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TRUSTEES REPORT

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31st August 2015

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with its Governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

The company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital.

None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £10 in the event of a winding up.

The current trustees were recruited personally to provide specific skills to the Board. Although there is no specific recruitment policy, the charity would advertise for specific trustees if it felt this appropriate.

The charity has a simple organisational structure - a CEO with responsibilities for the operational management of the charity who is supported by the Director of Corporate Development and Treasurer.

Transactions with related parties are disclosed in the notes to the accounts.

The directors regularly review all financial and operational risks which may have an impact on the charity. Procedures are adopted to mitigate perceived risks and these are subject to regular review to ensure that there are adequate safeguards in place.

Objectives and activities

The Company is a charity registered with The Charity Commission. The initial objective of The International Medical Education Trust is the promotion of a network of partnerships among individuals, groups and institutions in developed and developing countries for cooperation in agreed programmes of medical education, service and research.

We have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when setting our programmes aims and objectives for the improvement of medical education and healthcare delivery for the public benefit. The trustees always ensure that its programmes are in line with the charity's aims and objectives and our intention is to improve the standard of medical education and healthcare delivery in the areas in which we work.

Achievements and Performance (2014-2015)

Although our income has fallen considerably compared with last financial year, our CEO and Director of Education and Training, Dr Malik Zaben has maintained the same high level of programmes in both Gaza and the West Bank in Palestine. The huge success of our 'Evening for Gaza' dinner on HMS Wellington on September 26th, 2014 on top of the healthy balance at the end of 2013/2014, has allowed us to continue the long term combined research and clinical training programmes in the Ukraine and Palestine in a sustainable way and increase the support for our projects in Africa. IMET2000 has had another successful year on the ground and the demands on our service continue to expand particularly with requests for help from the Palestinian Ministry of Health.

IMET2000 has continued with the projects highlighted in last year's report working in close partnership with the Ministry of Health in Palestine, the World Federation of Societies of Anaesthesiologists (WFSA), the International Federation of Medical Student Associations (IFMSA), the Palestinian Medical Council, the International Development of Family Practise in Palestine Committee (IDFPC), a student driven group in Oxford called OxPal and last but not least with Medical Aid for Palestine (MAP). We have worked well with MAP for many years and our collaboration and links with both MAP and a smaller NGO called IDEALS have been strengthened. The only real subtraction in our portfolio of projects is that we decided to pull out of the family practice project with An Najaah University in Nablus because it has attracted major funding from MAP, WHO and other large donors.

In summary, then, IMET2000 is now supporting in Palestine 6 major long term projects comprising:

- (i) A Centre for Continuous Healthcare Training and Development which has been operational since opening in 2008 and runs a programme of distance learning, videoconferencing, telemedicine, e-learning, workshops and overseas electives in nursing, dentistry and medicine
- (ii) A joint programme with MAP to upgrade the Burns Service in the West Bank and Gaza in which MAP is responsible for building fabric and equipment and IMET2000 takes the lead in training in burns surgery, anaesthesia, management of scarring and rehabilitation
- (iii) A long term programme in child psychiatry and child and adolescent mental health in general
- (iv) A 5 year programme in partnership with the WFSA in which IMET2000 funds an overseas expert in anaesthesia and management of pain to work in Palestinian hospitals for 4 weeks each at a time and committed to one visitor per month
- (v) A 5-year programme in prevention of hospital infections
- (vi) A 5-year programme in accident and emergency and trauma training for surgeons and nurses

In the Ukraine, the UNESCO Chair in Cryobiology held by Professor Barry Fuller continues to be successful and active on a low budget. It probably has most impact by supporting young scientists and doctors with travel bursaries to international conferences and workshops as well as supporting their IT needs with computer upgrades and electronic library funding.

Acknowledgements

The support of our Patron John Griffin has again made a big difference to our future viability. However none of the above programmes or his matched funding would have been possible without the support of many Trusts, Foundations and many loyal and generous individuals. We thank in particular InterPal, the Amjad and Suha Bseisu Foundation, the AM Qattan Foundation and the Barham Trust for substantial grants. In addition we have to thank the many individuals who supported us through the very successful 'Evening for Gaza' dinner held on HQS Wellington and organised meticulously by the IMET2000 Director of Corporate Development Events Manager Harriet Paul and a committee led by Mrs Peri Bassatne.

Financial Review

The finances of IMET 2000 continue to look reasonably healthy and despite the fall in income in the current year we still have a runway to cover existing financial commitments for 12 months. The Board recommended last year that the Executive Council should be strengthened through recruiting a part-time Business Manager and additional academic staff to assist our CEO, Dr Malik Zaben. We have been actively seeking new staff willing to work for £20/hour for the charity but have not thus far found suitable personnel. Having recruited our erstwhile Events Manager Harriet Paul to take over my role as Director of Corporate Development starting on November 17th 2014 we have actually managed the year without stress so successful has that appointment been. We have also confirmed Dr Nimisha Patel who has worked for many years in Gaza and the Lebanon for the UN as the Honorary IMET2000 Consultant in Mental Health. As UNESCO Chair in the Ukraine, Barry Fuller is the Deputy CEO responsible for that programme as well as being Company Secretary, whilst Nimisha will help Malik run our extensive mental health programme in Palestine and Lebanon. I remain in post as Treasurer and assistant to Malik in a part-time capacity. We do not feel that increasing our staff in the UK is justified unless the demands on our service are matched by increased income.

As some of our activities in Palestine are paid for locally through local sponsorship and low cost facilities, we anticipate that our annual expenditure from central funds in London will average £250,000, assuming that we do not take on more than our existing six major projects scheduled for 5 years duration. Analysis of the impact IMET2000 has on upgrading the Health Sector in Gaza and the West Bank in close partnership with the Ministry of Health indicates that we continue to run more useful activities on the ground than many other NGOs with ten times our income. This I believe is due to the close relationship Malik has established with the Ministry, university departments, the Palestine Medical Council and with nursing, medical and dental associations. Our administrative costs are tiny compared with other NGOs out there.

Because we have ongoing matched funding from our Patron, John Griffin, and an extremely supportive funding base in the UK and Emirates, we have the runway indicated above and estimate that we will probably raise our income again this year to 2013/2014 levels (i.e. near £500,000). Our fundraising strategy will alter slightly in that we know we are competing with the Syrian crisis (life and death) and have decided to make more grant applications with expectation of success based on our track record.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST AUGUST 2015

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the special provisions relating to small companies and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

After making enquiries, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual report and accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Incoming resources

Income from legacies and donations is accounted for on a received basis and grossed up for any tax recoverable. Grants are treated on a receivable basis in accordance with the Charities SORP.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

1.3 Resources expended

All expenditure has been accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, such as support costs, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Governance costs include all items related to the statutory obligations and strategic management of the charity.

The Charity makes grants to a variety of applicants in line with their policy stated in the Trustees report and on the fulfilment of specific conditions. These grants paid are included in the accounts on an accruals basis.

1.4 Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are included in net outgoing resources.
