Strategic Report for the Period Ended 31 March 2020

The directors present their strategic report together with the audited financial statements for the period ended 31 March 2020.

Principal activities

The principal activity of the company during the period was the operation of a hotel in London trading as "The Hoxton Shoreditch". The hotel comprises 210 bedrooms, seven meeting rooms and one restaurant.

In the period ended 31 March 2020, turnover increased by £1,597,004 to £15,744,721, with operating profit decreasing by £471,588 to £4,833,927.

Business environment

The local competitive environment continues to evolve. The local area has seen increases in both bedroom stock and in demand from the corporate and leisure segments. The directors are confident about the competitive position of the hotel in this changing marketplace.

Strategy

The company has benefited from the continued execution of the company strategy, offering an individual hotel, inspired by the local neighbourhood. The hotel offers unique experiences, value for money, inviting spaces beyond the guest rooms and is constantly evolving with the area in which it is based and the offerings it makes available.

Given the success, the same strategy will be followed in the coming year, with ongoing focus on developing new ideas and concepts in order to remain competitive, including the development of a rooftop bar which opened in December 2020.

Research and development

Market intelligence provides data about the local market to benchmark pricing decisions. An awareness of local hospitality and office developments, and planning applications for proposed developments, continues to be key to the directors' understanding of how trading may be affected by changes in the competitive environment.

Future outlook

Since March 2020, the outbreak of the COVID-19 coronavirus has had a devastating impact on the world economy. The business and personal leisure travel markets are only expected to return when both employers and individuals feel that it is safe to do so from a health perspective (PWC Hotels - response to COVID-19 & Hotel forecast).

Following government guidance, the hotel closed its doors in March 2020 and all but essential team members were placed on furlough under the British Government Job Retention Scheme until July 2020. The hotel reopened in July 2020 with focus on leisure business as travel bans and quarantine measures limit Corporate and Group business. Management have reviewed the operating costs of the business and restructured to reflect the lower revenue expectation.

In December 2020, London was reclassified into Tier 4 local COVID-19 restrictions, resulting in the hotel closing again temporarily. The hotel is currently expected to reopen in early 2021, although given the daily evolution of the COVID-19 outbreak and the global responses to curb the spread, the company is not able to accurately predict the future impact of the COVID-19 outbreak on its results of operation, financial condition or liquidity. The business will continue to monitor the outbreak in order to mitigate the impact of COVID-19 on the business, with a view to maximise yields.

Strategic Report (continued) for the Period Ended 31 March 2020

Principal risks and uncertainties

The directors have assessed the main risk facing the group as being the global coronavirus pandemic involving the spread of COVID-19 and the counter measures adopted by governments as they seek to mitigate the impact of the pandemic. The safety of our employees and guests are at the forefront of our response to the pandemic which includes a comprehensive plan to protect employees and guests. The economic impact on the hotel sector is widely reported and acknowledged by the directors and we have carried out a full restructure and reduced our cost base to manage to the forecast revenue levels while maintaining a proactive strategy to drive revenues.

Key performance indicators

The measurements used to assess progress against revenue objectives are average rate and Revenue Per Available Room (RevPAR), a function of occupancy and average rate. Before the closure of the hotel in March 2020 due to COVID-19, RevPAR had reported positive growth due to an increase in the average rate compared to the prior period.

Financial instruments

The company finances its operations through shareholder loans. External bank financing has been obtained by the company's parent, Newco NHL UK (17) Limited, to which the company is a guarantor and which is secured by a fixed and floating charge over the property, assets and undertakings of the company, its subsidiary and its sister companies.

The management team's objectives are to retain sufficient liquid funds to enable the company to meet its day to day obligations as they fall due whilst minimising cost of capital and maximising returns on surplus funds.

As all the company's funds are invested in sterling bank deposit accounts and its borrowings are all obtained in sterling there is no currency exchange risk exposure.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Period Ended 31 March 2020

1. General information

The Hoxton (Shoreditch) Limited is a private company, limited by shares, incorporated in England and Wales under the Companies Act. The address of the registered office is given on the company information page and the nature of the company's operations and principal activities are set out in the strategic report.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the company accounting policies (see note 3).

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

2.2 Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by the FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland":

- the requirements of Section 4 Statement of Financial Position paragraph 4.12(a)(iv);
- the requirements of Section 11 Financial Instruments paragraphs 11.41(b), 11.41(c), 11.41(e), 11.41(f), 11.42, 11.44 to 11.45, 11.47, 11.48(a)(iii), 11.48(a)(iv), 11.48(b) and 11.48(c);
- the requirements of Section 12 Other Financial Instruments paragraphs 12.26 to 12.27, 12.29(a), 12.29(b) and 12.29A;
- the requirements of Section 33 Related Party Disclosures paragraph 33.7.

This information is included in the consolidated financial statements of Newco NHL UK (17) Limited as at 31 March 2020 and these financial statements may be obtained from Companies House, Crown Way, Maindy, Cardiff, CF14 3UZ.

2.3 Going concern

At the reporting date, the company had net current liabilities of £8,897,959 (31 December 2018 - £8,421,667). The directors have received confirmation from the parent group that support will be provided to the company to meet its obligations as and when they fall due for a period of at least twelve months from the date of approval of these financial statements. On this basis, the directors have concluded it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Period Ended 31 March 2020

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.4 Turnover

The turnover shown in the statement of comprehensive income represents amounts receivable during the period, exclusive of Value Added Tax. The company has derived its turnover from the operation of a hotel in London. Room revenue is the main source of turnover for the company which is recognised over the period the rooms are occupied. Other income is recognised when services are rendered and an invoice is raised to the customer.

2.5 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

Freehold property - Nil

Long-term leasehold property - 50 years

Plant and machinery - 15 years

Fixtures and fittings - 10 years

Office equipment - 3 years

Assets under construction - Nil

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

2.6 Valuation of investments

Investments in subsidiaries are measured at cost less accumulated impairment.

2.7 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, being the estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost represents the purchase price of goods for resale.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.8 Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the period comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income, except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date in the countries where the company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the reporting date, except that:

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

2.9 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment.

2.10 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

In the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are shown net of bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the company's cash management.

2.11 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. ^C

2.12 Dividends

Equity dividends are recognised when they become legally payable. Interim equity dividends are recognised when paid. Final equity dividends are recognised when approved by the shareholders at an annual general meeting.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.13 Pensions

Defined contribution pension plan

The company operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the company has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in the statement of comprehensive income when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the statement of financial position. The assets of the plan are held separately from the company in independently administered funds.

2.14 Interest payable

Interest payable is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income on an accruals basis.

2.15 Reporting period

The financial statements are prepared for the period 1 January 2019 to 31 March 2020, a fifteen month period. The period was extended in order to achieve a co-terminus period end with its parent company. The comparative amounts presented in the financial statements (including related notes) are therefore not entirely comparable.

3. Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements, the directors have had to make the following judgements:

• Determine whether there are indicators of impairment of the company's tangible assets. Factors taken into consideration in reaching such a decision include the economic viability and expected future financial performance of the asset and where it is a component of a larger cash-generating unit, the viability and expected future performance of that unit.

Other key sources of estimation uncertainty:

Tangible fixed assets (see note 11)
 Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over their useful lives taking into account residual values, where appropriate. The actual lives of the assets and residual values are assessed annually and may vary depending on the number of factors. In re-assessing asset lives, factors such as technological innovation, product life cycles and maintenance programmes are taken into account. Residual value assessments consider issues such as future market conditions, the remaining life of the asset and projected disposal values.

All turnover arose within the United Kingdom.

Also, the company paid dividends amounting to £2,250,000 to Newco NHL UK (17) Limited (31 December 2018 - £4,500,000).

Norlake Hospitality Limited, the parent company of Newco NHL UK (17 Limited), charged the company £11,100 during the prior period in respect of expense recharges. This amount was paid in full by 31 December 2018.

At 31 March 2020, the company owed Norlake Hospitality Limited and other subsidiaries of the Norlake Hospitality group £933,313 in respect of group relief payments (31 December 2018 - £869,637). These amounts are included in other amounts owed from group undertakings.

The company is related to Ennismore International Management Limited (Ennismore) by virtue of the fact that Ennismore is controlled by a director of the company. During the period, Ennismore charged the company £1,542,776 (31 December 2018 - £1,433,261) in respect of management and other services and £1,152,901 (31 December 2018 - £754,943) in respect of expense recharges. At 31 March 2020, the company owed £1,285 to Ennismore (31 December 2018 - £361,602).

23. Contingent liabilities

The company is a guarantor to a £231.0m (31 December 2018 - £181.3m) bank loan facility taken out by the immediate parent company, Newco NHL UK (17) Limited. The available loan facility was fully drawn down at both period ends.

On 25 November 2020, the company's immediate parent company refinanced the existing loan facility at comparable market rates. At the same time, the loan was increased by £50m for the inclusion of a related party to the facility. The loan facility is repayable in full in December 2021. The company remains a guarantor of this debt facility.

24. Controlling party

The company is an immediate subsidiary undertaking of Newco NHL UK (17) Limited, a company registered in England and Wales. The ultimate parent company is Bharti Overseas Private Limited. In the opinion of the directors there is no single ultimate controlling party.

The largest group in which the results the company are consolidated is that headed by Bharti Overseas Private Limited, a company incorporated in India. Copies of the Bharti Overseas Private Limited consolidated accounts are available to the public and may be obtained from the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, India. The smallest group in which the results are consolidated is that headed by Newco NHL UK (17) Limited, a company registered in England and Wales. The consolidated accounts of Newco NHL UK (17) Limited are available to the public and may be obtained from Companies House, Crown Way, Maindy, Cardiff, CF14 3UZ.
