pensions

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme Contributions payable for the year are charged in the Statement of Financial Activity

Value Added Tax

The charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT

Gifts in Kind

Fixed assets donated to the Charity are included as donation income at Market Value at the time of receipt Donated facilities are included as donation income at the value to the Charity where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost

No amounts are included in the financial statements for Gifts in Kind donated for distribution. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

Grants

Grants are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when they are received

Leasing Commitments

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the period of the lease
