VISION, MISSION and ETHOS

Imagine a society where everyone reaches their full potential. Where the future is not defined by the past or determined by the place a person starts.

City Gateway exists to give everyone the equal chance to change the future. And through what we do, we help change society.

We serve people in communities most impacted by social and economic inequality. We seek to transform those communities by improving individuals' life chances. We deliver programmes that enable positive, sustained outcomes in empowerment, education and employment.

Ethos

At City Gateway, we believe everyone is made equal and in the image of God. We strive to follow the example of Jesus, in loving and helping those excluded and in need in society.

Why?

We believe we are called to demonstrate the love of God in practical ways by addressing the inequality of opportunity in London. Of the 8.8million Londoners, 280,000 are unemployed. Of this 280,000 unemployed, almost a third (90,000) are 16-24 year olds. 30,000 of these Young People are economically inactive and sustained NEET and 20,000 of these live in East London.

Our Approach

City Gateway aims to provide the gateway for our students between a place of social and economic inequality and further education or work. Our training and employment services take a unified approach, providing all the elements of functional, vocational and employability training, supported by wrap-around coaching and safeguarding support. This model helps our students to overcome critical issues and to remain in a supportive educational environment that is tailored to their learning and developmental needs. In turn they are enabled to work through negative patterns over a sustained period and to gain the confidence, skills and appropriate qualifications needed for further education or long-term employment.

Our Impact

"The accumulated impact of former City Gateway learners who are currently employed in the regional workforce amounts to £5.7 million in added income in the Tower Hamlets and surrounding boroughs' economy each year. Every £1 invested into learner education at City Gateway yields £5.90 in higher future wages. A 16.3% annual rate of return."

When I heard him over the phone crying, it was just like, it was just my dad, the person who I look up to, the person who is that strong model is actually crying because of this."

"I didn't have no confidence in myself, I didn't think I was going to get anywhere in life and then I came to City Gateway. The experience has been amazing", says Deen, having recently started his Apprenticeship at Man Group. Drawing on the encouragement and support of his coach at City Gateway, he has gained self-belief, confidence and a determination to succeed. "I met a really good guy, my coach' says Deen, "he is actually the reason I am here today, he built up my confidence, he built up my skillset, my mind frame and he told me I was worth it and I could do it. Back then I wouldn't have believed it but now I believe. I've been told by my line manager that I'm doing really well, progressing really fast. So my next step is to secure a permanent position. Once I do that I'm going to stick with my IT role and keep pursuing my career and I actually asked them, if I do - can I train someone from City Gateway like myself. So I hope I can do that."

STRUCTURE and GOVERNANCE

City Gateway is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 28 April 1999. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission.

City Gateway has always, and will continue to take its responsibilities of ensuring that its charitable activities contribute significantly to the lives of those we work with and specifically within the local areas in which those activities are undertaken. With reference to Charities Act 2011, all our charitable activities are directed towards having a lifelong impact on the local area and these activities are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Trustees are appointed on the basis of their skills and experience as well as their passion to further City Gateway's vision, mission and ethos. A mix of different skills and backgrounds is sought on the board and sub groups.

Each candidate is interviewed by the Chair of the Board and the Chief Executive Officer and if successful is then invited to attend a board meeting as an observer prior to a secret ballot vote by Trustees. The Trustees in office during the year ended 31 August 2016 are listed on page 3.

All Trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no private benefit from the charity. The term of office for a Trustee is limited to 3 years which is extendable by arrangement and with the agreement of the board for a further 2 years. Any extensions beyond five years can only be made under exceptional circumstances and requires the agreement of the whole board.

Newly appointed Trustees are briefed on their responsibilities and the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the current Strategic Business Plan, and given an overview of the recent financial performance. Each trustee is invited for a tour of the buildings to be introduced to the staff and the organisation on the ground as part of their induction. The functions of the board and its decision-making processes are also explained, as are their individual roles, responsibilities and legal obligations under both charity and company law. Each Trustee has clear responsibilities, is often given a particular role and is expected to attend all Trustee meetings and any relevant sub group meetings. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training, where this facilitates the undertaking of their role.

Trustees are responsible for setting general policy, finalising and approving the annual plan and budget, monitoring the charity and taking major decisions about the strategic direction of the charity and the capital expenditure. Trustees appoint the Chief Executive Officer ("CEO") to manage and lead the charity and agree a level of delegated authority. The remuneration of the CEO and other key management personnel is approved annually by the Trustees.

LEADERSHIP and MANAGEMENT

City Gateway has a brilliant staff team, led by the CEO, and operates an internal communications policy with the aim of driving optimum staff involvement in the charity's activities. City Gateway celebrates diversity and promotes equal opportunity in employment.

The CEO is accountable to the board of Trustees through the Chairman who has regular meetings with the CEO. The CEO is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met.

Our Services

City Gateway supports those who are most in need – often isolated individuals who lack the skills and support to access opportunities to break out of poverty and improve their quality of life. Our students have often been in care, ex-offenders, those involved in local gang culture, those with substance misuse issues, physical or mental health problems or learning difficulties, people who have experienced domestic abuse or can be at risk of sexual exploitation. Many of our students have been excluded from mainstream services and lack confidence and skills to progress towards their full potential. We work with the belief that by dealing with the root causes rather than the costly after-effects of social and economic disadvantage, exploitation and exclusion, we can enhance a person's ability to transition and navigate life's challenges more effectively.

Our provision is in two main areas: Young People's Education, Training and Employability and Family Programmes. As part of this we run an Apprenticeship Training Agency, which offers services to employers to source and host our Apprentices.

Financial Review

The accounts contained in this report have been presented in accordance with "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)" - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and with relevant companies and charities legislation and regulations.

2016/17 Statement of Financial Activities

The Trustees report a year of good progress in 2016/17. Throughout this year we have strengthened the foundations of the Trust after separating the City Gateway Alternative Provision School into a separate entity on 31 August 2016.

2016/17 has been a year of transition for City Gateway where we have refocussed our delivery for our students, restructured the organisation and reduced it's cost base and established a sure financial foundation from which to operate in the future.

We are pleased to report that our cash position is healthy at year end and our cash reserves are in excess of reserves policy at the end of the year.

City Gateway's gross income from all sources, how this income was expended and the split of financial activity between restricted and unrestricted funds is shown in detail in the following pages.

Annual income was £2.6m. This is reduced on the previous year due to the inclusion of City Gateway Alternative Provision School in the prior year.

The annual deficit was significantly improved in the year from £630,000 in 2016 to £274,000 in 2017.

Reserves

City Gateway is committed to using its resources in pursuit of its charitable activities. It is also committed to maintaining a level of reserves that is prudent to meet its on-going liabilities, sufficient to ensure that all service delivery commitments can be met and to protect the long term sustainable future of operations. This commitment is in line with the Operational guidance No 43 (Charity Income Reserves) issued by the Charity Commission which seeks to guarantee financial security and ensure a sufficient level of reserves.

The reserves policy is to aim to maintain sufficient reserves to cover at least 3 months future expenditure. This policy is regularly reviewed to ensure that it continues to be appropriate and sufficient.

Cash Reserves at 31 August 2017 totalled £777,000 which represents 3.4 months future expenditure.

Free reserves at 31st August 2017 were £319,000 (2016: £467,000). This corresponds to 1.5 months (2016 0.7 months) of unrestricted expenditure.

Future plans

The Trustees plan in the future to build on our mission to transform the life chances of young people and families in East London communities most impacted by social and economic inequality.

In the coming years, we plan to develop and build our partnerships with Employers, both in Apprenticeships and entry-level employment, to give our Students the best possible opportunities to reach their full potential.

In addition to this, we will continue to focus a part of our work around families and women as this work continues to be vital in early intervention and wider social transformation.

We plan to raise funds in order to adequately support this work by continuing to build our valuable partnerships with Government, Grant awarding bodies, Trusts and the Corporate sector.

Risk management

We continue to assess, review, monitor and plan for all risks which the organisation may face, now or in the future. Our Risk Management Strategy comprises a risk register of all aspects of the organisation and its activities, outlining possible risks which may occur, procedures to mitigate the risks identified and regular reassessments both of the risks already outlined on the register and of potential new risks. This process raises awareness of the potential risks and assists with the development of robust contingency plans.

A current key risk is the Fundraising landscape. Most of City Gateway's fundraising streams are provided for between one and three year cycles. City Gateway has a detailed plan of engagement and impact accountability reporting with current and potential future funders looking forward into the coming years.



STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees (who are also the directors of City Gateway for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the income and expenditure of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Report of the independent auditor to the members of City Gateway

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of (the 'charity') for the year ended 31 August 2017 which comprise Consolidated Statement of financial activities, the Consolidated and Charity Balance sheets, the Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

City Gateway meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Under s408 of the Companies Act 2006 the charitable company is exempt from the requirement to present its own Statement of Financial activities. The deficit for the year for the charitable parent company was £265,655 (2016: deficit of £627,802).

The charity has also taken advantage of the exemption available in accordance with FRS not to disclose transactions with its wholly owned subsidiary company.

Income

income is included on the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Income received in advance on contracts, performance related grants and grants for future periods is carried through to the Balance Sheet as deferred income and included in creditors. Where it is probable that income received will be claimed back, this amount is included in the SOFA as an income provision and is also included on the Balance Sheet as a creditor.

Expenditure

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Intangible fixed assets

Website and software costs have been capitalised at historic cost and amortised on a straight line basis over 2 years and 5 years respectively.

Tangible fixed assets.

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated in order to write off each asset evenly over its estimated useful life. Individual items costing under £1,000 are written off on purchase. Estimated useful life of assets is as follows:

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Designated funds are those unrestricted funds which the trustees have earmarked to be used for a particular purpose.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Operating leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension scheme

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charity to the fund in respect of the year.

19. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Due to the nature of the Charity's operations and composition of its Trustees, it is possible that there will be transactions from time to time between the Charity and organisations with which Trustees of the Charity have a relationship. • City Gateway received distributions of £172,193 (2016: £30,000) from City Gateway Enterprises Limited.

As at 31 August 2017 a balance of £556,857 (2016: £306,655) was due to City Gateway.

Purchases of £4,800 (2016: £26,033) were made from The Corporate Comms Shop Limited, a company where one of the trustees is also a director.

20. PENSION COMMITMENTS

The charity operates a defined contributions pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity in independently administered funds. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable by the charity to the funds and amounted to £82,443 (2016 - £240,686). At the year end there were outstanding refunds of £415 (2016: £nil).

21. PRIOR YEAR ADJUSTMENT

During the year it was identified that deferred income of £89,850 had been incorrectly released in the year ended 31 August 2016. A prior year adjustment was therefore made to increase the deferred income balance and reduce the unrestricted reserves by this amount. The opening balances as at 1 September 2016 were unaffected.
