

Treasurers Statement

The year showed a deficit of £46,525 compared with a deficit of £58,680 for the previous year. This was a reduction of £12,155 or 21%. Although, the reduction was a positive trend, the deficit was still significant and would need addressing by the Trustees in the short term either by increasing income through additional income streams or by reducing expenses and overheads.

Income was down from £59,905 to £57,768 a fall of £2,137 or 4%. This showed a positive trend as in 2014/2015 the income included a legacy of £5,600. Rents showed an improvement through rent increases and no voids. Meeting room hire had increased through a letting hire increase. Appeals income had decreased but still provided 19% of the total incoming resources.

Total resources expended had shown a reduction of £14,292 or 12%.

This positive trend was mainly due to a reduction in premises costs which this year had not included any major refurbishment or works.

Report of the Directors

For the year ended 31st March 2016, the Directors of **sight** airedale have pleasure in submitting its report and the audited financial statement for the year ended 31st March 2016.

The accounts comply with current statutory requirements, the charity's governing documents and SORP (revised 2005).

Structure, Governance and Management.

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee. The organisation was established on the 9th May 1907, registered in accordance with the National Assistance Act 1948 on the 7th December 1948, registered under the Charities Act 1985 on the 29th April 1999 number 3762507 and registered under the charities Act 1993 on the 7th April 2000 number 1080245. The charitable company governing document was adopted on the 31st March 2000 and amended on the 5th October 2005 to include beneficiaries resident in Ilkley and District and established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association. The Charity Commission approved the change of title of the charity from Keighley and District Association for the Blind to sight airedale on the 20th May 2011. In the event of the company being wound up Trustees are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.00. The charity does not have trustee liability insurance.

The organisation is governed by a Board of Directors. The Board usually meets bimonthly. The Board reports to the General Committee three times a year. The Directors are elected by the members of the General Committee, who are Trustees of the charity, at the Annual General Meeting. At the Annual General Meeting all the Directors retire from office and elections are held to fill these vacancies. Retiring directors are eligible to stand for re-election. The names of the Directors and Trustees of the charity are shown in this report. Trustees do not receive any remuneration for their services to the charity.

Trustee Recruitment and Appointment

Trustees are generally recruited through word of mouth.

Trustee Induction and Training

Prior to appointment, new Trustees receive an induction pack. The induction pack includes the memorandum of association, the latest financial statements, copies of previous minutes and the magazine. On appointment, new Trustees have a personalised induction programme, where they attend one to one introductory sessions with the Chairman and Chief Executive

These meetings are designed to cover the main operational framework of the charity, the current financial position and future plans and objectives.

Statement of Responsibility of the Directors

Company Law requires the Board to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the organisation's state of affairs at the end of the year and of its financial activities for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Board are required to:-

- Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently
- Make adjustments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the association will continue in business in the foreseeable future.

The Board are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the association and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with The Companies Act 2006. They are responsible for safeguarding the assets of the organisation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. The Board has overall responsibility for the activities of the organisation advised by the Chief Executive.

There are currently two Sub Committees, Finance and Appeals. The Board set clear terms of reference for the committees and receive regular reports on their activities.

Management

The Chief Executive is responsible for the day to day management of the organisation, acting under delegated authority given by the Board.

Associated Relationships

Sight airedale works with other national, regional and local charities that focus on the needs of sight impaired people. We also have a close contact with local authority Health and Adult Services Sensory Needs teams.

Risk Management and Internal Controls

The Board continually reviews the major risk a small local charity faces. It is satisfied that the arrangements for managing these risks within the limited staff resources available will ensure that sufficient funds are available to maintain services for the foreseeable future. The charity does not have the resources for an internal audit programme. The charity uses specialist consultants where appropriate. However the systems are designed to safeguard the charity's assets, ensure that proper accounting records are maintained and provide reliable information. The Board believes that these systems will provide reasonable but not absolute assurances against errors or fraud. The major risks identified by the Board were a failure to secure adequate revenue finance and a difficulty in recruiting Trustees particularly with sight impairment.

Key Elements of the organisation Control System Includes the Following:

- The Board meets bi-monthly. There is a clear organisational structure with appropriate levels of accountability and reporting lines. The Board has established two Sub Committees with clear terms of reference.
- The Board approves the delegation of financial authority through the Chief Executive
- Any capital commitment in excess of £500 requires approval by the Directors
- The organisation investment portfolio is managed by an independent investment manager who operates within the specific guidelines and restrictions set and reviewed twice a year by the Board. The Finance Sub Committee meets on an annual basis and comprises of The Honorary Treasurer, Chairman and Vice Chairman.
- The Appeals Sub Committee usually meets monthly.

Aims, Objectives and Activities

The organisation, like all charities is restricted to undertaking only activities that are in accordance with its aims, objects and associated powers.

The aims are "to advocate, to develop and provide services whether, practical, financial or otherwise to support people who are registered severely sight impaired and sight impaired in the Airedale District to help them achieve independence with dignity in all aspects of life and society"

The main objectives and activities for the year continue to focus on information and support for severely sight impaired and sight impaired people. The strategies employed to assist the charity meet these objectives include the following:

- Providing a range of services which address some of the problems of sight loss
- Supporting not only the individual but also their family and friends and the wider community of the Airedale District.
- Working in partnership with other agencies to secure the widest range of services.

Public Benefit Statement

The Trustees have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit in exercising their powers or duties.

Achievement and Performance

The main areas of charitable activity are information, support services and benefit and grant enquiries.

Information

Information is requested through the helpline and visitors to the office on the services of **sight** airedale and enquiries about other sight impairment providers. The Chief Executive made 5 home visits compared with 34 visits in 2014/2015. The main outlet for information is the charity's seefact magazine sent out three times a year in seven different formats; Large Print (16pt), CD, Tape, Braille, Email, MP3 Memory Stick and eBook to 469 Friends of **sight** airedale and volunteers, supporters and Health Professionals.

Volunteers

The work of **sight** airedale owes much to the support the charity receives from its 57 volunteers. The majority of voluntary work is carried out in our Social Centres, however contributions are made on the Board of Directors, General Committee, Sub Committees, Appeals, Audio Book Library and the production of the Newsletter.

The annual Mary Arnold Award introduced in 2000 recognises and celebrates the outstanding contribution volunteers make to the work of the charity. The winner in 2015 was Mrs Joan Barrett.

Support Services

The Social Centres service is delivered by our volunteer organisers, voluntary helpers and Chief Executive. Without their commitment this service could not be delivered and addresses the social isolation often experienced by severely sight impaired and sight impaired people. Over the past year, there has been a decrease in demand for this service. The Skipton Centre closed at the 31st March 2016 after 80 years service.

The Daily Living Shop has had 105 contacts compared with 190 in 2014/2015. This service offers demonstrations of specialised equipment designed for sight impaired people, carried out by members of the team. The greatest demand continues to be for Low Vision Assessments.

Our six rented properties have **not** been fully occupied. The bungalow in Oakworth has had a void. The five flats in Keighley have been fully occupied. One tenant is a Friend of **sight** airedale. The income from this service continues to be a valuable source of unrestricted funds.

Benefit Form Service

The Chief Executive supported three Friends of **sight** airedale, often involving a home visit to complete claim forms for Attendance Allowance, Employment Support Allowance and Personal Independence Payment. The service generated £100, dependent on entitlement. Nine individuals received support in 2014/2015.

Grant Requests

No requests for Special Needs Grants were received by the Board. A previous grant was made in 2014/2015.

Redesign of the Charities Newsletter

The seefact newsletter is published three times a year and is sent free to all registered friends of sight airedale and professionals. Based on feedback to the Chief Executive from a friend of sight airedale. The Assistant and ICT Manager redesigned the large print edition of the newsletter to provide a more contemporary magazine style.

Redesign of the Charities Contact Database

Our contact database initially developed in 2008, has undergone many modifications over the years and was becoming inefficient. Work started on developing a new system in June and went live in October. Development work was carried out in-house by the ICT Manager.

Produce a Mobile Version of the Charities Website

Work on developing a mobile edition of the charities website was more complicated than expected so will be carried out next year.

Integrate the shop catalogue into the website

The Daily Living Shop catalogue is now integrated into the website, allowing visitors to view shop items but not order them.

Mobile Technology Demonstration Service.

The Mobile Technology Demonstration service was established in October 2013 in response to growing numbers of enquiries relating to mobile phones and tablet computers. Set up with a grant from the Santander Foundation and Oxenhope Straw Race the service provides demonstrations of a range of Mobile Technologies such as mobile phones and tablets.

Between the 1st April 2015 and 31st March 2016, 26 people accessed the mobile technology service with 39 enquiries. This compares with 36 people making 51 enquiries during 2014/2015.

Braille Learning

The Braille Learning Service was established in 2011 in response to the lack of Braille tuition available locally. A volunteer tutor provides the service, and the course runs from September to March. Students receive one-to-one tuition in basic Braille skills.

Regrettably, we have had no interest in this service over the year.

Transcription Service

In response to requests from sight impaired people for documents to be converted into Braille through the withdrawal of such a service by Bradford Council.

As a result, the Braille transcription service was established in 2006. The aim of the service is to provide local sight impaired people, voluntary and commercial organisations with a resource for providing accessible versions of documents. We are now able to convert documents into Braille, Audio CD, text and eBook Formats and large print.

We have seen a reduction in demand for Braille. In part, this is due to recent advances in mobile technology that give sight impaired people wider access to reading materials. Approximately 1% of the sight impaired community use Braille.

Income from transcription jobs for 2015/2016 was £90 compared with £30 for 2014/2015. The bulk of the income comes from the production of a newsletter for another local blind society.

The seefact newsletter accounts for the majority of transcription work. We provide seefact in nine different formats, large print, Braille, MP3 Memory Stick, Audio CD, Audio Cassette, Email (PDF, HTML, MP3 Download, eBook formats for both the Kindle and iPad).

Computer Learning

Computers provide a sight impaired person with independence, the ability to handle their correspondence, access news and other information, as well as the skills needed for work or study. Computer learning has been offered since 1998.

Delivered by the ICT Manager, the service provides access to one to one computer learning, customised to the needs of the individual.

For the year 2015/2016, nine students accessed computer training compared with ten students in the previous year. As a result of the introduction of a £3 charge per session in January 2015 student fees for 2015/2016 were £138 compared with £51 the previous year.

Digital Audio Library

Our library service provides registered Friends of **sight** airedale with free access through the Articles for the Blind Scheme to a wide range of digital audio books. The ICT Manager organises the service under the direction of the Chief Executive along with three volunteers who help with the conversion of books from donated cassettes to MP3.

As of the 31 March 2015, there are 1962 books in the library. For 2015/2016 8 people borrowed 62 books, this compares with ten people borrowing 131 books in 2014/2015. Thanks have to go to the continuing work of the volunteers, Jack and Joan Coan and Elsie Altass. 2016 will see the 2,000th title added to our library.

Income Streams

Income for 2015/2016 was £3,139.42 compared with £649.61 for 2012/2013. The increase in income can be accounted to the development of a contact database system for another local blind society at £2,694.00. Other income came from student fees, donations, transcription fees and Amazon referral fees.

Plans for the next 12 months:-

- Upgrade payroll system to allow for the introduction of Automatic Enrolment in June 2016.
- Develop a VI Awareness training course
- Generate income via the charities YouTube channel
- Produce a mobile version of the website.

Plans for the future

The Chief Executive will redraft the memorandum of association or constitution of the charity subject to a decision by the Trustees on the eligibility criteria. The present memorandum was approved in March 2000 however since then there has been a change in Charity Commission legislation and the title of the charity.

Financial Review

Free Reserves Policy

The Charity receives its funds through voluntary income as opposed to earned income. The organisation holds free reserves for the following purposes:

- To provide continuity of activities in the event of a large variety of voluntary income
- To deal with emergencies
- To deal with short term fluctuation in cash flow
- To be able to develop and grasp new opportunities as they arise

During the year free reserves (fixed asset investment) were £264,349 (2015 £320,314).

The level of reserves is equivalent to nineteen months running costs plus a designated fund of £100,000 as a building contingency. The free reserves policy is to achieve sufficient free reserves to allow the organisation to find new sources of funding for key work or the restructure in order to maintain continuity and to continue key work in the event of a sudden major loss of funding. Also, reserves may be used to fund a budgeting deficit. The free reserves policy is reviewed at least once a year by the Finance Sub Committee.

Overview

The Charity had an overall (deficit) for the year of (£55,050), (2015 deficit £44,215).

Voluntary Income

The organisation is dependent on voluntary income and no earned income is received from statutory sources or national organisations. This year the organisation's voluntary income does not meet its expenditure. It is the view of the directors that all possible areas of income should be considered without compromising the values of the charity and its duty to deal with the issues identified by local severely sight impaired and sight impaired.

Notes Forming Part of the Financial Statements for the Year to 31 March 2016

1. Accounting Policies

a. Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charity have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRSSE) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 15)', the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

b. Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members elect directors of the company for the purposes of the Companies Act. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the charity.

c. Donations, legacies and voluntary income

Income is recorded when receivable whenever the amount is known otherwise it is accounted for on a cash received basis. Legacies are recorded on a cash received basis due to the uncertainty of the value of estates until received.

The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

d. Depreciation of tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to reduce the net book value of those assets to their estimated residual value at the end of their expected useful lives at the following rates:

Fixtures and Fittings - 25% reducing balance Computer Equipment - 20% reducing balance

Property improvements - 2% on cost

No depreciation is provided on freehold properties since the company maintains the properties to such a high standard that their value is in excess of their cost, improvements however are depreciated over their estimated lives of 50 years.

e. Investments

In accordance with recommended practice listed investments are stated at market value. Changes in market value are included in the Statement of Financial Activities as unrealised gains and losses.

f. Pension costs

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable for the year are charged in the Statement of Financial Activities.

e. Grants

Grants payable are recorded as direct charitable expenditure when paid.

Grants receivable are recorded under incoming resources wherever the amount is known, otherwise they are accounted for on a cash received basis.

f. Expenditure

Directly attributable expenditure on staff and other costs are charged to direct charitable expenditure, fund raising or general administration as appropriate.
