The charity's objects are to promote the protection, preservation and improvement of the natural environment for the benefit of the public and to advance the education of the public in all environmental and ecological matters by the provision of an educational centre in Dimmer and in particular

- a) to establish, or secure the establishment of, for the benefit of the public (which term shall include individuals, commercial concerns, public bodies and every other type of entity or organisation) a centre in Dimmer to be known as Carymoor Environmental Trust ("Centre") to advance, foster and increase public knowledge, education and awareness of and interest in all matters concerning environmental and ecological issues ("Environmental Issues") and to arrange or provide for or join in arranging and providing for
 - i) research facilities,
 - ii) educational and information resources, facilities and displays,
 - III) exhibitions, conferences, training courses, attractions, meetings, lectures, classes and
 - seminars in each case connected with Environmental Issues, and

- b) to maintain and promote the Centre and its objectives and facilities whether alone or in conjunction with others for the benefit of the public

- d) to advance public education in all aspects of sustainability including, without limitation, resource and energy use, waste, ecology, health, technology, agriculture and biodiversity

OBJECTIVES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Education:

2011-12 proved to be a transitional year for Carymoor's education delivery with the end of one significant project and the development of a whole new range of education services

Our outreach education programme, delivered through the award winning Somerset Waste Action Programme (SWAP), completed its tenth successful year and has worked with every school in Somerset The final free school outreach visits were carned out in July as funding for the project from Somerset Waste Partnership came to an end. The 10 year project has seen Carymoor staff support schools across Somerset to reduce waste, increase recycling and encourage schools to incorporate sustainability in to their day to day running. It has enabled Carymoor to develop a working relationship with hundreds of schools and community groups across Somerset, which provides great potential for the future.

Between April and July 2011 a final 41 free SWAP school visits were carried out. Over the course of the 10 year project over 2100 school visits were carried out in Somerset schools, over 1200 community groups were visited and almost 500 community events and roadshows were attended

Carymoor has continued some areas of work with Somerset Waste Partnership with staff undertaking a 'doorstepping' project, targeting low performing recycling rounds and engaging individuals on the doorstep to try and increase participation. The team has covered rounds in Wellington, Burnham, Bridgwater and Yeovil and spoken to thousands of Somerset residents during the year SWP is in the process of fully evaluating the results of this work but it has already shown improvements in recycling rates on these rounds.

Carymoor and Vindor again collaborated on the "Dig it, Grow it, Cook it, Eat it" schools competition. The response from schools was excellent once again with 30 schools taking part in the scheme. Each school received a tonne of Revive compost from Vindor and was then asked to develop a school vegetable garden, documenting each stage in a scrapbook for the judges. Six schools attended a celebration event at Carymoor to mark their achievements, with presentations made by local writer and presenter. Tracey Smith. The competition has been a practical way to show the benefits of growing your own whilst touching on a variety of other themes — reducing waste, composting, healthy eating, food miles and the many benefits of gardening.

We were fortunate enough to secure a large grant from the Government's Transition Fund which has enabled us to carry out large scale redevelopment work of our education programme and to plan what would follow the completion of the SWAP project in September 2011 we launched our new education programme which offered a charged school outreach service for the first time and a range of new activities to offer at Carymoor These new Environmental Action Days include a global citizenship day at our unique replica shanty town, a survival day with a range of shelter building and Forest school style activities and a 'Passion for Plants' day. All of these days were run alongside the existing 'Wild Days Out' and landfill site tours that have remained so popular Landfill site tours continue to be the most popular option with 80 schools opting for this option during 2011-12. In October 2011 we were able to secure a 1 year grant from the Ernest Cook Trust which helped to support our 'Wild Days Out' working with KS1 children on wildlife activities at Carymoor.

The new Environmental Action days were developed after undertaking a number of teacher's focus groups to ensure that what was offered met schools' needs. The new activities were also tested out on willing schools over three 'Big Survival Days', where children took part in orienteering, shanty town activities and in daubing the new Carymoor round house. The development work has enabled the team to more fully integrate the outreach and site education work into one coherent programme. In addition to these services a Carymoor Critters after school club service has been developed with three schools taking up the service in the Spring Term of 2012 and this is an area to develop in the next year.

The Carymoor education programme now offers a comprehensive menu of options across a range of environmental themes – wildlife, sustainability, global issues and biodiversity. During the financial year 4252 children visited the centre for education days and a further 6967 children were visited in school.

Community:

Volunteers continue to make a valuable contribution to the conservation and education work of the Trust. Our regular Tuesday volunteer group continued to provide fantastic support to the maintenance of our site. We were able to offer a long term education trainee volunteer placement from September 2011 to April 2012 to a student who proved invaluable support to the education team whilst gaining a lot of experience for her own professional development. Two new volunteers were recruited to maintain and develop the wildflower collection and a number of talented new education volunteers have also got involved in helping to deliver education work on site.

In January 2011 we were fortunate enough to secure a grant to develop our existing strawbale building into a dedicated base for our volunteers, with new flooring, sun pipes to increase natural light and a fridge and microwave to provide some level of independence. In addition to this our Transition Fund enabled us to purchase a range of new tools and equipment for volunteers to use With these resources now in place the charity will be looking to increase its support to volunteering projects in the future.

The Somerset Waste Partnership has continued to support our Compost Champions project and we are fortunate enough to have 49 volunteers for this scheme. Carymoor staff also attended 13 roadshows in West Somerset in the summer of 2012 to promote the rollout of the new Sort It-recycling service. This was part of the SWAP project and saw the education team explaining the new service to thousands of residents over a two week period. Carymoor staff have been involved in promoting the service to residents across Somerset and have played a key role in its successful implementation.

A successful bid to Viridor Credits saw a number of excellent additions to the amenity at Carymoor New photovoltaic cells were installed in June 2011 and will produce just under 4kw of electricity. As well as improving the sustainability of our building the installation is linked to a monitor inside the centre to show how much energy is being produced, making it an excellent working demonstration to inspire others. In May 2011 work began on developing a new 'bronze-age' style roundhouse in a field adjacent to the main centre. This is another great example of sustainable building, using locally sourced and biodegradable materials. The building has been an excellent project for volunteers to get involved in too as they have helped to daub the structure. In addition a large-scale tipi was purchased to provide additional visitor capacity particularly during busy periods. All of these improvements have added to the unique facilities at Carymoor.

Carymoor again had a large stall at the Royal Bath & West Show during half term in June 2011 and won the Gold Medal awards for the best stand in the Woodland and Wildlife area. The team worked with hundreds of children and families over the 4 day event.

In half terms in October and February and during the Christmas holidays family activity days were run with great success. These days brought in a good number of families that had not visited Carymoor before and we have received many repeat bookings, always a good indicator of success. In October these sessions were in association with the BBC's Live 'n' Deadly programme which also helped with promotion. The February sessions offered a range of bird themed activities called 'Feathery February Fun.' These sessions were particularly successful with 29 families attending. Schools have been helpful in marketing these sessions to their families and word of mouth has also been excellent.

Carymoor continued its project funded by Somerset Skills and Learning's Neighbourhood Learning for Deprived Communities fund. This saw the education team providing adult education courses with the theme 'Cut Waste, Cut Costs', targeting residents from deprived wards who are not employed. Practical sessions have been run on cooking, gardening and global sustainability issues. A total of 50 learners took part in the sessions, exceeding our target of 40. This project was followed up by a successful bid to Somerset Skills and Learning's 'Learning Communities Fund' in October 2011 to take this area of work out to different communities. Much of the learning from the NLDC project was carned forward into this new work which was undertaken in partnership with Housing Associations in Bridgwater, Yeovil and Frome who provided assistance in marketing courses to their residents and generally supported the project. The LCF project will continue on until July 2012. Alongside the LCF project we also delivered some traditional countryside skills training days for Somerset Skills and Learning with two hedgelaying courses and a willow weaving day held at Carymoor during March.

Conservation:

Thanks to two local volunteer bee keepers we now have two hives established at the edge of our orchard. As a result we enjoyed the first, of what we hope will be many, jars of Carymoor honey. We have also been fortunate enough to have an observational beehive installed within a dedicated shed, adjacent to our wildflower collection. This has enabled us to give children and other visitors an inspiring first-hand view of a bee colony at work during the summer months.

The 38 varieties of apple tree in our young orchard can all trace their origins back to pre-war Somerset Summer 2011 was the most productive year for these trees since their planting in early 2005. Our volunteers harvested, pressed, pasteurised and bottled a bumper crop of apples and we have proudly been serving their apple juice at events and functions for the rest of the year.

The biodiversity of the wider reserve has continued to flourish. A patch of bee orchids appeared in a new location and the wild flower banks in our specially created butterfly habitats ensured another year of impressive butterfly surveys. Our regular transect produced only the second record ever of a marsh fritillary on site, and sightings or purple hairstreaks in our hedgerows has brought the total number of species recorded on site to 31.

There were some notable bird sightings at Carymoor during the period. In November 2011 two female, hen harners were spotted and could be regularly seen hunting over Carymoor and neighbouring Carymarsh. In January 2012, three short eared owls were spotted on site by one of our education volunteers and were regularly seen for a period of several weeks. The bird forage crop planted in the field adjacent to the centre again proved to be a welcome source of food for the smaller bird species passing through during the winter months and visitors enjoyed observing close up the breeding success of our resident great tits, thanks to a recently installed bird box camera and display screen.

Future Plans

With our new education programme now in place 2012-13 will focus on promoting our services to new and existing customers to maximise take up. Funds from the Government's Transition Fund have enabled the chanty to make significant steps forward in developing a suite of professional marketing tools. With a new website, established social media, new printed literature and display materials now all produced Carymoor has all the tools it needs to reach its income generation targets.

These are challenging times for a small charity to be operating and further efforts will go into raising voluntary income and donations and other forms of fundraising. In 2012-13 the Trust plans to hold a major open day in May to invite the local community to come and see just what has been achieved on our unique nature reserve. We are aiming to particularly bring in our local community as we are keen to show how the site has developed and to forge better links with local residents.

With a new 5 year strategic plan approved by our trustees in March 2012 the charity has identified its priorities over the coming years. Amongst these is a long term intention to make the Carymoor site more accessible to the local community and this is becoming a focus point as the charity moves forward.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

In addition to the existing contractual funding streams a £40,000 donation was received from Viridor. This is the third annual payment under a 3 year sponsorship agreement. A further £25,000 was secured from a joint communications fund held by Vindor and Somerset Waste Partnership. This funding was to support the new education programme and was part of a 3 year agreement with a further £15,000 for 2012/13 and a final £10,000 in 2013/14.

A grant was secured in 2010-11 to upgrade the facilities of the visitor centre which was funded by Vindor Credits, as distributors of the Landfill Communities Fund. This included the installation of new photovoltaic cells on the roof of the centre to generate electricity, new furniture, a new iron-age style roundhouse and a tipi to provide additional visitor capacity during busy periods.

A grant was secured from Big Lottery's 'Awards for All' fund for £9,217 to refurbish the strawbale building as a dedicated volunteer base

Ernest Cook Trust provided a grant of £8,920 to support Carymoor's 'Wild Days Out' wildlife themed education programme

A donation of £10,000 from Ideal Final Result Consultants was received in the previous financial year and remains unspent until an appropriate capital project is identified

Funding for other projects has also been secured through grants and contracts from Children and Young Peoples Partnership Somerset and Somerset Skills and Learning Some of these projects will continue into 2012/13 with funding consequentially be carried over to our next financial year as appropriate

Income from school groups visiting the site was £23,950 whilst a further £9,821 was raised from outreach visits to schools, after school clubs and education consultancy services

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below and have been consistently applied within the same accounts

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with SORP 2005 and the FRSSE (effective April 2008)

b) Cash flow statement

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS1 available for small companies from the requirement to prepare a cash flow statement

c) Depreciation

Depreciation has been computed to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets less residual value over their expected useful lives using the following rates -

Leasehold building

Over 25 years

Plant and equipment

15 - 20% reducing balance method

Office and computer equipment Over 3 to 5 years

Fixed assets costing less than £250 are not capitalised

d) Accounting for income

School visits, tours and courses

School visits, tours and courses are accounted for on a receivable basis

Projects overheads charges

The funding for certain projects may include provision for an overheads charge. The charges are recognised in the accounts as unrestricted income on an accruals basis

Restored land management fee

Restored land management fee is accounted for on an accruals basis

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are accounted for when they are received

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings appropriate to the organisation. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the Charity. Management and governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the Charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements. Support costs are allocated to the charity's activities either based on staff numbers or actual usage where this can be reliably determined.

f) Funds structure

Unrestricted funds

Income within this fund has been generated by the Charity and the use of such income has not been restricted to a particular purpose. In addition to meeting the costs of activities in furtherance of the charity's objects, the unrestricted fund has to pay for the general administration of the Trust.

Restricted funds

These are funds restricted to a particular purpose. During the period the Trust had eleven restricted funds.

The Projects fund represents funds generated from the landfill tax credit scheme which can be spent on approved projects and then reclaimed

The SWAP fund represents funds received in order to run the Somerset Waste Action Partnership scheme. This fund ended on 30 June 2012.

The Transition fund represents funds received to develop a replacement education programme and carry out any necessary restructunng of the chanty following the loss of funding for the SWAP programme

The Cultivating Wellbeing fund, Glean Project fund, CHYPPS Project fund and NLDC Projects fund represent funds received for a specific projects

The IFS Consultants fund represents match funding for a specific project

The Visitor Centre fund is a grant received from Viridor Waste Management which is to be used to make improvements to the Visitor Centre

The Ernest Cook Foundation fund is a grant for the education programme

The Big Lottery fund is a grant for repairs to the strawbale house
