# Report of the directors for the year ended 31 August 2013

The directors have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements of the group for the year ended 31 August 2013

#### Results

The profit and loss account is set out on page 7 and shows the profit for the year

## Principal activities

The principal activity of the company and the group during the year was the provision of education and residential care for children with special needs

The group provides a choice of education and care for children with special needs, their families and local authorities across the UK through a network of ten schools and ten children's homes. The group aspires to being an exemplar of best practice for the education and care of children and young people with special needs, locally, regionally and nationally. It has a clear view of its purpose and practice and this is articulated in the theoretical and philosophical aspects of its work.

### **Business review**

Development and performance of the business

The key financial and non-financial performance indicators during the year were as follows

Demand from the local authorities (the main customers of the group) for the high quality services provided by the group is driven by increasing statutory requirements. The group traded well throughout the year, in spite of the continued austerity drive of its key customer base. This drive will have impacted on lesser quality organisations. The Directors are pleased to report that of the Group's twenty Education and Care establishments which operated during the year, eight are assessed as 'Outstanding' by Ofsted, eight assessed as 'Good', with a further four awaiting their first full inspection.

The Directors are pleased to also announce the opening of the Group's new school, Avon Park in Rugby, Warwickshire This school opened as planned in November 2013

# Report of the directors for the year ended 31 August 2013 (continued)

## Regulatory and legislative risks

As an education provider, the group's schools are registered and approved by the Department for Education, (DfE) and are subject to inspection and report by Ofsted Periodic inspections are carried out for each school. The group's residential care operations are also registered with Ofsted as providers of care Regular inspections and reviews are carried out by Ofsted.

The group regularly updates its policies and procedures in order to ensure compliance with required standards

In addition, the group has an obligation to meet Health and Safety requirements. The Group employs a highly experienced and qualified health and safety manager who audits and updates internal policies.

## Financial risk management policy

The group's principal financial instruments comprise cash, trade debtors and creditors, loans and borrowings and certain other debtors and accruals. The main risks associated with these financial assets and liabilities are set out below.

#### Credit risk

Credit risk arises principally on third party derived revenues. Group policy is aimed at minimising such risk, and collection of debts is actively managed to ensure that payments are received in a timely manner. The Group's customers are Local Authorities and have a good payment history. The directors believe the Group's exposure to bad debts is not significant.

#### Liquidity risk

The group is funded by way of overdrafts and operational cash generation, as well as access to long-term bank loans held by the ultimate parent company, Witherslack Group (Holdings) Limited

The group's liquidity risk is managed through the group finance function, controlled by Witherslack Group (Holdings) Limited. The Group generates substantial operational cash surpluses. Capital expenditure is approved at board level. Day to day cash flow flexibility is maintained by retaining surplus cash in readily accessible bank accounts. Working capital requirements are funded primarily through each group company's resources although each group company does have recourse to additional funding through the ultimate parent company banking facilities.

## Interest rate risk

The group's interest rate risk is managed through the parent company's finance function

Exposure to interest rate movements is managed at parent company level through a mixture of hedging instruments. The interest rate risk is hedged through a combination of financial instruments which have capped the maximum LIBOR applicable to the interest rate calculation on a significant element of the parent company bank borrowing to 3% per annum.

## Market price risk

Due to the nature of the principal activity, the directors do not believe the group is exposed to significant movements in market prices of its services

## **Future Developments**

The group continues to invest significant resource in the development of both the physical infrastructure of the schools as well as in the further development of the education and care services provided by the group. Since the year end, Avon Park school has opened and the Group is actively pursuing several other potential developments.

## Disabled employees

The group gives full consideration to applications for employment from disabled persons where the requirements of the job can be adequately fulfilled by a handicapped or disabled person. Where existing employees become disabled, it is the group's policy wherever practicable to provide continuing employment under normal terms and conditions and to provide training and career development and promotion to disabled employees wherever appropriate

## **Employee involvement**

During the year, the policy of providing employees with information about the group has been continued through internal media methods in which employees have also been encouraged to present their suggestions and views on the group's performance. Regular meetings are held between local management and employees to allow a free flow of information and ideas.

# Notes forming part of the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2013

## 1 Accounting policies

The group and company financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of freehold children's homes and are in accordance with UK Generally Accepted Accounting Principles

The following principal account policies have been applied

### Basis of consolidation

The consolidated group financial statements incorporate the group financial statements of the company and all subsidiary undertakings. These are adjusted, where appropriate, to conform to group accounting policies. Acquisitions are accounted for under the acquisition method and goodwill on consolidation is capitalised and written off over twenty years from the year of acquisition. The results of companies acquired or disposed of are included in the profit and loss account after or up to the date that control passes respectively. As a consolidated profit and loss account is published, a separate profit and loss account for the parent company is omitted from the group financial statements by virtue of section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

## Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis. Although the Group and the company had net current liabilities of £7,093,481 and £6,858,973 respectively at 31 August 2013 (2012 - £5,862,050 and £5,571,459) this is as a result of the group's business model which results in relatively large deferred income balances at the year end. The group has continued its successful expansion through the year and the directors are pleased with the progress against the business plan of the group.

## Cash flow statement

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a wholly owned subsidiary of Witherslack Group (Holdings) Limited and group accounts are publicly available from Companies House

#### Turnover

The turnover shown in the profit and loss account represents amounts invoiced during the year. Turnover is recognised on the provision of educational and care services, once the service has been delivered and the right to consideration has been achieved.

# Notes forming part of the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2013

## 1 Accounting policies (continued)

#### Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows

Goodwill

5% straight line

Development costs

5 - 20% straight line

Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows

Freehold property - 2% straight line
Leasehold property - 5 - 10% straight line
Fixtures and fittings - 15% reducing balance
Motor vehicles - 25% reducing balance

Assets under the course of construction are not depreciated

## Freehold children's homes

Financial Reporting Standard 15 'Tangible fixed assets' requires fixed assets which are carried at revalued amounts to be shown at their current value at the balance sheet date. To achieve this freehold children's homes are subject to a full valuation every five years with an interim valuation carried out in the third year of this cycle. The profit or loss on disposal of revalued properties is calculated by reference to net book value and any realised revaluation surplus is transferred to the profit and loss account through reserves.

### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items

### Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Assets held under finance leases, which are leases where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset have passed to the company, and hire purchase contracts, are capitalised in the balance sheet and are depreciated over their useful lives. The capital elements of future obligations under the leases and hire purchase contracts are included as liabilities in the balance sheet.

The interest elements of the rental obligations are charged in the profit and loss account over the periods of the leases and hire purchase contracts and represent a constant proportion of the balance of capital repayments outstanding

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged in the profit and loss account on a straight line basis over the lease term

Notes forming part of the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2013 (continued)

## 1 Accounting policies (continued)

#### Pension costs

The company operates a money purchase (defined contribution) pension scheme. Contributions payable to this scheme are charged to the profit and loss account in the period to which they relate. These contributions are invested separately from the company's assets.

#### Deferred taxation

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date. Timing differences are differences between taxable profits and the results as stated in the financial statements which arise from the inclusion of gains and losses in tax assessments in periods different from those in which they are recognised in the financial statements. A net deferred tax asset is regarded as recoverable and therefore recognised only when it can be regarded as more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of underlying timing differences can be deducted.

Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which timing differences reverse, based on tax rates and laws enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date

## Financial instruments

#### Investments

Investments held as fixed assets are stated at cost less any provision for impairment. Investments held as current assets are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

### Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised and carried forward at invoiced amounts less provisions for any doubtful debts. Bad debts are written off when identified

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are included in the balance sheet at cost. Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand and short term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less.

## Liquid resources

Liquid resources comprise cash at bank and in hand and short term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less

## Interest-bearing loans and borrowings

All loans and borrowings are recognised initially at cost, which is the fair value of the consideration received, net of issue costs associated with the borrowing

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains or losses are recognised in the profit and loss account when liabilities are derecognised or impaired, as well as through the amortisation process.

#### Deferred government grants

Deferred government grants in respect of capital expenditure are treated as deferred income and are credited to the profit and loss account over the estimated useful life of the assets to which they relate
