### **Objectives of the Charity**

The Guild is established to promote, maintain, improve and advance education for the public benefit by promoting and encouraging the appreciation, knowledge and understanding of the art, history, hentage and techniques of the allied crafts of patchwork, appliqué and quilting, and to formulate, prepare and establish schemes therefore, provided that all of the objectives of The Guild shall be exclusively charitable

All activities of The Guild are governed by the Company's Memorandum and Articles of Association

### Structure, Governance and Management

### **Governing Document**

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 10 October 1997 and registered as a charity on 12 January 1998. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

### **Recruitment and Appointment of Council Members**

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as council members. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association council members, whether directors, trustees or officers, are elected to serve for a period of three years. A retiring trustee shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of two years.

### Induction and Training

All potential new trustees are invited to attend a training weekend which is designed to give an insight into roles and responsibilities and of the aims and objectives of the Guild. This year the Trustees met for a training day to review responsibilities and to develop a strategic plan for 2010.

### **Risk Management**

The Trustees have a risk management strategy by which they

- Annually review the risks faced by the charity,
- Establish procedures to mitigate the risks identified by the charity

Trustees will continue to review the risks annually by updating existing policies and putting in place measures to mitigate any further risks that may be identified

### **Organisational Structure**

The Guild has a Trustee body of up to twelve members, which is known as Council, to which members are appointed for a three year term. Interim arrangements have been put in place to allow council members to be appointed for shorter terms to allow a phased replacement of council members in future years. The Council meets at the AGM and in December with meetings as required at intervals between these dates. Six of the Trustees form an Executive Committee which meets bi-monthly to direct decision making. The Executive Committee consists of the President, Treasurer and Divisional Heads for Membership, Marketing, Museum and Operations. Each of the Divisional Heads can form sub-committees to direct the work of specific projects within the division. The Divisional Heads and Treasurer are appointed for a three year term and, currently, the President serves a two year term of office.

The Guild has a strong network of voluntary officers who further the aims of the Guild at national level and who all perform important roles within the Guild. These include an Education Officer, a Young Quilters Officer and an International Officer. The International Officer promotes the work of the Guild in all parts of the world, representing the Guild in the European Quilt Association (EQA) and ensuring communication with the Guild's international members.

The eighteen regions of the Guild covering the British Isles provide a solid base which underpins national activities. Each region is headed by a Coordinator who, along with an officer for each area in the region, a Treasurer, a Newsletter Editor and, for some regions, a Young Quilter representative and website coordinator, work to promote the Guild in their local area by organising events for members. The Trustees acknowledge and thank the regional officers for the work that they do

Four Specialist Groups operate within QGBI to promote studies into specialist areas of patchwork and quilting

- The British Quilt Study Group (BQSG, 179 members) investigates the heritage and history of quilting within the British Isles. Its work involves not only the investigation of quilting techniques and materials used in the past but also the social history that influenced the creation of those quilts. The BQSG also represents the United Kingdom in the international field of heritage quilt study.
- The Traditional Quilt Group (TQG, 246 members) is interested in creating quilts using the traditions of the past to produce modern quilts
- The Contemporary Quilt Group (CQG, 434 members) uses modern methods and techniques to explore the boundaries of patchwork and quilting
- The Miniature Quilt Group (MQG, 122 members) is interested in the particular challenges of creating patchwork and quilting on a miniature scale

All four Specialist Groups are responsible for their own finances although membership is still administered by the Guild Membership of all groups is open to full members of QGBI Membership of each group has increased during 2009

### **Related Parties**

Festival of Quilts Limited (FoQ Limited) is a wholly owned subsidiary of The Quilters' Guild It is responsible for the commercial activities of the Guild and passes any profits made to the Charity

### **Objectives and Activities**

The Quilters' Guild was formed in 1979 and is the national organisation representing quiltmakers throughout the British Isles. Traditional and contemporary work are of equal importance within the Guild and membership is open to anyone who works in patchwork, appliqué and quilting or who has an interest in quilts.

The Guild aims to give quiltmaking the status it deserves both as a craft and as an art, and to encourage and maintain a high standard of workmanship and design. As a registered charity the Guild promotes appreciation, knowledge and understanding of the art, techniques and heritage of quiltmaking and fosters a climate of friendship and cooperation amongst quiltmakers, both in the UK and abroad

### **Achievements and Performance**

At the year end there were 6,323 members of the Guild comparable with the previous year Of these, 981 have taken out an extra membership to join one or more of the specialist groups, an increase of 115 over the year Membership figures include 205 Young Quilters and 104 International members

The majority of activities in the Guild take place in the Guild's regions and during 2009 a total of 131 events were organised by the Guild's regional groups across the whole of Great Britain

The Conference and AGM in 2009 was held in Swansea when 358 members took part in workshops, lectures and visits to local attractions in addition to attending the Annual General Meeting

The Guild's involvement with Creative Exhibitions has allowed the profile of the Guild to be raised by the Festival of Quilts Exhibition held annually at the NEC, Birmingham. This year there were approximately 1,000 quilts entered for the show and more than 31,000 people attended this four-day event. Workshops were delivered by the Guild for Young Quilters. Entries to the show came from all over the British Isles and from overseas. There were also invited exhibitions within the show from groups and from individuals providing a showcase for work of all styles and from many countries.

The main Guild publication is 'The Quilter', which is published quarterly. It carries a wide range of articles by contributors, addressing current issues in the quilting world and providing inspirational articles on techniques and tips for quiltmakers. It also updates members on the business of the Guild and supplies information about events, organisations and websites which may be of interest to members.

In 2009 the Guild awarded the BA Bursary of £1,000 to a graduating BA Textiles student, Rebecca Pickering. An award was made to student Lisbeth Williams in recognition of excellence in work produced on a City & Guilds course. The Travel & Education Scholarship was awarded to Linda Libby. The Guild has other awards financed by bequests from members to promote patchwork and quilting, including the Sue Belton award and the Amy Emms award.

### The Museum

In 2008 the Guild relocated from Halifax to St. Anthony's Hall in York. In addition to housing the Guild's administrative offices and library, St. Anthony's Hall houses the Quilt Museum and Gallery

The Guild's collection of over 700 historic and contemporary quilts and quilted items is one of the largest in the country and the Quilt Museum and Gallery is the only museum dedicated to patchwork and quilting in England

The total number of visitors to the Museum in 2009 was 11,191, with 10,184 paying visitors and 1007 free (including the York Residents Weekend and previews)

### Heritage Lottery Funded Project Unfolding the Quilts

The Guild is running a three-year project funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund This provides the Quilt Museum and Gallery with an Education Officer and a part-time Volunteer Organiser

During 2009 the Education Officer regularly worked with local schools, the adult education department at City of York Council, Nybep (North Yorkshire Business Education Department), local teachers (from primary to further education), York Unifying Multicultural Initiative and the NHS She has set up a new group 'Community Quilters' which meets at the Museum Over the year 189 learning events have been delivered on and offsite with a total of 2,996 participants

Several new learning aids to improve access to information about the quilt collections have been developed with funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund this year including a 10 Minute DVD introduction to Quilting and the Quilters' Guild, freestanding information panels on quilting and the history of St. Anthony's Hall and an 'art cart' and discovery case for use within the galleries and education room.

The Volunteer Organiser is continuing work on recruiting volunteers and facilitating training in stewarding, health and safety, installing/de-installing exhibitions, curatonal, library and administrative duties and supporting the education programme at the Museum. In December 2009 we had 63 volunteers but this figure fluctuated throughout the year with 80 people volunteering during summer 2009. Volunteers contributed 4,428 hours of their time, equivalent in value to £40,000 had the Guild had to pay employees for this work.

### Arts Council Activity - My Pearl

The 'My Pearl' project was a follow-on to the Art Council funded 'Quilts in Time' inaugural exhibition and activity programme in 2008. An under spend of £2,000 from the initial project was used by the Museum to employ a freelance artist to work with a local community group (Hob Moor craft group of young mums) to learn sewing skills and become confident in using them to create a pieces for exhibition at the Museum and at their community centre

### The Quilters' Guild Collection Trust

During 2009 a new trust was formed with the purpose of becoming the body that holds in trust the Guild collection of quilts, historic fabrics and associated items. At the end of the year the first meeting of this trust had yet to take place

### Festival of Quilts Limited (FoQ), The Guild's Trading Subsidiary

FoQ Limited trades as 'Quilters' Guild Enterprises' to avoid confusion with the Festival of Quilts which is held annually at the NEC, Birmingham FoQ Limited, which is wholly owned by The Guild, has four main outlets for selling goods the Museum shop, sales of goods through the Guild's regions at regional events, sales of goods at quilt and craft shows and sales through the new on-line shop <a href="https://www.quiltmuseumshop.org.uk">www.quiltmuseumshop.org.uk</a> FoQ Limited also handles the income and expenditure for The Guild's annual conference

The on-line shop was a new initiative which went on-line in October, 2009, and at the year-end was beginning to receive its first orders

FoQ Limited sells some goods especially produced for The Guild such as postcards, mugs, badges, tea towels, etc., together with quilting books and magazines, quilting equipment, kits, greetings cards, gifts and other items. Each year FoQ Limited also produces a calendar featuring quilts made by Guild members and from the Guild Collection.

FoQ Limited donates any profits made to the Quilters' Guild

### How the Public Benefits from the Activities of the Quilters' Guild

The above description of the Guild's activities during 2009 illustrates the wide range of benefits provided by The Quilters' Guild of the British Isles

Regional events include speakers, workshops and exhibitions and all Guild events (apart from the Conference and AGM) are open to members and non-members. Membership of the Guild is open to anyone interested in patchwork, quilting and appliqué and we have concessionary rates for children and students under the age of 21 years.

The Guild is actively involved in preserving the textile heritage of the UK through the Quilters' Guild Collection of historic and contemporary quilts. The activities of the regional and specialist groups enable The Guild to support the development of patchwork, quilting and appliqué in the present day

The Museum and Gallery allows the public to view both historic and contemporary quilts and textile work, from our own collection and on loan from other sources. Key pieces from the Collection can also be seen on the Museum website <a href="www.quiltmuseum.org.uk">www.quiltmuseum.org.uk</a>. Although visitors have to pay to visit the Museum there are concessionary rates for children, students and pensioners. Residents of York can visit the Museum free one weekend each year as part of a wider City of York initiative. Pieces from the collection are loaned to other museums and shown in off-site exhibitions.

The educational activity based at the Quilt Museum involved nearly 3,000 participants during 2009 Volunteering at the Museum allowed 80 people the opportunity to meet new people, learn new skills and further their interest in historic quilts

Patchwork and quilting is mainly a female occupation and the Guild works with people across all age ranges. We have members in every part of the country, in towns, cities and in the countryside and those who cannot attend events, for any reason, have the benefit of our publication 'The Quilter' and their regional magazine arriving on their doormat four times a year

### Financial Review

### **Principal Funding Sources**

Membership income remains the main source of funding for the Guild During 2009 the Guild received £195,218 in membership income. Although members can join at any time of the year, the majority of membership renewals are in May, as this used to be the start of the 'Guild year'. This peak will diminish over time, allowing a more even flow of funds to be established.

During 2009 the Guild used grant income from the Heritage Lottery Fund which supported the Museum Education Officer and Volunteer Organiser and all aspects of their work, as described in 'Activities' above

The Guild works with Creative Exhibitions to support the exhibitions and competitions at the Festival of Quilts at the NEC This resulted in payment of £15,154 which helps to offset the cost of involvement in the show

The wholly owned subsidiary Festival of Quilts Limited has produced £19,596 operating deficit

During 2009 the Guild recovered £47,830 in Gift Aid from HM Revenue & Customs, making a valuable contribution to the running costs of the Guild

### **Investment Policy**

The general reserve funds owned by the Guild are held in a Charities Deposit (COIF) account which is currently attracting an interest rate that is comparable with other deposit accounts

### **Reserves Policy**

The Guild operates where possible within the yearly budget set annually by the Trustee body. The reserves held are sufficient to allow for any unpredicted shortfall in funding from membership income and unforeseen expenses. The operation of the Quilt Museum and Gallery during 2009 continued to draw on the Guild's reserves and the trustees are conscious that the Guild's reserves are reaching the minimum desirable level.

The regions and specialist groups are largely self funding, although occasionally there may be short term deficiencies which the Guild will bridge with a grant or loan, as applicable. Each region tries to hold a reserve fund to cover operating shortfalls should they occur. Some of the regions and specialist groups hold these reserves in charity deposit accounts.

### **Plans for Future Periods**

2009 was the first full year of operation of the Quilt Museum and Gallery in York. Although the Museum has been successful in mounting a varied range of exhibitions and attracting over 10,000 visitors it is clear to the trustees that this is not bringing in sufficient income to support the operation of the Museum at St. Anthony's Hall

During 2010 the Guild will continue to market the Museum and Gallery in a variety of ways to attract a larger number of visitors. Meanwhile the trustees will decide on a way forward which addresses the deficit in Guild funds.

In August 2010 the Guild intends to bring the administration of membership renewals back 'in-house' This will involve moving to a new or updated database and appointing a Membership Officer to run the system and develop the membership. The new database may also form the basis of a new website, giving Guild members space to show their own work on the web.

### Directors' responsibilities

The directors are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the group and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure of the charitable company and the group for the year. In preparing these financial statements the directors are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP,
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and the group and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and the group and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charity's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

In so far as the directors are aware

- there is no relevant audit information of which the company's auditor is unaware, and
- they have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information

We have audited the financial statements of The Quilters' Guild of the British Isles for the year ended 31 December 2009 which comprise the consolidated Income and Expenditure Account, the Statement of Total Recognised Gains and Losses, the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, the Consolidated Balance Sheet and the related notes These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein

### 1 Constitution

The Guild is a company which is limited by guarantee and every member of The Guild undertakes to contribute to the assets of The Guild in the event of the same being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, for payment of the debts and liabilities of The Guild contracted before they cease to be a member, and of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributions among themselves, such amount as may be required not exceeding one pound

### 2 Accounting policies

### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention, with the exception that investments are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice. Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and applicable accounting standards.

These financial statements consolidate the results of the Guild and its wholly owned subsidiary, Festival of Quilts Limited, on a line by line basis. A separate Statement of Financial Activities for the Guild itself is not presented because The Guild has taken advantage of the exemptions afforded by Section 408 of the Companies Act 2006 and paragraph 397 of SORP 2005.

### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and sponsorships and is included
  in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is
  not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when
  the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Membership subscriptions are included in the Statement of Financial Activities for the period to which they relate, subscriptions received in advance being deferred to future periods
- Life membership subscriptions received are credited to a designated fund and amounts are released to the General Reserve as required
- Tax recoverable on covenanted income and Gift Aid donations are brought into account as and when received

Investment income is included when receivable

### Volunteers and donated services

No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers

### Charitable expenditure

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.



### 2 Accounting policies (continued)

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the accountancy fees and annual return costs

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

### Fixed assets

Fixed assets (excluding investments) are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation Depreciation is charged at

33 3% straight line

Office equipment

20% straight line

Resource centre

10% straight line

No depreciation is charged in the year of acquisition

Grants in respect of expenditure on tangible fixed assets are treated as either fund income or deferred income. The grant is released to the income and expenditure accounts over the expected useful economic life of the related asset in line with the depreciation policy.

The Guild owns a number of Heritage and Contemporary Quilts, the majority of which have been donated. In view of the difficulty in valuing these historical and inalienable assets, no value has been placed on these quilts for the purpose of these financial statements.

Investments held as fixed assets are revalued at mid-market value at the balance sheet date and the gain or loss taken to the Statement of Financial Activities

### Stocks

Stocks of current catalogues, magazines, cards etc, held at the year end are valued at the lower of cost or market value

### Leasing commitments

Rentals applicable to operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities over the period in which the cost is incurred

### Pension costs

The company operated a defined contribution pension scheme for the benefit of one employee who had elected to forfeit salary for pension contributions. The cost of contributions are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they become payable.

### Funds structure

The Guild has restricted income funds to account for situations where a donor requires that a donation must be spent on a particular purpose or where funds have been raised for a specific purpose

All other funds are unrestricted income funds which the trustees are free to use for any purpose in furtherance of the charitable objects. Within unrestricted income funds are designated income funds which the trustees set up to identify and separate the income and expenditure relating to specific projects.
