TRUSTEES' REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

The trustees are pleased to present their annual Trustees" Report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ending 31 March 2017 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The governing document of the trust is the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee.

The charity registration number is 1089668. The company registration number is 3605584.

Upon acceptance, the trustee is duly appointed against signature, in accordance with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association. 3(b).

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TRUSTEES' REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

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A summary of specific investment powers and their authority is contained within the Memorandum and Articles of Association, 10 (1).

The trustees have been authorised by the charity commission to take advantage of dispensation from disclosure of the description 'Limited' in the company name.

The charity's objects are to promote the protection, preservation and improvement of the natural environment for the benefit of the public and to advance the education of the public in all environmental and ecological matters by the provision of an educational centre in Dimmer and in particular:

- a) to establish, or secure the establishment of, for the benefit of the public (which term shall include individuals, commercial concerns, public bodies and every other type of entity or organisation) a centre in Dimmer to be known as Carymoor Environmental Trust ("Centre") to advance, foster and increase public knowledge, education and awareness of and interest in all matters concerning environmental and ecological issues ("Environmental Issues") and to arrange or provide for or join in arranging and providing for:
 - i) research facilities;
 - ii) educational and information resources, facilities and displays;
 - iii) exhibitions, conferences, training courses, attractions, meetings, lectures, classes and

seminars in each case connected with Environmental Issues, and

- iv) to provide a public forum or meeting place for those visiting or making use of the Centre together with ancillary recreational and refreshment facilities.
- b) to maintain and promote the Centre and its objectives and facilities whether alone or in conjunction with others for the benefit of the public.
- c) to promote, support, encourage and facilitate projects and developments which will produce benefits for the public through their approach to Environmental Issues; and
- d) to advance public education in all aspects of sustainability including, without limitation, resource and energy use, waste, ecology, health, technology, agriculture and biodiversity.

The trustees have an organisational risk assessment and the trustees and Chief Executive are actively managing the high risk areas.

An induction programme is carried out for new trustees to allow them to meet staff members and discuss their work, introduce the roles of the committees and advisory groups and understand their roles and responsibilities as members of the Board of Trustees.

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Objectives and Activities

Carymoor Environmental Trust is an environmental education and nature conservation charity. We aim to enrich people's lives by providing outstanding outdoor learning opportunities at our unique nature reserve. We want our visitors to be inspired to live more sustainably and to feel connected to the natural world.

Carymoor has identified principle objectives for each of its four key work areas.

Formal Education

- To provide an education programme that encourages environmental responsibility and the desire to help create a sustainable future.
- To establish Carymoor as the centre of excellence for sustainability education and training for Somerset and the wider region.

Sustainability and Biodiversity

- To develop a centre rich in positive environmental messages that are used as a resource for education and engagement.
- To provide practical solutions to allow individuals, communities and businesses to understand, adapt and respond to the effects of climate change.

Widening Participation and Engagement

- To deliver inclusive lifelong learning through engagement and participation.
- To provide volunteering opportunities that impact positively on both the individual and the environment.

Management and Compliance

- To regularly evaluate and review all work in line with current best practice.
- To develop financially sustainable work programmes.
- To maintain good governance and work within the charitable objects of the Trust.
- To ensure legal compliance in all areas of work

Visitors can experience nature first-hand at our inspirational reserve which is a haven for wildlife of all kinds. The nature on our site is contrasted with the nearby working landfill site - an eye opener for all ages - to bring home the importance of waste reduction, reuse and recycling. Our talented and enthusiastic team make learning about sustainability exciting and our unique site offers a wealth of resources. Our welcoming visitor centre and surroundings have lots of sustainable features – solar panels, a strawbale house, a roundhouse and a beautiful sensory garden.

Volunteers play a key role in all of Carymoor's activities from marketing and education to practical conservation and wildlife recording. We are hugely grateful for their support and for the huge contribution they make to Carymoor's work.

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Education:

Outdoor education is Carymoor's main function and our education team has continued to provide inspirational day trips to schools and other groups. During 2016-17:

- 92 schools visited our site which is an increase of 35% on 2015-16 (68 schools). 3429 children came to us on these visits, an increase of 21% on 2015-16 (2814 children).
- A further 2318 children were visited in school over 22 outreach visits, a 7.5% increase on 2015-16 (2156 children).
- The total number of visitors for 2016-17 (which includes courses, family days and schools) is up 25% on 2015-16 (4081 up from 3245).
- In September 2016 the Ernest Cook Trust supported Carymoor with a grant of £9,029 to support our Woodland Classroom project. The education team has been working on this project to develop our woodland area into an exemplar Forest School area and to develop new activities for the autumn and winter. We are very grateful to have Ernest Cook Trust's support.
- New purpose-built dipping platforms have been constructed by our Long Pond, providing a new learning space at Carymoor. This development was kindly funded by a grant from Awards for All and sponsorship from furniture company Myakka.
- In September 2016 we advertised for an Education and Conservation trainee and recruited three volunteers who have committed to regular days.
- The education team has added a number of new activities for primary schools, including Eco Pirates, Wild Olympics, a Vikings day and a World War 2 day.
- Feedback from our visiting groups has been uniformly excellent.
- Carymoor will be developing a new 'Going Underground' visitor attraction during the summer
 of 2017, following grants from the Clark Foundation (£5k), Garfield Weston (£7.5k), Viridor
 and Somerset Waste Partnership (£5k), Comply Direct (£12k) and a pledge of £5k from
 South Somerset District Council. We are very grateful for our funders for their support which
 will enable us to tell the story of the Dimmer landfill site in an engaging and tactile way and
 to inspire a new generation of learners with the Reduce, Reuse, Recycle message.

Community:

Carymoor has continued to offer a range of services to the local community, including activity days for local families, volunteering opportunities, courses and environmental communications work for the Somerset local authorities.

- The Carymoor volunteer team has continued to make an incredible contribution to activities, assisting with all aspects of the Charity's work. 330 volunteer days were given during 2016-17. Carymoor would not be able to function without this vital contribution and we thank the team for their commitment and enthusiasm.
- In September 2016 SS&L provided Carymoor with a grant of £2,455 to run a range of
 courses for adults on rural skills. During December and January 4 days have been run,
 covering an Introduction to Hedgelaying and an Introduction to Coppicing and Pollarding. 28
 learners have so far attended courses with a further scything course planned for April 2017.
- The programme of family activity days has continued to draw local families to the centre and nature reserve to get involved in a range of wildlife activities and trails. Over 200 people came to themed days which included 'Eco Pirates', 'Awesome Autumn', 'Fabulous Feathered Friends' and 'Crafty Christmas'.
- Our Future Field Naturalists club ran four times throughout the year, giving children a varied first-hand experience of local wildlife. Themes for the sessions included 'Beetle Bonanza', 'The Mighty Mouse' and 'the Spotted Flycatcher'.

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- Carymoor completed a project on behalf of Somerset Waste Partnership, following a successful bid to the Government's Department of Communities and Local Government's (DCLG) recycling reward scheme. Carymoor staff worked with 4 Somerset communities to encourage recycling and waste reduction.
- The Compost Champions scheme has continued for another successful year, with additional volunteers being recruited to promote home composting. 65 volunteers have now been trained by Carymoor staff and are active in their local communities.
- On Friday 12th August 2016 an open day was run to give people an opportunity to visit the centre and find out more. There was no charge for the day. Guided walks were given and activities were run for children. Exactly 100 people attended the day.

Conservation:

The staff and volunteer team continue to manage our site to maximise its benefits for biodiversity and to provide a unique education resource to our many visitors. We are grateful to our wildlife recording volunteers and conservation partners for their assistance in managing our site.

- A second bioblitz event was held on the 7th and 8th May with wildlife recorders from a variety
 of conservation organisations taking part. This was organised in partnership with Somerset
 Archaeological and Natural History as a follow up and comparison to the first event held in
 August 2015. Over 450 species were recorded during the 24 hour period.
- We are grateful to Butterfly Conservation volunteers who have continued to monitor our butterflies at Carymoor. Although 27 species were recorded this year one more than last year, thanks to the reappearance in good numbers of the Small Blue overall numbers were well down on last year, reflecting a UK-wide trend. Of the 27 species recorded, 21 showed a decline of up to 95% over 2015. The total number of butterflies recorded fell from 3770 to 2181. The sightings of the Small Blue were important though as this is a priority species in our site management plan. 4 Small Blue butterflies were recorded on a transect at the end of May (and 3 others not on the transect), the most ever recorded at Carymoor.
- In April 2016, 5 sheep were introduced in the Upper Dauncey field to aid the grassland management and to provide some education opportunities.
- Carymoor was again able to plant our a bird forage crop in the Upper Dauncey field, thanks
 to Somerset Ornithological Society who donated the seed and RH Targett and Sons who
 carried out the cultivating and planting work for no charge. Numbers of farmland birds have
 halved since intensive agriculture started in the 1960s so this crop helps to sustain overwintering birds.

Future Plans

Viridor's support to Carymoor has been pivotal in the Charity's success and we have recently agreed a new 5 year sponsorship deal which will run through to March 2022. The staff and trustees are very grateful for this support. The sponsorship deal also represents a great opportunity to develop a new 5 year strategy. Staff, trustees and volunteers have been working on this new vision, confident that the period is underpinned by Viridor's support. The staff and trustees want to see new audiences come to Carymoor and to extend the experiences on offer to new schools. We want to see Carymoor thrive.

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The Dimmer landfill site is likely to close in 2020 and will be replaced by a waste transfer station. This will mean activity at the Dimmer site for many years to come and will provide new educational opportunities. Our 'Going Underground' project will in part address the closing of the tipping face as it will enable our visitors to understand what is under the surface of the landfill and how what we value as a society has changed over the decades.

With the changes at the site, the staff team has looked to develop new educational opportunities over the past 2 years and this will remain a priority in the new strategy. The staff team is keen to increase the history learning on offer as this has proved to be very successful. Wildlife-themed education continues to develop and the recent grant from the Ernest Cook Trust has enabled the team to develop a range of new resources and a new woodland area.

Finding new income streams remains a priority for Carymoor and particularly income from charitable activities which helps to build the resilience and long term sustainability of the Charity. During 2017-18 a number of new activities will be tested, including running holiday activity days for unattended children and running a camp for young people in the Upper Dauncey field. The latter may work as a test to see if small-scale residential school trips could be viable in the future. The staff team's creativity and resourcefulness means a great deal is achieved for low-cost or no cost and their personal commitment to the Charity makes all the difference in our future planning. 2017 will mark the 21st anniversary of the charity and plans are in place to mark this excellent achievement.

Financial Review

The staff team has worked hard once again to keep expenditure to a minimum and to reach its income targets.

Overall income for the year was £165,246 and total expenditure was £149,346. This financial performance has continued to build on our sustainable business model and the Charity now has £79k in reserves, a figure that is in line with our financial policy. Of these reserves, £43k is specifically ringfenced for contingency and for the potential re-instatement of Upper Dauncey field.

Income from our educational activities, both at our site and as outreach work was £32,736, an increase of £1746 over 2015-16 (5.6%).

A further £22,331 has been raised towards the 'Going Underground' project during the year and we are looking forward to seeing this project come to fruition over the summer of 2017.

We would like to thank those individuals who have donated to the charity over the past year and thank the trust and grant giving bodies that have supported us during the year, including Garfield Weston, the Clark Foundation, Ernest Cook Trust and the SC and ME Morland Trust.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Carymoor Environmental Trust for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In preparing these financial statements the trustees are required to:

- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. The trustees considered that an audit was not required for the year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 and that an independent review was required.

I report on the accounts of Carymoor Environmental Trust for the year ended 31 March 2017, which are set out on pages 9 to 16.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below and have been consistently applied within the same accounts.

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

b) Cash flow statement

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS1 available for small companies from the requirement to prepare a cash flow statement.

c) Depreciation

Depreciation has been computed to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets less residual value over their expected useful lives using the following rates:-

Leasehold building Over 25 years

Plant and equipment 15 - 20% reducing balance method

Office and computer equipment Over 3 to 5 years

Fixed assets costing less than £250 are not capitalised.

d) Accounting for income

School visits, tours and courses

School visits, tours and courses are accounted for on a receivable basis.

Projects overheads charges

The funding for certain projects may include provision for an overheads charge. The charges are recognised in the accounts as unrestricted income on an accruals basis.

Restored land management fee

Restored land management fee is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are accounted for when they are received.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings appropriate to the organisation. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the Charity. Management and governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the Charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements. Support costs are allocated to the charity's activities either based on staff numbers or actual usage where this can be reliably determined.

f) Funds structure

Unrestricted funds

Income within this fund has been generated by the Charity and the use of such income has not been restricted to a particular purpose. In addition to meeting the costs of activities in furtherance of the charity's objects, the unrestricted fund has to pay for the general administration of the Trust.

Restricted funds

These are funds restricted to a particular purpose. During the period the Trust had five restricted funds. These funds were as follows:

The Projects fund represents funds generated from the landfill tax credit scheme which can be spent on approved projects and then reclaimed.

The Compost Champions, Community Recycling Prodject fund, Carymoor Wetlands Restoration Project fund and Going Underground Project fund represent funds received for a specific projects.
