DIRECTORS' REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

The Directors present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2023.

Directors

The Directors who served during the year were: Neil Yeomans (Chair from 1 November 2022) James Greenshields (Chair to 31 October 2022) Claire Elizabeth Tait Jenkins Lars Mikael Nilsson Tallulah Self (resigned on 7 May 2022) Ann Elizabeth Summerhayes (CEO)

Results and Financial Review

The loss for the year after taxation is shown in the Statement of Financial Activities, which is set out on page 6.

In the year Inside Job Productions (IJP) received total income of £278,322 (2022: £272,078). With total expenditure of £279,197 (2022: £335,490), there was a net loss of £875 (2022: net loss of £63,412). Inside Job Productions' net assets at 31 March 2023 were £73,269 (2022: £74,024) and cash in hand was £48,249 (2022: £37,776).

Objectives and Activities

Inside Job Productions is an award-winning film and digital production company, operating as a social enterprise. We make film and digital content for clients across the third, public and corporate sectors.

Our clients range from some of the world's largest corporations to some of the UK's smallest charities. Our work spans all genres of film including documentary, drama, animation, promotional, educational and films shot at conferences and exhibitions. We also provide other digital services including photography, creative design and podcasts.

As a social enterprise we use the profits we make from our core business to develop and run training programmes and offer paid employment to people experiencing mental ill health.

We continuously develop new social impact projects aimed at improving the mental health and wellbeing of individuals from some of the most marginalised communities in the UK. The development of the ideas for these projects is largely funded through the company's profits. The projects themselves are funded through grants from government or from grant-making trusts and foundations.

Achievements and Performance

Core Business

Inside Job Productions had another successful year securing commissions from existing and new clients across the corporate, public and third sector.

From the corporate sector we continued to produce content for Janssen, the pharmaceutical division of global corporate Johnson & Johnson, Control Risks, NFU Mutual and took on a new client in Wates. From the public sector we produced a series of films for PACT. From the third sector we continued to work with SENSE and Social Enterprise UK and took on several new clients such as Irene Taylor Trust and Mencap.

Achievements and Performance (continued)

Social Impact

During the period under review, the grant income which funded the majority of our social impact continued to represent a significant part of the total income of the company. This grant income, awarded through HM Prison and Probation Service (HMPPS), funded the salaries and costs associated with the Mental Health Media Production Unit (MHMPU) at HMP Wandsworth. The costs for the part-time Production Assistants, who worked within the MHMPU, were met from the surplus on grant income of the company. Throughout the period under review, the MHMPU has been managed by Owain Astles and supported by Ayo Abolaji. The project has been overseen by our former Chair, James Greenshields. The funding for the project came to an end in September 2022.

Structure, Governance and Management

The legal structure of Inside Job Productions C.I.C is that of a Community Interest Company. With its asset lock and clear commitment to social goals, we believe that our C.I.C. status serves our vision well as a company committed to the growth of its core business alongside an increasingly ambitious social impact programme.

On 1 July 2023, Mofe Ibrahim Binitie and Amanda Poerning were appointed as directors.

The two shares in Inside Job Productions C.I.C. were owned by a company limited by guarantee, Media for Development (Holdings) Ltd. On 24 October 2022 these two shares were transferred to Ann Summerhayes and James Greenshields respectively.

Subsequent to the year end, one additional share was issued to each of the remaining directors, being Neil Yeomans, Mofe Ibrahim Binitie, Claire Jenkins, Lars Nilsson and Amanda Poerning.

Staffing

During the year there was a maximum of six members of staff working at IJP at any one time - on both full and part time contracts.

Future Developments

IJP remains confident in its ability to continue to work with new and existing clients and to deliver its core work of beautiful films and digital content. We believe that our business model, operating with a small core team and a wide network of freelance Producer Directors, together with continuous creative innovation as demonstrated during the period under review, will enable new growth in the year ahead.

Following the year-end, in May 2023 we launched an exciting new social impact project with Rethink Mental Illness, a leading national charity which seeks to improve the lives of people severely affected by mental illness. The project will see a production trainee (a person with lived experience of mental illness) and a participatory filmmaker/trainer join IJP for six-months to support the launch of and create content for the charity's new TikTok channel which will raise awareness of mental health and wellbeing amongst an audience of young people across the UK. This project will be on-going with a new trainee recruited bi-annually.

We will also continue to invest in developing our social impact programme alongside our core commercial work. Non-Executive Director, James Greenshields, will continue to work in partnership with third and public sector organisations to develop a new social impact project, the Suicide Prevention Film Unit.

Reserves Policy

IJP requires a level of free reserves to safeguard the organisation, protect options for future development and to achieve the following:

- the option to develop new services and/or to expand current ones;
- to ensure that delays in the receipt of expected income do not interrupt services or cause serious financial difficulty for the organisation; and
- the ability to survive unexpected setbacks and problems arising from internal or external causes.

The Board will review the level of reserves on an annual basis.

The level of free reserves for the year under review amounts to £73,267 (2022: £74,022). Such level would meet IJP's fixed costs covering approximately 8-months' expenditure, calculated at approximately £109,000 per year at current levels.

Free reserves are funds that do not have a restricted or designated purpose and which are not tied up in fixed assets.

Statement of Directors' Responsibilities

Company law requires the Directors to prepare accounts for each financial year and the annual report in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

In preparing those accounts the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the accounts; and
- prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue in business.

The Directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud or other irregularities.

They consider that the company is exempt from the statutory requirement for an audit for the year and is not required to obtain an audit exemption report.

This report has been prepared having taken advantage of the small companies exemption in Companies Act 2006.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Company information

Inside Job Productions C.I.C. is a private limited company domiciled and incorporated in England and Wales.

The company's registered address is 18-22 Aswin Street, London E8 3DL.

Basis of accounting

The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these accounts are rounded to the nearest pound.

The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102 (effective January 2022) (FRS102).

Despite the company not being a registered charity, these accounts have been prepared in the format of the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice 2019 Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS102), as this is considered the most appropriate format given the social enterprise nature of the organisation.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

Income

Income has been recognised net of VAT (where applicable) on the basis of entitlement, certainty and measurement.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Grant income policy

Grant income represents payments received or accrued in accordance to grants agreements.

Restriction of grant income is specified by the funder.

Restricted Funds policy

Restricted Funds were given for specific purposes which are narrower than the general objectives of the company.

Further details of Restricted Funds are disclosed in note 13.

Unrestricted Funds policy

Unrestricted funds are for use at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis, inclusive of value added tax, where not recoverable.

Expenditure relating to Film and Media production are those elements of expenditure directly incurred in performing these activities.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS (continued)

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Depreciation of tangible assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets in use, at rates and bases calculated to write off the cost or valuation of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixture, fittings, production and office equipment @ 50% - straight-line method.

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Account.

Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Rental payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment.

Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price.

Taxation

The tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable.

Current tax

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from net profit as reported in the Income and Expenditure Account because it excludes items of income or expense which are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are never taxable or deductible. The company's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates which have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting end date.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Employee pension and benefits

The costs of short-term employee benefits are recognised as a liability and an expense.

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the company is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

Since 1 September 2016, the company pays contributions into the Workplace Pension Scheme NEST as required by law. Contribution payable are charged to the Income and Expenditure Account in the year they are payable.

Financial instruments

The company only has assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Governance costs

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the company and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include external accountants' fees as well as legal expenses.

Support costs

The method used for the apportionment of support costs between activities is based on the level of expenditure for the different activities.

During this period under review, the social impact work of Inside Job Productions has been focused on the activities of the Mental Health Media Production Unit, a participatory filmmaking project based at HMP Wandsworth. The unit creates mental health and wellbeing-related film content, made by and for prisoners, and delivers the content across the London prison estate. The project has been funded through the HMPPS Innovation Grants programme and supplemented through the surplus income of Inside Job Productions CIC (specifically funding the costs of young people living with mental health problems who work as prison-based Production Assistants on the project).

We have worked with a cohort of serving prisoners who each receive training in film production skills – both theory and practice – and who then go on to lead on the creation of our film content. Our participants learn to write and direct their own films, based around the topic of mental health and wellbeing. We cover the process of film production, from scripting to pre-production, through to the casting, shooting and editing of the films themselves. Where possible, this content is also made available to our participants on release, so that they are able to create a portfolio to show to potential employers and/or to support applications for future education and training.
