

The Trustees of Nations in Bloom have approved a financial target of accruing Reserves equivalent to one year's operating costs. The Trust made significant progress towards achieving this objective, and it is anticipated that the objective will be achieved within 2004/2005, provided that no exceptional expenditure is incurred.

There have been no material changes during the last year in the policies and objectives of the Company.

The Company has achieved its financial budgetary targets for the year.

The Company made progress during the year through the successful organisation of Nations in Bloom 2003, the Finals of which were held in Apeldoorn, Netherlands. Twenty-seven communities participated in the Final of the Competition and the Competition attracted media attention worldwide.

To further the 'educational' objectives of Nations in Bloom, in Nations in Bloom 2003 a seminar was held, which representatives of the participating communities and members of the local community attended.

The Company is free of any dependence on donated services and facilities either within or outside of the Company's accounts, and is not dependent on the support of any particular individuals, organisations or groups of donors.
