DIRECTORS' REPORT

The directors present their report and the group accounts for the year ended 31 December 2003.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY AND REVIEW OF BUSINESS

On 26 September 1997 the group entered into an agreement with the Carlisle NHS Trust to refurbish certain existing hospitals, to design and construct further hospital buildings and to manage and provide non-clinical support services at the hospitals. The project is part of a Private Finance Initiative and will run for a period of 45 years. The finance for the project was raised by the issue of £75,800,000 Guaranteed Secured Bonds due 2003-2027.

RESULTS AND DIVIDENDS

The profit for the year, after taxation, amounted to £190,731 (2002: £301,903). The directors do not recommend the payment of a dividend.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The group's principal financial instruments comprise guaranteed secured bonds, subordinated unsecured loan stock, current asset investment and cash. The main purpose of these financial instruments has been to finance the design, build and operation of a hospital under the Government's Private Finance Initiative. The group has various other financial instruments such as trade debtors and trade creditors that arise directly from its operations.

The main risks arising from the group's financial instruments are interest rate, inflation and liquidity risk. The board has policies for managing each of these risks and they are summarised below. The policies have remained unchanged since incorporation.

Interest and inflation rate risk

The group borrows at a fixed rate of interest and receives income linked to RPI. The group also invests in cash deposits at floating rate. The group's exposure to interest and inflationary fluctuations will continue to be monitored.

Liquidity risk

The group's objective is to maintain a balance between continuity of funding and flexibility through the use of cash deposits and money market investments.

SUPPLIER PAYMENT POLICY

The directors recognise the importance of good relationships with suppliers and the established payment policy is to

- agree payment terms in advance of any commitment being entered into;
- ensure suppliers are made aware of these terms by inclusion of the terms of payment on the order of contract; and
- ensure that payments are made in accordance with the terms of the contractor's order providing that the presented documentation is complete and accurate. The company has no trade creditors.
- At 31 December 2003, the group had an average of 9 days purchases outstanding in trade creditors and the company had none.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards.

Fundamental accounting concept

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. The credit facilities in place at 31 December 2003 are adequate to cover the projected funding requirements of the group. The bond issue was made on the basis that the payment schedule from the NHS Trust is matched to the bond repayment profile.

Basis of consolidation

The group's financial statements incorporate the assets and liabilities of Health Management (Carlisle) Holdings Ltd and its subsidiary undertaking Health Management (Carlisle) plc as at 31 December 2003 and their result for the year ended 31 December 2003.

No profit and loss account is presented for Health Management (Holdings) Limited as permitted by Section 230 of the Companies Act 1985.

Financial asset

Amounts receivable under the agreement with the Carlisle NHS Trust relating to the hospital facilities transferred are included under debtors and represent the total amount outstanding under the agreement less unearned interest. Interest receivable is recognised over the period of the contract based on the interest rate implicit in the contract.

Liquid resources

Liquid resources comprise current asset investments held as readily disposable investments. They are readily convertible into known amounts of cash at, or close to, their carrying value. The investments are carried at lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is based on mid-market price.

Deferred taxation

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date where transactions or events have occurred at that date that will result in an obligation to pay more, or right to pay less or to receive more, tax.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that the directors consider that it is more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the underlying timing differences can be deducted.

Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which timing differences reverse, based on tax rates and laws enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date.

Capital instruments

Shares are included in shareholders' funds. Other instruments are classified as liabilities if they contain an obligation to transfer economic benefits and if they are not included in shareholders' funds. The finance cost recognised in the profit and loss account in respect of capital instruments other than equity shares is allocated to periods over the term of the instrument at a constant rate on the carrying amount.

The shareholders are contracted to make payments to the group for such losses surrendered at the rate which will be payable, as and when the group becomes liable to corporation tax which would not have been payable but for the surrender of the losses. An amount of £1,497,791 (2002: £1,371,709) has been included as a debtor in respect of the payments receivable from the shareholders.

Due to the long term nature of the project and the uncertainty as to when the losses will be utilised, a deferred tax asset has only been recognised to the extent that it matches deferred tax liabilities of the group. To the extent that losses are not surrendered to the shareholders, they will be available without time limit for offset against future profits of the group

19. DERIVATIVES AND OTHER FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The company's subsidiary undertaking issued the Guaranteed Secured Bonds (see note 14) in order to finance the design, build and operation of a hospital under the government's PFI initiative. The cash received from this bond issue was used to pay the building costs, professional fees and interest costs during the construction period. Part of the proceeds from the bond issue has been invested in a portfolio managed by Scottish Widows Investment Partnership. The objective of the portfolio is to maximise gross return. Investments are made at Scottish Widows' discretion but are subject to certain restrictions on maturity, liquidity and maximums. The investments are made in short term deposits, gilts and certificates of deposit. There are no equity investments and all the investments are in sterling financial instruments. The disclosures below do not include short term debtors and creditors.

Financial assets

The group's financial assets are its finance receivable of £62,751,577 (2002: £63,039,043) current asset investments of £3,042,582 (2002: £2,904,729) and cash of £4,875,489 (2002: £3,453,778), all of which are denominated in sterling. The current asset investments and cash are floating rate assets, while the finance receivable is a fixed interest rate asset. The weighted average interest rate for the fixed rate financial assets is 9.22% (2002: 9.22%). The weighted average period for which interest rates on the fixed rate financial assets are fixed is 26 years (2002: 27 years).

Financial liabilities

The group's financial liabilities are its listed bonds and its unsecured loan stock as described in notes 14 and 15 respectively, all of which are denominated in sterling and bear fixed interest.
