Directors' report

for the year ended 31st March 2012

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2012. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice ('SORP') 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity

The charity is a charitable company limited by guarantee, and is governed by its memorandum and articles of association. There are no restrictions on the operations of the charity contained in either the memorandum or the articles of association. The work of the charity is carried out by the Trustees, who meet regularly to consider the running of the charity. Trustees are appointed by invitation of the existing Trustees.

Principal activities

The Ancient Tree Forum (ATF) works through partnership, the principal one being with the Woodland Trust (WT), it also works in close association with other national organisations including the National Trust, English Heritage, Natural England, The Tree Register of the British Isles and the Tree Council The ATF-Woodland Trust partnership operating through its Partnership Executive Group (PEG) aims to improve protection for and knowledge of veteran and ancient trees, including ensuring that relevant publications provide good conservation guidance for landowners, advisors and practitioners. The partnership provides topic-based Ancient Tree Guides, which to date total seven

ATF and the Woodland Trust have collaborated over conservation issues and projects, - including the ground breaking Ancient Tree Hunt (ATH) aimed at encouraging community involvement in identifying, mapping and recording veteran, ancient and notable trees. Joint activities include raising public awareness of ancient and veteran trees, providing good practice guidance, influencing policy on local and national veteran tree protection, and improving understanding of how to ensure long term population sustainability. The ATH, which was launched in 2007 as a five year project, was supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund and Esmee Fairbairn Foundation, and is a tripartite partnership between the ATF, Woodland Trust and the Tree Register of the British Isles and Ireland (TROBI). Although the main thrust of the project ended earlier in 2012, records continue to be received and entered onto the website.

An important aspect of this partnership involves monitoring and contributing to consultation on proposed legislation and guidance with the aim of minimising any adverse effects, while positively influencing veteran tree conservation to secure the sustainability of this rare habitat and the diversity of species that depend on it. Proposals from the UK devolved governments and European legislation are monitored in this way to identify policies impacting on veteran and ancient trees so that relevant comment may be made to influence decisions in favour of tree protection, reduce any negative impact and to ensure sustainable conservation. Recent successes have ensured that policy documents in three of the four devolved governments now include recognition of the values and importance of veteran trees.

Consultation responses have included commentating on the England Environment White Paper, important changes in the TPO regulations in Scotland and in England where, with the help of the Woodland Trust Campaign team, we had over 1,000 supporters. In partnership with Woodland Trust, we supported a Community Council petition to the Scottish Government for improved tree protection and also contributed to and commented on a range of guidance on ancient/native woodland and deadwood management, included guidance from the Forestry Commission and English Heritage aimed at ensuring the values of veteran trees are recognised and are conserved through good management.

The ATF - WT partnership includes provision of advice and information on trees under threat, offering a facility for individuals and communities requiring support in order to make appropriate conservation decisions. Many veteran and ancient trees are lost or threatened annually from inappropriate responses to public safety, adverse impacts from planning and development and intensification of land use examples of such advice and advocacy include investigations aimed at protection for individual heritage trees such as the largest oak in Wales, and the impacts upon collections of veteran trees from planning developments such as the use of Greenwich Park as an Olympic venue. In such cases, the ATF in its mission to prevent avoidable loss of our ancient tree heritage, seeks to communicate their values and vulnerability and the consequences of losing them, and thereby improve local, community and national interest in their sustainable protection and conservation.

The ATH exceeded its target of achieving 100,000 tree records in 2011. This is nationally significant in communicating widely, educating the public, schoolchildren and landowners about this natural heritage. The iconic, charismatic nature of ancient trees fulfilled the promise of capturing the imagination through engaging a well informed, broad volunteer force, which ended on completion of the project. This project continues to successfully engage participants in its interactive dedicated map-based website. The National Trust has partnered the scheme to catalogue its own trees, an immensely significant development, being the largest single owner of ancient and veteran trees and has already contributed twenty four thousand records. The ATF-WT are currently analysing the data to obtain the maximum potential from this massive data source. The results of this analysis will help to ensure the momentum gained in societal awareness of the conservation interests of veteran and ancient trees can be maintained and enhanced, and that added value can be obtained to use the data for improving protection and understanding the connectivity between collections of veteran trees and enhancing habitat linkage.

The Founder President of the Ancient Tree Forum, Ted Green MBE, continues to enlist additional 'Ancient Tree Guardians' in support of core ATF interests, recruiting landowners who care about veteran trees to encourage participation in their conservation. He has fulfilled a key role, travelling throughout the UK and abroad acting as an ambassador for the ATF to inspire and influence owners, managers, academics and state bodies about the value and good stewardship of ancient and veteran trees. Through the medium of the blog 'Ted and Jill's Treemendous Adventures' he is also able to enthuse and inspire an even larger and more diverse audience.

The Ancient Tree Forum website continues to be very effective, with an increasingly international audience, informing public, professional and practitioner visitors about veteran and ancient trees and good conservation practice. The creation of a Facebook page has connected us to a wider age range, expanding outreach and influence. All publications produced are available on the website, which also provides opportunities for sharing knowledge and for debate and interaction on ancient tree care and conservation. An e-mail newsletter keeps UK supporters informed, while supporting an ever-widening base of international contacts. It is hoped that it will also provide direct links to a vast amount of reference material available at a number of other sites.

During the year, the ATF joined a partnership with Pro Natura (Sweden), Amigos del los Arboles Viejos (Friends of Ancient Trees, Spain), Inverde (Belguim), Societatea Progresul Silvic (Romania) and the European Arboricultural Council (Europe wide and responsible for the European Tree Worker qualification) to apply for EU Leonardo da Vinci funding for a training project

The ATF has continued to work with the National Tree Safety Group (NTSG), a broad spectrum of governmental and non-governmental stakeholders including tree professionals, owners, advisors and managers, to counter the threat to ancient trees and their potential successors from risk-aversion. The NTSG guidance document was published in August 2011 to widespread approval including that of the HSE. The purpose of this evidence-based document is to inform the reasonable and prudent landowner to make appropriate decisions concerning tree related public safety through understanding trees as natural organisms, helping to support a balanced and proportionate approach that considers the benefits from trees and the very low risks they present. The considerable effort expended by the ATF in supporting the NTSG is a mark of the importance placed in appropriate and sensible tree management as, historically, a great number of veteran and ancient trees have been unnecessarily sacrificed through risk aversion.

Regional groups have continued to develop on a county basis with specific strongholds in Cornwall, Devon, Dorset and Wokingham District Veteran Tree Association. The work carried out by WDVTA has been exemplar, this one district has recorded 5759 trees to date and produces an excellent six monthly newsletter.

Mike Townsend's brilliant support has enabled both the Business Plan and Strategic Plan to be completed, together these two documents help to structure our priorities over the coming years. A draft Manifesto was produced by Vikki Bengtsson and Helen Read which will provide the ATF with a sound document to inform the public and other bodies of our main objectives.

The summer event in Devon was an outstanding success. The field visits to Whiddon Deer Park and Wistman's Wood were well attended and extremely interesting and informative. The diversity and calibre of the speaker on the two days was outstanding.

ATF field events included site visits to advance the knowledge of those who attend, and focus attention on management needs of specific ancient trees. The autumn 2011 event was held at Thoresby Park which looked at unique issues surrounding the impact from historic mining causing land slippage within the SSSI wood pasture site. We also visited Sherwood Forest looking at the magnificent trees there and discussing future engagement and interpretation opportunities.

The 2012 spring event was held aroud the Wrexham area, the first of several stops was to look at some very old oak in an industrial park outside Wrexham. These trees were next to a munitions factory during WWII and it was felt they posed a potential fire risk so were filled with concrete. We ended the event at the privately owned Wynnstay Park where we were invited to provide the owners with guidance on managing their fine collection of ancient and veteran trees.

During the last year I took over the daunting task of Chairing the ATF, made less so by the strong support of the Treasurer and the Membership Group We extend gratitude to Mike Townsend, President, for facilitating the Board in its combined efforts contributing to the formulation of the Ancient Tree Forum's new Strategic Plan, a process that was initiated following the ATF's 10th anniversary The review and its adopted conclusions will be announced during 2011-12

1. Accounting Policies

1.1. Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005 and applicable accounting standards

Due to its size the charity is not required to prepare a cash flow statement

1.2. Incoming resources

Income is recognised in the period in which the charity is entitled to receipt and the amount can be measured with reasonable certainty. Income is deferred only when the charity has to fulfil conditions before becoming entitled to it or where the donor has specified that the income is to be used in a future period

1.3. Resources expended

Resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis and categorised as follows

- (1) Fundraising expenditure includes costs directly attributable to raising income.
- (11) Maintenance costs represent costs incurred in the furtherance of the charity
- (iii) Management and administration costs represent the costs attributable to the management of the charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

1.4. Fund accounting

- (1) Unrestricted general funds these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees
- (11) Restricted funds these are funds which can be only used for particular purposes with the objectives of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes
