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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30 June 2023

The trustees, 2 of who are also directors of the charitable company (the charity) for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, are pleased to present their report together with the consolidated financial statements of the charity and its subsidiary for the year ended 30th June 2023 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and financial statements for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustees Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

To promote for the benefit of children and young people who are sick, disabled or otherwise in need in the interests of social welfare and so to improve their conditions of life:

- i. the provision of facilities for recreation and other leisure time activity
- ii. the promotion of education through leisure time activities to develop their physical, mental and spiritual capacities that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and members of society

Public Benefit

The trustees follow the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and use the phrase "Fun and Happiness" to encapsulate the types of activities we provided and promoted, recognising that, for children, recreational and leisure time activities are ones that they would choose to do. Further, that these activities successfully engage their interest making informal education possible and, by making them happy, improve their quality of life.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

KidsOut is the Fun and Happiness Charity supporting disadvantaged children including children that have survived domestic violence and are relocated to a women's refuge. Children are often taken in the middle of the night with the clothes on their back and generally taken out of the area to a strange house sharing a room with their mother and siblings. This means they can no longer see their friends, attend their normal school or interact with other family members. In the years of collaboration, we have formed strong connections with women's refuges and domestic abuse support groups across the UK, all our services are developed following extensive consultation with refuge workers, mothers and children.

Children are at the heart of everything we do at KidsOut, with our support, children develop personal skills needed for a healthy mental outlook and wellbeing helping them to become well integrated members of our society and their community.



FUN DAYS

Fun days takes children across the UK on a fun day out and helps them remember what it is like to be a child. We provide fun days predominantely to children that have fled domestic abuse for the safety of a refuge, having experienced domestic violence either directly or witnessed it repeatedly at home, these children live with many emotional and economic challenges. KidsOut is the only national charity focussing directly on their needs, we also provide fun days to disadvantaged children across the UK from a range of backgrounds, including those living with critical health issues, in economic hardship or with a disability helping to provide happy and positive experiences for the children and their families to look back on.





For the year to 30th June 2023, we provided a total of 57,774 fun days out including providing Odeon cinema tickets to every child in refuge, open air cinema experiences, Ten Pin Bowling, Theatre trips, Pokemon World Championships, Easter Egg Hunts, Hasbro Tea party, Mexican Embassy Christmas Party, Pantomime Elf Spectacular, Kidzania, Elf City Experience, Circus Starr Big Top Circus, Local family fun days and the Kings Coronation celebration and much much more.

Ninja Warrior - An entertainment venue based on a hit ITV show "In this time of immense difficulty for families in refuge, it is essential that LIK' KidsOut can continue to provide fun and happiness to children who need



This year children have visited over 100 different attractions and events, with some of the biggest outings taking place at Chessington World of Adventures, Wicksteed Park, Aldershot Army Rugby Ground, Longleat Safari Park and Drayton Manor

Theme Park. The first National Rotary Day Out took place in 1990 and has since turned into the biggest single outing for disadvantaged children in the UK.


LAPTOPS/TABLETS



After implementing Wi-Fi within many of the refuges, we have also continued to provide laptops and tablets so there are multiple available for children to use whether that be do their school homework, interactively read/listen to our World Stories books or to play games.

SCHOOL UNIFORMS

Many children find themselves at a new school after being displaced to a refuge in a different area away from their home, we help to provide the school uniform required so the child can fit in to their new school rather than standing out.



FOOD VOUCHERS

We provided 5,596 Food Vouchers to families during the main school holidays of Christmas, Easter and Summer when access to free school meals are not evallable.

TOY BOX

We provide a box of brand-new toys to every child arriving at a Refuge averaging 10 wide ranging new toys including board games, puzzles, books, arts & crafts, footballs, cuddly toys specifically for their gender and age. This helps to entertain and keep them engaged while in the sanctuary of a Refuge and offer comfort for them and their mothers at a very difficult and traumatic time. We also include in every box a Booklet called "A Guide To Be On The Safe Side" that teaches children how to keep themselves safe in many different situations and also to look out for others.


We also work with many other organisations including hospitals, charities and trusts, churches, schools, councils and youth groups supplying toys to disadvantaged children across the UK with toys and fun days out.

We rely on the generosity of volunteers to be able to deliver our services, the total for the year were 2779 volunteers 23,755 hours broken down to National Rotary KidsOut Day 2325 volunteers 18,600 hours, Toy Box packing with CSR days 384 volunteers 4,723 hours and other 70 volunteers 432 hours.

Of the 225,522 toys received 123,068 were generously donated to us from toy companies and other charities, Hasbro, Cash4Kids,Olympia Toy Fair, Harper Collins, Gamely, Winning Moves, Splat Planet and Aurora plus the wonderful generosity of too many companies to mention through our Giving Tree appeal and general donations from the public a further 48,153 toys, the total in kind value exceeding £2m.

PHYZZPOD SENSORY ROOMS

We have 21 multi-sensory environments to help young children learn and explore creatively. Particularly benefitting children with learning and physical disabilities, each Phyzzpod is a semi-portable sensory learning room that includes coloured lighting, bubble tubes, effects projectors, sound and video projection. By controlling these elements, children engage multiple senses and have more fun learning.





WORLD STORIES

The collection has increased to 174 stories in the collection, a total of 724 translations (898 pieces of content). The total number of sign-ups was 76,528 at the end of June 2023 with 15159 during the year which included 13,392 teachers.

World Stories is a growing collection of stories from around the world. The collection includes retold traditional tales and new short stories in the languages most spoken by UK children. We add new stories, translations, pictures and sound recordings every week.

CHILL KIDSOUT WORKSHOP

74 children from Year 6 through to Year 10 attended a workshop to boost student's wellbeing and resilience during exam times with mindfulness games and an exploration of the human body and mind. The workshops use storytelling, journaling, movement, relaxation, drama games, and discussion providing a highly engaging, immersive learning experience. This is a brand-new service we are offering and hope to roll out to many more children across the UK in the future.

DIY/SOS NEUBERGER

On 30th June, Sinead Gilmore and the Neuberger team completed a garden renovation for Kensington Refuge in London, with a garden project front and back, including a new shed, an interactive area; hopscotch, covering for the bins and some Wisterial

GIVING TREE

Each year, we run our Giving Tree initiative. It is a very simple process where companies or individuals can sign up, we provide tags for hanging on their trees and staff and guests can take a tag and buy a present either from our online shop or from a high street store and put under the tree. We have collection centres around the UK where we collate and sort as many of the toys as possible before bringing back to our Luton warehouse. We ensure every child in refuge at Christmas receives a Christmas present.



Total of Toys donated through the Giving Tree Initiative were 32,600.

Financial Review

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources were donations in kind in the form of Fun Days Out and Toys £3,220,924 (2022: £3,452,891) together with income generated through fundraising £681,346 (2022: £860,208).

Reserves policy

Note 17 to the financial statements shows the movement on funds during the year. Unrestricted funds of the charity amounted to £1,410,346 of which £794,346 was freely available at the balance sheet date, the remainder being invested in tangible fixed assets.

The reserve policy during the year was as per the Charity Commission guidance. KidsOut maintained the recommended 6 months operating costs (£250,000); one year of committed services (£375,000) and provision for the reimbursement of ticket holders should the deferred events be cancelled, and refunds be requested (£140,000 net of deposits recoverable from venues).

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association, the trustees are nominated by other trustees and must be approved by a board meeting. One third of the trustees resign each year at the AGM of the charity (based on a rota system) but can stand again for re-election at the same meeting. When looking for new trustees to nominate, the trustee board undertakes a skills audit to highlight the areas desired by the charity and those currently lacking or under-represented.

None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

Decision making

The board of trustees administers the charity. The board meet quarterly, and individuals will input their particular areas of expertise through the Chief Executive where required at other times. The Chief Executive is appointed by the trustees to manage the day to day operation of the charity. The trustees delegate authority to the Chief Executive to facilitate operations including finance, fundraising, project development and service provision and employment.

Key management remuneration

All Trustees give their time freely and no Trustee/Director received remuneration in the year. The pay of senior staff is reviewed annually and normally increased in accordance with average earnings. In view of the nature of the charity, the directors benchmark against pay levels in other charities of a similar size and scale of activity. A remuneration committee through the Chairman sets and approves all pay awards for the staff.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. The staff of the charity submit their own areas of work to a risk assessment on an annual basis and the results of that are compiled in a risk register. This contains identified risks, the systems put in place to mitigate those risks and the procedures put in place to minimise the potential impact of those risks, should they materialise and is reviewed by the trustee board.

Employee involvement

The charity's policy is to consult and discuss with employees, through unions, staff councils and at meetings, matters likely to affect employees' interests. Information of matters of concern to employees is given through information bulletins and reports which seek to achieve a common awareness on the part of all employees of the financial and economic factors affecting the group's performance.

Disabled persons

Applications for employment by disabled persons are always fully considered, bearing in mind the aptitudes of the applicant concerned. In the event of members of staff becoming disabled, every effort is made to ensure that their employment within the charity continues and that the appropriate training is arranged. It is the policy of the charity that the training, career development and promotion of disabled persons should, as far as possible, be identical to that of other employees.

Fundraising

We are always exploring ways to grow our income whilst adhering to our values in all our activities. KidsOut manages its own activities in respect to raising funds in conjunction with our trading subsidiary and does not employ the services of external professional fundraisers. KidsOut takes its responsibilities towards its donors very seriously, and seeks to apply best practice to protect the personal data of its donors, never selling or swapping data and ensuring that communication preferences can be changed at any time. KidsOut is mindful of its responsibilities to vulnerable people and undertakes to react to and investigate any complaints regarding its activities for raising funds and to learn from them and improve its service. During the year, KidsOut received no formal complaints about its activities for raising funds.

 - o Identifying and testing journal entries, in particular journal entries posted with unusual account combinations;
 - o Assessing the extent of compliance with the relevant laws and regulations.

There are inherent limitations in the audit procedures described above and the further removed non-compliance with laws and regulations are from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, the less likely we would become aware of it. Also, the risk of not detecting a material misstatement due to fraud is higher than the risk of not detecting one resulting from error, as fraud may involve deliberate concealment by, for example, forgery or intentional misrepresentations, or through collusions.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charitable company, its members as a body and its trustees as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

1. CHARITY INFORMATION

Kids Out UK is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 14 Church Square, Leighton Buzzard, Bedfordshire, LU7 1AE.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The presentation currency of these financial statements is in £ sterling.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. The trustees have reviewed and considered relevant information, including the annual budget and future cash flows in making their assessment. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the trustees have tested their cash flow analysis to take into account the impact on their business of possible scenarios brought on by the impact of COVID-19, alongside the measures that they can take to mitigate the impact. Based on these assessments, given the measures that could be undertaken to mitigate the current adverse conditions, and the current resources available, the trustees have concluded that they can continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual report and accounts.

Group financial statements

The financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly owned subsidiary, Kids Out Trading Limited on a line-by-line basis.

Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key source of estimation uncertainty arises from the valuation of fun days out and toys donated to the charity.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. Gifts in kind are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay for the goods on the open market.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an Impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

The Charity benefits greatly from the involvement and support of its many volunteers. In accordance with FRS 102 and the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the economic contribution of general volunteers is not recognised in the accounts.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 30 June 2023

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Allocation and apportionment of Support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include back office costs, finance, personnel, payroll and governance costs which support the charity's programme and activities. These costs have been allocated between the cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property

- 2% on cost

Improvements to property

- Straight line over 10 - 20 years

Motor vehicles

- 25% on reducing balance

Computer equipment

- 33% on reducing balance

Stocks and donated goods

Stocks comprise toys and vouchers donated to the charity for distribution to its beneficiaries and are valued at in kind value (retail price less cost price) after making due allowance for obsolete and slow-moving items

Donated goods and gifts in kind are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay for the goods on the open market. The open market value is updated every year to reflect the inflation and price changes. A corresponding amount is recognised in stock in the period of receipt. Stock is reduced when the toys and vouchers are distributed and an equivalent charge is included in charitable activities at that point.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash held in short term deposit accounts or accounts with instant access.

19. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

Kids Out Trading Limited

Kids Out Trading is a wholly owned subsidiary of Kids Out UK. During the year one trustee of Kids Out UK was a director of Kids Out Trading Limited, a UK company. The company raises funds on behalf of the charity. The company paid the charity a management charge for costs incurred on its behalf of £nil (2022 - £nil) and a donation of £5,494 (2022 - £230,941).

As at 30 June 2023, the Company owed Kids Out UK £274,204 (2022 - £278,674) which was unsecured and repayable upon demand.

The director is also a director of Advance Boardroom Excellence Limited, a registered company. Kids Out Trading made a net sales of £11,000 (2022: £20,000) to Advanced Boardroom Excellence Limited.

The key management personnel of the charity is the Chief Executive Officer whose employee benefits including Employers National Insurance totalled £138,983 (2022 - £120,045).
