None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company All of the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £10 in the event of a winding up

The current trustees were recruited personally to provide specific skills to the Board Although there is no specific recruitment policy, the charity would advertise for specific trustees if it felt this appropriate.

The charity has a simple organisational structure - a CEO with responsibilities for the operational management of the charity who is supported by the Administrator

Transactions with related parties are disclosed in the notes to the accounts

The directors regularly review all financial and operational risks which may have an impact on the charity Procedures are adopted to mitigate perceived risks and these are subject to regular review to ensure that there are adequate safeguards in place

Objectives and activities

The Company is a charity registered with The Charity Commission The initial objective of The International Medical Education Trust is the promotion of a network of partnerships among individuals, groups and institutions in developed and developing countries for cooperation in agreed programmes of medical education, service and research

We have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when setting our programmes aims and objectives for the improvement of medical education and healthcare delivery for the public benefit. The trustees always ensure that its programmes are in line with the charity's aims and objectives and our intention is to improve the standard of medical education and healthcare delivery in the areas in which we work

Achievements and Performance (2011-2012)

This year was marked by an ambitious expansion in our activities in Palestine

made possible initially by the generosity of the guests in our successful Annual Dinner in March at the House of Lords and followed on by many other large and small donors. The demands on our services grew exponentially The Palestiman Health Education Centre (PHSEC) supported by IMET2000 in Ramallah has become known as the premier provider of CPD and continuous education and training for nurses, dentists, doctors and allied professionals in the West Bank and Gaza The Centre now employs 2 nurses, 2 dentists, 2 doctors as well as part time IT, administrative and business staff. These are busy running workshops in specialist disciplines on a monthly basis, often with invited speakers from overseas, as well as increasing both the quality and the quantity of valuable educational material freely available on the website Equipment for an embryonic telemedicine network was purchased and installed in 2012 in Ramallah, Nablus, Jerusalem and Hebron (West Bank) and in Gaza City and Khan Younis (Gaza) so that the north, middle and south of the West Bank are linked and the north and south likewise in Gaza. We are also establishing an electronic library in the Centre which will provide free access to thousands of international journals to all Palestinian health professionals signed up to our programmes. We are still supporting a PhD student (Pathology) in Cairo, another in paediatric nursing in Nottingham, 13 MSc students in University of London (Management of Burns) and have a young doctor starting training in Jordan (a 4 year course) in Child Psychiatry We are fortunate that the newly appointed Minister of Health, Dr Hani Abdeen, has worked with us in medical education ever since 1991 and is keen to continue on a partnership basis particularly in upgrading his mental health programme. The previously reported programme to upgrade the Burns Service in the OPT in partnership with MAP and the Ministry of Health continues apace, indeed the MoH recently asked IMET2000 to take the lead in setting up new Burns Units in Hebron and in Ramallah

Work in the Ukraine has also continued successfully under the aegis of the UNESCO Chair in Cryobiology held by Professor Barry Fuller. Of particular note is successful support for yet another prestigious 3-year grant in Kharkiv and the award of his Doctorate in UCL to Dr Andriy Yabluchanski in December, 2011 again helped and supervised by Barry Fuller.

The Medic-to-Medic (M2M) programme has doubled in size during the last year and has expanded into Uganda In addition to the cadre of medical students, the programme has broadened to support pharmacy, physiotherapy, clinical officer and health sciences management students. Also, 2012 sees the graduation of the first cohort of medical students who have been supported by M2M for the entirety of their medical education. They will add to the 9 doctors who have been part-supported by M2M and are now all practising in Malawi.

Although still focussed on the College of Medicine in Blantyre, a partnership has been established with the College of Health Sciences in Lilongwe and a pilot programme has been launched at the College of Medicine at Gulu University in Northern Uganda. This is a particularly important as Gulu is a post-conflict area and M2M is testing its capacity to support an expansion of its programme in another country.

This year also saw M2M produce two academic papers in highly respected journals in the field of international healthcare development. This, coupled with the programme's robust monitoring and evaluation framework, contributes to M2M's strategic ambition to not only provide support for needy students, but also to make a significant impact on the understanding of healthcare issues in the developing world. The enlargement and expansion of these programmes and our inability to attract major long-term Government (DfiD) funding to meet the increased costs forced us to reconsider our strategies in the Middle East and in Africa With the full agreement of our IMET2000 Board of Trustees, it was decided in July 2012 that the M2M programme had grown to a point where it could support itself as its own organisation and so it was agreed by all parties that it should move out from the umbrella of IMET2000 M2M is in the process of registering new charity called "Health Workers For All" but the separation took effect from September 1st, 2012 These accounts will therefore be the last to embrace the M2M income and expenditure

Financial Review

None of this ambitious programme would have been possible without the loyal support of so many Trusts, Foundations and numerous individuals. We are deeply indebted to them all, large and small, and forever thankful and grateful that they still think us worthy of support even though they are asked to help in real emergencies, natural disasters and conflicts and obviously competing worthy causes. In fact our combined income has increased this year by some 20% We thank our major sponsors including the Sir Stewart Halley Trust, Medical Aid for Palestinians (MAP), INTERPAL, the Asfari Foundation, the Bseisu Foundation, the AM Qattan Foundation, the Esmee Fairbairn Trust, the Linbury Trust as well as the many smaller donors and the fundraising efforts of Harriet Paul and Lord David Evan who combined to make the Annual Dinner in March such a resounding success. M2M doubled its funding in the year thanks to the continued support of its numerous regular donors, an expanded fundraising campaign, and university initiatives for example in Cambridge, University College London, Imperial College London, the University of East Anglia and a new student branch in the University of Sydney

Organisation

The new organisation of IMET2000 took effect from September 1st 2012 so that M2M moves out and the parent charity concentrates 95% of its work in Palestine We wish to thank Dr Kate Mandeville for her leadership of M2M and congratulate her on gaining such a prestigious World Bank posting in the USA. We are sad to lose our Business Manager Ms Nam Thaker who is going to work full time with M2M in future. The M2M Management team, which also comprises Mr Paul Purcell, Dr Nick Mandeville, Ms Teresa Due and Dr Tamsin Lillie, will join them to form the core management of the new Health Workers For All charity. We are pleased to welcome Dr Malik Zaben as our CEO who will be assisted as Treasurer and Director of Corporate Development by Professor Colin Green. We also wish to thank Dr Aubrey Rose for his work in establishing the charity in 2000 as Company Secretary, now resigning and replaced by Professor Barry Fuller. We welcome Professor Sir Eldryd Parry as a new Trustee and two new Patrons in Ms Caroline Lucas, MP and Mr John Griffin.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST AUGUST 2012

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the special provisions relating to small companies and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)

After making enquiries, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual report and accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006

1.2 Incoming resources

Income from legacies and donations is accounted for on a received basis and grossed up for any tax recoverable. Grants are treated on a receivable basis in accordance with the Charities SORP

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts

1.3 Resources expended

All expenditure has been accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, such as support costs, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Governance costs include all items related to the statutory obligations and strategic management of the charity

The Charity makes grants to a variety of applicants in line with their policy stated in the Trustees report and on the fulfilment of specific conditions. These grants paid are included in the accounts on an accruals basis

1.4 Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are included in net outgoing resources
