Structure, Governance and Management

The Trustees that held office during the financial year and at the date of this report are set out above. The Trust deed allows for up to 10 Trustees to be appointed. Trustees serve until they resign or come up for re-election. One third of the board of Trustees retire annually by rotation, but are immediately eligible for re-election. New Trustees are nominated by existing members of the board and are appointed, where they have the necessary skills to contribute to the chanty's management and development. New Trustees are provided with information that they need to fulfil their roles, including information about the role of Trustees and chanty law. Of the existing Trustees, three have been Trustees since the inception of the chanty in the year 2000 and the other three for more than one year.

The Trustee group meets four times a year with one of these sessions being in January and taking the form of a full day for strategic planning of the forthcoming financial year (April - March) Although Trustees have not been allocated specific areas of responsibility in the past, this remains an aspiration for the next financial year

The charity's Chef Executive is responsible for the day- to- day running of operations within the charity and managing the three other staff members of the charity on behalf of the Trustees

The charity has its main office in Learnington Spa in Warwickshire with supporting activities being carned out at the Chairman's house in Sussex. No remuneration is paid for the use of the Chairman's facilities.

In addition there is a strong group of "Associates" comprised of self funded people who assist, either with a function in the organisation or a particular task in order to help us fulfil our objectives. Associates are appointed by the Trustees on the basis of an application form and the recommendation of the Executive Director. The Executive Director is responsible for allocating duties to, and supervising the activities of the Associates.

The core business of the charity is in producing interactive audiovisual lessons - currently on DVD - for the benefit of people in the developing world. In addition the charity is also aiming to form links with other organisations and individuals overseas with a view to distribution and implementation on the ground. The charity has no overseas staff members but simply links to existing community groups and networks in the countries concerned. During 2006/2007 Thare Machi Education has active links with partners in the following countries. Cambodia, India South Africa, Kenya, Malawi and Uganda.

The relationship between Thare Machi Education in the UK and local partners overseas is one of a true partnership. Our ideal model involves working with the local partners so that they produce translations and recordings from our English scripts. These are often exchanged for hardware and equipment in which to play the educational DVDs.

The DVDs themselves are produced by Eurotalk interactive, a new media company based in London, which remains one of our major supporters. At present the discs are provided at no cost to ourselves

Risk Management

The activities of the charity have been subjected to a risk assessment and these can be categorised into risks, which have low possible consequences, and risks, which have high possible consequences. The risks have been identified as follows

Risks to do with the product (educational DVDs)

- Functionality of players and functionality of discs
- The quality of production
- The reliability of production
- The quality of English scripts
- The quality of translated scripts
- The quality of lessons and images
- The appropriateness of lessons images

Risks to do with the organisation Thare Machi Education and subdivisions of this would be a

- Quality and number of partner's,
- Availability of funding,
- Quality and reliability of staff,
- Quality and reliability of Associates
- Quality and reliability of Trustees

The MAJOR risks to the progress and development of the charity have been identified as

- The quality and reliability of production
- The quality of the content of the discs
- The quality of the staff

Theses risks have been mitigated by the following activities

- Exploration of alternative methods of production, to avoid over reliance on Eurotalk
- Peer review and cross checking of lesson content
- Development and training of staff to avoid reliance on any one individual

The trustees review these risks on an annual basis and the following principles are embedded in the organisation to minimise the risks

- Strong emphasis on relationships running horizontally and vertically throughout the organisation
- Maintaining adequate reserves
- Appropriate insurance cover

In assessing risk, the Trustees recognise that any international operation requires the acceptance of, and management of risks, if the key objectives of the chanty are to be achieved

Objectives and Activities

Thare Machi Education is a UK based, non-governmental, non political and non religious organisation established in 2000, it is constituted under a Memorandum of Association dated 29 January, 2000 and is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission. The Memorandum of Association defines the charity's objectives as being

- To educate and train young people and children (the beneficiaries) in any part of the world where social and economic
 conditions put them at risk of exploitation, particularly from prostitution or forced labour, so that they may fulfil their
 potential and their conditions of life may be improved
- To promote the protection and preservation of health amongst the beneficianes by informing and assisting them in avoiding the Human Immunodeficiency Virus
- To relieve disability and to relieve disability amongst the beneficianes in any part of the world by the provision of medical
 and surgical treatment and by providing education and training designed to enable them to overcome their disability"

In pursuing these objects, Thare Machi Education has focused on producing and developing a growing library of interactive audiovisual lessons that are currently being published on digital versatile discs (DVDs). Initially, these were focused on the prevention of infection of HIV/AIDS, but they have grown to include the wider social context of the disease in a number of different geographical and cultural locations.

The activity of the charity is the publication of educational content. This involves the following

- Drafting, reviewing and finalising the scripts for new lessons in English
- Selecting appropriate images to illustrate the teaching content of each new lesson
- Refining and signing off a new interactive DVD in English
- Translating the English script of that new lesson into the languages of our partners
- Recording the sound track of the new lesson in the languages of our partners
- Producing and signing off a new interactive DVD of a new topic for our partners
- Forming links with new partners in developing countries and inviting them to implement and use the DVDs on the ground
- · Operations associated with the efficient running of the charity including fund raising, reporting and accounting

The charity delivers its activities through the use of our own staff and through and the previously mentioned Trustees and Associates Thare Machi Education has three full time and one part time staff members

A major component of our modus operandi is to co-opt the skills, abilities and time of the growing group of "Associates". This means that a vast proportion of the activities of the charity are achieved through donations in kind and during the year 2006/2007 these activities are not fully reflected in the balance sheet. It is intended in the financial year these activities will be increasingly valued and appear in the accounts.

Activities and Achievements

This Trustees report covers the seventh year of Thare Machi Education's existence as a registered chanty and limited company During 2005/2006 the efforts to create new English lessons and to translate them into the language of our partners were the main priorities. But the end of the reporting period 20 lessons existed in English with a rapidly growing number being translated, recorded and produced in other languages. During the reporting period we were linked to the following countries India, Cambodia, Malawi, Kenya, South Africa and Uganda.

In many of these countries we are working with partners speaking a number of different languages. For example, in Uganda we have links to groups speaking five different languages and at the end of the reporting period translations were being worked on in all five languages. Throughout the year we maintained our links with existing partners and developed a number of new ones as well.

Consistent with the objective of developing new sources of production of the discs, a contract was placed with a Johannesburg based media company "Transafrica Media" to produce a specialist product for Africa. This will be our four HIV and AIDS titles in all 11 official languages of South Africa, plus French and Swahili. This is a major contract and although not complete at the time of reporting, will produce a resource that can be used through out much of Africa, where these languages are spoken

Change of name

One of the major events of the reporting period was the decision to adopt Thare Machi Education as our formal working name. This followed increasing confusion between the former working name of "The Starfish Initiative" and other organisations with the name Starfish in their title. As the Charity was originally registered with the Charity Commission under the name "Thare Machi Limited" and in the absence of any alternative obvious appropriate names, we have agreed to use Thare Machi Education as our working name and to market ourselves as time. A new logo and strap line was commissioned which resulted in our slogan becoming "Technology Bringing Knowledge and Hope" The Starfish emblem will continue to be discreetly used for continuity for the immediate future.

Investment Policy

The Trustees have the power to invest such assets as they see fit. As the Charity has benefited from the generosity of significant benefactors, our cash reserves have been held in a high interest deposit account. The question of investing our donated resources will be considered at the trustee's strategic planning day in 2008.

Plans for the Future

During the Trustee's strategic planning in February 2007, objectives for 2007/2008 were agreed 26 languages were identified as the "base" languages with which we will work. The objectives are as follows

- 1) To complete the translation and recording of five lessons (4 HIV lessons plus TB) in each of the base languages during the year
- 2) To produce 12 new lessons in English
- 3) To produce a monthly email update for internal circulation
- To produce a printed annual report
- 5) To commission an evaluation study
- 6) To allocate areas of responsibility to individual Trustees
- 7) To produce more comprehensive supporting literature
- 8) To identify new corporate sponsors
- 9) To organise an event to involve and inform the Patrons

It is intended that at the end of 2007/2008 the Charity will be on a firmer administrative footing with a full family of supporting literature and greater clarity of the roles of Trustees, staff and Associates. The opportunities are immense and our ability to tackle them needs to be continually reviewed creatively on an annual basis.

Financial Review

The results for the year are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 10. Income has increased significantly compared to 2006 as a result of a large donation received in the year. Expenditure has also increased significantly principally due to donations and write offs of assets.

Reserves Policy

The income of the charity can fluctuate greatly year on year. The trustees aim to maintain reserves sufficient to continue operations in the long term and meet unexpected shortfalls in income as they occur.

Trustees' Responsibilities In Relation to the Financial Statements

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing these statements, the directors are required to

select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,

make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,

state whether applicable Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and

prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985 They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities

Statement as to disclosure of information to auditors

So far as the directors are aware, there is no relevant audit information (as defined by Section 234ZA of the Companies Act 1985) of which the company's auditors are unaware, and each director has taken all the steps that he ought to have taken as a director in order to make himself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditors are aware of that information
