DIRECTORS REPORT

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2014. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2005 in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charitable company.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

GOVERNING DOCUMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 3rd December 1997, as Cambridge Summer Recitals Limited, and registered as a charity on 3rd March 1998. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the company and is governed under its Articles of Association. It changed its name to Cambridge Summer Music Ltd in February 2014.

ORGANISATION AND APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

Trustees meet quarterly and supervise the staff between meetings and for specific events. New trustees are identified from within the Music Community when required.

INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

New trustees are recruited by either recommendation from existing trustees, Arts and Business, Friends of Cambridge Summer Music Ltd. or advertising. All new trustees receive induction training, have meetings with the directors and other trustees, with explanations of the accounts and the aims and objectives given of the organisation. New trustees are presented with recent festival documents, previous minutes of the trustees meetings and the most recent AGM.

RISK ASSESSMENTS

Trustees are mindful of risks which primarily occur at events. The mitigation of risk in this connection is addressed by ensuring that stewards are properly trained.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The objectives of the charity continue to be the provisions of a wide range of high quality music, educational events and the encouragement of young performers.

PUBLIC BENEFITS

The objectives are aimed at all members of society irrespective of background and age.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

This summer marked the thirty-fifth summer event that Cambridge Summer Music (formerly Cambridge Summer Recitals) has promoted.

Spring

A series of 5 fundraising concerts were held in May, alongside the Music in Quiet Places series in villages, which were held in Girton, Comberton, Landbeach and Balsham churches. They provided a good introduction and modest sum towards the festival funds, a means to attract new Friends and to ask existing Friends to subscribe again, while giving a taste of what the Festival would offer. However, the Spring concerts are harder to sell, though MIQP remains popular.

Summer Festival

Concerts

This year there were nineteen main concerts, twelve lunchtime concerts including Fitz Proms, organ lunchtimes and Friday lunchtime recitals, and four Sounds Green concerts in the Botanic Garden, three of which took place on Wednesdays before the Festival began.

There were also three very successful Music for Kids concerts, with Prime Brass in Space, the Wandlebury outdoor Family concert with the Cambridge Wind Band which attracted about 450 people and the National Youth Music Theatre's performance of The Ragged Child. A week-long workshop for 10 - 14 year olds (the second of our Camkids musical theatre workshops) culminated in two extremely inventive and successful performances of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat.

On the two weekends of the Festival the scope of the music widened to include an indie folk band and a Czech folk fusion band with some other bands to provide music in the streets.

The main theme of the Festival was the Great War and its effect on music and musicians with reference to World War II. Artistically, the Festival was a success, with some particularly memorable concerts by the Zürcher Kammerorchester and Zürcher Sing Akademie, conducted by Sir Roger Norrington, Roderick Williams, Nicholas Daniel and the Haffner Ensemble, Joanna MacGregor, the Aronowitz Ensemble, and the Aurora Orchestra, playing in the new Saffron Hall. The Leys School Great Hall was another new venue for Cambridge, in which The Ragged Child was performed. The opening concert and the closing concert were particularly good, with the Carducci Quartet and clarinettist Timothy Orpen (Mozart) and Natalie Clein cello, Katya Apekisheva piano and Fredrik Paulsson violin in a Russian themed programme.

Autumn

Four Music in Quiet Places were held in Waterbeach, Fulbourn, Haslingfield and Burwell. The Christmas Gala with the Festival Chorus and Prime Brass was held in the Guildhall.

Support

Grant support was reduced by the City Council to a paltry £900, reflecting the dire cuts to the Arts that had been predicted. Support from Trusts were given by The Williams School of Church Music, D'Oyly Carte Charitable Trust, Fidelio Charitable Trust, and the Howard Foundation. Sponsorships and donations were given by RealVNC, St James's Place Wealth Management, Howard Group, Cambridge Pianoforte, and individuals Audrey Williams, Timothy Benn, Dr Shirley Ellis, and Geraldine McMahon, as well as many other Friends. Help in kind was given by Clare College (a room for the duration of the Festival), St John's College and Sidney Sussex College (venues). Other help in kind was provided by Byard Art, Cambridge University Press (receptions) and Cambridge Plant Interiors (plant for concert platforms).

We lost, sadly, one of our Patrons, Christopher Hogwood, who died of a brain tumour in September 2014, and we thank Lady Jane Howard, who stepped down as Patron this year.

Appeal

An appeal was launched on the Just Giving website to raise £35,000, after it was clear that there was a deficit due mainly to the King's St John concert's results, and also to the Aurora Orchestra. This was successful and by mid-January had raised approximately £37,000.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

2014 proved to be a successful year both financially and artistically. Despite putting on a very interesting and varied programme we were unable to meet the budgeted ticket sales. In October we embarked on a fundraising exercise, which not only offset the ticket sales and produced a surplus for the year.

ORGANISATION AND APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

The Company is comprised of Trustees Tim Brown (chairman), Jenny Jullien (treasurer), Patricia Ryan, Clare Gilmour, Sarah Chambre, Hattie Harris and Nigel Yandell. The executive committee is made up of nine people, with some Friends and two Trustees. This committee decides on day-to-day matters, such as publicity distribution.

RESERVE POLICY

The Trustees hope in the medium term to move into a position where they can retain cash reserves of in the region of 3 months running costs.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

At the end of 2013 several initiatives were put in place to plan for a more stable future, and the Trustees took on more responsibility to alleviate the burden of the director and to help to direct more fundraising. The desire is to re-pay its long term loans, but realises it may take some years in the present cautious financial climate.

DIRECTORS RESPONSIBILITIES IN RELATION TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Company and charity law require the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the financial activities of the company and of its profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing those financial statement, the directors are required to:

- a) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- b) state whether the policies adopted are in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and with applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes that the company will continue to trade. This assumes ongoing support from patrons and sponsors and the ability of the directors to manage cash flow. If the company were unable to trade, adjustments would need to be made to reduce the value of assets to their recoverable amounts, to provide for further liabilities that may arise and reclassify fixed assets as current assets.

(b) INCOMING RESOURCES

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

(c) RESOURCES EXPENDED

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities has been included in these cost categories. Where costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned across the cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of these resources.

(d) TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS AND DEPRECIATION

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write-off the costs less estimated residual value of each asset evenly over their expected useful lives as follows:
