None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company All of the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £10 in the event of a winding up

The current trustees were recruited personally to provide specific skills to the Board Although there is no specific recruitment policy, the charity would advertise for specific trustees if it felt this appropriate

The charity has a simple organisational structure - a CEO with responsibilities for the operational management of the charity who is supported by the Administrator

Transactions with related parties are disclosed in the notes to the accounts

The directors regularly review all financial and operational risks which may have an impact on the charity. Procedures are adopted to mitigate perceived risks and these are subject to regular review to ensure that there are adequate safeguards in place.

#### Objectives and activities

The Company is a charity registered with The Charity Commission. The initial objective of The International Medical Education Trust is the promotion of a network of partnerships among individuals, groups and institutions in developed and developing countries for cooperation in agreed programmes of medical education, service and research

We have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when setting our programmes aims and objectives for the improvement of medical education and healthcare delivery for the public benefit. The trustees always ensure that its programmes are in line with the charity's aims and objectives and our intention is to improve the standard of medical education and healthcare delivery in the areas in which we work

#### Achievements and Performance (2012-2013)

This year started off under the new IMET2000 Executive Council comprising Dr Malik Zaben as Chief Executive Officer (CEO) as well as Director of Research and Education in Palestine, Professor Barry Fuller as Company Secretary, and Professor Colin Green stepping down as CEO after 12 years in that role taking on a new role as combined Treasurer and Director of Corporate Development Having had such a good year in Palestine in 2011-2012 as reported in our last accounts with great expansion in our training and education programmes (largely due to the relentless efforts of Dr Zaben and his team in Ramallah), we started badly this financial year in that our financial position became so weak in September and October that the new CEO had to cut back on all his activities in both Gaza and the West Bank This was a most disappointing start to his stewardship as CEO However, we gradually restored order through gaining three substantial grants in November and December Even better, an anonymous philanthropist came to our rescue and agreed to match whatever we raised by our own efforts By the middle of January, we were again back on track and could expand our work in Palestine and in the Ukraine The huge success of the Annual Dinner in the House of Lords on February 1st 2013 consolidated our position and the matched funding that has continued through the huge generosity of our friend John Griffin (no longer anonymous) who has now become a Patron and is willing to go public on his support, has allowed us to expand our overseas PhD scholarships in research into novel burns treatments currently under way in our parent organisation, the Northwick Park Institute for Medical Research (NPIMR) This research will soon be useful as an inexpensive treatment to be trialled clinically in Gaza. Thanks to John, we can now for the first time fulfil the other major ambition we have long wanted to achieve and that is to back combined research and clinical training programmes in both the Ukraine and Palestine That combination was the back bone of NPIMR's raison d'etre and success and now we can combine that home UK-based scheme with overseas colleagues and expand into a far more international programme. We have after nearly 20 years come full circle

At a strategic level IMET2000 has also made its future far more sustainable by drawing up valuable memoranda of understanding with the Ministry of Health in Palestine, the World Federation of Societies of Anaesthesiologists, the International Federation of Medical Student Association, the Palestinian Medical Council, the International Development of Family Practise in Palestine Committee and last but not least with Medical Aid for Palestine We have worked well with MAP for many many years under the leadership of their CEO Steve James, his successor Tony Laurance wants further close cooperation which we much welcome to help them in their education and training programmes

IMET2000 is now supporting in Palestine 5 major long term projects comprising

- (1) A Centre for Continuous Healthcare Training and Development which has been operational since opening in 2008 and runs a programme of distance learning, videoconferencing, telemedicine, e-learning, workshops and overseas electives in nursing, dentistry and medicine
- (ii) A joint programme with MAP to upgrade the Burns Service in the West Bank and Gaza in which MAP is responsible for building fabric and equipment and IMET2000 takes the lead in training in burns surgery, anaesthesia, management of scarring and rehabilitation
- (iii) A long term programme in child psychiatry and child and adolescent mental health in general
- (iv) A 5 year programme in partnership with the WFSA in which IMET2000 funds an overseas expert in anaesthesia and management of pain to work in Palestinian hospitals for 4 weeks each at a time and committed to one visitor per month
- (v) A 5 year programme in partnership with UK experts in Family Practice to work with An Najaah University in a programme to upgrade primary health care throughout the West Bank

In the Ukraine, the UNESCO Chair in Cryobiology held by Professor Barry Fuller continues to be successful and active on a low budget

#### Financial Review

These are all heavy commitments which entail raising our income from about £250,000 in 2011 2012 to £500,000 in 2012/13 and possibly even more in future. The support of our Patron John Griffin has made a huge difference to our future viability. However none of the above programme or his matched funding would have been possible without the support of so many Trusts, Foundations and many loyal and generous individuals. We thank in particular the Asfari Foundation, Medical Aid for Palestinians, the Linbury Trust, InterPal, the Bseisu Foundation, the AM Qattan Foundation and the Esmee Fairbairn Trust for substantial grants. In addition we have to thank the many individuals who regularly support us through the very successful Annual Dinner in the House of Lords kindly hosted by Lord John Alderdice and organised meticulously by Harriet Paul and a committee lead by Mrs Peri Bassatne.

#### NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31<sup>ST</sup> AUGUST 2013

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the special provisions relating to small companies and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)

After making enquiries, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future Accordingly, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual report and accounts

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006

#### 1.2 Incoming resources

Income from legacies and donations is accounted for on a received basis and grossed up for any tax recoverable. Grants are treated on a receivable basis in accordance with the Charities SORP

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts

#### 1.3 Resources expended

All expenditure has been accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, such as support costs, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Governance costs include all items related to the statutory obligations and strategic management of the charity

The Charity makes grants to a variety of applicants in line with their policy stated in the Trustees report and on the fulfilment of specific conditions. These grants paid are included in the accounts on an accruals basis

#### 1.4 Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are included in net outgoing resources
