The directors present their report and the financial statements for the period ended 31 March 1999.

Governing Instrument

The company was incorporated on 17 June 1998, and commenced trading on 1 October 1998.

The charity's objects and regulations are regulated by the company's memorandum dated June 1998 and, under that memorandum is constituted as a company limited by guarantee.

The charity seeks to meet its objectives through activities which are aimed at the development of the spiritual, intellectual, social and physical well being of young people. To meet this objective the charity operates neighbourhood detached youth work projects and activities which offer young people a range of opportunities that seek to support their transition to adulthood. Furthermore, the charity offers a training programme for youth workers in informal and community education studies; a research and development unit that seeks to identify new pieces of work in which the charity can be involved. In order to achieve this the charity relies upon income from the rental of a building leased to the University of Northumbria, interest from invested capital, local authority grants, charitable donations, contributions from the European Social Fund and Single Regeneration Budgets. There have been no changes in the charity's objects or policies this period.

The charity is organised with a board of trustees/management, with a member of the committee being nominated as treasurer. The board of trustees/management have a full time Chief Executive who is responsible for the day to day management of the charity.

Development Activities and Achievements

The charity has continued to expand its work over the past year, and put in place funds for the development of a new neighbourhood detached youth work project in the North West of the City which will begin in April 1999.

During the year the charity has been able to develop its existing work and respond to the needs which are presented by the young people with whom the Projects come into contact. Last year a group of young men took part in the Coast to Coast cycle ride, while another group raised all the funds for and planned a trip to Spain. A group of young people took part in a sail training week, with each person achieving competent crew status. Work with other agencies developed, particularly that which involves supporting young single people in their first tenancies. In Byker this support work is now a major part of the work of the Project, and funds have been received from the European Social Fund to support its development.

In August a piece of work began which is supported through the Tyneside Training Enterprise Council, from funds received via the Single Regeneration Budget Challenge Fund. The Progression Forum is part of a range of interventions being supported by the TEC, which are aimed at reaching those in the 14 – 19 age group who are not in fulltime education or not accessing post 16 provision. The Progression Forum, managed by the charity, is working with voluntary youth sector to look at ways in which opportunities for these isolated young people can be better delivered.

The work based in Newcastle College is another example of the importance of working in partnership. The YMCA has placed a detached youth worker in the college to work with the student population, through the Students Union, but also through contacts that can be established using informal education in a formal education. This is an important and innovative piece of work, which, given the rapid increase in student numbers in FE Colleges, particularly in the 16-19 age group, contributes to enabling young people to sustain post 16 education.

The YMCA is increasingly recognising the value of working in a multi agency environment and being a partner in the development of youth work opportunities through these partnerships. A new piece of work will begin in 1999/2000, which is funded for two years initially by the National Youth Agency, which is seeking to help "hard to reach" young people to improve their level of basic skills, improve their chances of training and employment, and sustain their first independent tenancies.

Finally, during the year the charity has reviewed its accounting procedures and introduced a computerised system. This will improve financial management, reporting and scrutiny at a time when funding is coming into the charity from a variety of sources.

Directors' Report for the period ended 31 March 1999

Directors' responsibilities

Company law requires the directors to prepare the financial statements for each financial period which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of its financial activities for that period. In preparing those financial statements the directors are required to:-

- (a) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- (b) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- (c) prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue to operate.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud or other irregularities.

Notes to the financial statements for the period ended 31 March 1999

1. Accounting Policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards.

1.2 Donations and voluntary income

Donations and voluntary income are accounted for gross when received.

1.3 Grants receivable

Grants for immediate expenditure are accounted for when they become receivable.

Grants received for specific purposes are treated as restricted funds.

Grants restricted to future accounting periods are deferred and recognised in those periods.

1.4 Allocation of costs

Costs are allocated between direct charitable and other expenditure according to the nature of the cost. Where items involve more than one category they are apportioned between the categories according to the nature of the cost. Detailed analysis of the allocation of costs is given in note 2 to the accounts.

1.5 Investment assets

Investment assets are included in the accounts at their market value. Where held as an ongoing investment they are included as fixed assets. If the investment is to be realised within twelve months it is categorised as a current asset.

1.6 Realised and unrealised gains and losses

All realised gains and losses are recognised in the accounts. Unrealised gains and losses on investment assets are recognised as detailed in note 1.5. Permanent diminution in the value of fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.7 Depreciation

The cost or valuation of fixed assets is written off over their expected useful lives as follows:-

Motor vehicles 25% reducing balance basis Fixtures and fittings 25% reducing balance basis

6. Funds

Grants and donations are received towards the projects operated by Newcastle upon Tyne YMCA. These are the Byker Project, Walker project, Student Project, Progression Forum and Blakelaw Project. These funds are disclosed as being restricted.

Two designated funds exist within the Newcastle upon Tyne YMCA. The capital fund relates to the investment properties at Ellison Place and Ovingham Gardens. This is on the basis that the properties are subject to a long term lease and it is unlikely that the YMCA could dispose of the assets.

The contingency fund represents the level of resources held to ensure the Association can sustain its current operation for a period of twelve months, and meet its obligations to staff, should employment need to be terminated.
