TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2022.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Objectives and activities

Cygnet Training Theatre & Cygnet Research Library is an educational charity dedicated to the training of professional actors and to the continual presentation of theatre and theatrical experience, and to providing research opportunities for Artists in Residence.

The year began on September 13th 2021 with a company of one boy and seven girls. For the first time we offered a one-year Postgraduate course – which was to join the third year of the course. One boy and one of the girls joined the two third-year girls, which made two even groups of four.

After an induction day for the company, during the first two weeks of term visiting students joined a 10-day intensive Stage Combat Course in Basic and Advanced weapon systems, given by Captivate Action. This culminated on Thursday 23rd September with a Fight Night at 6pm open to the public who voted for the most enjoyable fight, followed the next day by the examinations. Four visitors attended making the total 12 in all. Everyone passed their examination, five with merit.

Alistair Ganley directed the first year actors in a double bill of *The Yellow Wallpaper & The Giant Wisteria* by Charlotte Perkins Gillman & the final year group in *Crossing* by Reza de Wet. Both played for four performances from 25th November to 2nd December.

The Autumn term ended on Friday 17th December with Cygnet's Carol Celebration.

During the autumn the graduating actors began working on a showcase production with award-winning writer Neil Bebber. Another boy joined the group in January 2022, and the piece was written, workshopped and rehearsed under Neil's guidance to open in March. What if all this is real? played four performances at Cygnet Theatre before a lunchtime showcase on 31st March at the Jermyn Street Theatre, London. It toured in the Summer Term to The Alma Tavern in Bristol 16th -19th May & The Drayton Arms Pub Theatre from 6th – 9th July.

The first-year actors were directed by Lucy Corley, in *Splendour* by Abi Morgan which was performed at Cygnet from 29th March – 1st April 2022.

Kevin Johnson, of The Actors' Wheel, continued to lead classes in Physical Theatre & Devising, which resulted in a devised performance *Blitz* in St Catherine's ruins for Exeter's celebration of the 80th anniversary of the raid on 6th June.

In the summer term the company followed a workshop with Billy Geraghty making situation comedy & rehearsed Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* under the direction of Amanda Knott. The production opened at Cygnet Theatre on 29th June – 1st July before touring to various outdoor venues between 15th & 23rd July, visiting Dulverton, Lympstone, Alphington, Farringdon, Hatherleigh & Thorverton before finishing at Lapford Mill.

Cygnet continues to benefit from the regular freelance team of staff – including Stephen Copp & Jacquie Crago (Voice), Louisa Wilde (singing), Daisy Harrison (Dance), Kate Somerby (Trinity Diplomas) & Kevin Johnson – Movement & Devising. Mark Cassidy joined the team this year teaching Meisner Technique, and Mel Mehta has joined the voice staff.

Kate Somerby prepared the students for their Trinity Diploma examinations: first/foundation year Cygnet students prepared for the ATCL Performance Diplomas in Speech & Drama & Performing Arts (Associate of Trinity College London – Level 4 QRL) on 28th April - all gaining good passes. Third Years Elly Lee & Meg Sharland gained their LTCL Diplomas – (Level 6 QRL), Elly with Distinction.

Elly Lee also received the Equity Cup, awarded by the local branch of Equity. Elly Lee & Edward Gist graduated with offers of representation from agents.

Alistair Ganley offered evening courses in Improvisation in the Autumn & Spring Terms, which continue to be popular.

Cygnet attended one Careers' Fair at Teign School and has made contact with the Drama Department head at Exeter School with a view to future collaborations.

Many professional directors, teachers and performers also give their time to join our termly Assessment panels, providing feedback for students on their work and progress, which not only helps the students but give Cygnet the in-kind benefit of at least £1500, to add to benefits from the modest fees which many of professionals take whilst working with the Cygnet Company.

Cygnet Theatre ran approximately 30 events at the theatre, stewarded by a team of over 30 Front of House volunteers, collectively giving over 360 hours throughout the year, which is equivalent to over £2,250 in-kind payments.

Cygnet hosted a number of visiting companies and guest artists, as well as continuing to present folk concerts in partnership with Wren Music.

On Tuesday 14th June Richard Digby Day returned to the Northcott Theatre to talk with Daniel Buckroyd – current Artistic Director – about the life of theatre and being an Artistic Director in a Repertory Theatre.

Cygnet initiated a Musical Theatre Competition on 28th May at which two august practitioners – Luke Simnet and Naomi Lee Schulke were judges. The Mercure Southgate kindly provided Luke with accommodation for the night. The competition attracted a wide series of applications and finalists from different age categories performed at the theatre to great acclaim.

As the country was still recovering from the pandemic, Cygnet welcomed around 1843 of our expected 3000 audience members into the building and hosted local groups.

Cygnet building was also hired: Wren Music for choir rehearsals; Louisa Morgan, Katy Bringloe, Joe Levy & Pete Rawcliffe for singing teaching. Anthos Arts continued to hire on Saturdays and Theatretrain hired the building for a week in August 2022

Hannah Brooks continues to run Cygnet Youth Theatre evening class for 12yrs and upwards, who performed *The Secret Diary of Adrian Mole*, during the Dream Festival.

Cygnet continues to benefit from the Solar PV installation made in 2012.

We remain indebted to the Associates, our Front of House Staff and Trustees for their help and support throughout the year.

Financial review

As shown in the statement of financial activities on page 7, incoming resources have decreased during the year by £ 24,853 to £114,593 (2021: £139,446).

Income from Cygnet productions totalled £10,965 (2021: £5,031).

Direct costs of Cygnet productions totalled £10,154 (2021: £2,237).

Fundraising and publicity expenses decreased by £2,159 to £6,028 (2021: £8,187).

Expenditure on charitable activities increased by £49,356 to £144,591 (2021: £95,235).

This gave net incoming/(outgoing) resources during the year of (£36,026) (2021: £36,024), bringing the total fund balance at 31 August 2022 to £260,356 (2021: £296,382).

The Trustees aim to hold sufficient reserves to cover running costs for 3 months. This equates to approximately £20,500.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate their exposure to major risks.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The charity's objects and regulations are set out in the company's Memorandum and Articles approved on 13 January 2000. The company is the successor to the earlier non-incorporated charity which ceased to operate and its assets and funds transferred to the present charity.

The charity is governed by a board of trustees.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Cygnet Training Theatre & Cygnet Research Library is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The registered office is Cygnet Theatre, Friars Gate, Exeter, Devon, EX2 4AZ.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's [governing document], the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \pounds .

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. There were three restricted funds during the year:

- Building fund: this fund is maintained for the upkeep and improvement of the theatre building
- Student welfare fund: this fund is maintained to contribute towards the living costs of the students studying with the company
- Project fund: this fund is maintained to contribute to any project for which Cygnet is raising money, for a specific purpose, on an ad hoc basis

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Income represents grants, donations, tuition fees and other revenue receivable during the year.

Government grants are recognised at the fair value of the asset received or receivable when there is reasonable assurance that the grant conditions will be met and the grants will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

All expenditure is included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis.

Direct charitable expenditure

This comprises all expenditure directly relating to the objects of the Charity. Where appropriate, it includes a proper allocation of items of expenditure involving more than one cost category. Where expenditure is of both a charitable and administrative nature, it is split between the two. In most cases, this results in 70% going to charitable expenditure and 30% to management and administration expenditure.

Management and administration expenditure

This comprises the costs which are not incurred directly in any of the charitable activities or projects of the Charity. Where appropriate, it includes a proper allocation of items of expenditure involving more than one cost category. Where expenditure is of both a charitable and administrative nature, it is split between the two. In most cases, this results in 70% going to charitable expenditure and 30% to management and administration expenditure.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Freehold property 2% per annum on written down value

Freehold land 0% per annum

Property improvements 4% per annum on written down value

Plant and equipment- grand piano 0% per annum

Plant and equipment- computer hardware 33% per annum on written down value Plant and equipment- other 20% per annum on written down value

Costumes 0% per annum

Freehold land is not depreciated. Costumes are not depreciated as they are well maintained and repaired when necessary.

The company inherited a property and it is included at market value on the date it was transferred to the charity. The property is used by the charity to house the research library and provide accommodation for visiting lecturers. Rental income is received from one individual and the property has been accounted for as property within tangible fixed assets.

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.7 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost comprises direct materials and, where applicable, direct labour costs and those overheads that have been incurred in bringing the stocks to their present location and condition. Items held for distribution at no or nominal consideration are measured the lower of replacement cost and cost.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price less all estimated costs of completion and costs to be incurred in marketing, selling and distribution.

1.8 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
