#### Strategic report for the year ended 31 December 2020

The company present their strategic report of the company for the year ended 31 December 2020.

#### Review of business and future developments

At the year end, the net liabilities totalled £1,640,000.

The turnover of the continuing operations of the company increased again this year by 47.6% to £8,350,000 from £5,655,000 which is seen as a good result.

#### Going Concern

The uncertainty as to the future impact of the Covid-19 outbreak has been considered as part of the company's adoption of the gong concern basis. The Directors have reviewed financial forecasts for the 12 months from the approval date of these financial statements, taking account of reasonable possible changes in trading conditions.

In addition, the company has identified a number of mitigating actions that are within management's control and can be actioned on a timely basis to be effective should trading deteriorate and are therefore satisfied that there is no material uncertainty. Accordingly, the company continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

#### Key performance indicators (KPI's)

Wootton organic Wholesale Limited uses a range of financial and non-financial indicators to monitor performance. The key performance indicators referred to in the business review above include: revenue and profit trends and gross profit margins, by enterprise.

#### Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risk facing Wootton Organic Wholesale Limited is the performance of the organic food sector.

#### Financial risk management

The company's operations expose it to a variety of risks that include credit risk and liquidity risk.

#### Credit risk

The principal financial assets of Wootton Organic Wholesale Limited are trade and other receivables, predominantly with JCB companies and related companies outside of the JCB Service group. Because Wootton Organic Wholesale Limited is integrated in financial terms with these JCB companies, its credit risk is managed by these companies.

#### Liquidity risk

Trade creditors liquidity risk is managed by ensuring sufficient funds are available to meet amounts due.

#### Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020

#### 1. General information

The principal activity of Wootton Organic Wholesale Limited is the production of organic meat produce for the domestic retail market.

The company is a private company limited by share capital, incorporated in England and Wales.

The address of the registered office is: Lakeside Works Rocester Uttoxeter Staffordshire ST14 5JP

The principal place of business is: Longshaw Lane Ramshorn Oakamoor Staffordshire ST10 3BZ

#### 2. Statement of compliance

The financial statements of Wootton Organic Wholesale Limited have been prepared in compliance with United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102, "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Companies Act 2006, under the provision of the Large and Medium-sized Companies and Groups (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 (SI 2008/410).

The company satisfies the criteria of being a qualifying entity as defined in FRS 102. Its financial statements are consolidated into the group financial statements of Bamford Property Limited. The company has taken advantage of the disclosure exemptions set out in paragraph 1.12 of FRS 102 specifically in relation to the company not preparing its own cash flow statement and the disclosure of transactions between companies within the same group.

#### 3. Summary of significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### Principal accounting policies

These financial statements were prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102. The financial reporting standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the company's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note 4

#### (a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, on the going concern basis, and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 as modified by certain financial assets and liabilities measured at fair value through profit or loss. Bamford Property Limited, the parent company, has confirmed that it is its present intention to continue to provide, or procure sufficient financial support to the company so as to enable the company to remain in operational existence and to meet its liabilities as they fall due for a period of no less than 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements. Having received this confirmation, the directors believe that it remains appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020 (continued)

#### 3. Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

#### (b) Turnover recognition

Turnover comprises the fair value of the consideration received for the sale of goods and provision of services in the ordinary course of the Company's activities. Turnover is shown net of sales/value added tax, returns, rebates and discounts after eliminating sales within the company.

The company recognises revenue when:

The amount of revenue can be reliably measured; It is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the entity; and Specific criteria have been met for each of the Company's activities.

#### (c) Taxation

Current tax is the amount of income tax payable in respect of the taxable profit for the year or prior years. Tax is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the period end.

Deferred taxation is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date, where transactions or events that result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future or a right to pay less tax in the future have occurred.

Deferred tax assets are regarded as recoverable and recognised in the financial statements when, on the basis of available evidence, it is more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the timing differences can be deducted.

Deferred tax is measured at the average tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which the timing differences are expected to reverse based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted at the balance sheet date.

The deferred tax assets and liabilities are not discounted.

#### (d) Employee benefits

#### Defined benefit pension obligation

Post-employment benefits for eligible employees are primarily provided by a defined benefit scheme which is funded by contributions from the company and employs into a trust fund. The company is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of these schemes. As a result, the company accounts for contributions to the schemes as if they were defined contribution scheme by charging them to the profit and loss account as incurred. Full details of the defined benefit scheme can be found in the financial statements of JCB Service which are publicly available.

#### Defined contribution pension obligation

The defined benefit pension schemes are closed to new entrants and have been replaced by a stakeholder scheme which is a defined contribution scheme. Post-employment costs relating to defined contribution arrangements are charged to the profit and loss account as incurred. The assets of the scheme are held in an independently administered fund.

#### (e) Tangible fixed assets

Tangible assets are stated in the statement of financial position at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses. The cost of tangible assets includes directly attributable incremental costs incurred in the acquisition and installation.

Depreciation is charged so as to write off the cost of assets. Assets in the course of construction are stated at cost. These assets are not depreciated until they are available for use.

The principal rates used are:

Land and buildings 2%
Plant and equipment 10-20%
Fixtures and fittings 10%

#### 3. Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

#### (f) Debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, less provision for impairment. A provision for the impairment of trade debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the company will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

#### (g) Creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the company does not have an unconditional right at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

#### (h) Borrowings

Interest-bearing borrowings are initially recorded at fair value, net of transaction costs. Interest-bearing borrowings are subsequently carried at amortised cost, with the difference between the proceeds, net of transaction costs, and the amount due on redemption being recognised as a charge to the profit and loss account over the period of the relevant borrowing.

Interest expense is recognised on the basis of the effective interest method and is included in interest payable and similar charges.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the company has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date.

#### (i) Financial instruments

The company has chosen to adopt the Sections 11 and 12 of FRS 102 in respect of financial instruments.

#### (i) Financial assets

Basic financial assets, including trade and other debtors, cash and bank balances, are initially recognised at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

Such assets are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

At the end of each reporting period financial assets measured at amortised cost are assessed for objective evidence of impairment. If an asset is impaired the impairment loss is the difference between the carrying amount and the present value of the estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. The impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

If there is a decrease in the impairment loss arising from an event occurring after the impairment was recognised the impairment is reversed. The reversal is such that the current carrying amount does not exceed what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised in profit or loss.

Financial assets are derecognised when a) the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire or are settled, or b) substantially all the risks and rewards of the ownership of the asset are transferred to another party or c) control of the asset has been transferred to another party who has the practical ability to unilaterally sell the asset to an unrelated third party without imposing additional restrictions.

#### (i) Financial instruments (continued)

#### (ii) Financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including trade and other creditors, bank and other loans, loans from fellow companies and preference shares, are initially recognised at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Trade creditors are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The company does not currently apply hedge accounting for interest rate and foreign exchange derivatives.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the liability is extinguished, that is when the contractual obligation is discharged, cancelled or expires.

#### (iii) Offsetting

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amounts presented in the financial statements when there is an enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### 4. Critical accounting judgements and estimation uncertainty

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

#### (a) Fixed assets

The annual depreciation charge for tangible fixed assets is sensitive to changes in the estimated economic lives and residual values of the assets. The useful economic lives and residual values are re-assessed annually. They are amended when necessary to reflect current estimates, based on technological advancement, future investments, economic utilisation and the physical condition of the assets. The carrying amount is £2,773,000 (2019: £2,976,000).

#### (b) Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost is determined using the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method.

The cost of finished goods and work in progress comprises direct materials and, where applicable, direct labour costs and those overheads that have been incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. At each reporting date, stocks are assessed for impairment. If stocks are impaired, the carrying amount is reduced to its selling price less costs to complete and sell; the impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss. The carrying amount is £400,000 (2019: £310,000)
