The trustees have been authorised by the charity commission to take advantage of dispensation from disclosure of the description 'Limited' in the company name

The charity's objects are to promote the protection, preservation and improvement of the natural environment for the benefit of the public and to advance the education of the public in all environmental and ecological matters by the provision of an educational centre in Dimmer and in particular

- a) to establish, or secure the establishment of, for the benefit of the public (which term shall include individuals, commercial concerns, public bodies and every other type of entity or organisation) a centre in Dimmer to be known as Carymoor Environmental Trust ("Centre") to advance, foster and increase public knowledge, education and awareness of and interest in all matters concerning environmental and ecological issues ("Environmental Issues") and to arrange or provide for or join in arranging and providing for
 - i) research facilities,
 - ii) educational and information resources, facilities and displays,
 - iii) exhibitions, conferences, training courses, attractions, meetings, lectures, classes and
 - seminars in each case connected with Environmental Issues, and
 - iv) to provide a public forum or meeting place for those visiting or making use of the Centre together with ancillary recreational and refreshment facilities
- b) to maintain and promote the Centre and its objectives and facilities whether alone or in conjunction with others for the benefit of the public
- c) to promote, support, encourage and facilitate projects and developments which will produce benefits for the public through their approach to Environmental Issues, and
- d) to advance public education in all aspects of sustainability including, without limitation, resource and energy use, waste, ecology, health, technology, agriculture and biodiversity

The trustees have an organisational risk assessment and the trustees and Chief Executive are actively managing the high risk areas

An induction programme is carried out for new trustees to allow them to meet staff members and discuss their work, introduce the roles of the committees and advisory groups and understand their roles and responsibilities as members of the Board of Trustees

OBJECTIVES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Carymoor is an environmental education and conservation charity that encourages people to live more sustainably. Carymoor has identified principle objectives for each of its four key work areas.

Formal Education

- To provide an education programme that encourages environmental responsibility and the desire to help create a sustainable future
- To establish Carymoor as the centre of excellence for sustainability education and training for Somerset and the wider region

Sustainability and Biodiversity

- To develop a centre rich in positive environmental messages that are used as a resource for education and engagement
- To provide practical solutions to allow individuals, communities and businesses to understand, adapt and respond to the effects of climate change

Widening Participation and Engagement

- To deliver inclusive lifelong learning through engagement and participation
- To provide volunteering opportunities that impact positively on both the individual and the environment

Management and Compliance

- To regularly evaluate and review all work in line with current best practice
- To develop financially sustainable work programmes
- To maintain good governance and work within the charitable objects of the Trust
- To ensure legal compliance in all areas of work

Visitors can experience nature first-hand at our inspirational reserve which is a haven for wildlife of all kinds. The nature on our site is contrasted with the nearby working landfill site - an eye opener for all ages - to bring home the importance of waste reduction, reuse and recycling. Our talented and enthusiastic team make learning about sustainability exciting and our unique site offers a wealth of resources. Our welcoming visitor centre and surroundings have lots of sustainable features — solar panels, rainwater harvesting, a strawbale house and a beautiful sensory garden.

Carymoor has been particularly pleased this year to welcome so many new volunteers to the team, who support almost all areas of Carymoor's work, from marketing and education to practical conservation and wildlife recording. We are hugely grateful for their support

Education:

Environmental education remains at the heart of what Carymoor is all about. Our excellent education team continues to attract new schools, in addition to others who have come to us for years, to experience an inspirational day at Carymoor. During 2014-15

- 74 schools visited our site. This amounted to 3098 children visiting the centre for education days.
- A further 2931 children were visited in school over 26 outreach visits
- A number of new activities and services have been developed for schools.
 This includes a new 'Go Wild in Your Schools Grounds' service which helps schools to design and develop their school grounds into versatile outdoor spaces that can be used for outdoor learning. We believe this is a growth area for the education team. A new habitats day for KS2 and a shelters day have also been developed and run.
- · Feedback from our visiting groups has been uniformly excellent

'The children loved it. This is my third visit to Carymoor and each year has been fantastic! I will certainly be back next year!' Mere Primary School

Community:

- Volunteers continue to make a vital contribution to the conservation and education work of the Trust 393 volunteer days were given during 2014-15 CET is hugely grateful for the dedication and commitment of our volunteers across all areas of Carymoor's work
- The programme of family activity days has continued to draw local families to
 the centre and nature reserve to get involved in a range of wildlife activities
 and trails. In August a number of Wild Wednesdays were held and other
 activity days took place in school holidays throughout the year. The themes
 for the days have included 'Beetles, Bugs and Bees', 'Fantastic Fossils and
 Bones', 'Orchard Wildlife', 'Christmas Crafty Creations' and 'From Source to
 Sea'
- In October 2014 Carymoor ran four Forest Fun Fridays which featured forest school style activities, fun and games for 8-11 year olds
- On 13th September 2014 Carymoor held its annual open day and offered tours of the site and children's activities to local people. This was promoted as part of the Heritage Open Day scheme.

- In September and October staff carried out doorstepping work for Somerset Waste Partnership, encouraging residents in Taunton to reduce waste and recycle more Somerset Waste Partnership has continued to be an important partner for Carymoor
- Somerset Waste Partnership and Viridor have continued to fund our Compost Champions project and we are fortunate enough to have 60 volunteers for this scheme. The Champions promote home composting within their local communities by attending events, giving talks and supporting individuals and organisations. A training day was run at the Woodlands Hotel in Brent Knoll for new volunteers on 28th March 2015. We are very grateful for the time and effort of our team of volunteers which helps to reduce waste to landfill, saves money for householders and supports communities in Somerset.
- Carymoor partnered Castle Cary Town Council in delivering some adult education courses for Somerset Skills and Learning Carymoor staff delivered courses on working with and managing willow

Conservation:

The staff and volunteer team continue to manage our site to maximise its benefits for biodiversity and to provide a unique education resource to our many visitors

- Carymoor is very grateful to a number of local conservation groups and volunteers who have assisted us with the monitoring of wildlife on our site. This has included a newt survey (30th April) by Somerset Reptile and Amphibian Group, plant surveys by Somerset Botany Group (10th June and 10th August), ongoing bird ringing and surveys by Somerset Ornithological Society, monitoring of butterflies by Butterfly Conservation Trust, bees monitored both by a volunteer and the Bumblebee Conservation Trust as well as regular surveys for slow worms and reptiles.
- Julian Rawlins completed the butterfly transect for 2014 Overall numbers of butterflies increased by 24% on 2013 The grand total counted was 5784, up on 4656 in 2013 Small / Essex skippers were the most numerous with 1286 counted, up on 577 last year 2 Small Blues were counted but Small Heath, Silver Washed Fritillary and Brown Hairstreak were not counted this year
- Carymoor was again able to plant our a bird forage crop in the Upper Dauncey field, thanks to Bruce Taylor (of the Somerset Ornithological Society) who donated the seed and RH Targett and Sons who carried out the cultivating and planting work for no charge. Numbers of farmland birds have halved since intensive agriculture started in the 1960s so this crop helps to sustain over-wintering birds, including some threatened species such as yellowhammers and tree sparrows.
- Following an application to Somerset Environmental Records Centre it was confirmed on 4th December 2014 that all of the area of the site Carymoor manages had been designated as a Local Wildlife Site

- Work has continued on our Viridor Credits funded project to establish a new wildflower meadow as a habitat for a declining species of bee, the Shrill Carder Bee During May 2014 volunteers planted over 1000 plug plants in the meadow, grown in Carymoor's polytunnel Colleagues from the Bumblebee Conservation Trust ran a bee identification day for staff and volunteers on 7th July A new volunteer, John Butler, has visited the site once a month to carry out a bee transect and records the data of bees found on site on the Bee Walk website A press day was held to mark the project on 26th March 2015 which was attended by staff, volunteers and other key partners
- Our volunteer team has led a range of projects that would not have happened
 without them. These include developing new interpretation and the
 maintenance of our orchard, maintaining and interpreting our tree trail, the
 upkeep and reorganisation of our wildflower collection and a range of tasks
 on the Shrill Carder bee project.

FUTURE PLANS

In 2015-16 the Charity plans to further consolidate the biodiversity value of the site With Local Wildlife Site status now achieved the Charity will now pursue the Biodiversity Benchmark, an external accreditation to show the value of brownfield sites that are successfully managed for wildlife. We hope to pursue this in the latter part of 2015 after Viridor has completed some essential engineering work on the site. In the summer of 2015 we plan to hold a bioblitz, a 24 hour stock take of species on site. We plan to undertake this with in partnership with Somerset Archaeological and Natural History Society (SANHS). We also aim to continue and expand the range of wildlife monitoring that takes place on site.

In the coming years it is likely that the landfill site at Dimmer will be closed and it is not yet clear what level of activity will remain once this happens and what the education potential of those activities will be. The emotional impact of the tipping face has on our visitors has been the foundation of our education programme. New resources and attractions will be needed to replace this. Fundraising has been taking place to resource these new projects. In particular we wish to renovate the Long Pond at Carymoor into a vibrant habitat where our visitors can learn about local aquatic biodiversity. We also have plans to develop an attraction that show our visitors what is hidden beneath the surface of the landfill and to show how what we throw away reflects how we live

These new developments will enable the Charity to build upon the success of its existing education programme and to further enhance our unique site. The staff and volunteer team have once again shown their dedication and professionalism and the Charity remains well placed to meet the targets and objectives laid out within the strategic plan.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

There have been continued efforts to minimise expenditure and to maintain an appropriate level of reserves. Our income from education remains volatile and it is clear schools are being affected by the current financial climate. With this in mind we have made a series of offers to schools, with discounts for visits booked well in advance, and we have also made partnerships with two coach companies to try and make it easier for schools to visit us.

Income from our educational activities, both at our site and as outreach work was £25,729

We are hugely grateful to Viridor, the waste and recycling company, who have continued to sponsor Carymoor with a 2 year funding agreement in place until March 2017. This alongside longer term projects (e.g. the land management of the site, Compost Champions, contract work via our trading company) has afforded Carymoor a level of stability and optimism for the future.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below and have been consistently applied within the same accounts

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with SORP 2005 and the FRSSE (effective April 2008)

b) Cash flow statement

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS1 available for small companies from the requirement to prepare a cash flow statement

c) Depreciation

Depreciation has been computed to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets less residual value over their expected useful lives using the following rates -

Leasehold building

Over 25 years

Plant and equipment

15 - 20% reducing balance method

Office and computer equipment

Over 3 to 5 years

Fixed assets costing less than £250 are not capitalised

d) Accounting for income

School visits, tours and courses

School visits, tours and courses are accounted for on a receivable basis

Projects overheads charges

The funding for certain projects may include provision for an overheads charge. The charges are recognised in the accounts as unrestricted income on an accruals basis

Restored land management fee

Restored land management fee is accounted for on an accruals basis

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are accounted for when they are received

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings appropriate to the organisation. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the Charity. Management and governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the Charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements. Support costs are allocated to the charity's activities either based on staff numbers or actual usage where this can be reliably determined.

f) Funds structure

Unrestricted funds

Income within this fund has been generated by the Charity and the use of such income has not been restricted to a particular purpose. In addition to meeting the costs of activities in furtherance of the charity's objects, the unrestricted fund has to pay for the general administration of the Trust.

Restricted funds

These are funds restricted to a particular purpose. During the period the Trust had seven restricted funds. The largest of these funds were as follows.

The Projects fund represents funds generated from the landfill tax credit scheme which can be spent on approved projects and then reclaimed

The Visitor Centre fund is a grant received from Viridor Waste Management which is to be used to make improvements to the Visitor Centre

The Compost Champions, Habitat Creation fund, SCF Volunteering Project fund and Steel Charitable Trust Grant fund represent funds received for a specific projects

The IFS Consultants fund represents match funding for a specific project. This donation was returned during the year
