New Sandfields Sustainable Regeneration (Limited by Guarantee) Financial Statements For the year ended 31 March 2001

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Directors' Report for the year ended 31 March 2001 (continued)

The directors present their report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2001.

The company is limited by guarantee and as such, has no shareholders.

Principal Activity

The principal activity of the company is the regeneration of the local area through communications and activities with residents.

Company Members

The liability of the members is limited to £10 each.

Business Review

In the first half of the financial year New Sandfields Sustainable Regeneration Limited ("NSSR") emerged from a period of organisational and community development which had resulted in a situation of under funding. Between May and October the organisation relied wholly on the income from the Strategic Development scheme administered by Neath Port Talbot County Borough Council ("NPCBC"). Help was made available by NPCBC and BP in kind; in order to sustain the organisation through a difficult period whilst an application to the National Lotteries Board ("NLCB") was finalised. NPCBC agreed to administer the payroll of NSSR and agreed to allow the quarterly payroll to be paid in arrears.

From 1st October 2000 the NLCB money became available, which covered salary costs and the printing and distribution of our newsletter "Making Waves".

NSSR started the second half of the financial year well with the move to new premises in Sandfields. The building is an ideal venue for NSSR to expand its range of community services and to build upon the progress made to date.

October saw NSSR make great strides with the opening of the "Turning Tide Youth Cybercafe". The project was the brainchild of NSSR and was made viable through the partnership formed with the local authority's Youth Inclusion Programme.

The award of a grant from the NLCB also enabled NSSR to hire café staff and an administrator. The installation of the computer equipment commenced what has turned out to be a very successful partnership and project.

During January the company was successful in securing an award of £4976 from the National Assembly food awards to run microwave cookery classes for the youth on Sandfields. This tied in nicely with the "Healthy Eating" focus of the café.

Business Review (continued)

As the early part of the year progressed NSSR was successful in forging many partnerships with various local organisations. The introduction in February of a monthly "working practitioners lunch" formed the basis for NSSR and other organisations to network and forge partnerships outside of NSSR's remit.

The lunches also proved an ideal vehicle to advertise the facilities available for hire and have resulted in several organisations using the premises for buffet lunches and seminars.

March saw the resignation of chief executive director Mr Travers Merrill. Mr Merrill felt that NSSR would benefit from a fresh approach to various interests. His successor Mr Ian Isaac took up post in April.

The work to consolidate partnerships in the form of formal agreements with organisations based or working in the Sandfields area continues with new impetus by the new chief executive director.

NSSR is now seeking to encourage participation from all areas of the community and plans to draw in members of all age groups in activities designed to build confidence both on a community and individual level. Links with the comprehensive school and plans to engage local further educational establishments will open up further areas of development to the Sandfields community.

As referred to above, as a consequence of an accumulation of historical problems the company suffered financially as a result of under-funding in the first half of the financial year which led to a deficit of some £22,000. This has resulted in converting balance sheet reserves of £12,408 at the start of the financial year, into a deficit of £9,690 at 31st March 2001.

The board is actively addressing this problem and is in search of a financial solution prior to the company taking up charity status.

The Company's Aims and Future Objectives

NSSR was set up in 1998 having evolved from New Sandfields 2000 which was a community partnership consortium between NPCBC, BP Baglan, British Steel, Lloyds TSB and other residents groups and organisations in the Sandfields area.

NSSR was established with the aim of being a charitable company to work in partnership with the Local Authority, residents on the Sandfields Estate, BP Baglan and others to pursue sustainable development and tackle social disadvantage based on the expressed needs of the residents in the area.

NSSR has worked with NPCBC at various levels in pursuance of these aims

The Company's Aims and Future Objectives (continued)

The following themes form the background to the development of a strategic plan for the next three years:

- NSSR as a Sandfields Community regeneration organisation co-ordinating, hosting and facilitating other voluntary and statutory organisations either based or working in the Sandfields area.
- NSSR as a host organisation for working parties on:
 - Resident sea front development and management ideas
 - Annual sea festival project
 - Community safety issues
 - Transport
 - Youth
 - Elderly
 - · Capacity building
 - Health
 - Working practitioners networks and seminars
- NSSR as a frontline organisation providing discrete services either directly or in partnership with others, seeking synergies and adding value to bids and proposals as well as the outcomes in terms of capacity building, social and human capital in the area.
- NSSR as an organisation promoting and working in partnership with other organisations to achieve sustainable development and community involvement. There needs to be a holistic approach to sustainability for the community of Sandfields. There is a link between deprivation and the physical environment in which people live. There is also a link between underachievement and the lack of daytime and evening opportunities for those who lack basic skills in literacy, numeracy and information communication technology.
- New Sandfields needs to work with others to target those who either lack the abilities to access mainstream services or who are excluded by reasons of lack of employment, attendance at school, are disabled or who are involved in drugs or alcohol abuse. Alongside those who are more able or more economically active, NSSR seeks new and innovative ways of engaging with people to have a direct say and involvement in the regeneration of their community.
- The aim is to improve the environment, improve access to work, local authority and voluntary sector services, cultural and leisure activities. The establishment of a seafront visitor centre designed and run by the community is an admirable goal and objective towards these ends. An immediate objective is the increased use of the sustainable development centre at Bevin Avenue, Sandfields. To expand and further develop the café service and consolidate partnership with the youth inclusions programme ("YIP").
- NSSR as a direct provider of services and joint provider of services in partnership for disadvantaged individuals and groups on the Sandfields estate to gain access to training and daytime and evening activities that will help develop their social and vocational skills and improve employability.

The Company's Aims and Future Objectives (continued)

• To have a plan for service and project development on a scale conducive to achieving a critical mass whereby it can function effectively as a co-ordinating community capacity building and community sustainable regeneration body supported by interested residents and key stakeholders in the community.

The company has obtained clearance to achieve charity status and aims to become a charity within the next twelve months.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2001

1. Accounting Policies

1.1. Company status

The company is limited by guarantee and has no issued share capital. The liability of its members, who number 10 shall not exceed £10.

1.2. Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective March 2000).

1.3. Turnover

Turnover represents the total invoice value, excluding value added tax, of sales made during the year.

1.4. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

1.5. Leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income as incurred.

1.6. Pensions
